When Castro County voters go to the polls Saturday week to decide whether or not we will have a new county exposition building, it should be after considerable thought.

The need for new buildings of all kinds is usually underestimated. At this moment we see many uses for a county center building, but if it works out as have other similar projects in this area, it will be used harder and more often than we have any reason to expect now.

Almost every night, somewhere in the county, there is a meeting of some kind going on—some large, some small—and they are all devoted to the betterment of the county. These meetings can range from 4-H meetings, farm meetings, chamber of commerce meetings, soil conservation meetings, community club meetings, sports, shows, exhibits, plays to parties and socials.

The need for such a building has been desperately felt for many years by those who set up these gatherings and face the empty prospect of finding a place to hold them.

Castro County voters have always approved these bond elections which result in a definite improvement in county facilities. It has been quite some time since something as important as the exposition building has come up. Many men have worked long and hard, visiting other such buildings, meeting and planning. Almost all of these men were farmers who felt more keenly, possibly, than anyone else the county's lack of a common meeting place.

The impending bond election gives us good cause to reflect upon just what our taxes buy. It has been often said that we derive more direct good from our city and local taxes than any other—this, despite the fact that these taxes are the lowest we pay. The taxpayers can throw a thousand dollars a year into the maw of federal treasury through income taxes and others and never see an increase in the benefits he himself receives—but on a city and county level he pays much less and gets more in usable facilities due to the common effort.

Castro County needs many things. We really doubt that there will ever be an end to it. We are a relatively new country and are still in need of the many services other counties in other states have built up during the turn of the century. For us to catch up with the essentials we want and need will require the cooperation, both at the polls and solicitation, of everyone in the county.

We are in a unique situation in this county. Due to working acquaintances built up over the years people in Big Square know people in Arney; people in Hart know people in Summerville; Nazareth residents have friends in Sunnyside and there are people in Dimmitt who call visitors from all these communities by their first names. Castro County, due to easy transportation, schools, fairs, and common interests has become a community in itself—isolated pockets within the county are becoming less and less distinct.

This isn't an idealistic, stargazing assumption—it's become a fact. And with the passage of the exposition building bond election, it will become more so.

It is for these reasons that we would urge everyone who is a qualified tax-paying voter to take part in the election and to vote approval. The exposition building would be a tribute for many years to come to the vision of the voters of this county.

Mr. C. W. (Weis) Anthony, who is chairman of the Exposition Building Committee this week came up with some good figures to substantiate the proposed construction.

"Our county is in far better financial condition than the average county in the state. In fact, there are only a very few that are in as good shape as our own," he said.

"And with even this in mind, our county taxes are less than most others of comparable size and population."

Here is what Mr. Anthony said had been figured out by himself and others interested in the exposition building:

It would cost the average home owner about \$3.00 per year or the same amount for the owner of a quarter-section of land.

Two cartons of cigarettes a year would more than pay this amount—there'd be enough left to go to the movies.

One package of chewing gum a week would pay it.

Fifteen gallons of gasoline per year would pay it.

It's like someone said about big oak trees growing from little seeds.

## Free Chest X-rays Here June 26-27

Free chest x-rays will be given in Dimmitt on Friday and Saturday, June 26 and 27. Times are from 1 to 5:30 p.m. Friday and from 8:40 to 1 p.m. Saturday at C & S Equipment Company.

Sponsoring the x-ray program will be the Dimmitt JayCee-Ettes in cooperation with the State Health Department.

Purpose of the x-rays is to check for any signs of tuberculosis, lung cancer or heart disease.

A door prize of an electric skillet and \$5 to the oldest white, colored, and Latin-American person receiving chest x-rays will be awarded by the JayCee-Ettes.

H. K. Shackelford, field representative of the State Health Department, explained last month that state law does not permit x-rays for children 15 and under, because TB incidence rates are lower among children than adults and state funds would not allow the x-raying of all children in the state.

Tuberculosis may be present among children, Shackelford said, but it is usually in a dormant stage. TB usually reaches a chronic stage, he explained, when a person grows older and resistance to the infection is lowered.

"Castro County has not had a chest x-ray service since 1948," Shackelford explained. "I'm glad to see the JayCee-Ettes working with us in having the county's citizens examined for tuberculosis.

"It would be ideal," he continued, "if every person 16 and over could have a chest x-ray. A person with tuberculosis is endangering not only himself, but all those with whom he comes in contact. The disease can be contracted only from a person who has it, and can be passed from person to person until it endangers the entire community."

