Bobbies Acclaimed Greatest Team In States History

A determined team of Dimmitt Bobbies met and overcame the stiffest competition ever encountered in a girls state basketball tournament last week at Waco, to earn the undisputed title of girls basketball champions of Texas. With the exception of the first half of the first game, which was played against Bynum, the Bobbies paced the scoring, leading their opponents all the way.

In the Bynum game Wednesday afternoon the Bobbies overcame a 7-point half-time lead to defeat the favored Bynum hoopers by a comfortable margin of 35 to 28.

The Bobbies were pitted against the Avery team in their second game of the tournament, played Thursday night with a 33 to 11 lead at half-time. Never in trouble during the game the Bobbies won a one-sided victory of 54-18. This was the only game of the tournament that Coach Blaine trusted the Bobbies fortunes in the hands of the second string. The junior girls, however, raised the hopes of local fans for another championship team next year with their exhibition of superb basketball ability.

In the semi-final game Friday night the Bobbies continued their march to the state championship by easing by a strong Cotton Center team by a score of 49 to 43. Although leading all the way the Bobbies were under constant pressure from the Cotton Center girls sparked by all-state Ruth Cannon, one of the ablest forwards ever to perform in a state meet. In defeating Cotton Center the Bobbies were avenged of one of their two defeats of the current year.

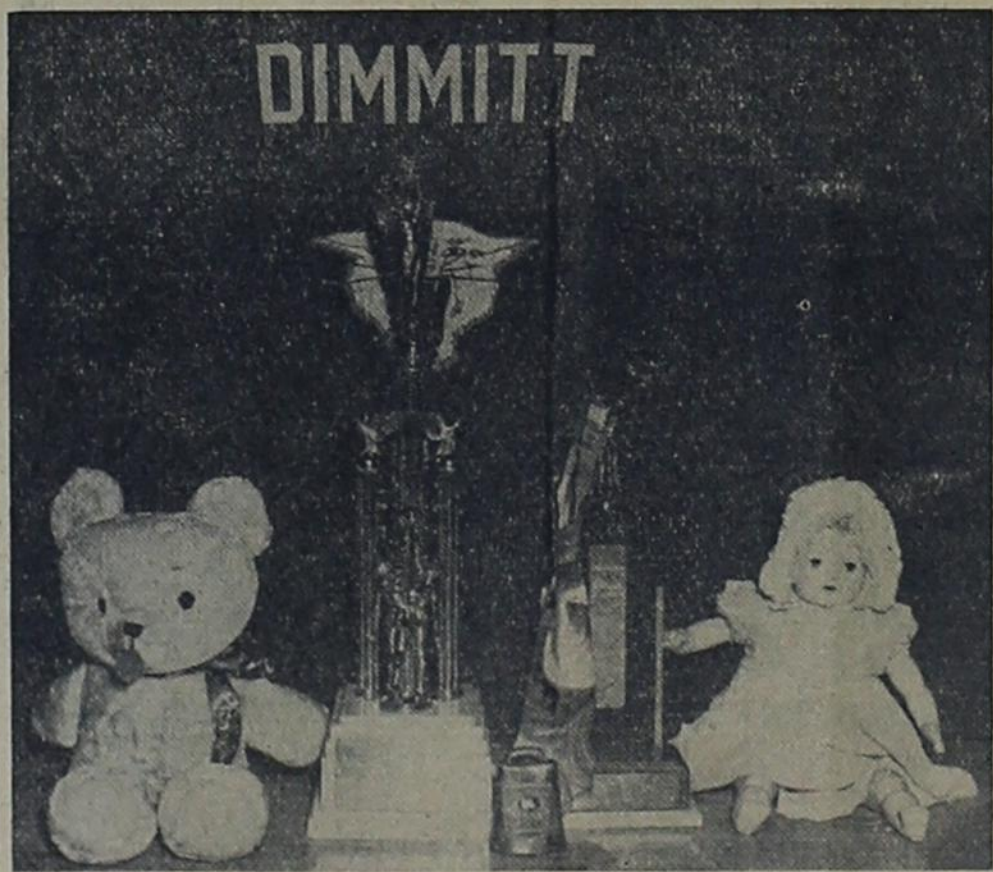
In the final game Saturday night, the Bobbies took the lead

