Three Students Awarded First Place In Contest

Three young ladies won first place in American Heritage Contest which was held recently. The contest is sponsored by American Heritage Foundation of Plainview. Paralynd Render won first place with her project, "How A Bill Becomes a Law." Placing first also was Carolyn Dunn with her project "Dictatorship Vs. Democracy." Another first place winner was Kay Bradley with her project "Roads To Democracy or Communism."

All three students are eighth graders and members of the Social Studies Club.

These three projects will be taken to Plainview for awarding of prizes. First place winner receives a \$25 U.S. Bond.

A banquet is held annually in addition to the above awards for students having winning entries.

The Dimmitt Junior High Senate is awarding the first place winners of grades five through eight.

All eighth grade students were required to have a project concerning some phase of American Heritage under the Constitution. All seventh grade students were required to have projects which showed phases of Texas Heritage.

These projects have been on display in the North Grade School. The students are assigned these subjects early in September each year and are permitted to choose a special interest field in which to work. Many excellent projects are exhibited each year according to the teachers.

The fifth and sixth grades are urged to prepare projects as they will be due April 23.

Approximately 21 students entered projects in the contest this year.

City Commission Purchases Trash Containing Boxes

The mayor and city commissioners voted in their March 18 meeting to purchase a Pak-Mor Hand-Lift system for downtown trash collection.

The system consists of a 20 cubic yard Packer Body on a Chevrolet truck. Also the merchants will be furnished with seven 4 cubic yard steel boxes and six 3 cubic yard steel boxes. The unit will hoist the boxes up on the truck and dump their contents into the Parker Body.

According to City Manager E. B. Noble, after this unit is finished in the downtown area it can be used in the residential section just the same as the present truck.

The Commission plans to start twice a week residential pickup this summer.

With the cooperation of the merchants and their employees, the Mayor and commission hope to stop the trash from blowing around on Dimmitt streets and sidewalks.

This service will not call for an increase in trash charges and should be in operation in approximately three weeks.

Total cost for truck unit and 13 steel boxes is \$12,600. The Mayor and commissioners can and will increase the number of boxes as needed, later.

County Receives 4,209 Acres In Reapportionment

Castro County received 4,209 acres in the 1963 reapportionment plan. The acreage bonus comes under the 1960 law which permits farmers to release unwanted acres to their county ASCS committee.

Castro County was originally allotted only 52,020 acres for 1963. With the reapportionment, the county will receive a total of 56,229 acres for cotton in 1963. This is a decrease from last year's total allotment which was 60,128 acres.

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., of Lubbock, has announced the transfer of 91,684 acres of cotton allotment from other areas in the state for planting by farmers in the 23-county PGC area. On an average year, the acreage increase should add approximately 90,000 bales to High Plains production, and some \$135,000 to its gross income.

The acreage bonus comes under the 1960 law which permits farmers to release unwanted acres to their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee without losing those acres for purposes of calculating future allotments. And, since these acres are retained as planting "history" by farmers who release them, producers who receive the extra acreage will not be given credit for them when allotments are figured in future years.

The final figure of 91,684 acres was compiled by PGC from information supplied by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation service office of College Station. The State ASC office first uses the acreage released to fill requests for additional planting quota in the county and zone where it is released. Excess acreage not needed to fill these requests is then available for filling applications for increased acreage outside that particular zone.

The acreage received this year represents an increase of 50,720 acres over the 40,964 allotted to the High Plains in 1962. The increase comes as a result of the state having been re-zoned for 1963 by the State ASC committee, with only two zones as compared to the previous five. The zoning was changed in order to provide for a more equitable distribution of released acreage and a consequent maximum utilization of the state's allotted acres. The High Plains area is a part of the area designated as "Zone 2".

The deadline for individual farmers to make application for sharing in this acreage "bonus" expired on March 4, and final distribution of the acreage assigned each county is to be made by county ASC committees by March 25. A producer's "share" of the county total is figured by the county committees, using various systems designed by the committees to reflect existing conditions in that county.

Addition of these extra acres to the original allotments brings the total available for planting in the 23 counties to 2,202,553 acres, or an overall reduction of 194,293 acre from the 2,396,846 total for 1962. This amounts to about 8.1 per cent less acreage, while the reduction in original allotment figures over 10 per cent.

