Some work has already been done on the new Dimmitt golf course, on the old golf course site, in the southeast section of the Dimmitt townsite and arrangements to complete the course within the next few days have been made. The golf links are being built as economically as possible because the members of the organization realize that the location can only be had temporarily as a growing Dimmitt will soon make it necessary that the golf club find a new site for its course. The golf course, as planned, embraces a considerable amount of private property, belonging to local and non-resident property owners, who will naturally take advantage of any development program in that section of town by placing their property on the market for sale to prospective homeowners or for commercial usage, a fact that could terminate the use of a part or all of the property as a golf course at any time and without the necessity of prior notice. The current development program by the City of Dimmitt, including the grading of streets and the installation of water and sewer service, will be extended to all sections of the city to encourage the continued growth of the town.

New Dimmitt Gin Almost Complete

Dimmitt's newest cotton gin is rapidly nearing completion and will be open to public inspection in another 30 days, according to W. H. Brown, co-owner of the gin. Already completed, and located in front of the gin, is a building housing the gin scales, offices, vault, reception room and two rest rooms. This structure, made of stucco, was built at a cost of approximately \$8,000, Brown disclosed. Brown said that high winds had delayed work on the new gin, which will be a "590" plant. Work has resumed at a rapid pace, however, and the structure will be finished sooner than originally planned, he added. The Levelland gin owner who moved here only recently remarked, "It will be the best gin I have ever owned." The gin will be made of steel throughout. Brown, who is living at present in the S. T. Newman home here, is in partnership with E. R. Martin, also of Levelland. Martin's wife will serve as bookkeeper for the new gin.

Remains of Capt. Bailes Enroute To San Francisco

In a letter received last week by Mrs. Joe Bailes, wife of Captain Joe D. Bailes, who was killed in Korea in May, it was learned that the remains of the late Captain Bailes is enroute to the United States by ship and will arrive in San Francisco Harbor about June 29. The remains will be brought overland to the funeral home in Hereford as requested by Mrs. Bailes. Services will be held from the First Baptist Church here soon after the body arrives, and interment will be in a Tyler cemetery shortly after July 1. The exact date of the funeral and burial will be disclosed as soon as the remains of the deceased arrive in Hereford. Mrs. Bailes was notified of the return arrangements in a letter from the Navy Department. Captain Bailes was killed in Korea on May 6 when his plane was forced down just a few minutes short of his home base. He was returning from a mission. Pilot of an F9F "Panther Jet," Captain Bailes was attached to the First Marine Wing. Dr. and Mrs. Porter Bailes of Tyler are the parents of the late Captain Bailes.

Officials, who already own a chain of department stores in the High Plains area, have contracted to purchase the old Streu Hardware building, located next door to the hotel here, from its owner, "Punk" Glibreath. The store reportedly will officially be opened to the public in late July.

The firm plans to remodel the now vacant building and offer residents a complete line of dry goods. No names have been mentioned in connection with the management of the store. The number of employees that will be needed has not been disclosed, either. Further plans will be revealed as soon as the firm completes the transaction for purchase of the building.

There won't be much delay in making arrangements for new applicants to go to the camp, Moran explained.

County Well Permits Now Listed at 172

Applications for permits to drill irrigation wells in Castro county increased from 168 to 172 as five permits were approved during the past week by the farm bureau office here. A total number of wells that have been drilled in the county now is estimated at 1,455. About ninety-five percent of the wells approved since Feb. 1 have been drilled. Approximately 230,000 acres of land in the county are being supplied with water from these wells. Farmers who haven't supplied complete data for their well applications are advised by the bureau office to do so as soon as possible.

Hudson Succeeds McLeroy as New County Agent

Castro county commissioners approved the application of Charles W. Hudson, 32-year-old former assistant Montgomery county agent, for the post of Castro county agent, at a regular meeting, Monday. The new county agent came here from Conroe, where he served as assistant agent for Montgomery county for six months. Prior to that time he was district supervisor for the veteran's farm training program for Eastern New Mexico. He also taught veterans at Clayton, N. M., for some nine months. Hudson is a graduate of Texas Technological College and Seagraves High School. He was a radio operator and gunner in the Air Force during World War II and served in Central and South America.

