Mrs. S. M. Lewis celebrated her 86th birthday Sunday, May 8, which was also Mothers Day and her 68th wedding anniversary.

She was married to S. G. Lewis on May 8, 1881. To that union were born eleven children, six of whom are living. They include Mrs. Mabel Williams, Mrs. G. E. Davis, with whom she makes her home, Mrs. O. E. Duke and Mrs. C. S. Schooley, all of Robert Lee, Henry Lewis of Borger and Pat Lewis of Port Arthor, Texas.

Mrs. Lewis has 47 grandchildren, 96 great grandchildren and five great-great grandchildren.

She moved to Coke county in 1889 and has lived continuously in Robert Lee, except for 12 years when she and her husband resided at their old home town of Voca, Texas, where her husband is buried.

Notes from the Oil Field



Sun Oil Company

No. 1 Billie Hanks, Sun's wildcat two miles east and south of their producing field at Silver, was plugged and abandoned the first of the week. The test found sulphur water in the Ellenburger and plugged back to the Pennsylvanian sand just below 6,000 feet. Oil shows were negligible.

General Geophysical Drilling Co., which had the contract, has not been given another location.

In the southwest corner of the Jameson field at Silver Sun No. 8 Jewell Brannan was fishing for drill collar. Depth Thursday was 5,033 feet in sand and shale.

No. 9 Brannan has been staked as an offset to No. 8.

No. 2 Robert W. Walker was drilling in shale at 5,354 feet.

In the Sun field west of Edith No. 4 Annie Cummings was drilling in shale at 3,080 feet.

Bronte Field

Another producer in the Bronte field was indicated this week when Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld No. 3 E. C. Rawlings recovered 120 feet of clean oil and 360 feet of heavily oil and gas cut mud on a test around 4,000 feet. Casing has been set.

J. K. Wadley No. 1 Sam Gray, wildcat 2 miles north of Bronte, was drilling Thursday below 5,150 feet.

No. 1 A. N. Rawlings, Seaboard and Southern Minerals wildcat 8 miles southwest of Bronte, was drilling at 4,750 feet.

Humble is making hole on the Lowry Estate test, an east offset to No. 2 Nannie Ash.

Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld No. 1 R. J. Warren was being plugged Thursday after deepening to 5,400 feet.

Placid No. 1 Forman appears to be abandoned at least temporarily.

E. W. Escue, Pioneer, Dies At Age of 93

Services for E. W. Escue, 93, were held from the Baptist church in Robert Lee Sunday afternoon in charge of the Rev. Fred Blake. Burial was in the Robert Lee cemetery. Serving as pallbearers were Charles, Finis, Irven and J. H. Escue, Jr., and J. W. Service, grandsons of the deceased, and J. W. Service, Jr., a great grandson.

Mr. Escue's passing occurred Friday evening at Shannon hospital in San Angelo where he underwent an operation earlier in the week. Until his final illness he had enjoyed good health, considering his advanced age.

Elija Warren Escue was born in Alabama, September 18, 1855. He came to Robert Lee more than a half century ago where he engaged in farming and ranching for a time. He was later a constable and deputy sheriff and for a period operated a butcher shop in partnership with Jeff Davis. For the past five years he lived at San Angelo in the home of his son, J. H. Escue. He joined the Baptist church at the age of 16.

He married Donie Sparks, who was the mother of his five children. She died in 1921 and he later married Sarah Brawley of Oklahoma who also preceded him in death. A son, Ted, died at the age of 20.

Surviving are three sons, J. H. of San Angelo, Charlie of Kilgore, and Wylie of California, and one daughter, Mrs. Leonard Service of Robert Lee.

Rainfall Since Jan. 1 Nearly 11 Inches Here

Coke county continued to receive additional rainfall the latter part of the week. More than a half inch was gauged in Robert Lee Friday night, while intermittent showers Saturday night and early Sunday amounted to one and one-inches. Other sections of Coke county were equally fortunate.

The rain gauge operated by Eddie Patterson at the telephone office in Robert Lee, shows 2.39 inches since May 1, bringing the total since the first of the year to 10.73 inches. This is nearly as much moisture as fell during the entire year of 1948.

Farmers are anxious to have a couple of weeks of dry weather now so they can get in the remainder of their crops. A large acreage of cotton, by the far biggest in many years, will be planted in Coke county.

A good yield of oats is assured and pastures are making an excellent comeback after several seasons of excessive drouth.

County Ag Agents News Column

Control Weeds With 2-4-D

The rains came and the weeds grew. Farmers may control weeds in their grain fields by spraying 2-4 D at the rate of 1 to 1 1/4 pounds per acre. Enough water to give a good coverage should be used. The powdered form of 2-4-D will be found most economical in treating a large area. Caution should be used in spraying around broad leaved plants that are not to be killed.

Otto Wojtek has sprayed about 90 acres and even though there have been frequent showers, the weeds are going down "for the count." Several other farmers are planning to spray for weeds. Any kind of spray equipment such as is used in spraying other crops is effective.

