

Petitions are being circulated for a special election when the matter of a county hospital will be sub mitted to the voters of Coke county. Present plans are that the petitions will be presented at a meeting of the commissioners court here next Monday.

At that time the court will no doubt set an election date, which may be not less than 20 days or more than 30 days in the future.

Plans to proceed with a vote on the proposed hospital were settled at a public meeting in the district court room last Monday. It has been previously pointed out that the commissioners court could not issue time warrants for constructing a hospital without having a county vote on the question.

The petitions, which are being filled rapidly, request that an election be called for the purpose of authorizing the establishment of a county hospital and the issuance of not to exceed \$50,000 in county warrants for the construction and equipment of same.

It is believed the amount will be sufficient for a 10-bed hospital, with clinic, operating room and modern equipment throughout.

Solid South Threatens Party Split; **Government Eyes Self Ration Plan; Congress Sets Tentative Budget Cut**

CIVIL RIGHTS:

10 Points President Truman, who seems to run to 10-point programs, tossed another one to congress-concerning the preservation and protection of civil rights-and then stood aside to await the explosion.

It came quickly. Southern Democrats, hopping mad over at least four of the 10 controversial points, began to talk seriously of calling a Dixie convention to split away from Mr. Truman on the civil rights issue.

Focus of the current disunity was a bill, up for approval by the senate labor committee, to create a national commission against job discrimination on grounds of race,

creed or color. Sen. Allen J. Ellender (Dem., La.) predicted that if the bill were approved in its present form the party would erupt into open warfare. Both foes and backers of the measure agreed that it would be a close thing.

The four proposals that most inflamed the southerners were the ones calling for (1) a federal antilynching law, (2) a permanent fair employment practice commission, (3) an end to Jim Crow rules in transportation and (4) outlawing of state poll taxes.

Remainder of the points advocated by the President were: A permanent commission on civil rights, a joint congressional committee on civil rights, a civil rights division in the justice department; tightening of civil rights statutes; home rule for the District of Columbia; statehood for Alaska and Hawaii; equalization of naturalization opportunities, and settlement of evacuation claims of Japanese-Americans.

Because 1948 is an election year, and a presidential election year at that, the program, which otherwise might be ignored, was certain to get hot partisan debate.

In answer to Mr. Truman's firm statement that "something must be done" about the civil rights issue, southern Democrats replied that they were thinking of calling an allsouthern convention to pick its own presidential candidate.

Charles F. Brannan, assistant secretary of agriculture, heads the new food saving setup. Originally started by the citizens' food committee last fall, it has been carried on until now under the direct leadership of the cabinet food committee.

Major emphasis, it was understood, would be placed on meat as the pivotal item in the cost of living merry-go-round; however, other foods also would be covered in the voluntary program. Based on specific recommendations of the food industry and public representatives, it is theoretically designed to meet the twin problem of scarce food supplies and high prices.

Biggest talking point the administration had in its attempts to solicit public support was the department of agriculture's somber prediction that the nation is heading for a serious meat shortage in the spring. And by way of emphasis Brannan added that meat rationing 'by price'' already is in effect because many people cannot afford to buy.

BUDGETING:

Hesitant

Budget busters in the house and senate were going around and around the issues of budget cutting and tax reduction, making oblique motions in the direction of the central problem-what to cut and how much.

In terms of actual accomplishment they managed to agree tentatively on a cut of 2.5 billion dollars in President Truman's 1949 budget. That would leave a potential surplus of 10.1 billion dollars for tax reductions and payments on the national debt. But, because of the admittedly tentative nature of their estimates, the congressional spokesmen evaded any conclusion that their budget would leave room for the full 6.5 billion dollars in tax re-

duction recently voted by the house. Meanwhile, the slight jubilation that had arisen over house passage of the Knutson tax reduction bill already had died down in view of the senate's attitude toward the measure.

The senate intends to keep the bill in drydock, possibly until early summer when it expects to have a better idea of whether or not the budget slash will stick.

PENSIONS:

Ana a Strike

While John L. Lewis was champing at the bit and looking like he might call a strike of his soft coal miners this spring, coal producers were busy thinking up possible reasons for him to do so.

