

The board approved the auditor's report. Visits to Dimmitt by two

representatives of the Texas Education Agency resulted in a few suggestions for improvements of the school system and policy, but no corrective actions were absolutely required. schools maintained their accreditation and were found in compliance with Sections D. E and F of Civil Action 5281 (non-discrimination by race or sex).

The accreditation monitoring report filed by H. E. Phillips and Walter Rambo commended the district for the emphasis placed on reading math and the "evidence of successful gains in student development.

The music program, adequate staff numbers and physical facilities were also complimented.

However, the team did suggest that the emphasis on reading, writing and math should not preclude testing in the other instructional areas. The report also suggested

that a more consistent program of physical education be provided for students in kindergarten, first and second

The high school subject areas were found to have some curriculum guides that were based on textbooks no longer in use, and updating of these was suggested.

Tom T. Walker wrote to the board that separate classes for boys or girls at any grade level should be eliminated. and sex-biased terminology in the handbooks should be eliminated (referring to principals as he, or cheerleaders as shel, as well as eliminating regulations which limit participation in certain activities, such as cheerleading, to one sex only.

Walker also stated that pregnant students may not be required to enroll in the homebound program, but should be allowed to choose whether to stay in the regular program or to enroll in the homebound program.

He also pointed out that the home language survey should be sent to the homes of all students, not just those with Spanish surnames. are Jim and Adele Fewell of



#### UETERAN'S SERUICES OFII AICEO

Contrary to a previously published report, Veterans Administration head Robert Nimmo announced on Oct. 1 that there is no plan to deny medical care to eligible veterans based upon an income test.

According to Nimmo, the recent unauthorized announcement apparently referred to a VA study which attempts to find an equitable means of complying with a congressional mandate to insure that veterans with nonservice-related conditions are not given full medical care unless they are clearly unable to pay for such care them-

"Thus far," Nimmo said, 'no final income limitations' have been determined, no final guidelines established, and no final decisions reached. It is clear, Nimmo concluded, that under today's budget constraints and the soaring costs of medical care the VA cannot continue to provide full medical care to all

Whatever steps we ultimately take to contain costs will be carefully designed to insure that no veteran with a service-related condition nor any veteran in dire financial straits will be denied quality health care by

# Budget cuts force change in child welfare program

on both the state and federal levels, the Texas Dept. of Human Resources Board in August determined that the child welfare programs of the department would be given a high priority and would receive only a 9% cut in funding instead of the proposed 17% cut.

But, due to a \$5 million cut in Protective Services funding by the federal government, the generosity of the state has in effect been wiped out.

These issues were discussed at the quarterly meeting of the Texas Council of Child Welfare Boards in Austin in September, and presented to the Castro County Child Welfare Board at its November meeting by Board President Angela

As a further method of dealing with the budget strain, the DHR discussed the possible elimination of investigations and services to Priority III clients as recommended by DHR.

Priority III cases are suspected cases of abuse or neglect, or "high risk children," that have not been investigated or proven yet.

Dr. Jim Marquart, head of the Texas Council, did indicate that foster care and investigations of Priority I cases (severe or crippling abuse or neglect, or death) and Priority II (proven abuse

Allowable fair market rents for these improved properties will be 120% of the regular fair market rents allowed on regular rental housing under TPCAC assistance programs. Improvements may also qualify for 132% of the regular fair market rent, if the rate of interest is as of the improved rental unit is rented time of closing, if the project to elderly, low income, handicapped or disabled persons.

After rehabilitation of rental property, TPCAC helps determine a rental charge that would cover the repair costs, operating expenses, and a reasonable profit.

Up to 15 years after the aid for improvements, the TPCAC will refer low-income, eligible families to the owner from the agency's waiting list.

The tenants will pay a portion of the rent each month, according to their income, and the remainder of the fair amount determined by the agency will be paid directly to the owner through the agency's program.

Annual adjustments will be made for increases in the cost of operation and maintenance of the units.

Owners of rental property are encouraged under the program to make these rental units available to eligible families, and to set the rent in accordance with the regular fair market rate set in each "I think a weakness will be county by the TPCAC housing

The rental unit must meet housing quality standards and continue to meet those standards at each yearly renewal of the original con-Eligible families are those

that are low-income, elderly, disabled or handicapped. Tenants who participate in this program will pay a portion of the rent according to their income, and the program will pay the balance directly to the owner.

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
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
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
