### New Location For Highway To Edith

Work is to start soon on the new paved highway from Robert Lee to Edith. Agreements have been reached on the new right of way, according to Judge Jeff Dean. Much of the route will be re located.

The road will leave the pavement at the same place on the northwest edge of town and pass a short distance south of the Fred Roe house. All of the sharp turns will be done away with and the highway will take a direct course to the river.

A new bridge will be constructed across the Colorado River near the sight of the old bridge. The new structure will be three feet higher than the old one. West of the bridge the pavement follows the old road to the Carroll Russell house, then angles to the south.

It will pass south of Mrs. Effie Roe's ranch home and then take a direct course across A. C. Johnson and Alf Key land to the Edith store, where it will connect with new pavement leading to Sterling City.

There will be two smaller bridges across Mess Box Creek and Paint Creek, and all the bridge work will be done by contract. Equipment owned by the state will be used for the rest of the work.

B. W. Wynn, resident engineer of San Angelo, said this week that equipment finishing up a Mason county project would be moved in here at once.

### Abilene Man Will Open Store Here

H. B. Porter of Abilene has leased the Walter Matthews building and will open a new store here within the next few weeks. He said the entire stock will be brand new and he intends to give Robert Lee a modern and up to date variety store.

Mr. Porter recently sold his business at Abilene. He has a wife and six children and will move his family here as soon as housing can be secured.

Mr. Matthews plans to vacate the building next week and will move his bowling alleys to Snyder where he has a new building under construction.

The building, located on the east side of Robert Lee's main business street, is one of the most modern structures in town. It is 25 feet wide and 100 feet long. The building was erected two years ago by Ray Ledbetter and was purchased by Matthews more than a year ago.

### School Dist. Tax Triples in 3 Years

Robert Lee Independent School District taxes will total \$27,029 for the year 1949, according to John L. Ross, tax assessor-collector. It is by far the largest tax ever assessed in the district and is nearly triple the 1946 tax figure of \$9,312.

Last year the district was enlarged by annexation of Sanco and this year Wildcat came in, making a large district with extends north and south through the center of the county. Taxes in 1948 totaled \$22,627 and in 1947 they were \$14,576.

Property assessments this year were \$1,291,354 on real estate, \$236,503 on personal property and \$274,089 on oil and utility properties, making a total assessed value for the district at \$1,801,946. The tax rate is \$1.50 per hundred dollars. This year's gain is due to about \$240,000 in real estate and \$100,000 in oil valuations, while personal property declined \$46,000 because of a shortage of sheep and cattle on the ranches.

Mr. Ross says school taxes were due and payable starting Oct. 1 and there has been considerable activity in paying. R. C. Roberts of Robert Lee secured the first tax receipt last Saturday.

### Mathers A-1 Rates 546 Barrels For Daily Production

Sun A-1 C. E. Mathers flowed 386.7 barrels of oil in 17 hours during its official railroad commission test this week. This average would give the well a 24-hour flow of 546 barrels, probably the biggest ever drilled in Coke county.

Production was through a quarter inch tubing choke in open hole from 6,254 to 6,273 feet. The section had been acidized with 2,000 gallons. Gas-oil ratio was 1,306-1. Flowing pressures were 1,300 pounds on the casing, 1,200 pound on the tubing. The oil tested 48 gravity.

A-1 Mathers topped the lime reef 467 feet lower than No. 8 Brannan, one-fourth mile to the east.

Two other tests are drilling in Sun's block southwest of Silver. No. 3 Robert W. Walker was at 4,460 feet in shale on Thursday and No. 3 Bloodworth was drilling in sand and shale at 3,680 feet.

Five miles west and north of Edith Sun No. 1 Foster S. Price was drilling in lime and shale at 3,305 feet. Rotary engineers are watching the cuttings.

### In Scurry County

Sun No. 1 Mae Lemons, 4 miles west of Snyder, was flowing to pits. Baker & Taylor, drilling contractors, were to move to an offset location.

The Lemons producer is in Sun's 12-section block where they brought in No. 1 Emil Schattel, a year and a half ago. It was the first deep discovery in Scurry county. Three offset holes were dry. No. 1 Lemons is 3 miles from No. 1 Schattel.

### In Tom Green County

Sun and J. J. Perkins have staked No. 2 M. B. Pulliam, 6 miles west of San Angelo. Duncan Drilling Co. of Big Spring is moving in rig for the test. Two previous tests in the area had promising shows.

### Harris Sets Casing

Al G. Hill No. 6 Ralph Harris Estate cemented casing below 6,900 feet the first of the week and tests will be made of upper lime and sand sections. The hole drilled 17 feet into the Ellenburger below 7,000 feet. There was no show of oil and no water.

### Hickman Producer

Humble found good oil shows in its newest R. E. Hickman test at Bronte and cemented casing Wednesday. Production is from Palo Pinto lime around 4,400 feet. Operators will move east for another Ash test before resuming drilling on Hickman.

