Ozona scored once in their first turn at bat, with Bronte coming right back with two tallies. Ozona had a big inning in the fourth when they put over four runs after two men were out. Bronte came back in the six with 3 runs, and Ozona scored the winning tally in the seventh.

Campbell, a husky left hander, was touched for five hits and gave up five runs in the four innings he worked. Only one score and three hits were allowed by Greer. Lefty Shelton pitched all the way for Ozona, and was touched for seven hits.

It was a dog fight all the way and a \$260 crowd was on hand. It is understood that Greer will continue to pitch for Bronte.

## \$400 More Needed For Fire Truck

Robert Lee's new fire truck is about ready for delivery, but the committee seems to lack \$400 in being able to pay for same.

When the project was launched in February by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, Chief Biggs of the San Angelo fire department offered to have his men assemble the equipment and the cost was estimated at \$2,800. Considerable delay was experienced in collecting funds, but the drive brought in \$3,143.41.

A checkup with Chief Biggs last week brought out the startling information that prices had arisen so much in recent months that the new truck was going to cost more than \$3,400.

Just what can be done about the situation in a problem. The drive seems to have been completed as no new donations have come in the past month. Perhaps the county will see fit to help with the project, since the truck is to be used in any part of the county where it may be needed.

The Observer hopes to give a detailed report of costs of the equipment next week.

## Long Illness Fatal To Fred O. Green

Death came to Fred O. Green, long time city secretary and prominent civic leader, at his home in Robert Lee at 5:30 Monday evening, July 14. He had been in failing health several years, and was forced to resign his city position last month. He had been critically ill the past three weeks.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 4 p. m. at the Methodist church in charge of the Rev. J. Howard Estes, assisted by the Rev. Fred D. Blake, pastor of the Baptist church. Hymns were sung by a choir from the two churches and a solo was sung by Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough. Burial was in the Robert Lee cemetery. Pallbearers were O. B. Jacobs, Bryan Yarbrough, Sam Jay, A. J. Bilbo, G. C. Allen and R. L. Read.

In the passing of Fred O. Green Robert Lee loses a fine citizen who devoted many years to public service. He was well versed in municipal affairs and politics, and played a leading role in helping develop the community.

A son of the late Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Green, Mr. Green came to Robert Lee from Mertzon, where he was connected with the San Angelo Telephone Co. He was manager of the company's branch here until 1922, when he went to Eldorado to manage the office there, holding that position until 1930. He returned here in 1934 and was city secretary and manager of the city water works until his recent resignation.

Mr. Green was married to Mrs. Sammie Smith Turney at Robert Lee on Dec. 31, 1916. He was a member of the local Methodist Church and held life membership in the Masonic Lodge at Eldorado.

Survivors include the widow; two children, Mrs. John Maxwell of Alexandria, La. and Fred O. Green, Jr., of Texarkana; a stepdaughter, Miss Mozelle Turney of New London; two brothers, M. M. Green of Yerma, Calif., and G. C. Green of Long Beach, Calif., a sister, Mrs. Frank Anderson of New Laguna, N. M., two grandchildren, Jane and Clara Maxwell of Alexandria.

## Here's Latest Coke County Oil News

Sun No. 3 Fred Jameson, indicated sixth producer in the making in the Jameson field of northwestern Coke county, is to be acidized Friday of this week. Plugs were drilled Tuesday from 5 1-2 inch casing cemented at 6,270 feet, with open hole extending to 6,565 feet, the total depth. Location is in the center of NW SW Section 315, and is a southwest outpost.

Sun No. 1-A Willie I. Tubb, northwest outpost to the Jameson field, was drilling ahead Thursday at 5,304 feet in lime and shale. Operators are not expecting to strike a pay section before about 5,900 feet.

Sun No. 2 Allen Jameson, half a mile north of Sun No 1\* Allen Jameson, opener of the Jameson field, had recovered only a small amount of new oil in swabbing down to 6,200 feet, with plugged back depth 6,491 feet. The test failed in the Ellenburger, but is expected to make a small well in the Pennsylvania after being treated with acid.

The Roberts & Hawkins rotary rig was released Tuesday evening and is preparing to move to No. 2 Tubb location, a quarter mile west of Homer Jameson No. 1.

Walter Tucker, tool pusher for Ray-Harris, was sent to Seminole this week to rig up the company's second new rotary. L. F. Grush is pushing tools here during Tucker's absence.

Scurlock Oil company is bringing in material for their new pipeline which will be laid from the Jameson field to Colorado City. The main tanks and pumping station will be located on Sandcreek, north of Fred Jameson's No. 2 well.

The Observer has been unable to verify reports that Sun was preparing to make a test north and east of Sanco. They control a good sized block of leases in that locality, including lands owned by the Arledge family and Palmer Leeper.

## Washington Letter

### Hawaii And Statehood

The house last week voted 196 to 133 in favor of permitting the Territory of Hawaii to become the 49th state in the Union. I voted against the resolution because I have grave doubts that such action is wise.

