High Plains Gets Sugar Quota

Senator Ralph Yarborough called Castro County News from his office in Washington, D. C. to notify the county of the Agriculture Department's authorization of the following bill.

"The Agriculture Department signed Tuesday morning an authorization for an extra 50 thousand tons of Sugar Beets for the area near Hereford in the year 1964 to be used in the proposed sugar beet mill near Hereford. This bill will involve production in the County of Castro, Deaf Smith, and Palmer in Texas."

Several area groups attended Washington during the latter part of September to seek the authorization of this bill.

Four other areas were competing with the Dimmitt-Hereford area for the '64 reserve. They were Trans-Pecos area, Aroustook County, Maine, Cayuga County, N. Y., and the Phoenix area of Arizona.

Holly Sugar Beet Corporation planned to set up the sugar mill, if the government allocated enough acreage. The establishment of the beet sugar industry in the West

Texas-Eastern New Mexico area will make a tremendous addition to the area's total economy.

Progressive men from the area and county fought in the legislative battle for sugar quotas for the past three years. U. S. Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa, Rep. Poage of Waco, and Senator Yarborough worked at securing this allotment for the Texas Panhandle.

Presently, approximately 2,200 acres of sugar beets are grown on the High Plains under a production contract with American Crystal Corporation of Rocky Ford,

Colorado.

Holly Corporation has obtained an option on a site near Hereford to build the \$20 million sugar beet processing plant.

The proposed plant is an ultra-modern refinery which will be able to process up to 100,000 tons of sugar annually. Holly officials said earlier this year they could have the plant in operation for the 1964 crop if the USDA made a sugar quota commitment this year.

Shoup, president of Holly Co. estimated about 300 employees would be required at the plant during

harvest seasons, with the firm keeping some 75 permanent workers.

Beet pulp from the proposed plant will easily supply rations for an 8,000 head cattle feedlot. Numerous by-products are also derived from a processing plant.

The 50,000 tons of sugar beets allotted to Panhandle growers in the Tuesday announcement would mean a cash crop of about \$8 million annually to the farmers. A processing plant could easily pump an equivalent of this into the Panhandle economy.

Howard Bridges Named Outstanding Soil Conservation Farmer In County

Howard Bridges, long-time Castro County farmer has been named as the outstanding conservation farmer for 1962 in the Running Water Soil Conservation District. According to Wade Mills, District Board Chairman, Bridges was selected by members of the board of supervisors of the Soil Conservation District at their December meeting.

In announcing the selection of Bridges, a resident of Sunnyside, Mills gave the following summary of Bridges outstanding conservation work: (1) he has carried out a complete conservation treatment of his farmland along Running Water Draw; (2) he has established some of the finest irrigated pastures in Castro County; (3) he has established a grass waterway for the orderly disposal of excess water; (4) he has retired to native grass, land formerly cropped that was being subjected to severe erosion; and (5) he has carried on an excellent program of crop residue management to assist in controlling wind and water erosion.

Other outstanding work by Bridges says Mills includes: (1) demonstration of the ability not only to apply sound conservation practices but to maintain them as well; (2) he has made the job of Soil and Water Conservation a part of his normal farming operation; (3) and he has assisted the Running District in its objectives by doing an excellent job on his own farm and by encouraging others to do the same.

In addition to the practices mentioned, Bridges is carrying on such practices as land leveling, legumes in rotation, proper pasture use, and proper range use and irrigation water management.

In summarizing the award to Bridges, Mills made the following statement, "This award is made each year in order to recognize individuals who are making the most of their soil and water resources through sound conservation. It is a difficult job to single out an individual among the farmers of the county and I would like to express the Soil Conservation

District's appreciation to the fine conservation work being done in the District by the majority of our farmers."

Shipley was a former Dimmitt resident and operated a Men's Clothing store plus a cleaning shop here for a number of years.

Shipley, a Dalhart resident for 16 years, made his home at 113 Denver. He was born October 4, 1900 in Texas.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m., Tuesday in Walker Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Leland Spurrier officiating. Burial will be in Memorial Park Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Dorothy; a son, Jim of Dalhart; one daughter, Mrs. J. R. Warner of Lubbock and a brother, Warren Shipley of San Diego, California.

Arlene Ewing Is Victim Of Highway Tragedy

Services for Roberta Arlene Ewing, 18, fatally injured Sunday afternoon in a one-car turnover near Tulla, were conducted in the First Baptist Church here at 2:30 p.m. with Rev. M. A. Smith, Jr., pastor, officiating.

The Rev. L. R. Landtroop of Clovis, and the Rev. Allen J. Owens pastor of Lee Street Baptist Church here, assisted.

Interment was in Castro Memorial Gardens under direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

Miss Ewing, a 1962 graduate of Dimmitt High School, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arlon Ewing of Dimmitt died en route to the hospital after she was hurt when the car in which she and two other girls were riding overturned three and a half times eight miles west of Tulla on U.S. Hwy. 86.

The girls were traveling to Tulla from Dimmitt when the '63 Falcon flipped over throwing Arlene Ewing onto the highway and her sister, Irene into the bar ditch.

Irene received a cut hand in which nine stitches were taken while Earnestine received several bruises.

The car was totally damaged according to investigating officers.

All animals will be sifted before the show for quality, condition, and grooming.

