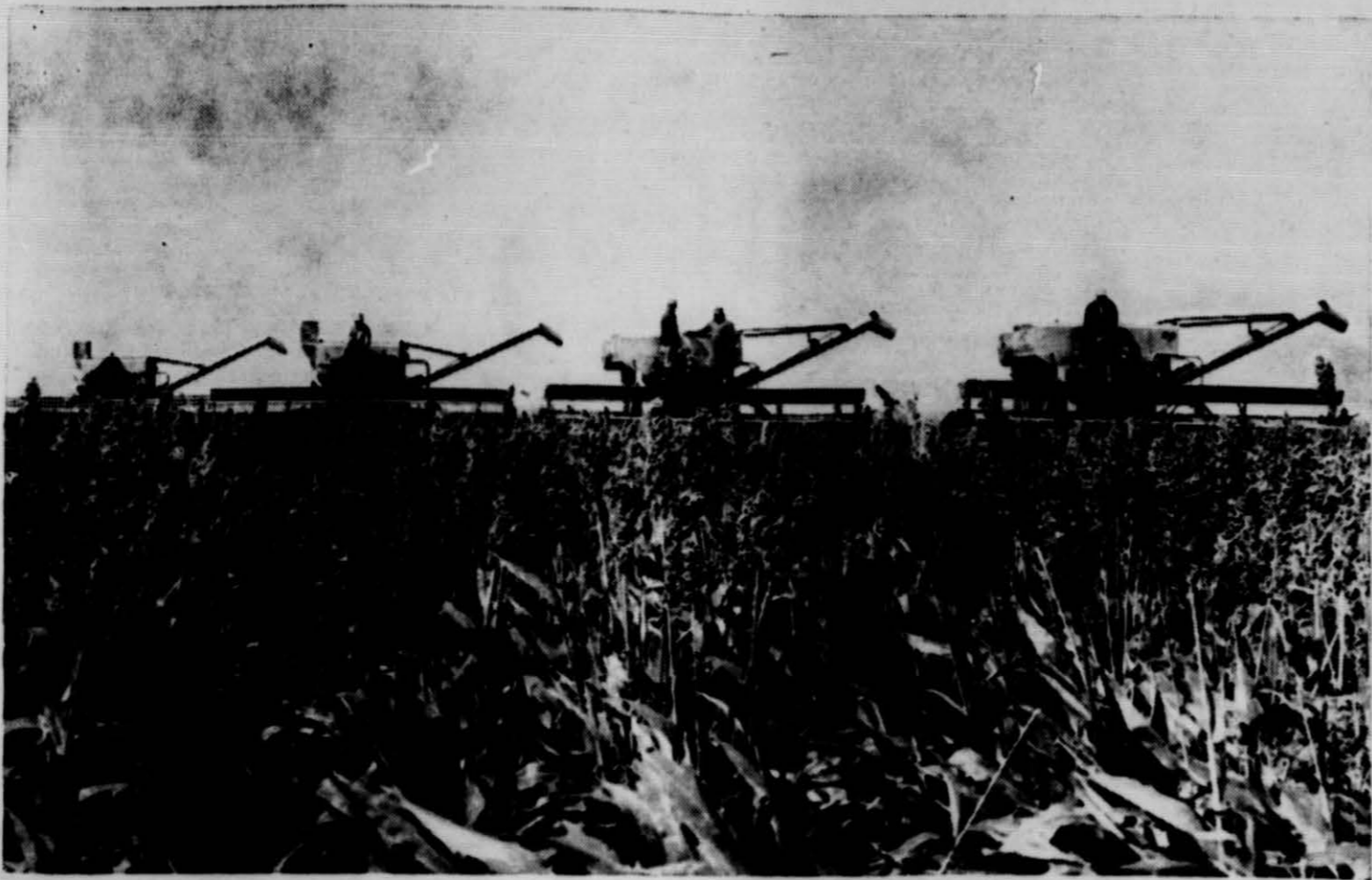

Congressman Walter Rogers was the guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Dimmitt Lions Club Tuesday noon. The congressman was in his usual good form when it comes to speaking and although having served in Congress for a number of years he still retains his sense of humor and is good at throwing in appropriate jokes to illustrate a point. I have heard the Congressman speak on several occasions recently, and with but one exception I haven't heard him repeat a joke. That is pretty good going for a public speaker. The main topics in Rogers' talk were the agricultural problem and the redistricting dilemma occasioned by Supreme Court decisions.

