Geologist Gives Oil Review Before Barbecue Crowd

Many people have wondered why oil is just now being discovered in Coke county, and according to Bob Cannon, well known West Texas geologist, a dozen tests made in this area from 20 to 30 years ago didn't go deep enough to strike pay.

Mr. Cannon was the principal speaker at the Robert Lee barbecue Tuesday night, sponsored by the Board of Community Development for the general public and oil personnel in particular.

Cannon said favorable reports from geologists were published in 1918, and as a result several wells were drilled. None of them went deeper than 4,000 feet, however, and wildcat operations spread westward where enormous pools were discovered and Coke county was by-passed for the next 25 years.

Crude oil dropped to 10 cents a barrel during the depression, Cannon recalled, and there was no wildcatting during the period. The war came and oil activity picked up. After the war the demand for oil increased, the price went higher and higher and we now have the most feverish search for oil our country has ever known.

Hence, territory which had only been gone over lightly is being re-examined, resulting in several concerns coming into Coke county and the discovery of new oil fields. The geologist said the main type of production in Coke county is from reef limestone found in shale sections, probably resulting from shell banks in shallow marginal seas which existed hundreds of millions of years ago.

Cannon said the new wells south of town were producing from the Ellenburger, a sheet limestone or dolomite, but it remains to be seen how much Ellenburger production will result in this area. The speaker said the oil being produced in Coke is desirable, high gravity, sweet crude and is in great demand.

Mr. Cannon and his brother, Joe, have an office in San Angelo where they have followed their profession the past 25 years. They have been in charge of the geology for Shamrock on the Wendland ranch, 8 miles southeast of Robert Lee.

An estimated 800 people attended the barbecue and enjoyed a fine program of entertainment. W. T. Roach and his committee are being highly complimented on their success in preparing the dinner of barbecued goat, and Harve Wallace was boss of the barbecue pit. Being unable to determine the number of people who would attend, the committee ran short of food before everyone was served.

Gerald Allen, president of the BCD, welcomed the guests and Judge Bob Davis was master of ceremonies. Mayor Neil Wylie told the audience Robert Lee was working hard to increase its water supply and get more housing, and he promised local citizens would get the job done if they were given a little more time.

Music was furnished by the Twin Mountain Boys of San Angelo, a snappy group of young fellows who can really play and sing. The Robert Lee square dance club put on a fine exhibition, with Mrs. W. T. Roach as caller. Selections were enjoyed by a vocal trio composed of Mildred and Edna Mae

Wallace and Betty Jo Mauldin.

A number of visitors made brief talks, including Dewey Smith, area superintendent for Sun Oil, L. T. Youngblood and Ed Nunnally of Bronte, Jerry Stoltz, H. G. Wendland, Sam Dotson, Carroll Land, of San Angelo, and others.

Alan Guiberson said he was lucky to hit with his wildcat on the Jack Lassiter lease, and gave main credit to his associate, Bill Barrbre, who worked on the project more than a year. Barrbre spoke briefly and an introduction was acknowledged by E. G. Lowe, superintendent of the Hickok & Reynolds test on the Rawlins property near Bronte.

Wire Being Strung On 120 Miles REA

A large number of farm and ranch folks of Coke county are very happy over the prospect of getting electrical service in the near future.

Last week REA contractors began stringing 120 miles of wire and the project is to be completed within a few days. Communities which will be provided with the new hookup include Silver, Friendship, Edith, Green Mountain and Bronte.

Poles were erected more than a year ago, but the contractor could not complete the job because there was no wire. The wire which has just arrived was ordered in January, 1946.

This makes 270 miles of REA lines completed in Coke county, and contract will be let as soon as wire is available for 160 miles of extensions, according to Mr. Carroll Land of San Angelo, manager of the Concho Valley Cooperative Electric.

Must File Before July 15 For PM Examination Here

The U. S. Civil Service Commission announces an open competitive examination to fill the position of postmaster at Robert Lee where a vacancy is about to occur. Persons who desire to take the examination must have their applications on file by July 15, 1948. Date of examination will be announced later.