School board has let the bids on classroom furniture according to Paul Hilburn, superintendent. There were six bidders. American desks in temple received the board's bids.

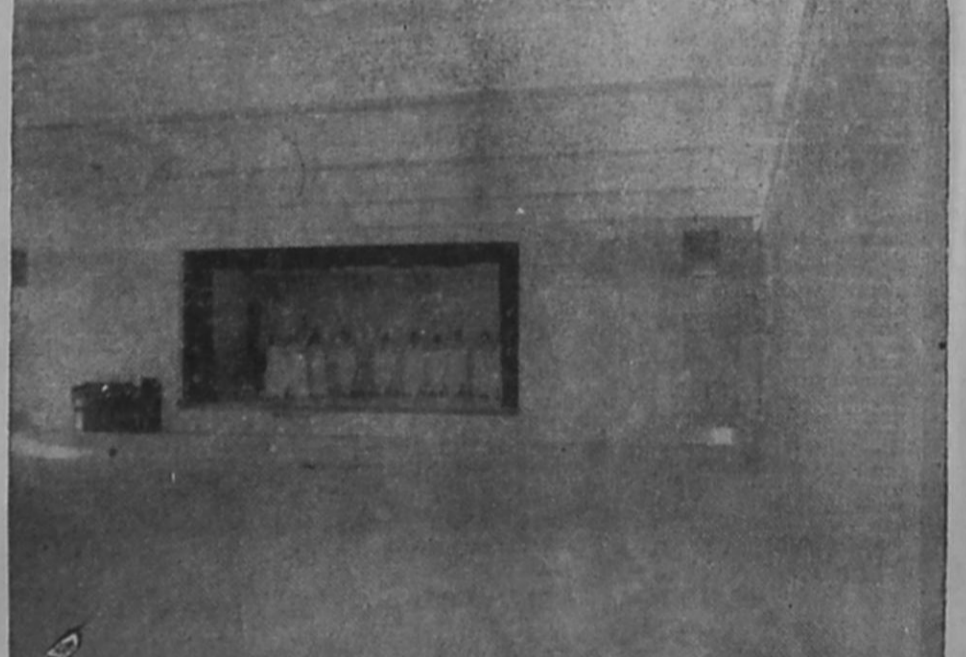
Classroom furniture bid was \$7,282.81 This includes 125 chair desk for 14 class rooms and 12 teacher's desks and chairs.

The Art of Giving

When we speak to children of Christmas, it is generally of Santa Claus until they are much older; then it is Christ. But we shall speak of the children's viewpoint at present. Who is he? Where did he come from?

Many have answered that question in many different ways. The most common, of course, was of a kind gentleman by the name of Charles Delqueletus Nicholas, who lives in a small village outside London, occupied by mostly Catholics. He had made his fortune in his earlier days in Ireland storing potatoes. His fortune came during the good years before the famine. Although a shrewd business man, he was sympathetic, kind, and gentle toward children. The famine hit and times became bad for man in the village. He helped the families in the village as much as he could. Because of this, not many left the village. As times got better, Charles continued this practice except he gave toys and play-things to the children every year, until he died. The children heard their mothers and fathers talk of the Saint Nicholas when the presents came. After Charles had died, they continued the practice. The children never knew him by face, but only in name as their parents had called him.

Quickly, the imagination of the children began creating him until he gradually grew into what he is today and he is still growing. Each year following Charles' death, they gave presents to their children on a date not known. Some authorities say it varied. Some say it was the day the famine ended, but most say it was the day Christ was born.

A Thought For Christmas

Just recently I received a Christmas card from a friend in Hong Kong. I am sure that the letter he wrote is of interest to us all. It read as follows:

An exodus—a forced retreat; the joy of freedom—the bitter sorrow of return; uneasy hope—utter despair; these are the experiences of men and women like the Wang family must have tasted. An opportunity for freedom was seized when the May Exodus began from the mainland of China into Hong Kong and Macao. Such an escape was the family's hope for freedom.

Local newspapers recently carried the Wang story in small print in an insignificant place. After pushing across a border point Mr. Wang succeeded in entering the Colony. His wife and teen-age son, though momentarily gaining freedom, were taken by Hong Kong authorities and forced to return to China. Hong Kong was already bulging at its seams. There was literally "no room in the Inn."

No matter how you explain the problem, right or wrong, the newspaper still verifies the results. Mrs. Wang and her son were taken in turn by Mainland authorities. Mrs. Wang died from some illness, perhaps a heart condition and the son was executed. In Hong Kong, upon learning the news, Mr. Wang sought to take his own life by chopping the ends of his fingers off. Uneasy hope—utter desperation.

If you will take the plight, emotions and frantic hopelessness of the Wang family and multiply it by 100,000 you will begin to get an infinitesimally small representation of the agonizing dilemma which faces hundreds of thousands of Hong Kong people. We remind you also that boxes of clothes, blankets, and other such usable items are still needed.

How to Fight Communism

GET THE FACTS. Study Communism. You cannot fight an enemy you do not know. This is a fundamental rule of warfare. Learn Communism's basic doctrines, its strategy and tactics; its line on current national and international affairs; the names of major Communist fronts and of leading Communists and fellow travelers. This is the minimum knowledge required for effective anti-Communism.

Act. Knowledge that is not put to use is wasted. No matter how much you learn about Communism, you will contribute nothing to the fight against it unless you have the will to DO, to translate your learning into deeds that weaken Communism.