The new agent remarked, when interviewed by the News, "I'm very happy to be here. I am familiar with the area as I have been through here many times. I will do my best to do a good job for the people of Castro county."

Hudson is married and has a two and one-half-year old son and an 11-year-old daughter. They will move here just prior to July 1 as Hudson will assume his new duties then. Hudson replaces Edd McLeroy as county agent. McLeroy, who served over two years as county agent, resigned to accept a position with a feed company here.

The course, estimated to cost about \$500, is expected to be ready for play soon. Greens will consist of cotton seed hulls and an oil film. Thirty residents have already paid membership fees into the new association that was formed when it was decided to develop the course.

The latest type of golf equipment will be sported on the new course, when it is completed, by Gene "One Club" Rutledge, Rutledge, who stated that he is ready and eager for play, has the latest thing in golf clubs. The golfing enthusiast, demonstrating his new club recently, proved that he has an all-purpose club. By turning the head of the club Rutledge can convert it into anything from a putter to a number nine iron. He frankly admitted that the new type club is a capable replacement for a complete set of clubs and is certainly unique.

No Shortage of Water Seen Here City Mgr. Says

Although Dimmitt residents are consuming quite a bit more water this year than last year there is adequate water being pumped from the city reservoir and no danger of a water shortage in the foreseeable future, according to City Manager, E. C. Noble. There are approximately 250,000 gallons of water in the underground reservoir and about 50,000 in the city's overhead tank, Noble estimated. All three wells have a capacity of about 1400 gallons of water. The city's supply of water from day to day is taken from the overhead tank.

The city's newest well was dug last September because the original two wells weren't supplying sufficient water for resident's needs. Reports of water shortages or impending shortages in other parts of the county and cities prompted the city to water their laws only at certain intervals. The situation there is reported bad and no immediate relief is seen from the shortage. Likewise, clampdowns on water use in Wellington, Childress and Canyon has gone into effect as demand reportedly is getting higher than the cities can supply it. Other cities are urging residents to conserve water to avoid the threat of water shortage.

These 4-H members have agreed to properly care for their animals and return eight top gilts to the same number of 4-H members next year.

Newman, along with other crack basketball players from over Texas and Louisiana, will play in several exhibition games sponsored by the Brazilian Confederation of Basketball. He is a graduate of Hart High School where he won high honors as a player. Included on the trip will be a weeks stay at the Fourth Baptist World Youth Conference in Rio de Janeiro. The Wayland delegation began departing in June by plane.

Jack Gregory, owner of the grain company, welcomed the addition of McLeroy to his staff and stated that he looks forward to long and pleasant association with the new member. Gregory added that the people may feel free to call on McLeroy for any service that he might render.

Road Improvements Start in County

Work began this week on improving a total of 15.6 miles of roadway on Highway 51 between Dimmitt and the Sunnyside Community. R. D. Rogers, highway maintenance foreman for this area, said the state highway department has let a contract to C. Hunter Strain which calls for putting on a layer of asphalt concrete to smooth the road up. The stretch being improved runs from the roadside park just out of Dimmitt to a point just this side of Sunnyside. The project will be financed by the state highway department. Rogers added that the highway department is also working on a stretch of road now, which when completed will afford motorists a paved road from Nazareth to Happy by way of Arney. The farm-to-market road being improved in the Arney area runs from the present farm-to-market road north of Nazareth to the Arney School House, turns east and connects up with farm road out of Happy.