at the opening of the game, and with the exception of being tied in the early minutes of the game, led the defending state champions Seagoville, during the entire game. The score stood at 28 to 24 at half-time and the final whistle stopped the scoring with the Bobbies leading 42 to 32. With a comfortable lead at the beginning of the last quarter the Bobbies froze the ball and held the scoring to a minimum for the last 8 minutes.

The Bobbies were supported at Waco by approximately one hundred Dimmitt fans who thoroughly enjoyed the four-day tournament, and witnessed other top teams of the state battle it out for coveted honors from consolation honors to second place.

Following the game Saturday night the Bobbies were guests of Dimmitt fans at a banquet at the Elite Cafe, when the champions were royally feasted by parents, fans, classmates and a number of Dimmitt college students who trekked to Waco from various colleges and universities of the State to see their home town team crowned State Basketball Champions.

The Dimmitt Bobbies are a balanced team, with every member an outstanding star in her department. Through team work, developed by Coach Blaine's patient coaching, determination and personal brilliance, the Bobbies were able to cop the highest honors in state basketball, and command the respect of all the opposing teams. The Bobbies have been referred to as a great team, the same could be said of each individual player.

Texas State Champions to Meet Iowa Champs

The Dimmitt Bobbies, as State Basketball Champions of Texas will go to Waco Friday, where they will play a traditional game with Slater, Iowa, the Iowa championship team.

The Bobbies, accompanied by their coach, John Blaine, and Mrs. Blaine and a number of parents, will make the trip to Waco by chartered bus. Although no accurate estimate is available predictions are that a large host of Dimmitt fans will be present Saturday night to witness the battle of the champions.

This will be the third year that the championship girls teams of Texas and Iowa have battled for cage supremacy. To date Iowa is one up on Texas teams. Kamrar defeated Mesquite in 1948 at Des Moines, Iowa. Seagoville divided a pair of games with Waterloo at Des Moines in 1949.

The Bobbies are rated as one of the best teams in the 12-year old history of girls state championship basketball, and by defeating Slaters corn-fed girls at Waco Saturday night they can be the most state-wide popular team in history.

Mr. Sheffy died Tuesday morning at 1:15 o'clock in the Amarillo Osteopathic Hospital after an extended illness. Cause of death was attributed to a kidney ailment. He was, however, successfully recovering from a serious heart attack, suffered several months ago.

Mr. Sheffy was born at Plainview on September 29, 1895, and came to Dimmitt from there in 1917. He was married to Miss Pearl Miller at Sweetwater in 1922.

He was in the hardware business and had extensive farming interests in Castro County. He had been active in civic affairs here, serving on the school board for many years, and was president of the Dimmitt hospital board, and Methodist board of stewards at the time of his death.

He was a member of the Methodist Church, the Masonic Lodge, and the American Legion. He was a veteran of World War I. Survivors include the widow, two daughters, Mrs. John Merritt and Miss Ann Sheffy, and one son, Ray Sheffy, Jr., all of Dimmitt; three brothers, Dr. L. F. Sheffy, West Texas State College, Canyon, Simeon E. Sheffy, San Francisco, and Sid Sheffy, Dimmitt; and three sisters, Miss Minerva Sheffy and Mrs. M. A. McGraw, both of Plainview, and Mrs. James C. Mahan, Childress.