GET THE HELP OF OTHERS. Two heads are better than one—and ten men more powerful than two.

AND PLAN YOUR ACTION. Mere numbers are not enough. Any project you undertake should have at least as much planning and organization as the Communists normally put into their schemes.

BE SCRUPULOUS about your evidence and the rules of fair play before making a charge against any individual or group. You have helped Communism instead of hurting it when you have to retract.

NEVER BACKTRACK. Stick to your guns. Resolve that though you are unjustly attacked and subjected to various pressures, you will not retreat.

The TRUTH and EXPOSURE are your most powerful weapons. Use them in letters to newspaper editors and public officials—the molders of public opinion and initiators of government action.

Don't forget the POWER OF THE PURSE. You, as a consumer, have considerable power over radio and TV advertisers, producers of public entertainment, and many others whose success depends on public acceptance of their goods, services or talents.

If you have the will, the knowledge, the members and organization, these will be no problem. Your major difficulty will be in deciding which of the many things that need to be done, you should do first.

"How You Can Fight Communism"

"America's chance of beating Communism depends on you.
 Why me? You may ask.
 Because the strength of any free nation springs from the stamina and patriotism of its people.

"There are about 183 million men, women, and children in the United States. Each is like one link in the chain of armor of national defense against outside attack and subversion within. Each is like a molecule of steel in a sword, our country's power to overcome its enemies. National character, like an object, is only as strong as its weakest point.

"It is useless to wag our heads and complain that so-and-so isn't doing his share to combat Communism. That way lies the Red trap of suspicion and division among ourselves.

"The communists-if they believe what they say-consider us soft, weak and co-rout. They think we have lost the spirit which moved Patrick Henry to shout: "Give me liberty or give me death". Nor do they respect our belief in individual responsibility. They look on 183 million Americans as one of their 700 million Chinese slaves as faceless masses to be manipulated by clever communist bosses.