Mrs. Lavon McGee is chairman of the program for the JayCee-Ettes.

**Meeting Here Monday to Form Heart Group**

A meeting will be held Monday, June 24th in the District Court Room beginning at 8 p.m., to discuss the formation of a Castro County Heart Association it was announced this week by Dr. J. W. Spence, county health officer.

Explaining the purposes and how to organize such an organization will be Mr. Arville Tolbert, and executive of the Texas Heart Association. He is expected to discuss heart diseases in general and the need for public cooperation in their treatment and recognition.

The Castro County organization would start out with funds already credited to its account, Dr. Spence said, since persons from the county, mostly Hart, have already contributed during the past several years.

"This will be strictly a lay organization," Dr. Spence said. "There have been few families untouched in one way or another by heart disease, especially during the decade, and it has become necessary that the public know as much as possible about the functions of this vital organ. It would be a definite contribution to the health of the county."

# Clean-Up Campaign Starts Monday

Dimmitt's mayor Joe Cowen this week proclaimed June 24-29 as Clean-Up Week.

Heavy spring rains made the need for the cleanup more apparent than in recent years, a city official said. The heavy concentration of mosquitoes in and around Dimmitt has been attributed somewhat to the presence of large

amounts of weeds and water-containing tin-cans, tires and any thing else capable of breeding mosquitoes.

City Manager E. B. Noble said this week that several weed cutting machines had been arranged for by the city and anyone with a large amount of weeds to cut

should call city hall. There will also be several trucks which can be arranged for at city hall for hauling away trash.

While weeds do not breed mosquitoes, they provide a cool place for the insects to stay during the hot afternoons. To remove the weeds would go a long way to-

wards removing the mosquito menace, Noble said.

No civic organizations had committed themselves on taking a definite part in the clean-up campaign sponsored by the city Thursday.

"This clean-up campaign is principally to clean out the weeds and trash from the city," Noble said, "but it would also be a good

time to paint-up and fix-up our business and residential premises. With a very little work on everyone's part, Dimmitt could become one of the best looking, neatest, small towns in the Panhandle.

Any promotions to wind up Clean-Up Week will be announced in the Castro County News next week.

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## First Wheat Delivered Here Wednesday at 4

Edd Wilson First; Followed Within Hour by Two Others

The first load of 1957 wheat to come to Dimmitt was brought in Wednesday afternoon about 4:00 o'clock by Edd Wilson, Jr. from his farm on the J. L. Mann place 7 miles South-west of Dimmitt.

The wheat, delivered to Castro County Grain Company, tested out at .15 moisture and 55 pounds per bushel. The variety was not known by elevator operator Jack Gregory. Mr. Wilson brought in 13,400 lbs. and reported his wheat was producing about 25 bushels per acre.

The first wheat load this year was about three weeks later than in past years due to the heavy spring rains and other factors.

Right on Wilson's heels came the second load of wheat, this one delivered to Dimmitt Gin and Elevator Company about thirty minutes later. This second load belonged to Raymond Odum and came from his farm about 10 miles southeast of Dimmitt. It is producing a whopping 70 bushels per acre and tested out at 16.5 moisture content and 58 pounds per bushel. It was of the concho three times with an application of about 100 pounds of nitrate per acre.

The wheat harvest is not expected to begin in earnest until at least this week due to Monday's heavy rainfall and hail.

## T. U. Smith Rites At Hart Friday

Interment will be made in the Hart Cemetery under direction of Dennis Funeral Home of Dimmitt.

He is survived by his wife, Lenora, a son, Rodney of Hart, a daughter, Mrs. W. T. Sanders of Morgan of Post; Mrs. Bell McCowan of Erick, Okla.; and Mrs. Ocie Birch of Tulsa, Okla.

## Lightning Causes Two Local Fires

Lightning was the cause of two fire alarms turned in about twenty minutes apart during Monday's hail and rain storm.

The first was the George Cameron residence, where lightning struck a transformer and came in through the house wiring. It caught on fire a wire plugged into a wall outlet in a bedroom which in turn set a bed on fire. Smoke from the burning bed ruined the finish inside the house and will necessitate a complete repainting, Mr. Cameron said. The family was out when the fire occurred and they came home to find the house full of smoke and the bed smoldering.

The alarm was turned in about 6 p.m.

Twenty minutes later lightning again struck near the R. S. Vestal home. It entered the house the same way, this time burning out their electric range. The stove has since been repaired and no other damage was done.