Mrs. Melrose Russell has resigned as Robert Lee postmaster after 13 years of service, and on July 1 Miss Myrtle will take over as acting postmaster here until a permanent appointment is made. Miss Hurley served 9 years as postmaster here and was Mrs. Russell's assistant for seven years. She taught school the past year in Barstow, Tex.

The Robert Lee office is third class and has been paying a salary of \$2,700 the past two years, but increased business will raise the figure to \$2,800 this year.

Applicants for the examination may secure the necessary blanks from the Robert Lee post office. The examination will be held at San Angelo.

Applicants must be citizens of the United States and residents of the territory served by the office for at least a year. They must be over 21 years of age and under 63. A 10 per cent credit in the examination is given to war veterans and widows or mothers of veterans killed in service.

Persons concerned in a contract for carrying the mails are not eligible. Laws provide that postmasters shall devote a minimum of 8 hours daily to their duties.

Candidates Must File By June 19

Saturday, June 19, is the deadline for candidates for county and precinct offices to file their names with County Chairman J. K. Griffith in order to get their names on the ballot.

Dates of the Democratic primary election is July 24 and ballots for absentee voters must be printed and ready for use by July 4.

Indications point to some heated campaigns for local, district and state offices this year. While county judge is the only Coke county office being contested, good scraps are shaping up in each of the four commissioner districts.

The congressional, governor, and U. S. senator races are beginning to warm up.

McCabe, Jr. placed 3rd with his yearling filly, Victor McCabe was 5th with a yearling stallion, and Wayne McCabe's 2 year old mare placed 5th. There was plenty of competition in all classes. Aubrey (Farmer) Jones took 4th money in saddle bronc riding and 6th in bull riding.

Bronte Wildcat Hits Gas Below 5100 Ft.

Wet Gas estimated at 10 to 20 million cubic feet daily was struck Monday by Hickok & Reynolds of Cisco and Dan Auld of San Antonio No. 1 E. C. Rawlings wildcat 11-2 miles west of Bronte.

The gas came to the surface in 3 minutes on a 23-minute drillstem test from 5,118-88 feet through half inch top and bottom openings. The section of lime is believed to be the base of the Strawn or the top of the Bend of the Pennsylvanian series.

Operators are drilling ahead and will explore the Ellenburger unless oil is found at a lesser depth. Formation is said to be running considerably higher than the Wendland and Reed Ellenburger discoveries eight miles to the south and west.

Hunt Testing Harris

Al Hunt's No. 1 Ralph Harris Estate was running a drillstem test around 5,800 feet this week. Reports of same were not available. Location is south of the Colorado River on the upper end of the old Saul ranch and two locations east of Sun's Central National Bank No. 2 (Blanks Estate) which found small production. Claud Dillon is the new tool pusher for Delaney Drilling Co., contractors.

Water Shut Off In Lassiter Strike

Alan Guiberson's No. 1 Jack Lassiter was flowing oil and no water this week after setting plastic plug to shut off a 5 foot water section in the bottom.

A flow of 10 barrels an hour was estimated and an official 24-hour test is scheduled for late this week.

The wildcat strike, 3 miles west and north of Sanco, found good pay in the Marble Falls and was completed open hole from 6,495 to 6,538 feet.

Guiberson has staked several more locations to the east and north and is negotiating with drilling contractors. He is said to have farmed out the forced offsets on Bryan Gartman and Marvin Simpson, hence several rigs are expected in the area soon.

Sun May Install Gas Conversion Plant at Silver

Sun Oil company is making plans for constructing a gas plant to be located in the center of their Jameson field in northwestern Coke county at Silver.

The plant will utilize wet gas which is now being flared, condensing it into butane, propane and other products, with the dry gas being injected back into the oil producing formation. By returning escaping gas back into the earth a much longer period of oil production will be assured for the area.

Much of the preliminary work has been done on the project, but some details are yet to be worked out. It was hoped to start work on the million dollar plant this autumn. Mr. Chas. D. Freeman, out from the Dallas regional office this week, said the conversion plant will require a large quantity of water, and Sun plans to confer with the Upper Colorado River Authority in the matter of constructing a dam in that locality.