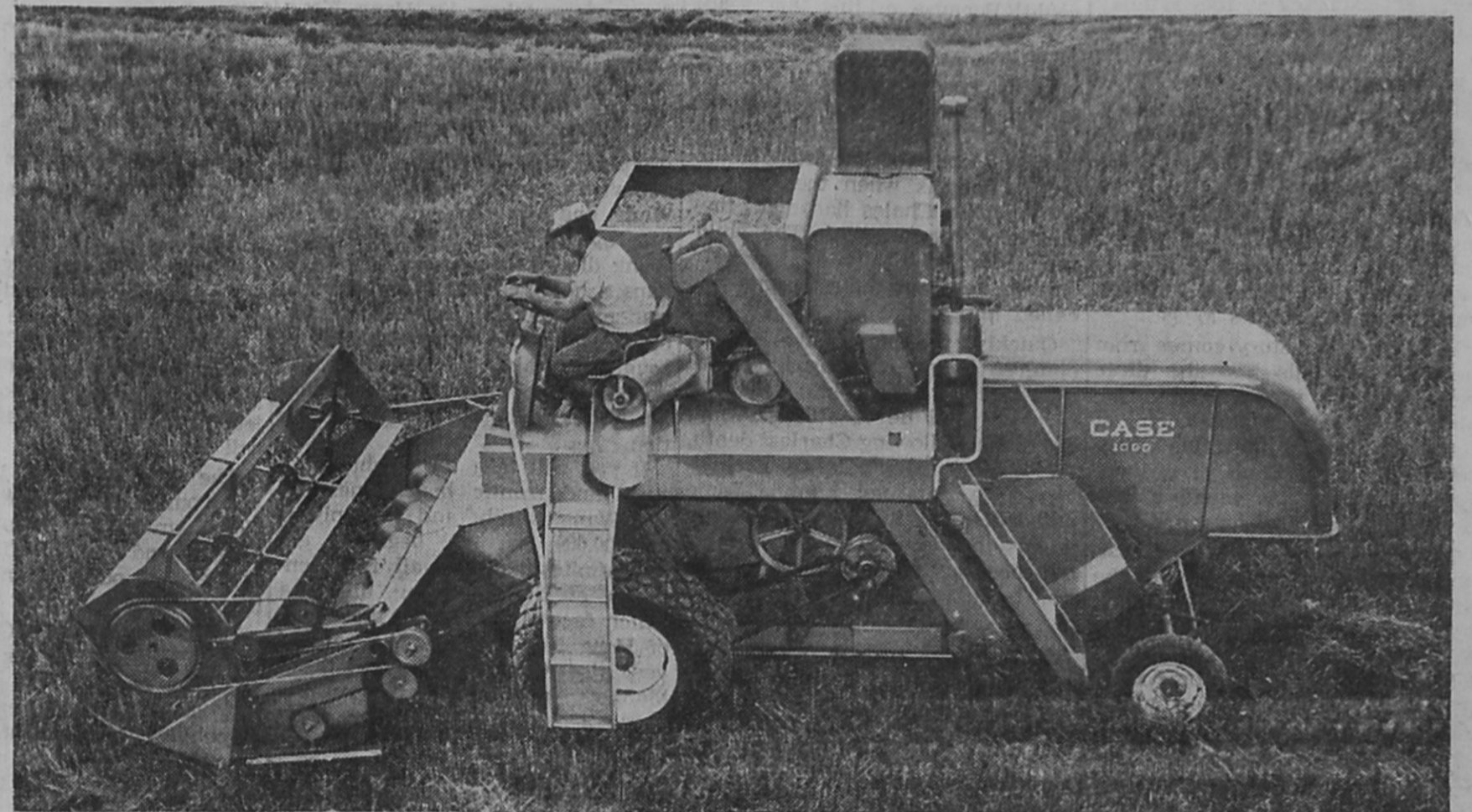

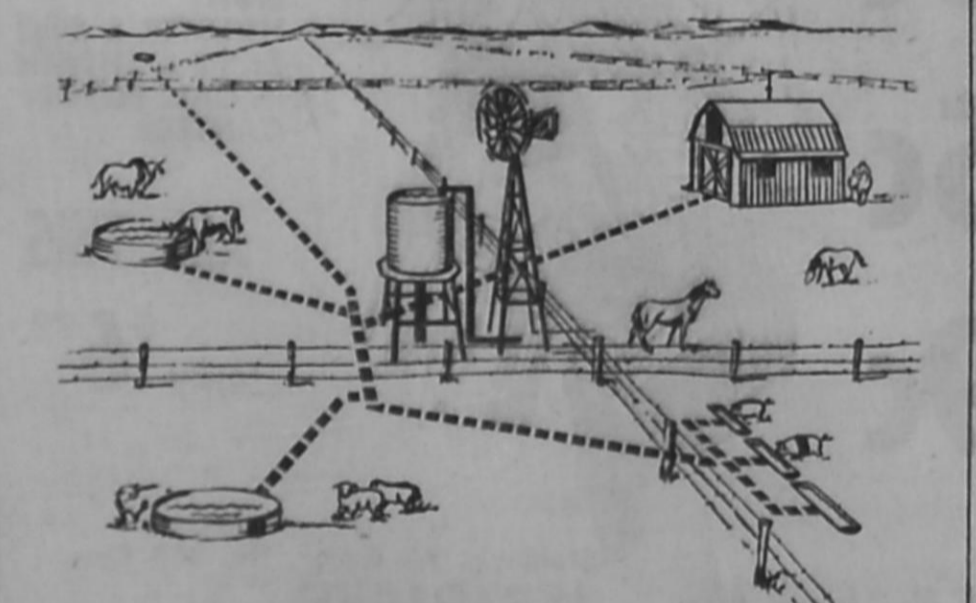

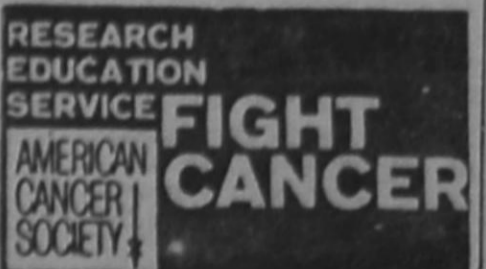

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

In the Panhandle and other north Texas points, water often freezes over ponds, small lakes and other spots where duck hunters congregate.

If you have such a favorite hunting place and it freezes over, pour bluing on the ice.

To the ducks flying overhead it will look like open water.

Natural Duck Blind

For the duck hunter who is lucky enough to have a regular shooting pond of his own, a little summer preparation will pay off handsomely.

If he has the forethought to stick willow buds in the mud around the pond the spring before duck season opens, the buds will have grown big enough to afford him and his friends excellent natural cover for shooting.

Inflating Air Mattress

Why waste breath inflating an air mattress on a hunting or camping trip when, for a few cents, you can buy a cylinder of gas such as is used on emergency rubber rafts?

If you balk at this expenditure, start the motor of your car and hold the mattress valve over the exhaust pipe until the mattress is filled.

There is no danger of monoxide poisoning, if reasonable care is observed.

Invert Scope

Owners of rifle scopes, with adjustments in mount and with tapered post reticule, can invert the scope so the post points down.

This gives full view of target.

Cold Weather Clothing

We Texans are so used to warm weather that when dressing for a winter hunting trip we either overdo it or under do it. Then we spend the rest of the day roasting or freezing.

Try to remember when selecting hunting clothes, that air space is very important. It gives more warmth with less weight.

Two pairs of middle-weight woolen socks will keep your feet warmer than will one pair of heavy woolies. Two light-weight wool shirts will do better than one heavy garment, etc.

Training Hunting Pups

If you can't afford the services of a professional dog trainer and want to do the job yourself, remember these important rules in dog training:

Don't start training until pup is 8 weeks old, except for housekeeping and other simple behavior lessons.

Teach commands only as fast as the pup can absorb them. Quit the lesson the instant the pup stops wagging his tail.

Drinking Cup For Dog

Quail and coon hunters in Texas often run into long speels of dry, hot weather that make it necessary to take along water for the dogs.

Remember to also carry with you some heavy aluminum foil to quickly shape up a drinking vessel for the pooch when he gets thirsty.

