## Garner Organization Claims 461 Delegates on First Ballot

DALLAS, Texas.—John Nance Garner, vice-president of the United States, will go into the next Democratic national convention with over 461 votes pledged to him, according to E. B. Germany, chairman of the State Democratic Executive committee and co-chairman of the Texas Garner-for-President committee.

"We are convinced, from the deluge of pledges we have received at the Dallas headquarters, that there is a genuine popular demand for the nomination of Mr. Garner on the Democratic ticket. This comes, not from one section or group of states, but from the entire nation. From Oregon and Vermont, and from Georgia to the Southwest, we are getting the most enthusiastic protestations of friendship and admiration for our stalwart Texas statesman.

"Mr. Garner's way of thinking has captured the public imagination of the middle ground of America's straight-thinking citizenry. If the politicians do not listen to the voice of the people in 1940, I predict that the Democratic party as an organization won't be worth shooting. I have heard many comments that the politicians are going to pick the next candidates for both the Democratic and Republican parties. My advice to them in both parties is to listen to what the people are thinking. If they don't heed the deep longings of the mass of America's citizenry, they will be politically dead after the next election. I repeat: If the Democratic politicians attempt to thwart the will of the people in the next convention, the party of Jefferson and Jackson won't be worth the effort to put it out of its misery."

In outlining the strength that he claims for the Texan, Mr. Germany pointed out that out of 1,100 votes in the Democratic

convention, the south and border states will furnish Mr. Garner with 286, the chief block of which is represented by the 46 votes from Texas. The southwest and western states, without counting California, and taking but two of the farm states, Nebraska and Wisconsin, will yield Mr. Garner a total of 461 votes.

"Now I am not including in this forecast of 461 the 210 additional votes indicated from the states of New York, Pennsylvania and California," declared Mr. Germany. The Gallup poll in the last three weeks has printed definite forecasts of public opinion from these three states, which together have 19 percent of the total convention strength. These polls show, assuming that the President will not be a candidate which is the only way that Democrats believing in the continuance of its traditional party policies can think, that Mr. Garner is the choice of over 50% of the Democrats in New York and California and of over 60% of the Democrats of Pennsylvania.

Out of these three states, two will give Mr. Garner a clear majority of the convention, the Texas leader pointed out.

"There is no question in my mind," declared Mr. Germany, "that the people of the United States have very definite convictions on the coming presidential campaign. The principles involved weigh deeply on citizens everywhere. They embrace Mr. Garner because he stands for a principle that finds welcome reaction in every human being who worries and sometimes wonders on the future of his country."

"Mr. Garner's nomination by the Democrats of this country is inevitable. It is ordained in the hearts of the American people, and I view his nomination and subsequent election as certain, with the present trend of events."

The Robert Lee Steers opened the football season with a 27-0 victory over the second string Bobcats of San Angelo here Saturday afternoon.

The Kittens won the toss and chose to receive. Captain Scott got off a good kick, and the pig skin was returned to near the 35 yard line. The Kittens lost the ball shortly when the Steers recovered a fumble, penetrating the 20-yard zone in two or three downs. But finally the Steers failed to make their yardage and the ball went over. Frank Tubb intercepted a pass and ran 35 yards for the first marker. The place-kick for the extra point went wild. Half-back Melvin Hamilton, with the assistance of G. P. Lowry's lugging, rammed across the line for a second marker and added the extra point early in the second quarter.

The Steers, still playing most of the first half on San Angelo's end of the field, finished scoring for the first half when Lowry crack-off guard for the third touchdown and Scott placekicked the extra point to give the Steers a lead of 20-0 at the half.

The Kittens came back in the second half with a new spirit. They made yardage, penetrating the 20-yard zone, but the Steers horned them out when they got the ball.

When the Kittens again got possession of the ball, they took to the air but not a pass was completed. Then Frank Tubb appeared out of thin air, snatched a Kitten aerial, and trotted 30 yards, looking back for pursuers, to make a touchdown, standing up. The extra point was made, giving the Steers their 27-0 win. Coach Mullins took advantage

of the lead in the fourth quarter and ran in several substitutes who had never played in a game.

It would not be fair to give all the credit to any two or three stars in Saturday's game because it was through the splendid cooperation of the entire team that this spectacular victory was won.

Today, Friday, at 2:30, the Bronte Longhorns meet the Steers here. In their opening game with Talpa, the 15th, the Longhorns won with a 6-0 lead. Last week they went to Sonora and were routed by a score of 13-0.

**Never-Never Land**

A left-wing columnist recently offered his readers the amazing argument that the fact that private utilities are big taxpayers while publicly-owned utilities pay little or nothing in taxes, should be given no consideration for the reason that the utilities simply collect the money they pay in taxes from their customers, and so are not really taxpayers themselves.

That argument, widely extended, must inevitable lead into a never-never land of economic insanity. The shoe store doesn't pay taxes, because it adds them to the cost of the shoe you buy. Neither does the grocery store, because it adds its taxes on to your can of beans. Neither does any individual, because he gets his money from the concern for which he works, and so is just a tax middleman for them. But neither does the concern for which he works pay taxes, because it collects them from customers, who really pay no taxes either.

We'd better stop this before

madness results. If the left-wing economist's argument is sound, nobody pays taxes at all. It is all done by magic. And so government might as well take over all business, as there is no real worry about tax revenue whether private enterprise exists or not.

There is the argument, carried to the point of reduction and absurdum. And it is typical of the lengths to which those who want to see the private electric industry socialized, are prepared to go. Any theory, no matter how unsound, if cleverly enough developed can be made to seem reasonable to the uninformed. And the friends of power socialism exploit public credulence to a fare-thee-well.

But the fact remains that the utilities do pay millions in taxes every year -- and that when government takes them over the rest of the taxpayers must make up the burden. Many a community has discovered that sad truth to its disillusionment. But it doesn't look as if the majority of the people have yet been won over by these screwball arguments.

R. Johnson and wife Nola B. We expected to see a slight war panic among householders as there seemed evident an increase in commodity prices. Goods would be affected at higher than normal prices, but after the first rush to prevent family shortage, the buyer realized this nation is equipped to care for its own with a surplus in commodities. We feel we will be protected from the war profiteer who causes an increase in prices. A legitimate and reasonable profit is not unreasonable and is expected when war prices create a certain rise. But save us from the extensive profiteering of 1914. The sensible purchase of everyday produce and the wise buying of staples will help business to keep its head, if the purchaser keeps his.
