U. S.-British Forces Fight Grimly In Resisting Heavy Jap Pressure; 'Joker' Found in Price Control Bill Has Power to Check Farm Prices

MIRACLE:

Man on Luzon

The continued holding out of General MacArthur's "smoke-begrimed army in its foxholes on Bataan peninsula" to use his own words, challenged and won the admiration of all Americans.

It was felt that his long stand in the face of more than 10 to 1 odds, his ability to maneuver his men into a position where only a fraction of the Japanese power could be used against him, and the fact that he was still immobilizing a vastly superior force, entitled him to the title of "miracle man" of warfare.

If the Japanese attempted to infiltrate his lines, as often as not he checkmated them with counterattacks. If they succeeded, either by a skillful withdrawal or by vigorous counter-measures at hand-tohand, the following day would find the MacArthur army still intact, still fighting, still able to resist all efforts to drive him into the sea.

Though the communiques from Luzon never had given hope of a successful outcome, there was no tinge of heroics, save the tribute of the general to men who, without relief and subjected to almost constant attack by fresh troops in rotation, continued a defense that seemed to grow from day to day in strength rather than to be collapsing under pressure.

General Homma, Japanese commander, sent over a "leaflet raid" in which he strongly suggested surrender, paying tribute to the magnificent defense of MacArthur's army. It was not rejected-the army simply paid no attention to it whatever.

SINGAPORE:

Siege

The Japanese, having increased their pressure on the narrow and difficult Malayan peninsula, had finally induced the British defenders to make a sudden, dramatic withdrawal from the mainland, starting the long-expected siege of Singapore.

This, a battle expected to go down into history as one of the bitterest and bloodiest in the history of warfare, started with the 750,000 population of Singapore largely added to by civilian refugees from the main- supply lines.

It was the first test in Lattle of a fortress and stronghold called by British tradition the "Gibraltar of the Far East" and now, after 118 years of building and rebuilding its Java and Sumatra. defenses with more and more modern armament, the time had come for its testing.

Singapore stood buttressed on the north by a mile-wide strip of land from which the British had attempted to strip all obstructions which might offer refuge and cover to enemy soldiers or batteries; by another mile-wide strip of water which had become the "moat" of Singapore following the destruction of the granite causeway which connected the potato-shaped island with the peninsula.

CHECKMATE: On Farm Prices

The administration in Washington, having apparently lest an important point in the Price Control bill, seemingly discovered that "all was well" when a joker was found in the measure.

Agriculture Secretary Wickard said that the government power to buy and sell commodities in case inflation threatened, probably would give the administration powerful ourbs to keep farm prices down to parity.

The senate agriculture committee questioned Wickard for four hours, left his office somewhat ruefully admitting that his claims were probably true.

Some were quoted as saying that they felt their legislative victory over the administration had been nullified by a power the bill itself conferred on the government.

Wickard was frank about the whole thing. He told the senators that cotton, wheat, tobacco, will be stabilized at parity.

He said that corn and other feed crops will be stabilized at around 85 per cent of parity, probably to keep stock prices from going sky high, also to encourage farmers to stock, dairying and poultry-raising.

Livestock, dairy and poultry prices will be permitted to go above parity -on the same basis of reasoning.

Farmers who grow corn, however, will be given benefit payments by the government to permit their return to be up to parity.

PINCERS:

In Island Empires

Little by little a study of the maps of the island empires of the ABDA forces in the East Indies began to show the picture of the Japanese effort, and demonstrated that a giant pincers movement was being carried out with three major objectives.

On the extreme west, the two prongs of the Japanese pincers were working on Rangoon and Singapore. The former, if the Japs could crack it, they felt, would put an effective stopper on the Burma road. The latter would jettison British hopes of defending the west half of the island empire, and leave the Japanese fleet in command of the India-Australia


In the center lay Borneo, and with invasion forces going both to left and right of this island, it was evident that the Japs were seeking to wipe out the advance defenses of

On the east was the Bismark archipelago, and the drive here, while not so well established, apparently was seeking an invasion of Cape York, Australia, and a sweep down the east coast of the continent "down under," the only rich and populous section of the whole huge

Holding Dutch East Indies Is Vital to United Nations

Slim Crescent of Islands Blocks Jap Aggression By Forming a Barrier Between Continents Of Asia and Australia.