## Wheat Hail and Wind Damage Hits County

Heavy winds, rain and hail lashed Castro County last week end and Monday to knock out an estimated ten percent of this year's wheat production.

Hail damage was heaviest in the northeast, east and southeast part of the county according to agricultural experts who made spot surveys.

Rainfall ranged from .50 inch to more than three inches over the county Monday afternoon and night as the steady heavy down-pour continued for several hours.

Strong winds from the south caused considerable damage over the weekend to near-ripe wheat. This damage was spotted, but in some fields blown-down wheat appeared to be as much as 30 percent.

The rain and hail came from the north and northeast late Monday afternoon, beginning in the central part of the county about 5 o'clock.

## Swimming to Be Taught at Local Pool

Dimmitt's annual swimming instruction program will begin at the local swimming pool Monday, June 24th, with football coach J. D. Covington and Johnny Ethridge as instructors.

This is an any-age (above 4), all youngster program and is not limited to any group. A charge for the three-weeks course of instruction will be \$10. No swimming lessons will be given on Fridays or Sundays. Signing up and payment must be in advance. Covington said. The Dimmitt Swimming Pool staff is sponsoring the lessons.

Non-swimmers will receive instruction during the morning hours from 9:30 to 10:30 and swimmers will be taught from 10:30 to 11:30 if there are enough who sign up for the lessons.

If three weeks are not sufficient to teach the majority to swim, Covington said, the course will be extended a week. The lessons will be on basic swimming principles to where pupils will be competent swimmers.

Ray Howard, district executive for the Boy Scouts of America, said in an interview yesterday that his work schedule would not permit him conducting the course in Dimmitt this year. He has been the instructor in past years here.

Covington will be assisted by Johnny Ethridge, Dimmitt basketball coach. No diving will be taught.

## Polio Night Nets \$14.50 for Fund

Dr. James E. Wohlgenuth, treasurer of the Castro County Polio Fund this week announced that a balance of \$791.40 existed in the treasury and that \$14.50 had been collected at the Friday Polio Night at the baseball game between the Nazareth American Legion and Lubbock Auto.

Collected at the gate was \$4.50 and the Nazareth group donated their share of the proceeds, \$10, to the polio fund.

This amount will cover the cost of one examination and one therapy treatment for a polio patient, Dr. Wohlgenuth explained.

This year's fund is the lowest in years, he added. During the past three years \$1,738 in local funds has been spent for polio patient care. \$1,221.85 was collected this year and half went to the national organization. On the local level, 1956 started out with a balance of \$742.95 and 1957 balance was \$343.00.

