### Steers Stampede Loraine 26 To 0

Robert Lee Steers defeated Loraine here last Friday night by a score of 26 to 0. It was a conference game.

The locals scored twice in the first quarter, with both touchdowns resulting from long runs by Donald Mauldin. Early in the contest Mauldin in the safety spot took a Loraine punt. He fumbled but recovered the oval and then raced 60 yards to the goal. He was given sensational blocking by his team mates.

A short time later the Steer quarterback found a hole in the line and journeyed 56 yards to score. In the third quarter the Steers marched 64 yards to the pay zone, with Hood and Hamilton doing most of the ball carrying. Robert Lee's final touchdown came early in the fourth period on a steady 55-yard march.

The Steers played without the services of three regulars who had met up with scholastic difficulties. New starters were Bud Austin at left end, Donny Duncan in the backfield and Tommy Kirkpatrick at guard. Other subs who saw a lot of action were Ronnie Baker and Copey Davis.

Thursday night of this week the Steers will play at Hermleigh where they meet one of the strongest clubs in the conference. Last week's ineligibles were expected to be back in the lineup.

Next week the Steers have an open date. They have a tough row to plough during their remaining four contests. Nov. 11 the Steers will find plenty of trouble at Stanton. Coahoma comes here Nov. 18 and the season ends at Bronte on Thanksgiving Day.

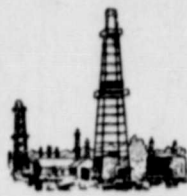

#### Sun Oil Company

In the Jameson field southwest of Silver Sun No. 3 Robert W. Walker was coring in lime at 6,325 feet. Seven-inch casing was cemented to a depth of 6,273 feet and operators were trying to locate a water line in the bottom of the Strawn.

Drilling will continue to the Marble Falls and then to the Ellenburger. A good pay section was indicated in the Strawn.

Sun No. 3 Bloodworth, in the same area, set 5 1-2 inch casing to a depth of 5,984 feet after topping the lime reef at 5,873 feet.

Sun has staked No. 4 Bloodworth, north of No. 3.

Five miles west and north of Edith Sun No. 1 Foster S. Price was drilling Thursday at 5,858 feet in sandy shale. Operators expect to locate the reef above 6,000 feet.

#### Russell at 2,000 Ft.

C. H. Murphy & Co. No. 1 R. C. Russell, wildcat five miles northwest of Robert Lee, was drilling near 2,000 feet. Surface pipe was cemented last week to a depth of 650 feet. Ralph Grider is tool pusher for Guy Mabee Drilling Co.

#### Two More Wildcats

Two new wildcat tests in southwestern Coke county were announced this week. Southern Minerals on a farm out will drill on Runkle property in Section 20, about 14 miles southwest of Robert Lee.

Amerada has staked a wildcat on the March ranch south of Robert Lee near the county line.

#### Harris No. 7

A. G. Hill No. 7 Ralph Harris Estate was drilling Wednesday night at 3,242 feet. It is a quarter mile south of the Colorado River and an offset to No. 6 Harris which indicates production from the Marble Falls. A workover rig is still on No. 6 Harris.

### Land Title Suits Being Argued In Court This Week

A trespass to try title suit of Lou Whiteside et al vs William H. Tackett tried in district court here the first of the week resulted in a jury verdict for the defendant.

The suit involved title to 40 acres of land in Section 291 between Sanco and Blackwell and had been included as a part of the Rufe Whiteside ranch for many years. Hackett had a deed to the property and had paid taxes on it each year.

Judge Sutton's instructions to the jury stated: "Do you find from a preponderance of the evidence that the land in controversy prior to the year 1916 was enclosed by fence with less than 5,000 acres of land belonging to or claimed by plaintiffs, or their predecessor in title? Answer yes or no."

The jury reached a verdict of "no" in fifteen minutes. R. H. Sims was foreman of the jury which also included Frank D. Bryan, Grady D. Gaston, Carl Hurley, N. C. Pentecost, Roy Walker, Victor Wojtek, J. D. Huffaker, Luther Sparks, A. V. Hughes, Homer Cornelius and Cell Varnadore.