By the time these words are printed Singapore may have fallen. Japanese bombers may be raiding Australia and Japanese ships may be in Australian waters. Even so, according to the sober prediction of those in diplomatic and official circles who are able to look at the war map without wishful thinking, the tide may still be turned against the Japanese if one condition remains the same. That condition is that the United Nations continue to hold key erritory in that slim crescent of isands, the Netherlands Indies which orm a barrier between the continents of Asia and Australia.

There are two reasons why these experts believe this Malaysian barier may be held in spite of Japanese gains north and south of it. First, as one military man put it, "by ule of thumb Japan has already stretched her supply lines so far 'rom her home bases that they may be expected to snap in vital spots." Second, because of successful delayng actions now going on, time is ighting on the side of the United Nations, time for sufficient reenforcements to arrive, especially from the United States, which will snatch air superiority away from the Japanese and thus affect the tide of

Japan has so far extended herself, experts agree, that a powerful blow might topple her over backwards. General MacArthur has held a Japanese army of 200,000 men in the Philippines. Huge land, air and sea forces have been drawn into the siege of Singapore. Japanese troops are fighting in Burma, 3,000 miles from the Manchukuoan border. They are spread fan-wise from Sumatra in the west 4,000 miles along the equator to the Solomon islands beyond New Guinea.

United Nations' Barrier

It is the barrier the United Nations have established from Sumatra to the Solomon islands, with Java as the key point, upon which Japan may break her curved scimitar of

Japan has already penetrated scattered islands in some placesin Borneo, New Guinea, in the Celebes and in the Australian mandated islands in the Bismarck archipelago. But there are many dents in her sword already-more than 31 ships ost in the first few days of the batle in the Macassar straits, which ie between Borneo and the Celebes. Many more such losses will be irreparable.

Successful, although scattered atacks by American and Dutch planes and submarines and surface ships are taking their toll. And even hough Japanese units may secure some island bases near enough to oomb the Australian coast, and some ships are able to slip through to raid coastal towns, the sword hand will be badly strained. The tough, well-fortified, well-supplied island of Java can deaden her blows. And if enough other bases for allied bombers and subs remain from which the far-flung Nipponese invaders can be harassed, her course westward and southward can be

checked. For the United Nations fighting at the Malaysian barrier it is simply a problem of hanging on. For the United States it is a problem of producing and delivering the goods.

Against us is first our late start in war production; second, the great distance to the front-about six weeks from loading to unloading; and third, lack of ships.

Into High Gear

We cannot make up lost time but it is agreed that Donald (Battling) Nelson and his war production board will keep us in high gear from now

As for the ships, by June we will be producing them at the rate of two a day-cargo ships. As for the precious cargoes, fighting planeswhich have to be shipped-they are being turned out in rapidly increasing numbers. The figures are secret. I have it on good authority that it would take only 2,000 more planes to give us superiority in the whole Pacific. But far less than that are needed to establish superiority in the present fighting area since Japan must keep a large air force at home for defense of her own

"Hurry. Cut red tape. Take risks. Don't wait until you have had what you think is enough. Send what you have, risk it. We'll risk our lives to use it."

If we are willing and able to answer this message, Japan may be toppled over on her heels. With Singapore in Japanese hands some Japanese elements would be able to filter through the island barricade toward Australia.

The fall of MacArthur will release thousands of Japanese soldiers, the fall of Singapore, thousands more. If the key defense of Java goes, the Japs can then flood south to Australia and perhaps isolate that continent of hardy fighters. The invaders can also swarm westward through the Straits of Malacca, take Rangoon, gateway of the Burms road. They can move submarines into the Persian gulf and the Rec sea and threaten the life line to Britain's middle east armies and Rus-

Once China is cut off, Japan wil offer her a very favorable peace. Chiang Kai-shek would not accept but his followers might accept. That would mean thousands more of Japan's effectives could be released. and if Russia's supplies are cut off Hitler could take Moscow while the Japanese troops move on Siberia.

And so we can understand why the United Nations, fighting to hold their island defenses in the southern Pacific, are praying that in the next few weeks that we will risk what we have to bastion them. Even though it be little it need not be too late.

The Hermit Of Sharktooth Shoals

The Hermit of Sharktooth Shoals came to town the other day with the surprising news that instead of being an enemy of man, the maneating shark is now to be regarded as one of man's best friends, and an especial friend of the farmer's.