Residents Are Urged to Rally Behind Proposed New Community Center Here

Representatives from some of the local civic clubs have been appointed to help the city planning commission study and possibly draw up plans for the construction of a new community center here. Already appointed are Russel Moran, representing the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce, and E. M. Nelson, who will represent the local Lions Club, American Legion members and the Dimmitt Garden Club are expected to name representatives soon. Plans as to the size of the building that will be needed, facilities, etc., are being studied and considered by a three-member city planning commission, appointed earlier this year. Serving on the commission are L. G. Manning,

W. E. Kirkpatrick, Sr., and Jack Cowart.

If the current plans should materialize the old grade school building, located in the south part of Dimmitt, would be converted into the proposed new community center. Members of the planning commission believe materials could be taken from the old structure and used to build the project. A completely new roof would be needed, however. Member pointed out that the new project (by utilizing the old structure) could be built at a cost of approximately \$25,000. They also add that by building an entirely new community center the total cost would run in the neighborhood of \$100,000.

As a result of returns canvassed in a joint election held in Arney and Happy, Monday of this week, some 40 sections of land in the Arney School District have been consolidated with the Happy District. The vote at Arney was 19 to 1 in favor of consolidation while Happy voters passed the issue by a 43-1 vote.

The retiring tail twister joined the group on the last number and evoked considerable laughter from club members.

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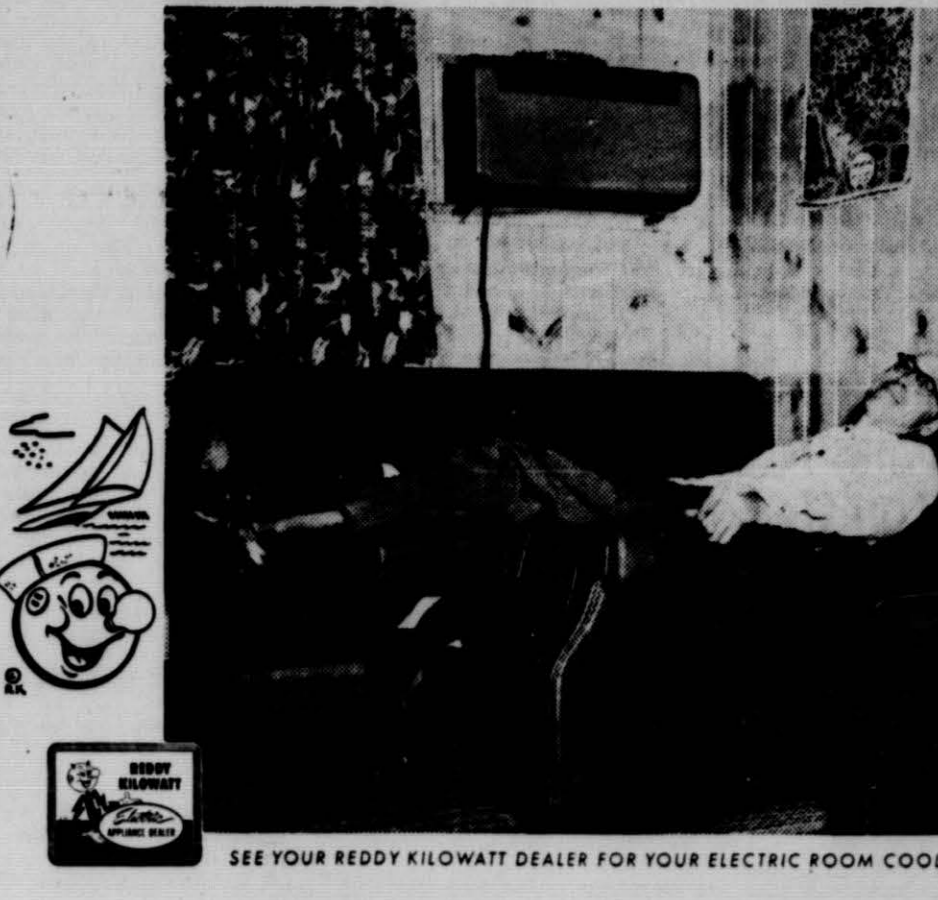

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Get a good idea for a new invention floating around in the back of your mind? Better take care, or someone else may beat you to the patent office.