One theory advanced was that rivalry between Lewis and Philip Murray, president of United Steelworkers (CIO), to win pensions for their members is partly to blame for Lewis' veiled strike threat.

Murray has been negotiating for an insurance and pension plan with U. S. Steel since last April and appears to be making progress. Lewis, so the story goes, may be vying with Murray in the fight to secure pensions for workers in the big mass industries. He has demanded \$100-a-month pensions for miners aged 60, with the pensions to be paid from the bituminous welfare and retirement fund.

Operators, however, have rejected this demand, making it clear that they will not consent to any disbursements from the fund until Lewis agrees to set up the fund in accordance with the Taft-Hartley law.

FOR SALE:

Some Eggs

U. S. government has hung out a "for sale" sign on 46.8 million dozen eggs that it bought last spring to support domestic prices.

There is one stipulation, however. Only foreign users will be allowed to buy them.

For the comfort of U.S. housewives the agriculture department was swift to point out that these eggs are not the kind that can be used readily for home consumption. They were shelled, dumped into huge containers and frozen before the government bought them, in the first place.

Agriculture department decided to sell the eggs to foreign buyers when it was unable to sell them to bakers and confectioners in this country because egg production has been going up and egg prices down.

Hence, the eggs are being offered on a bid basis to foreign governments, relief feeding organizations and to brokers or exporting concerns to "explore possible foreign outlets" and "to help relieve the foreign shortage of food."

GLOOMY: World Report

In a massive survey of global economy at the end of 1947 the United Nations has blocked out a dismal picture of a world that is critically short of food, plagued by industrial shortages and inflation and lacks the dollars it needs to finance the imports so vital to recovery.

Only the people of the U.S. could take heart from what the U. N. survey had to say. For this nation, with its undamaged wealth of resources and production, holds nearly all the economic chips in a world that is producing less than it did 10 years ago for a population that has increased by 200 million.

More distressing is the fact that the world outside the U.S. has bogged down following the relatively rapid strides in reconstruction tributor groups met with Clinton made during the 18 months after the

Appearing before parliament, Prime Minister Clement Attlee proclaimed his government's opposition to any general increase of personal incomes - wages, salaries, profits or rents. He proposed, in effect, that the British people put themselves on the honor system in sacrificing possible increased earnings

Purpose of this refined and patriotic masochism would be to combat inflation and rebuild the British economy. The people, Attlee said, must master the crisis instead of waiting to be overwhelmed by it.

Actually, the government was not freezing wages, although newspapers decried Attlee's words as implying such action. But the prime minister only used the word persuasion, not compulsion.

It has been estimated that wages in Britain have risen about 25 per cent higher than prices since 1939, and what Attlee said in effect was that if workers want to keep the gains they have won since before the war they must work harder and not seek beyond their power to achieve.


Homemade Weighing **Bin Speeds Work**

Device Aids Automatic Feed Handling Setup

It is an old saying that all farm equipment was first thought of by a farmer. Whether that saying holds true may be questioned. But it is certain that much of it did come into being as the result of ideas which some farmer had concerning ways to improve and speed up the performance of his various chores.

A pertinent example of this fact is shown in the accompanying illustration. It shows a homemade weighing bin, which was conceived by a Midwestern farmer for use with his automatic feed handling setup. It holds several tons of feed and is fixed to the ceiling by a series of heavy springs and turnbuckles, one spring being located at each corner of the bin in the center of two turnbuckles. Tension on the springs moves a pointer across a scale at the bottom of the bin to indicate weight up to 3,200 pounds.

A slide gate at the bottom of the bin permits feed to spill out into a cart in desired quantities. The bin




Home-made "weighing bin," built by Midwestern farmer.

is placed below a chute leading from a two-ton mixer in the barn mow. The entire setup operates as follows: Whole grain is blown into an overhead bin, from which it flows into a blower-equipped hammermill on the first floor. Ground grain is blown back into the mixer and then drops into the weighing bin. The mixer and grinder are operated by five-horsepower motors, whereas the whole grain is blown into the storage bin by tractor power.