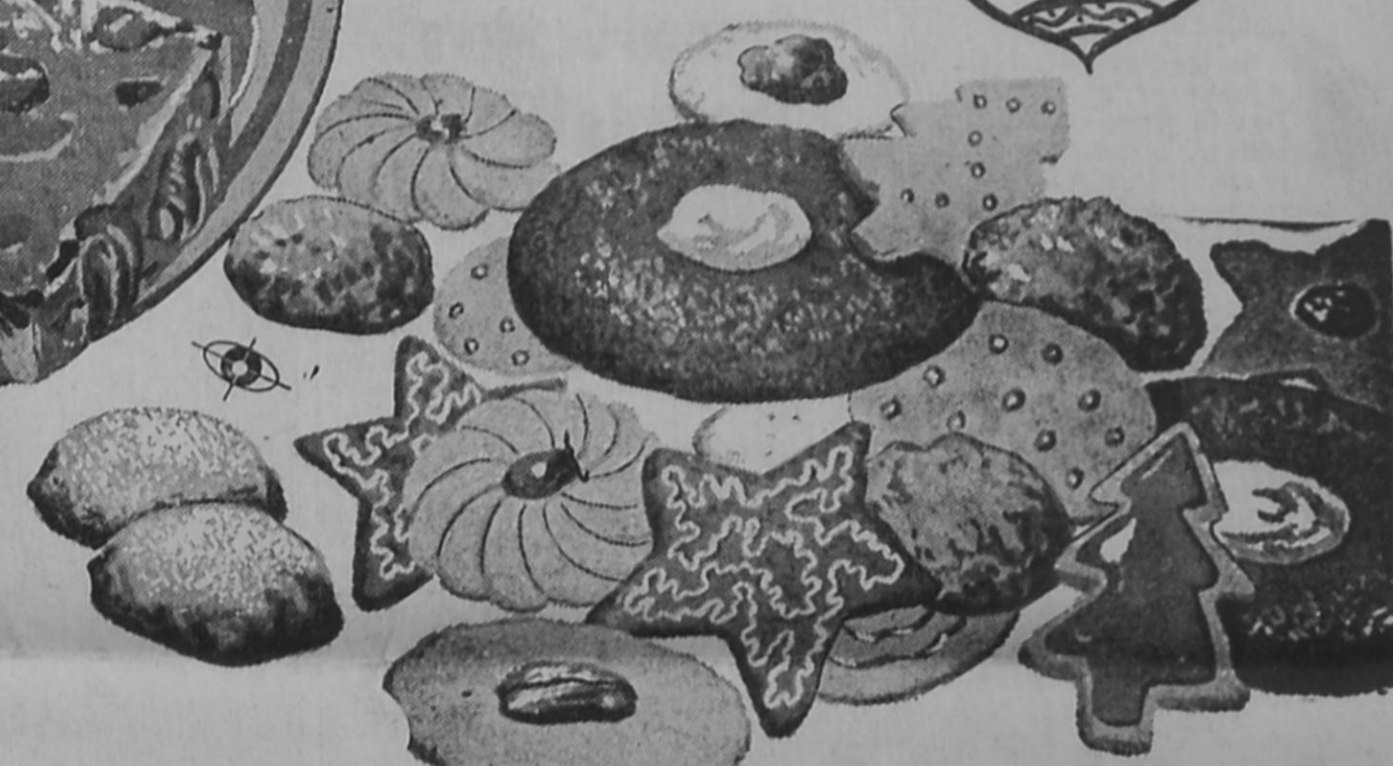
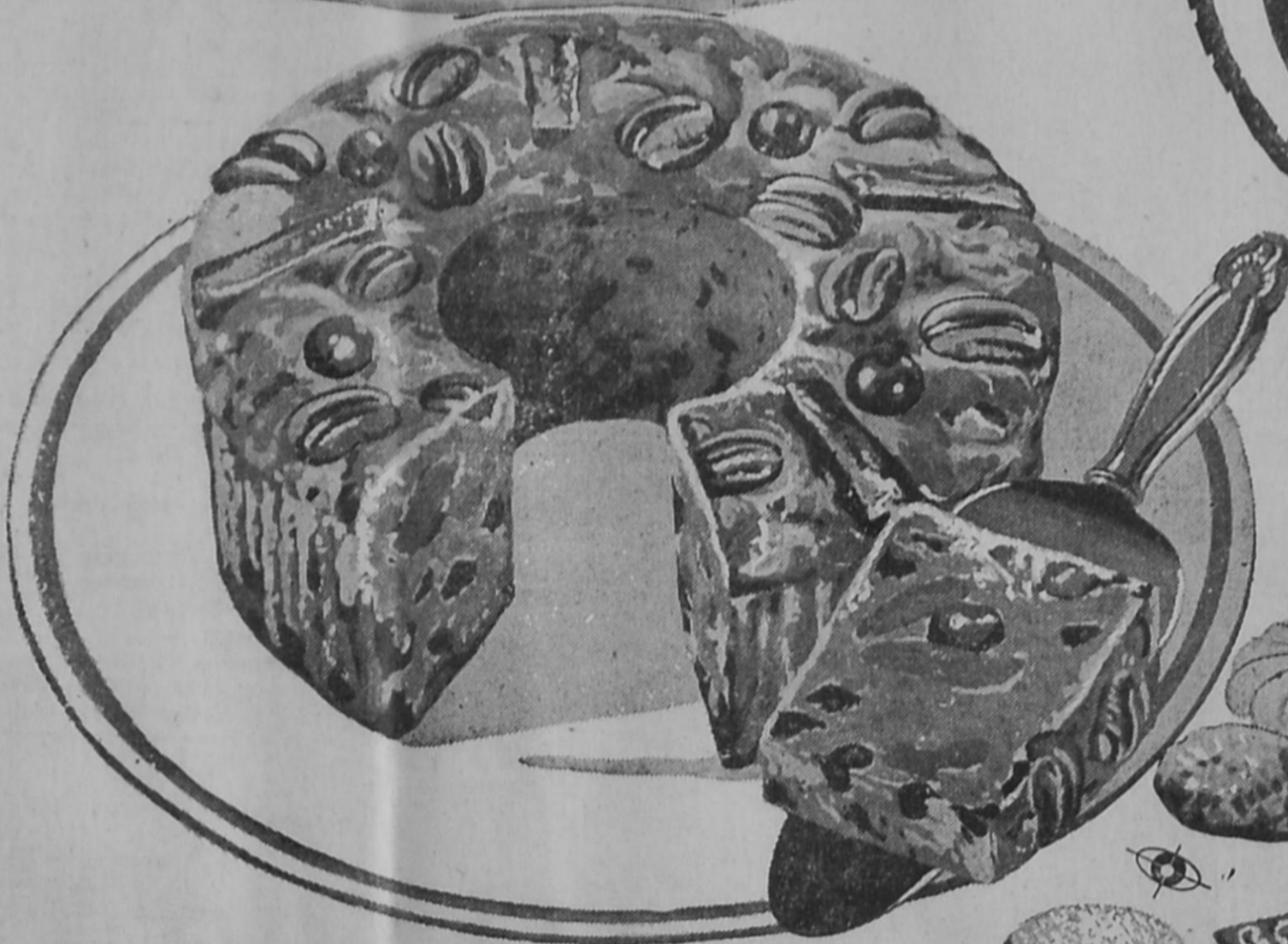
Gun Rust Remover