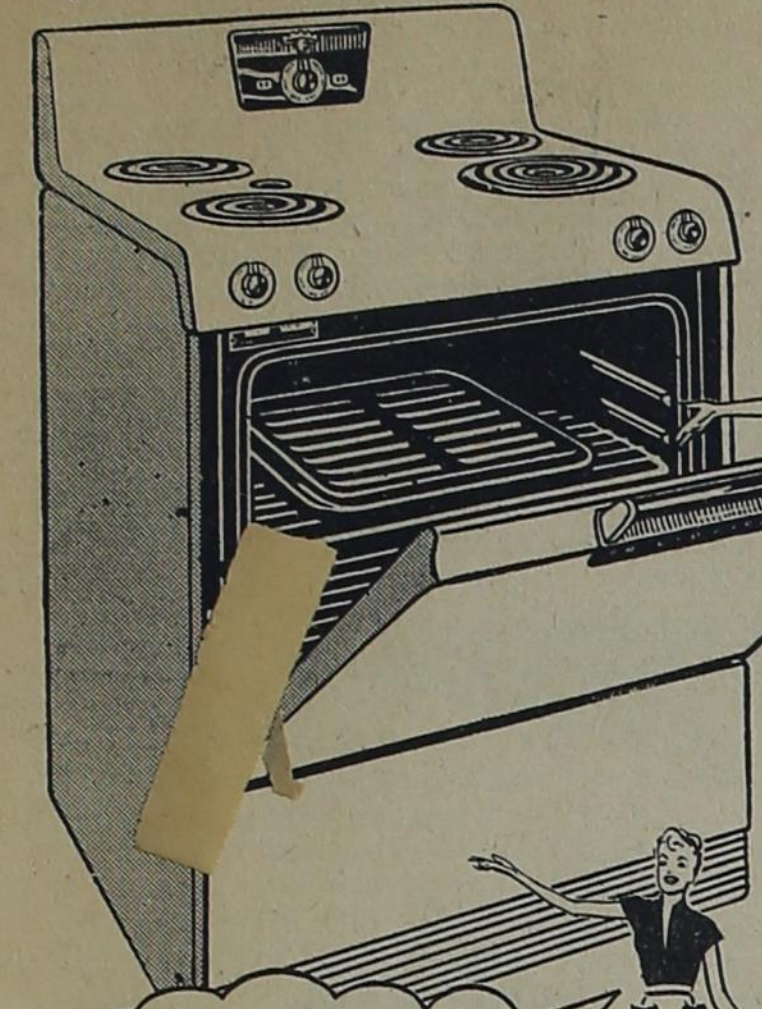

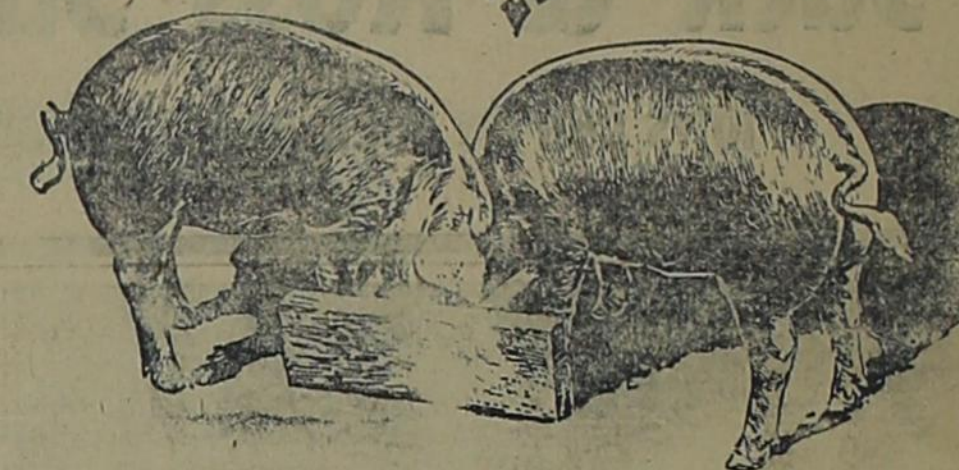

Public Education Needed In Control Of Social Diseases

Austin, March 15—The more than 2,000 cases of syphilis and 3,000 cases of gonorrhea throughout the State since the first of the year signifies the pressing need for continuing public education in matters of venereal disease, State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox believes.