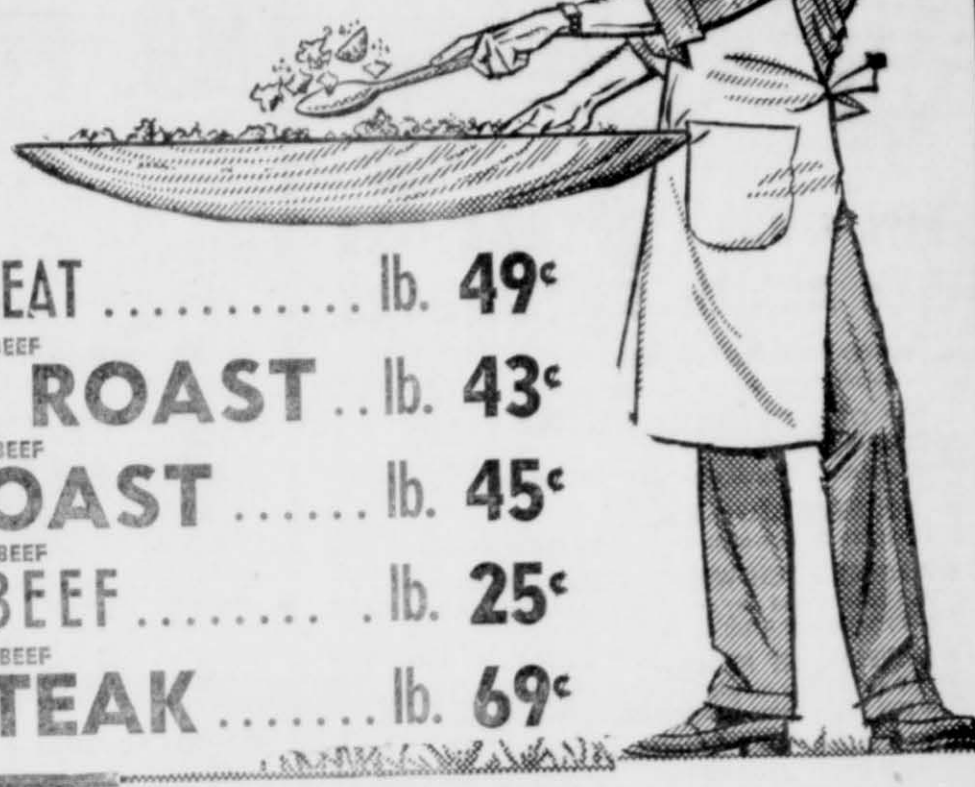

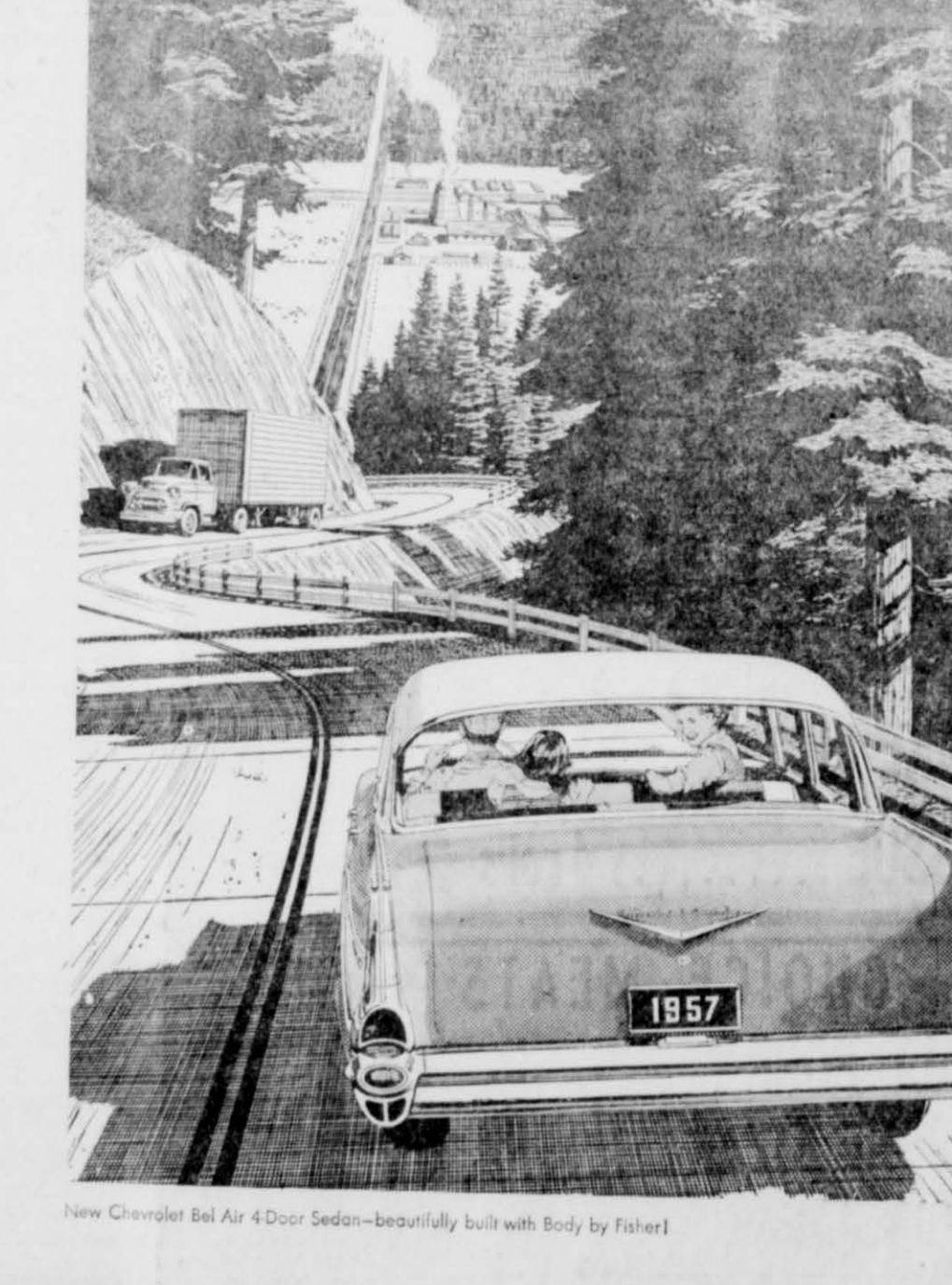
