Red Cross War Fund Drive Begins March 1

Bobcats Successfully Defend District A1 Championship Title

Displaying the sharp-shooting eye of John Curtis, along with the brilliant floor work of Cook and Birdwell, the Dimmitt Bobcats romped to their third District cage title in that many years under the tutelage of Coach Blaine. This gave the Cats a "grand slam" in major sports for the year, since they won the football title earlier in the year.

The Dumas Demons, a highly respected quintet from the North Panhandle, were the first opponents of the Bobcats in the tournament. They were subdued after a slow start to the tune of 27-14. Dalhart was the next to taste defeat at the hands of the Dimmitt five. The score was Dimmitt 55, Dalhart 15.

The tournament was a double elimination type, so the Cats played Friona two times, winning the first 40-27 and the second 32-22.

The Cats' chances at the regional tournament is a matter of speculation. Their first game is with Matador, a very highly respected quintet from below the Caprock, who are undefeated for the season with over thirty victories. However, the Bobcats' record of 41 victories against two defeats for the season is not to be taken too lightly, especially since they have scored 1427 points for the season compared with 862 for the opposition.

Cook and Curtis were picked on the all-district team. Birdwell and Jackson made the all-star five at Olton. Mayfield, who became eligible at mid-term, is the only member of the starting five who has not made at least one all-star team this season. With this type of performance, the Cats should make a nice showing at the regional meet regardless of whether they win or lose.

Mr. Hamm was born May 8, 1861 in Franklin County, Ark. He was married March 24, 1886, in Williamson County, Texas, to Miss Mattie B. Hall. They moved to Castro County in 1905, settling on a farm fifteen miles southeast of Dimmitt. Their home was on the wagon trail from Plainview to Hereford and many weary teamsters and cowboys found rest and feed for themselves and horses over-night at the Hamm farm. They were the parents of ten children, six of whom survive, they are Mrs. Vira Harrell and Mrs. Patsy Ruth Hill of Corpus Christi, Mrs. Faye Barnes of Hale Center, Fred Hamm of Hart, Mrs. Mary Bell Ingram of Dallas and Mrs. Johnnie B. Scrimshire of Santa Fe, N. M. Seventeen grandchildren and two great grandchildren also survive. Seven of the grandsons are serving in the Armed Forces of the United States. They are Major John U. "Pat" Hamm, Jr., who served in the Air Force in the Pacific; Major Eugene Buie of California; Master Tech. Sgt. Geo. S. Barnes, Marine veteran of Guadal Canal and wearer of the Silver Star medal; Pfc. C. W. Barnes, recently given medical discharge due to illness contracted in New Guinea; Sgt. Winston Hamm of El Paso; Seaman Wesley Barnes, recently ordered into active service in the Pacific and Pfc. Otho Douglas now in the South Pacific area.