## BCD Endorsement For Dam Project

A proposed dam on Mountain Creek to furnish water to the City of Robert Lee was given a unanimous endorsement at last week's meeting of the Board of Community Development.

Plans are being discussed by the City and the Upper Colorado River Authority for the project. An outright grant of \$50,000 has been voted by UCRA directors with the remaining \$75,000 of the \$125,000 project to be paid off by water revenues.

The UCRA is now waiting for an attorney general ruling on their authority to make the \$50,000 grant and purchase the revenue bonds from the city. The decision is expected soon.

Sam Jay, city water superintendent, reported that the two new wells completed a couple of years ago, now will furnish only about 60 gallons of water per minute. At first they good for 225 gallons. He added that all city water is now coming from wells, since the small amount of water in the artificial lake is too putrid for human use.

## Soil Conservation District News

James W. Allen, Ed Cumbie, D. K. Glenn, Vernon Haggerton, Jacob Morrow, Robert H. Sims and J. A. Stephenson are planning on seeding cover crops consisting of hairy vetch and Abruzzi rye. 45% superphosphate will be applied at the rate of 100 pounds per acre if the superphosphate can be secured in the pellet form in time for seeding. Hairy vetch is a winter legume which adds nitrogen to the soil. The rye holds the soil and prevents it from blowing. Rye and vetch will produce excellent grazing during the winter months and can be harvested for seed or turned under in the spring.

James W. Allen seeded a 23 acre field to permanent pasture grasses last week. The grasses consisting of weeping love, sand love, K. R. Bluestem, and western wheat were seeded in rows. Mr. Allen plans to cultivate between the rows to control the weeds until the grasses become established.

Robert H. Sims and L. T. Youngblood completed a coordinated soil and water conservation plan on their farms last week. The plans include construction of level broad base terraces, contour farming, seeding of cover crops and range improvement.

Construction on 7 miles of level broad base terraces will be completed this week on Vernon Haggerton's farm located 2 miles south of Blackwell.

F. A. Whitt expects to harvest the best cotton crop he has grown in years on his farm located 3 miles west of Silver school. Mr. Whitt constructed level broad base terraces on his farm last fall. Mr. Whitt states that he believes the terraces, through conservation of soil and water, has increased his cotton yield by 50%.

## Should Protect Babies Against Whooping Cough

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Sept. 29.—Now is the time to have your baby protected from whooping cough, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The Texas State Department of Health recommends that vaccination against this disease be administered at three months of age with a booster dose of vaccine when the baby is two years old. There is many a child whose life could have been saved if he had been immunized in infancy, said Dr. Cox.

"Whooping cough" said Dr. Cox, "first masquerades as an ordinary cold with running nose and eyes, followed by a slight cough. These symptoms develop about 1 to 14 days after exposure. Then in about another week the cough develops into series of continued attacks, in an effort to expel the troublesome mucus. An attempt to breathe during the choking spell produces the characteristic whooping sound. In mild cases it may be absent. The whooping stage lasts 4 to 6 weeks and may then take another two or three weeks to decline gradually.

"Here are some facts about whooping cough:

1. The disease starts like a common cold, 1 to 14 days after exposure. In about another week the cough develops and the whooping usually begins.

2. It is one of the communicable diseases children often catch at school. After a child has reached the age of five, fatalities occur less frequently. Children may carry this disease home to babies.

3. Most important of all is to see that infants are vaccinated against whooping cough, for most deaths occur among children less than one year of age.