The reapportionment, by counties, together with other pertinent figures for comparison are tabulated below.

Dimmitt Airport Runway Lighted With Gas Lamps

Gas lights were installed along the Dimmitt airstrip in a two-day project which started Sunday. These lights along the runway will permit the landing and take off of light craft after dark.

This project was sponsored by the Dimmitt Jaycees. J. G. Davis drew the plans and was engineer for the lighting project.

According to Davis, there is 3200 feet of gas pipe line. Nine lights line the runway on each side. There is a total of 18 gas lights lighting the airstrip. Money used for the construction of the lighting system came from the Air Show day.

A single large ditch dug by Kenneth Jackson holds the main gas line. Eight cross ditches dug by Burrus McRee with a portable ditch digging tractor provide gas from the main line for lights on opposite side of runway. This plan will save a large amount of pipe according to J. G. Davis.

Fred Bruegel, Jr. filled the large ditch and eight cross-ditches with the use of a tractor.

Rain gauge which Ramey used in reporting rainfall is located on Main about 6 miles east of Dimmitt. The gauge was erected April 21, 1923.

"Thank you very much for the important service you have rendered so well, Mr. Ramey. Please accept our congratulations on your fourth anniversary as Substations Observer for the Weather Bureau."

Extinguished In Baker's Food Store

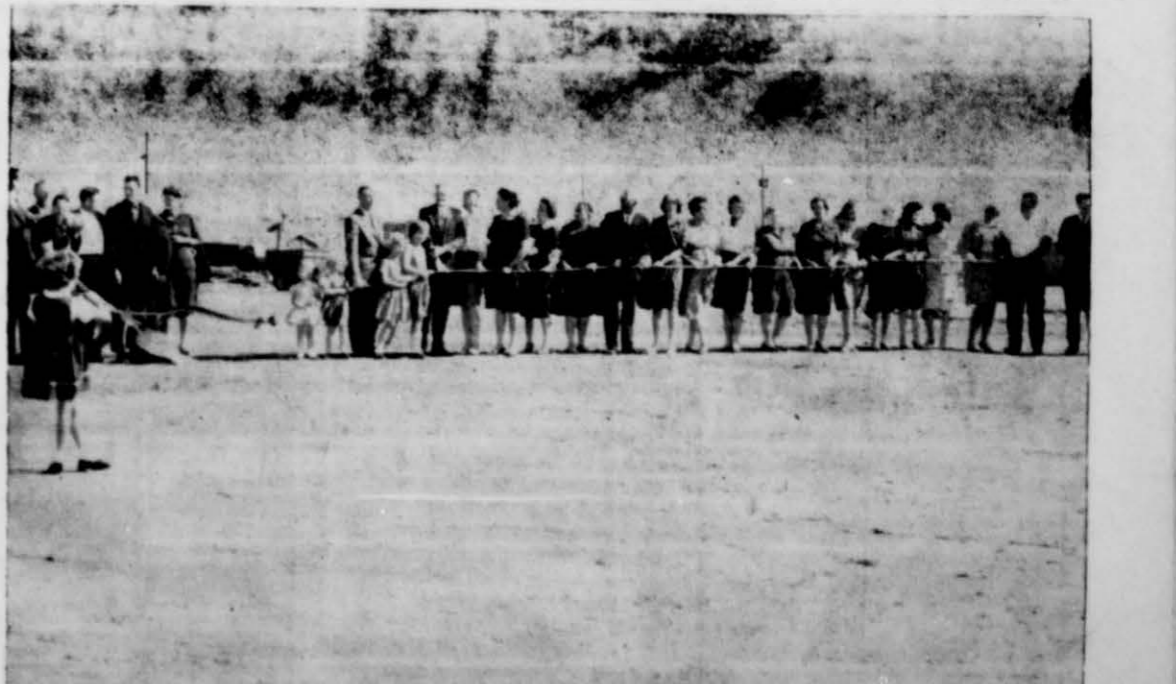
Baker's Food Store was the scene of an early morning fire, Friday at 3:30 a.m.