At its request, Hawaii became a Territory of the U. S. in 1898. It now has a population of 502,122. Of this number only 11,000 are racially Hawaiians. There are 61,000 part-Hawaiians, 9,000 Porto Ricans, 30,000 Chinese, 7,000 Koreans, 46,000 Philipinos, 172,000 Caucasians, and 163,000 Japanese.

In the last election only 71,000 voted. And yet if admitted to statehood those 71,000 would elect two United States Senators and one Member of the House.

The admission of Hawaii would provide a strong precedent for the admission of Alaska and Porto Rico.

The Territory of Hawaii is made up of eight tiny volcanic islands 2,000 miles off the coast. Some 60-odd percent of the population of the islands is of oriental origin. Most of the land is owned by a handful of people. It can hardly be expected that the rank-and-file of the people there share our thinking and ideals and have the same spirit of Americanism that typifies the average American. Their interests are different and their background is quite different from ours.

The bill now goes to the Senate where action at this session is not expected.

### Peanut Quotas

It now appears that Secretary of Agriculture will order acreage allotments on peanuts for the 1948 crop. He has already stated his intention to do so. A number of us, especially from Texas and Oklahoma, have protested this move and urged that reductions on a voluntary basis be first given a chance. Congressman Steve Pace of Georgia, who was instrumental in preventing quotas for 1947, has a bill pending to prohibit quotas for 1948, but it is doubtful the bill will be favored by the Agriculture Committee. The Secretary contends the Government peanut support program will be too expensive unless there is a sharp acreage reduction.

The exact basis for determining acreage allotments for individual farmers has not yet been devised. The formula must conform in general to the peanut quota law passed by Congress in 1941, but there are details that will be of interest to Texas growers. We are striving for a program—if one is imposed—which will protect the best interest of Texas growers as compared with growers in other parts of the country.

Peanuts has become a big crop

in Texas and has replaced cotton in many localities as the principal farm product. In our area, the counties of San Saba, Brown, Mills, Gillespie, Mason, and Llano have increased production, while smaller quantities are raised in surrounding counties. Peanut acreage in Texas has jumped from 129,000 acres in 1929 to 750,000 acres in 1946. During that same period the acreage jumped in the state of Georgia—the leading state—from 389,000 to 1,090,000 acres.

Another 2-billion-pound peanut crop is in prospect this year. Such a crop would be the sixth in succession above 2 billion pounds. The 1931-40 average was 1.2 billions.

### Foot And Mouth Disease

The eradication program of the dreaded foot-and-mouth disease in Mexico is progressing and is proving very expensive. But that was expected and cannot be avoided. Congress has already provided \$10 1-2 million to start with, and the Department of Agriculture has come in and asked for another \$65 million to continue the slaughter program. Chairman Taber of the Appropriations Committee declined this request pending an inspection and investigation by a Congressional committee. That is now being done. It would be disastrous to relax the program at this time, regardless of cost.

## Soils Group Begins Study of Conservation

Supervisors of the Coke county Soil Conservation district and the physical committee appointed to assist with development of the program of work, made a study of soils at an all day meeting Tuesday, July 8, for the purpose of developing land use recommendations which will help control soil erosion and improve soil fertility.

Supervisors R. B. Allen, Bryan Yarbrough, W. C. Shamblin, C. N. Webb and W. E. Burns were in attendance. The physical committee was represented by Ben Brooks, James Arrott and O. T. Colvin. E. J. Hughes and Lester Lawhon of the Soils Conservation Service assisted the board and their committee with this phase of the development of the district program, Mr. Allen reported.

Considerable progress has been made in developing the district program which is a docket that sets forth the problems effecting a complete program of soil and water conservation.

As soon as the program of work is complete, the board of supervisors and their committees will develop a plan of work which will set forth what needs to be done to correct the problems that prevail in the field of conservation.

In an effort to determine adapted cover and soil enriching crops, the supervisors, members of the physical committee and others are planning to make trial plantings of hairy vetch and abuzzi rye on sandy soils and Madrid and Hubam clover on tighter soils.

Sub-surface tillage is also being tried on the farms of W. C. Shamblin and C. N. Webb as an aid to

erosion control. This method of land preparation will increase the moisture penetration, reduce the impact of rain drops, retard runoff, reduce moisture from evaporation, reduce excessive soil temperatures and maintain the organic content in the soil surface, the board reports.

## School District Replaces Two Worn Out Buses

Robert Lee independent school district has purchased two new school buses to replace the old International and Chevrolet rigs that are badly worn from ten years of service.

The school board has contracted for a new Ford and a new Chevrolet from local dealers, and have disposed of the old buses at \$300 each.

The Chevrolet bus has been delivered by Casey Chevrolet company. It is a 2-ton chassis with 195 inch wheel base and the new body was built by Industrial Iron Works at Sweetwater. The body is 21 feet long and has a seating capacity of from 48 to 56 passengers.

Ivey Motor company is expected to deliver the new Ford bus in the near future.