4. Call your family physician at once if you suspect your child has whooping cough and follow his directions in detail."

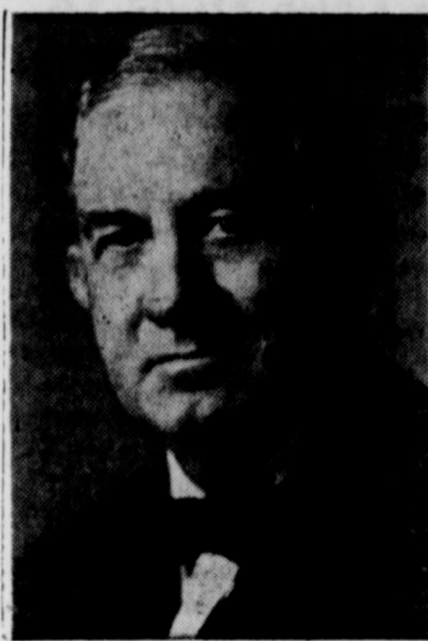

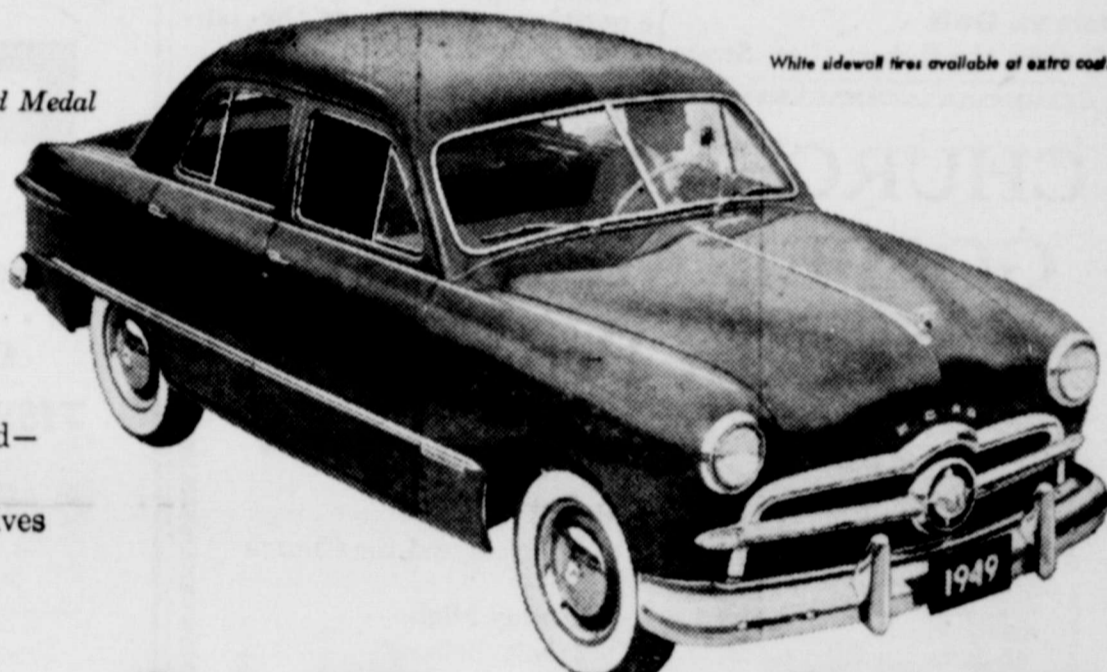

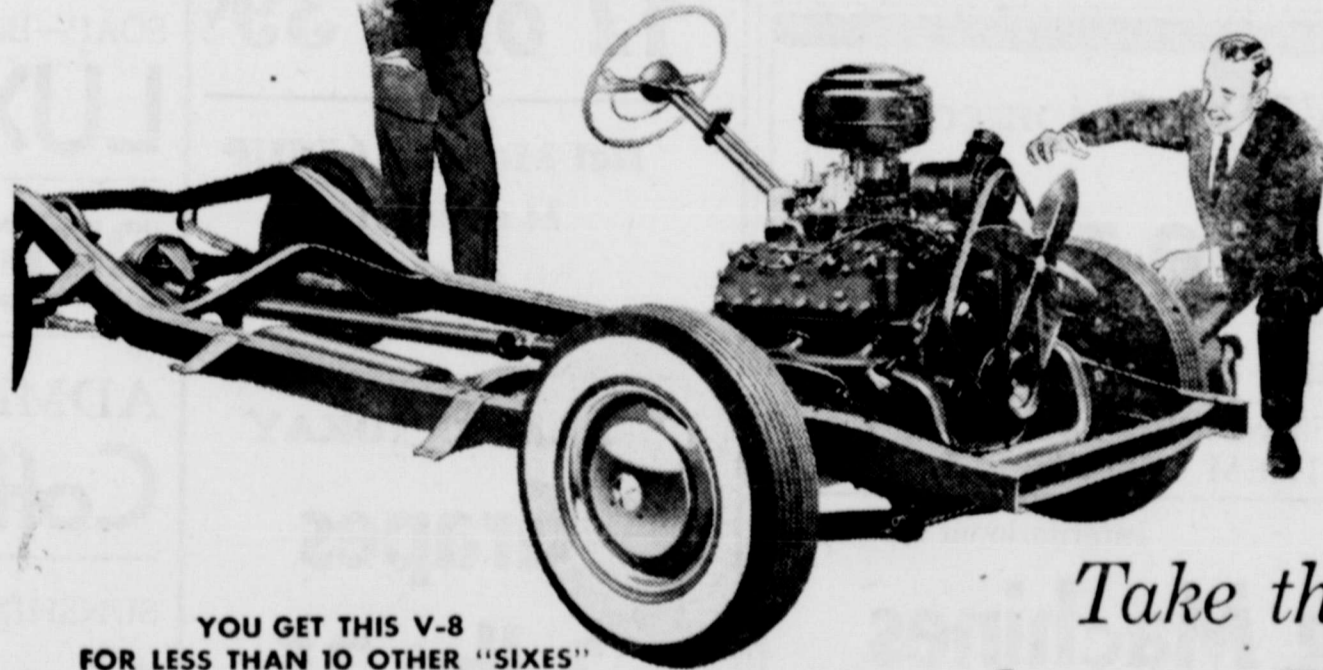