Cox appealed for state-wide participation in making "Better Health for Texans" a year long

program. A "Better Health For Texans Week" was officially designated by Governor Allan Shivers last December.

Cox said the response of the public, the press, radio, motion picture theaters, television, and "other agencies and individuals during the campaign was excellent."

"But," he said, "The continued success in reducing the incidence of VD requires the full support of all the public."

The veteran of more than 13 years as State Health Officer said his department was continuing an "intensified" campaign against venereal infections through "all media of mass edu-

cation—newspapers, radio, feature releases, and talks to luncheon clubs and civic organizations."

"We've even gone into television to carry our VD warning to the people," Cox asserted. He said his division of public division of public health education had recently produced a color film and a motion picture trailer which were available for loan to television stations through local health agencies.

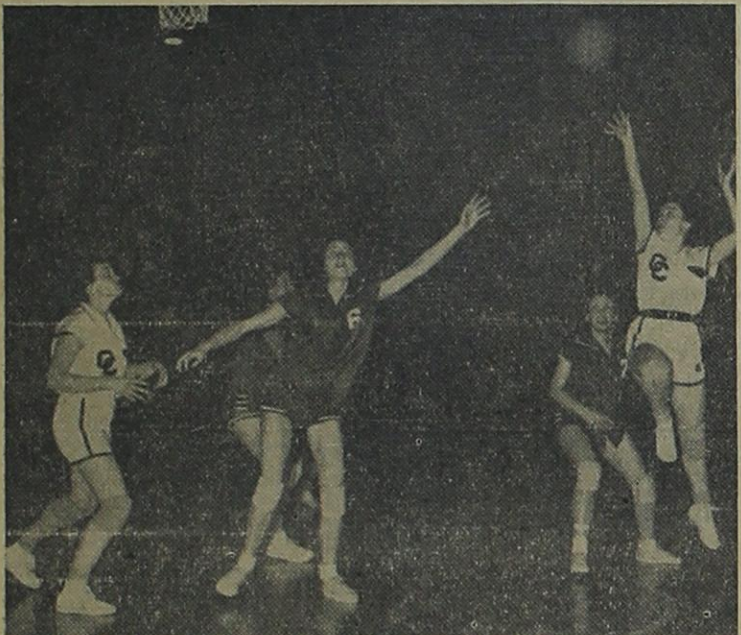
He said any organization desiring informational pamphlets, posters, and prepared speeches on the subject of venereal diseases could get them by writing to the State Department of Health in Austin.

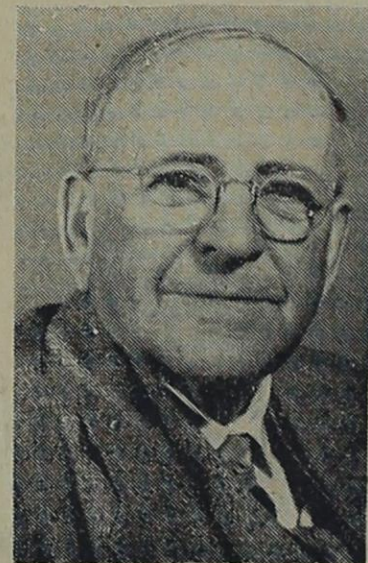

OUR FAVORITE RECIPE

Apricot Whip
1 cup apricot pulp
2 egg whites
1-8 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup sugar
1 tablespoon lemon juice, if desired.

Wash one cup of dried apricots. Cover with hot water and soak for one hour. (They may be cooked without soaking). Simmer for 30 to 40 minutes until tender. Mash apricots to a pulp or force through colander. Beat egg whites until stiff, gradually beating in the salt and sugar. Fold in the cooled apricot pulp. Add the lemon juice. Pile lightly into dessert dishes and chill before serving. Serves 4.

Dried prunes, dried or canned peaches, orange juice and pulp may be substituted for the apricots. More or less sugar and lemon juice will be necessary depending on the fruit used.

2. The apricot whip may be cooked in the double boiler. Cook until thick but not dry, stirring constantly.