The first of two injection wells is now being completed. It is No. 10 Homer Jameson. Both 7-inch casing and 2-inch tubing will be set to the bottom of the hole. Gas will be injected back into the formation inside the large casing while oil will be produced through the 2-inch pipe. No. 10 Homer Jameson flowed 231.7 barrels of oil in a 24-hour test this week, with pay section at intervals from 6,118 to 6,440 feet. When the well is completed the Ray-Harris rotary rig will move to No. 9 Fred Jameson, an east offset, which is also scheduled as an injection well.

Both the J. S. Walker No. 2 and H. L. Bloodworth No. 1 tests were acidized with 5,000 gallons this week and are swabbing. Tubb-Omega No. 1, a half mile north of Silver school house, was drilling Wednesday at 3,540 feet in shale.

South of the Colorado River, Central National No. 1 drilled out plugs and perforated six shots to the foot from 6,648-60 and was testing.

Central National No. 2 was waiting on pumping unit to be installed.

No. 3 J. B. Walker, north of the Walker discovery producer, was drilling in shale and sand at 4,886 feet.

No. 1 Calla Mae Cargile, north of Sanco, set 9 5-8 inch pipe to 790 feet and was drilling Wednesday at 1,700 feet in shale. Operators had moved in separators and were preparing to test the gas flow from No. 3 Arledge.

No. 1 Ellwood, Sun's wildcat test on the Spade ranch in Mitchell county, took a three-foot core from 7,623-26 feet. Core showed 1 foot of shale and chert, grade of brown, with good sulphur odor in parts. Coring will continue to the Ellenburger which appears to be low.

Methodist Meeting

Representatives of the Robert Lee Methodist church will participate in the San Angelo District set-up meeting Friday at First Methodist Church in San Angelo. The district is being organized under the leadership of the new district superintendent, the Rev. Fred J. Brucks.

Human Body Needs

Extra Salt in Summer

Austin, Texas, June 17.—There is little doubt that summer is here. If you don't think so, take a quick look at your thermometer or feel your shirt or blouse—chances are that it will be wet and salty with sweat.

Excessive sweating means the loss of body salt, and Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises the use of salt in drinking water as a means of avoiding heat cramps.

"Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat," says Dr. Cox. "On days when the thermometer goes to 90 degrees or above, as it has recently, the body may lose as much as fifty grams of salt. Laborers, farmers, and even white-collar workers should be especially watchful of heat cramps."

Heat cramps are characterized by pains in the stomach, headaches, and sometimes nausea and vomiting. The danger comes because the loss of the salt may occur without the knowledge of the individual until the deficiency causes cramps or heat fag.

Salt tablets may be purchased commercially. If they are not available, a pinch of table salt will serve the same purpose.

"Drinking milk is an excellent method of replacing body salt lost through perspiration," Dr. Cox says, "but alcoholic drinks should be avoided."

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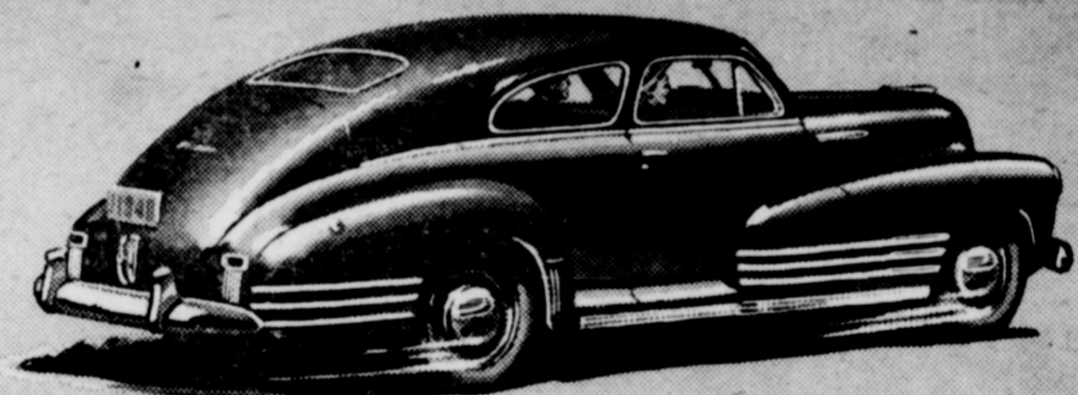

The New 1949 Ford Shows Radical Body Line Changes



The revolutionary new Ford four-door sedan for 1949 is lower, wider, roomier and provides nearly 25 per cent more visibility.