Livestock Owners Warned About Stock on Highway

According to Patrolman Sgt. Wells Hereford area supervisor, a large percent of motor vehicle accidents are concerned with livestock.

Sgt. Wells said, "Any owner of livestock involved in accidents where we find willful neglect or extreme negligence in keeping his livestock off state and federal highways will probably be contacted by patrolmen directly in regard to charges being filed."

Attorney Miller quotes section one and two of the five sections in Article 1370a entitled "Animals running at large on State Highways; enforcement notwithstanding other laws".

"Section 1: Any person owning or having responsibility for the control of any horse, mule, donkey, cow, bull, steer, hog, sheep, or goat, who knowingly permits such animal to traverse or roam at large, unattended only on the right-of-way of any U. S. Highway, or State Highway in this state but not including numbered farm-to-market roads, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00). Each day that an animal is permitted to roam at large in violation hereof shall constitute a separate offense."

"Section 2: No civil cause of action for damage shall lie against any person, firm or corporation operating a vehicle on a designated highway in this state by reason of such vehicle's striking, killing, injuring or damaging any unattended animal running at large on a designated highway, except upon a finding of gross negligence in the operation of said vehicle or willful intent to strike, kill, injure or damage such animal."

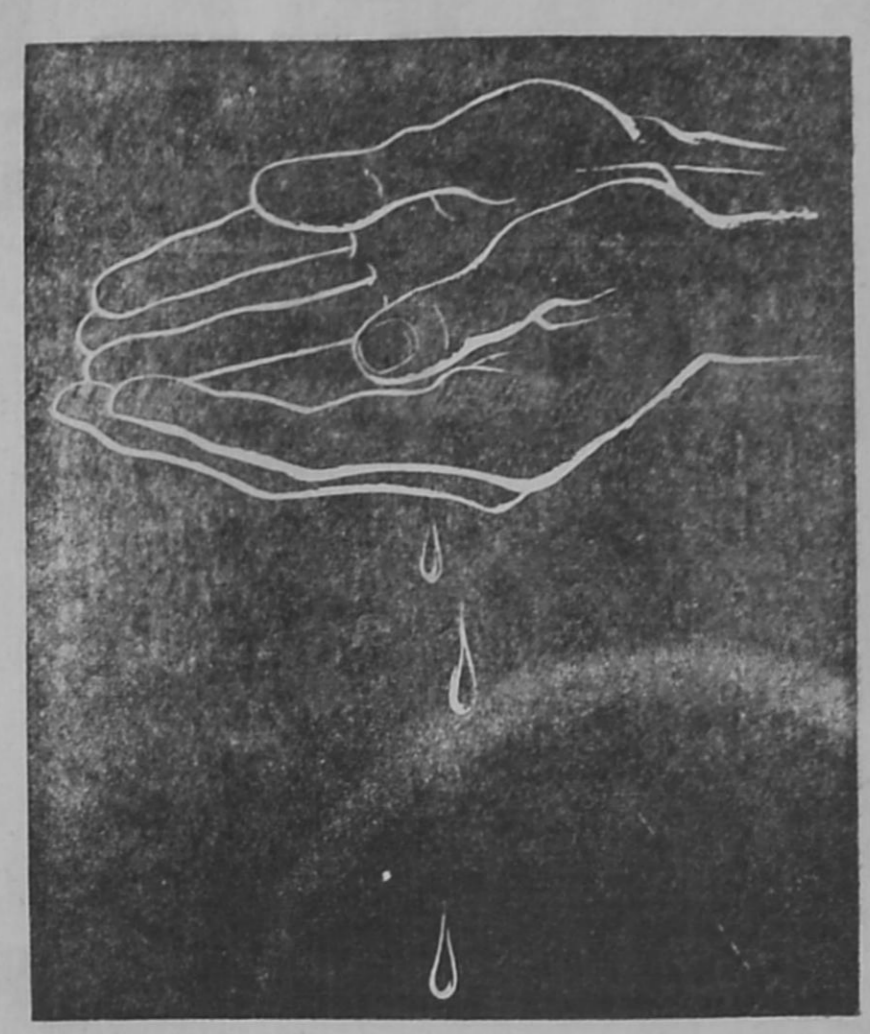

WHEN DOES A SOUND BECOME A NOISE?