Many people have good ideas about new or improved machines or gadgets, but never do anything about them because they don't know how to protect their rights while perfecting such items and going through the necessary patenting procedure. Here's what you can do to protect your invention before you have it patented.

Under the patent laws of the United States the person who first conceives of a new and novel invention is entitled to it. Therefore, if conflicting claims arrive as to who is entitled to a patent, it is necessary to establish who first had the idea, not one who filed the first application for the registered envelope and its contents, the inventor merely files it away in a safe place unopened. There, if a contest should develop postal records will tend to establish the testimony of his witnesses.

By taking the above precautions, your original idea was conceived, your work, perfect your idea, and after the same is perfected, make application for a patent, if you feel that you have a patentable idea.

One should not just make a preliminary sketch and put it away and think that is sufficient to protect his rights. That is just one additional bit of evidence to help him establish his right to the patent. The patent should be sought as soon as one possibly can after conceiving his patentable idea and working out details of the same.

Texas Cannot Wait for Water Survey Shepperd Tells Water Officials

Anahuac, June 20—Attorney General John Ben Shepperd told water conservationists Saturday that Texas can not wait the four years allotted by the 53rd Legislature for comprehensive survey of the state's water resources.

Shepperd urged immediate cooperation of all cities, counties, water districts and agencies to make inventory of needs and speed up a uniform water policy for the state.

Shepperd spoke to some 5,000 members of the Fraternity of the White Heron at a ninth annual fish fry in Anahuac. The group promotes the development of water resources in Texas and the Southwest.

In addition to an immediate statewide water inventory, Shepperd named two other "urgent needs." We must have a clear-cut understanding among the various water authorities as to who is going to do what," he said. "There is too much backbiting between various river authorities and water districts. Somebody in authority ought to call them together in the next ten days, lock the door and let them thrash it out."

He urged all water districts, river authorities and watershed associations to work under the State Water Resources Committee in making a prompt survey.

"But let's leave the politics out of it," he said. "Let every water-worried Texan be a fact-finder, not a lobbyist. Politics, like oil, will not mix with water."

Pointing up the committee's task of recommending water legislation, the Attorney General said, "When the survey is complete and a water policy outlined, I believe we should ask the governor for a special session of the Legislature to consider nothing but the water problem. It will not suffice to have this question brought up in a crowded regular session with twelve or fifteen hundred other bills."

Shepperd was the first Attorney General to set up a separate water division in his office to study the complexity of Texas water laws. He is a past president of the Sabine River Watershed Association and a long-time member of the statewide Tidelands Committee.

Farm Bureau Doin's

During the recent term of the legislature our Farm Bureau Legislative office in Austin used its influence in keeping with the resolutions adopted at the state convention last fall. In doing so they have reported favoring 28 bills that were passed into law. Six bills failed to pass and 2 of the favored bills were vetoed by the governor. Five bills were opposed and they all failed to pass into law. A copy of bills acted on is on file in the Farm Bureau office for those that are interested in looking them over, and you will be welcome to look these over.

Among the bills that were supported this session were: 1. No. 215 by Andy Rogers requiring stricter inspection of grain and increasing the warehouse bonds affording better protection to the farmers on grain stored in bonded warehouses. 2. H. B. 427 which had to do with the control of VE disease in hogs that was threatening hog growers in Texas. One of the bills actively opposed was H. B. No. 3 requiring the school districts to raise 25 per cent of the Minimum Foundation School Fund thus taxing local school districts regardless of ability to pay for a program set up by the state. Local school districts have no means of raising money except through ad valorem taxes. This is in opposition to the resolution as adopted at the last state convention.

More people are taking advantage of the free gasoline tax exemption service offered by the local Farm Bureau office. It will be filed for you and before it expires you will be notified, giving you plenty of time to apply for the tax refund.

Secretary of Agriculture, Ezra Benson, will be in Lubbock June 27 to address the meeting of the Cotton Council, being held June 25, 26, and 27 of this week. No doubt many farmers from this area will attend.