These are pictures of the new 1949 Ford cars. They show a radical change from the previous models, featuring a sweeping silhouette so low that rear fenders have been eliminated. Front seat widths have been increased six inches and the rear seats nearly eight inches.

Up to 10 per cent increased gasoline mileage is claimed for the six-cylinder engine and the re-designed V-8. The former develops 90 horse power and the latter 100.

Coke county folks will get their first look at the new Fords on Friday, June 18, at the Ivey Motor Co. showrooms in Robert Lee.

Cumbie Ivey, local dealer, will have 2-door and 4-door models on exhibit at this time.

Mr. Ivey says the new Ford is going to be a revelation to many persons who have not owned a Ford for a number of years.

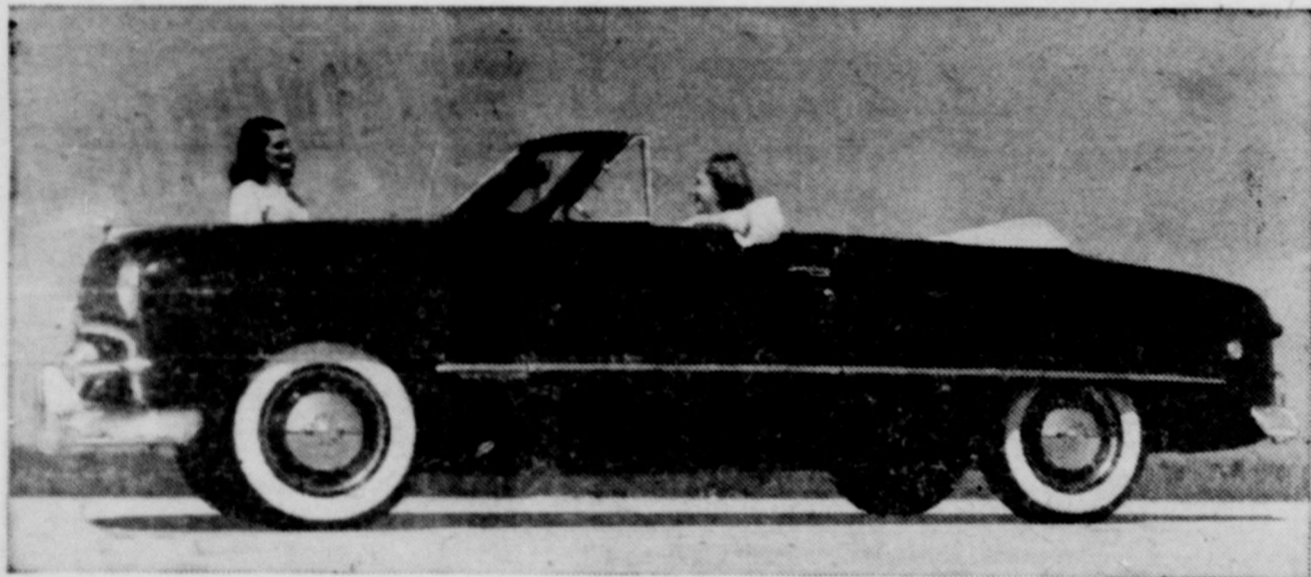
Thousands saw the new Fords in a preview in New York last week but they couldn't realize she is the great grand daughter of old tin lizzie. The car is lighter, lower, longer and more expensive than old models.

Henry Ford spent \$37,400,000 on tools to make the car, and it took more than a year. The car goes on display June 18 in showrooms of

6,500 Fords dealers.

What strikes the eye immediately is the styling. It's described as "functional," with a low silhouette which is unbroken from the blunt nose to the fenderless rear. A balance was achieved by moving the body forward five inches to cradle it between the wheels.