Automatic Egg Washer



Prof., F. B. Wright demonstrating the new egg washing machine developed at Cornell university. The device makes it possible for two persons to wash, dry and pack five cases of eggs an hour, five times as fast as the same jobs could be done by hand. As most poultrymen and their wives spend from two to four evenings a week cleaning eggs by hand, this machine will result in a big saving in time.

Formula Computes Feed **Required** for One Hen

High egg production clearly takes more feed, but just as clearly the feed brings a greater return in terms of eggs than the same amount fed to low-producing hens. Dr. L. E. Card of the Illinois experiment station explains how to compute the total feed required for one hen for a year

Multiply the live weight of the bird, in pounds, by 8.

Add 25.

Divide the total number of eggs the hen lays by 7 (e. g. 105 divided by 7 equals 15) and add this figure to the total obtained by the first two steps. An example:

Weight of hen-5 pounds. Five times 8 equals 40; plus 25 equals 65.

Hen lays 105 eggs per year. Di-vide this figure by 7. Result 15.

Total feed required - 80 pounds. (65 plus 15).

Judge Bob Davis **Discusses** Issues

Contrary to a recent article- in the San Angelo Standard Times, I wish to state to the voters of Coke county that at the present time I have no intentions of making the race for State Representative. have already submitted my candidacy for re-election to the office of County Judge and Ex-Officio Supt. of Schools of Coke County.

During the first term of office, there is no doubt that some mistakes have been made, but we are all prone to err at one time or another. It is through the realization of any mistakes that we made

During a first term, any official is only able to devise a plan, and during the second term, which is usually customary, he has the opportunity to fulfill those plans to the best interests of the entire citizenship of the county.

At the present time the Commissioner's Court is in the process of setting up a county wide road plan. We are rapidly completing negotiations with the State Highway Department for "all" the necessary funds for the completion of the Robert Lee-Sterling City Road. This will mean about \$455,000.00 to be paid in full by the State of Texas.

The next meeting of the court will engage an auditing firm to conduct a complete audit of the records of Coke county which has not been done in at least the past 10 or 12 years. At the same time a definite system will be set up whereby the audit will be made yearly at a small cost to the county. Inventories will be set up in order that all properties of the county will be known, and the exact location of same can be determined in only a few minutes.

A contract is now in the State Comptroller's office for approval, and within the next two weeks Judge Dotson, delinquent tax attorney, will begin his duties in clearing up all the delinquent taxes in the county.

There's No Limit to Work Day For Mayor of Many Interests

WOOD RIVER, ILL. - The mayor of Wood River (population 8,197) is a man of two titles, five jobs, unbounded enthusiasm and a complete disregard for the limits of a 24-hour day.

As mayor of the bustling Midwest-ern town, 35-year-old Lavier D. Humphrey puts on his "executive hat" and, like mayors the country over, deliberates highway improvements, tax rates, police affairs and garbage disposal.

Then he switches to dungarees and an oil worker's safety helmet for his eight hour a day job as operator in Shell Oil company's re-finery in neighboring Roxana. Starting with the company as a laborer in 1933, Humphrey has worked up to his present job as an operator in the lubricating oil plant. Donning a worn but service-

able baseball cap-symbolic of his intense interest in youth of the town - Humphrey turns to his third major interest, that of providing suitable recreation facilities for Wood River youngsters. He has established supervised playgrounds for young-sters of all ages and currently is sponsoring the conversion of a 15-acre corn field into a ball park and recreation center.

The mayor's fourth activity-the one of which he secretly is most proud-is his famed Junior G-Man club, first of its kind in the country. Humphrey and Police Chief Frank Starkey formed the club after youngsters caused \$500 damage to municipal property during Halloween night festivities in 1944. Club members cooperate actively with police; they report parking violations, speeders, red light crashers; they unmasked a peeping tom al-ways one look ahead of police, and they aided in detecting a gang of vandals who were breaking into the local high school. Since the club was organized, Halloween damage has drouped to less than \$25.