The Hermit is a former newspaper associate of mine who has renounced the noise and tumult of cities and now helps conduct a shark fishing establishment at Fort Pierce off the east coast of Florida. Along with most people, I had thought that the commercial use, if any, for sharks was limited to the hides, for belts and shoes. But now I learn from the hermit that shark liver oil is teeming with vitamins and is in great demand by pharmaceutical houses for those yellow pep pills that Americans are consuming in great numbers these days.

But that, it seems, in no way limits the usefulness of the lowly shark. After the hide has been stripped off and the liver extracted, the carcass can be ground up and made into a high potency fertilizer, rich in urea and nitrates. And that's where the shark's value to the farmer comes

Last year the Hermit and his sharking colleagues tossed overboard two million pounds of perfectly good carcasses, simply because they didn't have the machinery necessary to convert the defunct fish into fertilizer. This year, what with the announced shortage of nitrates and fertilizer, the Hermit feels that it is high time the government took an interest in the matter, and he is now in Washington for that purpose.

The more I hear about the shark profession the more colorful it sounds. The Hermit, for instance, tells me that the sharkery's president and founder is a prominent scientist, Dr. Alexander van Beyer, who has pioneered in the development of vitamin products from shark livers. The doctor has Chinese connections and is a member of the Hip Sing tong which is ar aid in the marketing of another byproduct, shark fins. The Chinese regard shark fins as a great delicacy

More than this, I understand that shark meat-by any other nameis an excellent food. Instead of let ting the sharks eat us we may turn the tables and eat the sharks! Wh

Salmon Dishes For Summer

It's always a good idea to have a can or two of salmon on your pantry shelves. Then when menu ideas fail you, or time is short, or your budget staggering under food bills, salmon will save the day! Few dishes are easier on the budget and offer more in healthful food values than the easily-prepared, delicious recipes we give you below.

All-In-One Salad

(Tested by Good Housekeeping Institute)



TATHARINE FISHER Good Housekeeping

Institute-approved measuring cups and spoons. Measure level 1/2 c. mustard pickle No. 2 can string beans, drained tomatoes s. diced cooked potatoes 1 peeled garlic bud,

1 peeled purple onion, 3 shelled hard-cooked eggs. sliced

% c. salad oil 1/4 tsp. granulated

1/4 c. vinegar % tsp. salt Few grains pepper Break up the thoroughly washed lettuce and ar-

range in the salad bowl. Arrange alternate layers of the string beans, tomatoes cut in eighths, the potatoes, salmon, onion, and eggs. Beat together the remaining ingredients with a fork, add to salad and toss well. Serves 6.

Salmon Mousse

(Tested by Good Housekeeping Institute)

Use Institute-approved measuring cups and spoons. Measure level. 1/4 c. cold water

2 tbsp. granulated sugar 1% tsp. salt 1½ tap, sait
1 tsp. powdered mustard
½ c. vinegar
1 egg yolk, beaten
1 envelope plain unflavored gelatin

1 thsp. bottled horseradish 1 1 lb. can (2 c.) salmon 1 c. finely cut celery 1/4 c. cream, whipped

Combine sugar, salt and mustard in top of double boiler; add vinegar and egg yolk while stirring. Cook over boiling water until of custard consistency, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, then stir in gelatin, which has been softened for 5 min. in the cold water Add horseradish. Chill until slightly thickened, then add 1 s. of the salmon flaked, and the celery, and fold in the whipped cream Place decorative olive slices and pimiento strips in bottom of a 2-qt. mold; then turn mixture into mold. Chill until firm, then unmold on a platter. Place remaining salmon flakes around it. Serves 4.

Salmon and Cheese Casserole

(Tested by Good Housekeeping Institute) Use Institute-approved measuring cups and spoons. Measure level.

1½ c. bottled scalded milk or % c. evaporated milk and % c. water, scalded
1 c. soft bread crumbs
½ c melted butter or marsarine
2 canned pimientos, chopped
1 thap, chopped paraley
1½ thap, chopped anion

11/2 c. grated American cheese 7/a tsp. salt
7/a tsp. salt
7/a tsp. pepper
Dash paprika
3 eggs, well beaten
1 c drained cooked or canned

1 1-lb can (2 c.) salmon, flaked

Pour the scalded milk over the bread crumbs. Add butter, pimientos, parsley, onion, grated cheese and seasonings. Then add the well-beaten eggs. Put the vegetables and flaked salmon in a greased 1½ qt. casscrole, and pour the milk and cheese mixture over them. Set in a pan of warm water and bake about 76 min. in a moderate oven of 325° F, or until the loaf is firm. Serves 6. To serve 2, make one-third this recipe, and bake in individual casscroles, in a moderate oven of 325° F, until done—about 45 to 50 min.