As expressed in his talk, Rogers opinion of the agricultural situation is similar to that of all other well-known Democrats. He believes that a healthy agricultural economy depends on a sensible government agricultural program, mainly price supports to guarantee the farmer fair returns on the major agricultural commodities. He also pointed up the well-known fact that the nation's economy depends on a strong agricultural economy. On all of these points I agree with him wholeheartedly. It will pay the farmers of the nation to send men like Congressman Rogers to the United States House of Representatives. He is dedicated and earnestly concerned about our agricultural industry.

The Congressman discussed the redistricting problem at length and was of the opinion that the members of the state Senate at least should be elected on a basis other than the "one man one vote" edict of the Supreme Court. The decision of the Supreme Court was occasioned by a suit instigated first in Tennessee and then in several other states where apportionment was deemed unfair, and later found its way to the Supreme Court for final determination. Rogers is of the opinion that rural areas will suffer from a legislative stand point if all representation is based on a strictly population basis.

The News, under its present management, has been operated at its former location for the past twenty-one years. Very little if any of the original equipment is still being used in the production of the Castro County News.

Only two pieces of equipment remain to be moved, the 4-page newspaper press and a small two-page press used for the printing of page and double-page circulars. The presses will be moved this week-end.

Local Fire Chief Makes Statement

Fire Chief James Slough today announced the Fire Department's cooperation with all the other groups in using simple precautionary methods to prevent many damaging fires. The Fire Chief, discussing replacement costs, said that, "even in small fires, where the firemen are able to confine the flames to one room, it costs property owners two to three times as much to refurbish the burned-out areas as it did ten years ago."

The Chief particularly emphasized the following points: 1. Great destruction to our city is caused by rubbish fires. If we remove the rubbish from our cellars, attics and closets, fire losses will come down and many alarms will be eliminated.

2. Buildings classified as conflagration hazards should be protected by automatic sprinklers. Such installations will pay for themselves out of savings in insurance premiums and as a result our conflagration areas will be eliminated.

3. Basement fires are the hardest to fight. Firemen have difficulty fighting their way in and often do not know what the conditions will be when they reach the basement. A large percentage of all business fires originate in sprinklers, our country's well over one billion dollars in fire losses would be greatly reduced.

The Chief particularly emphasized the large number of fires caused from carelessness in handling matches and smoking. "Matches should be kept where small children cannot reach them and a liberal supply of ash trays throughout the house would reduce fires," the Chief said. He particularly emphasized that, "If you value your life, do not smoke in bed."

Revival Services Continue At First Christian Church

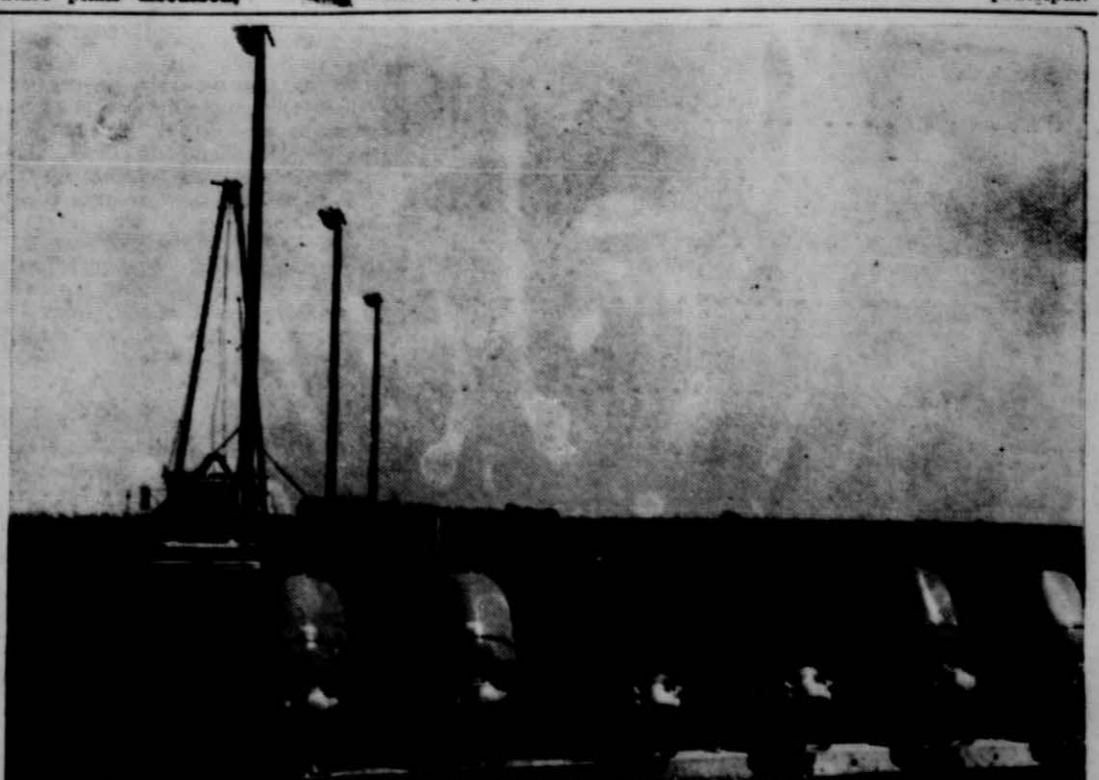
Evangelistic services are continuing nightly at the First Christian Church, 600 Western Circle, Dimmitt.