The cost is not prohibitive when we consider the gain in grain production and the grade of grain produced without the weeds.

The box of poppies was opened and the work of counting and arranging begun, to make them ready for the volunteer workers who will distribute them throughout the city on Poppy Day.

The poppies, made of crepe paper with wire stems, are exact replicas of the wild poppies which grew "between the crosses row on row" in the battle cemeteries in France and Belgium during World War I, Mrs. Strickland explained.

"They were nature's floral tribute to those who died," she said, "and as soon as The American Legion and Auxiliary were organized after the war, we made them our memorial flower. When more young Americans gave their lives in Europe's poppy-studded fields in World War II, the poppy became their memorial flower, too, and it now signifies remembrance for America's war dead, no matter in what part of the world they gave their lives."

The poppies received here are the work of disabled veterans in the Legion hospital (or workshop), where poppy making is directed by the Texas Department of the Auxiliary. The veterans not only earn badly needed money by making the little red flowers, but the employment is considered valuable as occupational therapy.

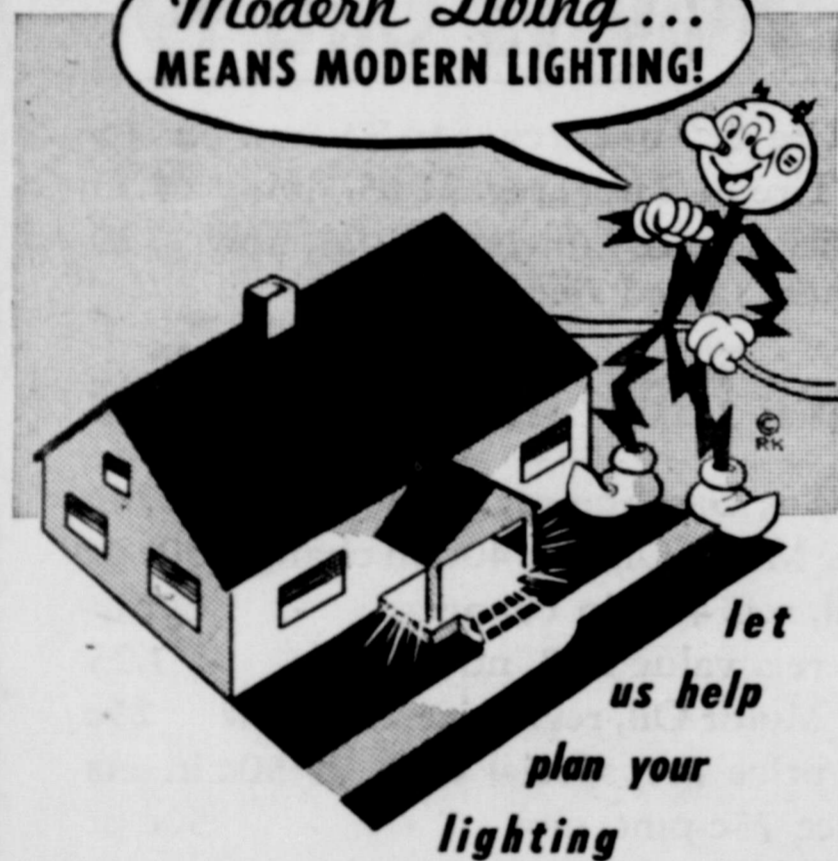

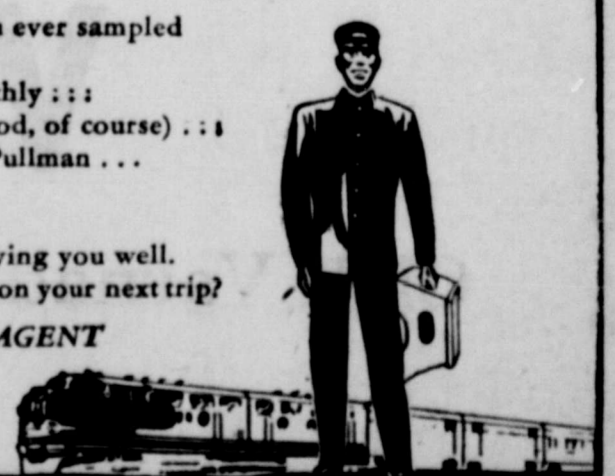

Speer Law Points

WHO MAY MARRY

By OCIE SPEER

Texas laws do not directly prescribe marriageable couples but they pursue the method of defining eligibles by negation.

First, there is proscription by races. Persons of Caucasian blood and their descendants are forbidden to intermarry with Africans. Such a marriage is null and does not create the relation of husband and wife. It is miscegenation and within certain degrees is punishable as a crime, the prohibited degrees being descent from negro ancestry from the third generation inclusive, though one ancestor of each generation may have been a white person. There is no other discrimination for racial reasons.