A wag once defined a small boy as a "noise with dirt on it." She was assuming that everyone knew the meaning of the word, "noise." However, in modern day activities with the advent of supersonic devices, the meaning of the word "noise" may become of the utmost importance and if noise is associated with annoyance, the question will probably be "when does a sound become a noise?"

One aircraft manufacturer has gathered together data on the problem and I include herein certain excerpts from these findings.
"It would be difficult to understand or attempt to alleviate any problem associated with noise without some comprehension of the complex character and characteristic of sound. This requires a clear definition of the acoustical expressions commonly used by experts who assess aircraft noise and its effect on people.
"It should be noted first that some words — such as 'intensity,' 'sound level,' 'amplitude' and 'loudness' — often used synonymously by laymen have technically important distinctions in the vocabulary of sound.
"What is sound? It is a physical phenomenon created by vibrations from some source—a slamming door, a bell, flowing water, a violin, turning propellers or spinning turbine engines. These vibrations may be transmitted through any medium, but usually we are interested in sound transmitted through air. At normal temperatures they travel through air at a velocity of about 1100 feet or 335 meters per second — the 'speed of sound.'
This may sound somewhat silly to many people but it could have an effect on the pocketbook of the taxpayers throughout this Country. One of the major problems presently faced by many municipal authorities stems from the noise generated by aircraft taking off and landing at the local airport. There are many lawsuits presently pending having to do with damages growing out of such noise. One of the major questions involved is as to the party responsible. There

are many suggestions as to the responsible party but as yet there are no fixed regulating guidelines as to all circumstances. Many feel that the Federal Government should be responsible because of its regulatory jurisdiction over the operation of aircraft but others feel that the municipal authority operating the airport should be responsible. Some feel that the municipalities benefitting from the traffic generated through the airport themselves should be responsible. All of this adds up to a very complicated legal problem which will be of great concern in this Country, which concern will become even greater when supersonic aircraft is brought into use.