PEACE CORPS VOLUNTEERS TRAINING ON UT CAMPUS

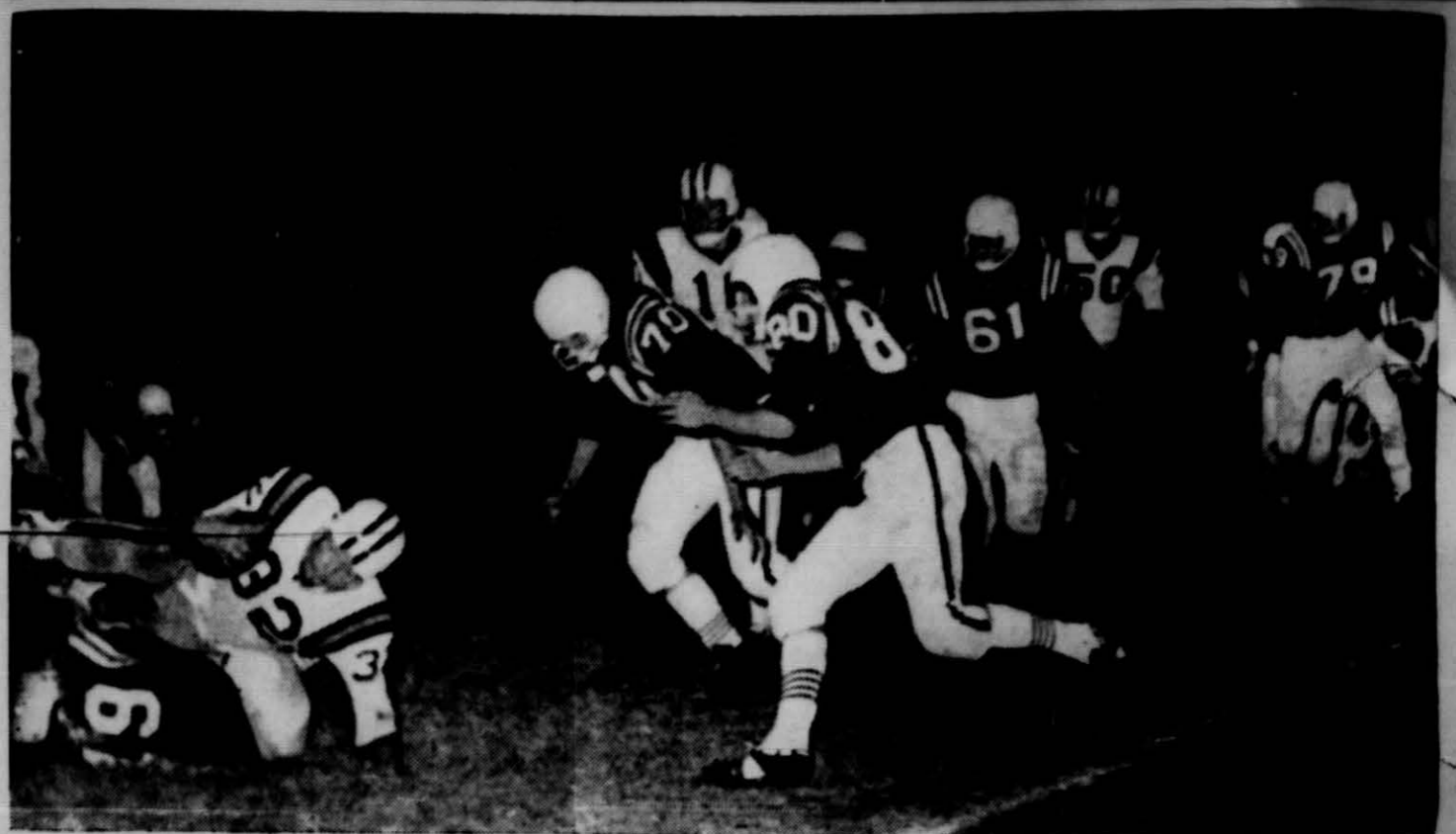