Next, no man may marry his mother, his father's sister or half-sister, his mother's sister or half-sister, his daughter, the daughter of his father, mother, brother or sister or of his half-brother or sister, the daughter of his son or daughter, his father's widow, his son's widow, his wife's daughter, or the daughter of his wife's son or daughter.

Correspondingly, no woman may marry a man similarly related to her. Such a marriage constitutes the crime of incest and is punishable as a felony. The kinship here forbidden means natural relations and not relations growing out of adoption of children. No person having a living husband or wife may marry another in this state. Such a relation constitutes the crime of bigamy and is punished as a felony.

Males under sixteen and females under fourteen years of age are not allowed to marry.

Of course two persons of the same sex cannot marry. There have been known instances of such attempts, but they have no legal effect whatsoever. This is true from the very nature of marriages which is more than a mere contract. It is a sex relation between the spouses.

The Texas statutes speak of "natural or incurable impotency of the body" at the time of marriage as rendering the marriage void and make it a ground for annulment. But this is not a prohibition of the marriage of such person. Any consideration of the exact meaning and its factual scope would find its place in a letter on Divorce or Annulment.

The law of nature requires the sex relations, and the law of civilized countries look with favor upon it and impose no impediment thereto not required by the public general welfare.

Soil Conservation District News

Clint Wilkins, district cooperator with the Coke County Soil Conservation district, reports that his Madrid Sweetclover is making rapid growth. I seeded my sweet clover with a mixture of oats and wheat in a common grain drill last February, Wilkins said. I believe this clover will be a very good crop for this country. It shows good possibilities as a grazing crop and also as a soil building crop, Wilkins added. Other district cooperators that report their clover is making good growth are Ed Cumbie, D. K. Glenn, H. C. Grafa, Grady Gaston, C. N. Webb, W. C. Shamblin, Guy Denman and Delmir Sheppard.

Native and introduced grasses seeded on his ranch located three miles south west of Blackwell just before the rains began, is coming up to a good stand, W. C. Shamblin, a member of the board of supervisors of the Coke County Soil Conservation district, reports. Shamblin seeded blue grama, buffalo, sand lovegrass, weeping lovegrass, K. R. bluestem, Lehman's lovegrass and slender grama.

R. B. Allen, Guy Genman and C. N. Webb are other district co-operators that have made seeding of native and introduced grasses.

AAA NEWS

Farmers everywhere are facing crop surpluses. Price supports on the crops you raise are justly needed.

The way it looks now, it is not likely that prices for the crops you sell can be continued at the present levels. Therefore, we have been requested by the PMA to gather crop acreage data from all farms for use in planning price support programs.

Each farmer in the county has been requested to sign up or turn in the history of his farm as to how many acres of each kind of crop that has been planted on that particular farm during the past five years.

To the farmers, this is probably the most important information they have ever been requested to furnish.

If you have failed to come in and file your official crop acreage report for the farm you now operate, please call at the AAA office as once, we can still take your report. This request is not compulsory; it is voluntary on your part, but it is to your future benefit and advantage to make your report.

In the future, unless the acreage of basic crops is reduced by the farmers, there may be no price supports.

Acreage allotments will not go into effect without first being voted on by the farmers who grow the crops. Voting by the farmers will not be held until after each farmer has been notified how many acres his allotment will be.

Thus, you can easily understand why we must get your farm history from you for each crop first.

This is your program, and your cooperation makes it work.

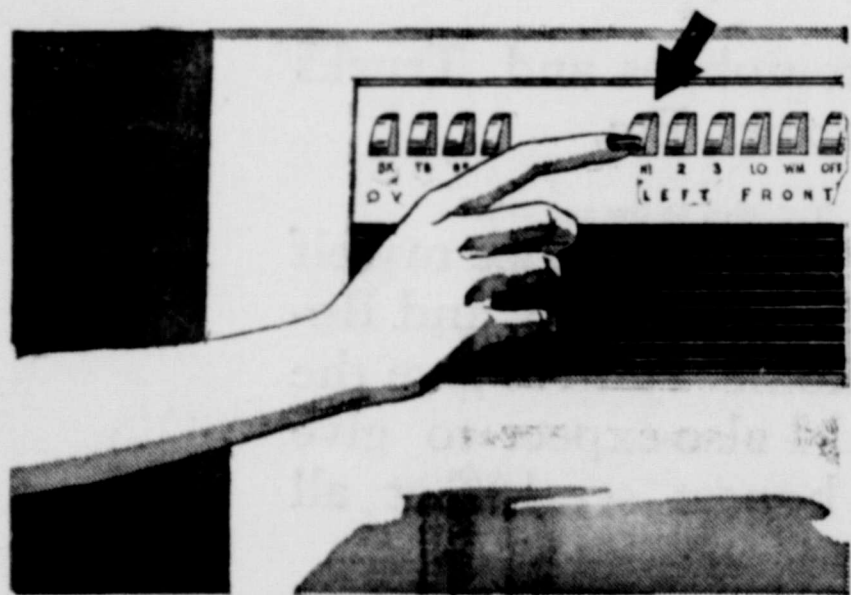