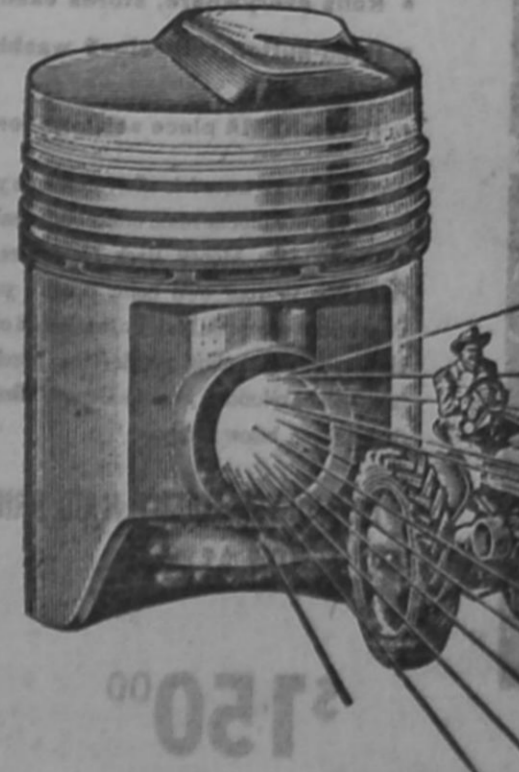

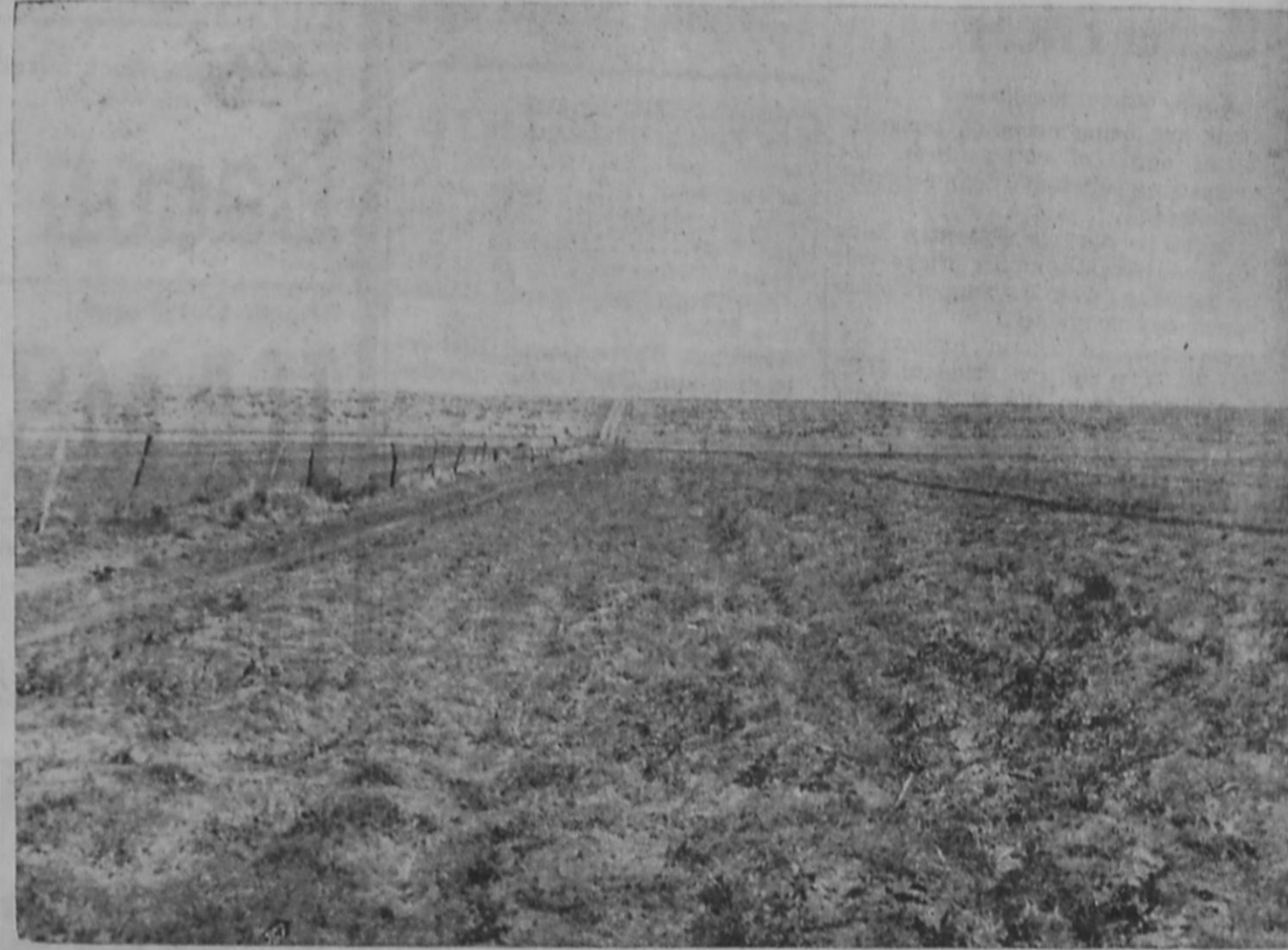

1963 Feed Grain Program Receives Higher Prices

ASCS Office announces applications are being accepted for additional acres of cotton under the release and Reapportionment provisions.

Secretary Orville Freeman says '63 Feed Grain support prices will be increased over the support price previously announced.

Secretary Freeman announced the '63 corn support price to \$1.25 per bushel from the \$1.20 support price previously announced on November 14.

Increases are also being made in the other feed grain support prices. This action is designed to assure that the twin objective of the Feed Grain Program—to improve farm income and to make further progress in balancing feed grain supplies with national requirements—will be met.

Secretary Freeman also announced an increase in the payment rate for diverted feed grain acreage to conserving uses on farms which divert their entire acreage in 1963. The national average support prices for 1963 feed grain crops are shown below together with the previously announced support prices.

Barley has been increased from \$.93 per bushel to \$.96 per bushel for total support price. Grain sorghum has been increased to \$2 per Cwt. from the \$1.91 per Cwt. Oats and rye have the same price support as previously.

As announced earlier farmers participating in the '63 Feed Grain Program will receive price support partly through loan and purchase agreement and partly through payment in kind. The increases announced today will be accomplished through higher loan and purchase agreement rate with no change in the payment in kind payment previously announced.

The 1963 feed grain program differs from the 1961 and 1962 programs primarily because of the additional 18-cent payment in kind as a result of price support. This new element has required further careful study by the Department. This study, coupled with reports from field offices, forms the announcement of the 1963 feed grain program and recommendations of advisory committees on feed grain which met in Washington last week indicating that action to raise support level was necessary to carry out the policy of this Administration to increase farm income, but back surpluses, and reduce government cost.

Special provisions are made for small farms in this announcement. The payment rate for acreage diverted to conserving uses will be increased to 50 per cent of the county support rate of the normal production of diverted acres, for farms on which the entire feed grain payment acreage 1959-1960 acreage, as adjusted) is diverted, up to the eligible maximum of 25 acres.

For other farms, diversion payments will be increased somewhat as a result of higher support price. For the first 20 per cent of the acreage diverted from feed grain to conserving uses, the payment will be at 20 per cent of the county support rate (reflecting maximum average support price of \$1.25 per bushel for corn, \$2 per Cwt. for grain sorghum, and \$.96 per bushel for barley) in the normal production of diverted acreage. On any acreage diversion above the minimum requirement, payment will be 50 per cent of the county support rate.

Frank Daniel Is Serving Aboard USS Ranger

Frank R. Daniel, airman, USN, of son Mrs. Dorothy Ellis of Dimmitt, Tex., is serving aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Ranger, operating in the Western Pacific with the Seventh Fleet.

The Ranger is part of American seapower abroad, an instrument of national policy and goodwill. The ship is scheduled to visit ports in Japan, Okinawa, the Philippines and the British Crown Colony of Hong Kong.