Humphrey admits, however, that his fifth job is the hardest: The coordination of all his activities within the limits of a 24-hour day. Under a Shell policy encouraging employees to participate in civic activities, Humphrey often finds himself wearing the mantle of each of his jobs at once.

Between sandwich bites during lunch hour in the refinery, he may hear a citizen's complaint that his neighbor's children get up too early, study a report on speeders from a trusted G-Man lieutenant, review the latest set of ball park plans even go over his own refinery reports.







Country Doctor Prescribes for Self-It's School

HARRISBURG, PA .- The country doctor in Pennsylvania has returned to school to learn the latest progress in the medical field. This new venture in medical education, never attempted previously anywhere in the world, has been hailed as a "pattern for other states."

Sponsored by Pennsylvania Medical society, the project has been accorded an enthusiastic reception by some 840 physicians of small towns and rural areas.

"Students" attend one eight-hour class a week in the nearest of six centrally located instruction centers. Teaching centers at present are in Allentown, Harrisburg, Johnstown, Oil City, Wilkes-Barre and Williamsport. The course extends for 10 weeks.

Instructors are medical experts from leading training institutions of Pittsburgh and Philadelphia. They lecture morning, afternoon and evening on the latest know-how in medicine. Practical phases of diagnosis and treatment are covered, instructors explaining the best techniques known to the medical profession.

Of the 840 doctors who took the opening course 580 were general practitioners, most of them from small communities and rural areas. Sixty-two were specialists in internal medicine, 61 were surgeons, 32 were obstetricians and gynecologists and 25 were neuro-psychiatrists.

"This program has proved that the general practitioner, especially the typical country doctor, seeks to keep himself abreast of the latest progress in medicine," Dr. Charles W. Smith, chairman of the medical society's graduate education com-mittee, said in commenting on suc-cess of the venture.

Savings Drives May Be Renewed

"HERE is a lot of loose money floating around the countryso much in fact that presidents of all eleven district federal home loan banks, and other banks, are behind a move to renew savings drives on government bonds to help siphon off the excess income which otherwise might force consumers' prices still higher.

This fact doesn't exactly agree with some reports that thousands of people are dipping into savings in order to make ends meet to pay the grocery, clothing and rent bills. As a matter of fact, the President's economic report said that expenditures had caught up with income and many were using savings or credit to keep the home fires burning.

But the annual report of the home loan bank board just released says savings held in the 6,100 savings and loan associations increased in 1947 by \$1,152,000,000, or 13.5 per cent, and brings total savings accounts to \$9,700,000,000 as of last December 31.

The report shows savings are dropping, it is true, as compared to peak years of 1944 and 1945. The report indicates that in 1947 the American people saved 9 billion dollars as compared to 22.2 billion in 1944 and 19.7 billion in 1945. There was nothing to spend money for, though, in those years

Other savings media also showed substantial increases during the past year. On the basis of figures covering life insurance companies, mutual savings banks, commercial banks, postal savings and savings bonds, total savings are estimated at \$155,700,000,000.

Army Supplants Navy in Favor





Skulduggery in the Courts

A FTER Jimmy Petrillo was acquitted in federal court in Chicago, Congressman Fred A. Hartley, co-author of the Taft-Hartley labor emancipation law, said he wasn't any too sure that the department of justice was leveling in this case.

I have been thinking the same thing about other union cases and some other department of justice jobs. They are getting very careless.

You know what leveling means, of course. It is a poetic term from the prize fighting racket. To level is to put forth your best efforts, as the prize fight commissioners say.

Lots of times I have thought that the department of justice didn't put forth its best efforts in cases involving union gorillas or moving picture people or ideological refugees.

There is a fact about the duty of the federal judges few of us know and most of those few seldom remember. A federal judge is supposed to sniff out skulduggery done in his presence and to denounce any obvious crookedness or negligence on the part of the district attorney whether for bene-fit of the government or of the defendant.

I dare say there have been cases where federal judges had scolded district attorneys for bearing down unfairly on defendants. But I challenge you to cite any case where a judge got disgusted and bawled out a prosecutor for willfull and obvious neglect of the people's interest and failure to do his best. I say it is high time one of them did.