Salmon Snacks

(Tested by Good Housekeeping Institute)

Use Institute-approved measuring cups and spoons. Measure level.

1 8 cz. (1 c.) can salmon, flaked 2 thap chopped pitted ripe olives 2 thap chopped pitted green olives 3 thap, mayonnaise

1/4 tap. salt

Crisp celery stalks Combine flaked salmon, olives, mayonnaise, salt and pepper. Use as a ng for crisp celery stalks of manageable length. Serve with crackers, esc, and tea or coffee as an afternoon or evening snack.

Stainless steel utensils have to be heated slowly over a low flame or the foods being cooked in them will scorch.

Use one-half can of pineapple juice and one-half water when you baste meat. It gives it a new and different flavor.

If clothes are well hung after laundering, ironing will be easier.



Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift together three times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add flour alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add lemon extract. Fold in egg whites quickly and thoroughly. Bake in heart-shaped pan, 9 by 9 by 31/4 inches in a moderate (350-degree) oven 65 minutes or until done. Spread rose-tinted Seven Minute frosting on top of cake. Sprinkle moist sweetened coconut on sides of cake while frosting is still soft. Decorate top with cardboard arrow and a heart of coconut.

THE HEALING MINISTRY OF JESUS

LESSON TEXT-2:1-12.
GOLDEN TEXT-Jesus . . . was moved with compassion toward them, and he healed their sick.—Matthew 14:14.

Man is more than a body. He is made up of body, soul, and spirit. In a physical world where he is so much in touch with physical nature, and the needs of his body are so much before him, he is prone to forget that there is within a spiritual nature which is his real self.

God is interested in both the physical and spiritual side of man. 1. Faith Brings a Double Need to

Christ (vv. 1-4). This faith-stimulating story faces us first with

1. An Impossible Situation. Incurably afflicted and helpless physically and far more deeply afflicted spiritually, this man had no one who could heal his body and restore his soul. Apart from the power of God in Jesus Christ his situation was hopeless, and thus he may well typify every one of us except for the grace of Christ.

Furthermore, his circumstances were such as to make it impossible for him to get to Jesus, who was there in his city. Even when his four friends came to his help and bore him to the house where Jesus was, they could not enter because of the crowds. So a journey begun in hope was evidently to close in despair. But wait, these men had

2. An Undeniable Faith. "Where there's a will there's a way." Where there is faith the obstacles may be surmounted. Having begun a good work they persevered in it.

Had these men been bound by convention or custom they would never have put their friend at Jesus' feet. They did try to make a proper entry through the door, but it was blocked. The way to Jesus is often closed, by some custom, a vain philosophy, or a religious ceremony. Let us, like these believing men, open the roof if necessary to bring our needs and our needy friends to

Although mention is made only of the palsy of this man, it is probable that both he and they knew that his was yet in his sins.

They brought him to Jesus, where their

II. Faith Receives a Double Reward From Christ (vv. 5-12).

Immediately Jesus "saw their faith" (v. 5), just as He always does. God is on the lookout for faith and is quick to reward it. The twofold need here brought a double blessing.

1. Spiritual Cleansing. The man's physical affliction thus proved to be his greatest blessing, for it brought him to Jesus, who cleansed him of all unrighteousness. If he had not been palsied he might never have met the Lord. Suffering, then, may be a means of grace. That is more than a pious platitude, for it has been proved repeatedly in the existence of men and women.

Certain scribes "sitting there" (they were not doing a thing to help) began to reason in their hearts that Jesus was blaspheming because only God can forgive sin. Their theology was faultless and their reasoning was logical, but the premise of their argument was wrong. Only God can forgive sin, but Jesus is God, something which they in their wisdom did not realize or ac-

cept. We (especially young people in school) should be careful that the fluent smoothness of some unbelieving philosopher's logic does not lead us astray, and away from God's truth.

Note also the solemnizing thought that Jesus knew what they were thinking in their hearts.

The challenge of these questioning scribes is met by

2. Physical Healing. Forgiving sins was harder than healing the body, but these enemies of Jesus lived so much in the realm of the physical that He had to give them a demonstration of His almighty power which they could see. It was a gracious thing for Him to do, and perhaps necessary in those early

days of His life and ministry. Today, with all the light of history upon the work of God, we need to beware that we do not sit in the seat of the scornful and demand a physical sign before we will be-