Mechanical improvements are stressed by Ford engineers who made scores of changes such as rubber engine mountings to reduce vibration, a 10 per cent increase in gasoline mileage and a 25 per cent improvement with the optional engine overdrive.

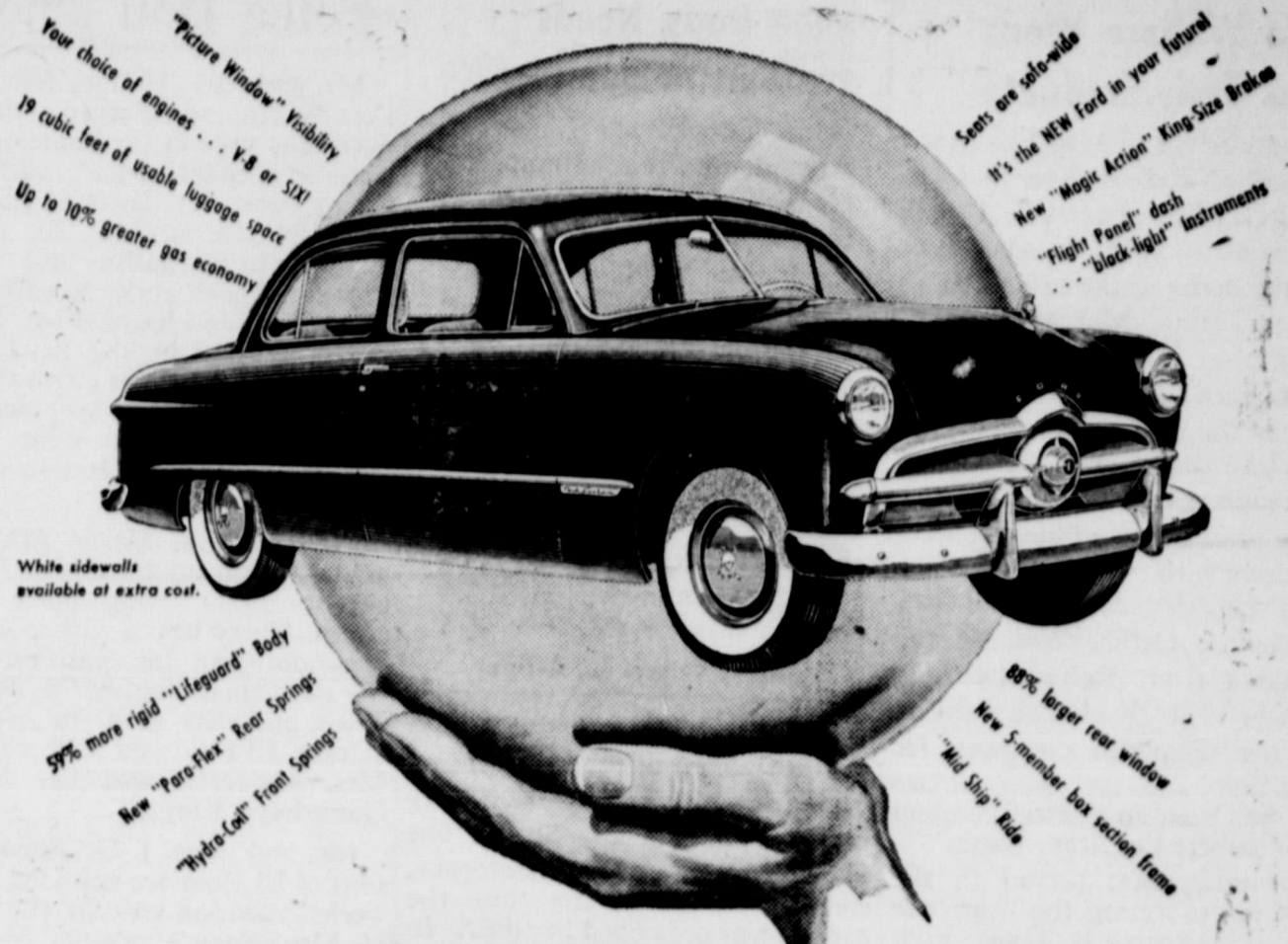