Gormley & Ragsdale of Dallas represented Mrs. Whiteside and Sam Dotson was the defense attorney.

A new jury was sworn in Tuesday afternoon to hear the suit of Geo. O. Dickey et al vs A. C. Johnson and wife. Mrs. Johnson was the former Erma Dickey, a sister of the several plaintiffs. Suit involves mineral rights to the Dickey land near Edith which Johnson and his wife purchased from the heirs a few years ago.

Carl Runge is attorney for the plaintiffs, and Sam Dotson is counsel for the defendants.

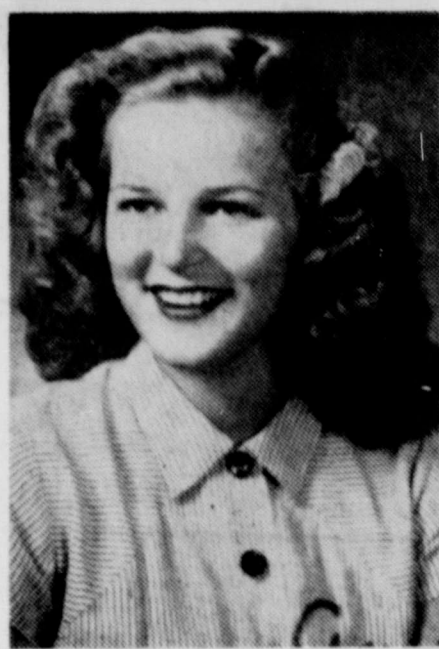

## Nelda Sheppard Gets 4-H Award For Citizenship

COLLEGE STATION (Special to The Observer)—Nelda Ann Sheppard, 18, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Delmir Sheppard of Robert Lee, is the 1949 Texas 4-H Citizenship Contest winner for girls. Floyd Lynch, state 4-H club leader of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service, made the announcement.

Miss Sheppard has completed seven years of 4-H work; is a freshman student at San Angelo Junior College, a National 4-H Club Congress trip winner in 1947, a Gold Star girl and a recognized leader in her community and county.

She has completed demonstrations with sheep, clothing, gardening, food preservation, home improvement and poultry. She has won many prizes with her lambs and they include one grand championship. Last year at the State Fair, she exhibited three pens of market turkeys and came home with 3 red ribbons. This was the largest show of its kind in the entire nation. She is exhibiting more turkeys at this year's State Fair. She has fed a total of 40 lambs.

She has been president of her local club six times and has served one year as president of the county organization. Mrs. S. C. Schooley is the local leader of the Robert Lee Senior 4-H Club and Nelda is the junior leader. She is just as active in school, community and church affairs as in 4-H. She has been a class favorite, class president, captain of the volley ball and basketball teams and pep squad yell leader. In 1949, she was treasurer of the sub-district Methodist Youth Fellowship and was on the program committee at their summer camp.

She says, "Long before Coke county had an organized girl's 4-H club program, I was interested in the work and had hopes that some day I, too, might become an active 4-H member. I had tagged after my three older brothers; all were prominent members and feeding livestock was something that interested me. I got my chance in 1943 and joined I fed 10 ten lambs for my first demonstration and the next spring I showed the champion lamb at our county show. I started my home economics work that fall and soon found it to be just as interesting as my livestock work."

"I would not take anything for my 4-H career," she adds, "It has meant more to me than any other organization that I have been associated with and I feel that I am a better citizen because of the training I have received. Out of my work, I have received something far better than wealth. I have developed my ability to get along with my fellowman and I feel that this training and the experiences I have enjoyed will enable me to become a more stable and intelligent citizen when I take my place in the world."

The National Citizenship Awards are provided to honor Mr. Thomas E. Wilson, chairman of the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, Chicago. The two national winners, a boy and a girl, will each receive a \$200 college scholarship. Her record will be entered in the national contest.

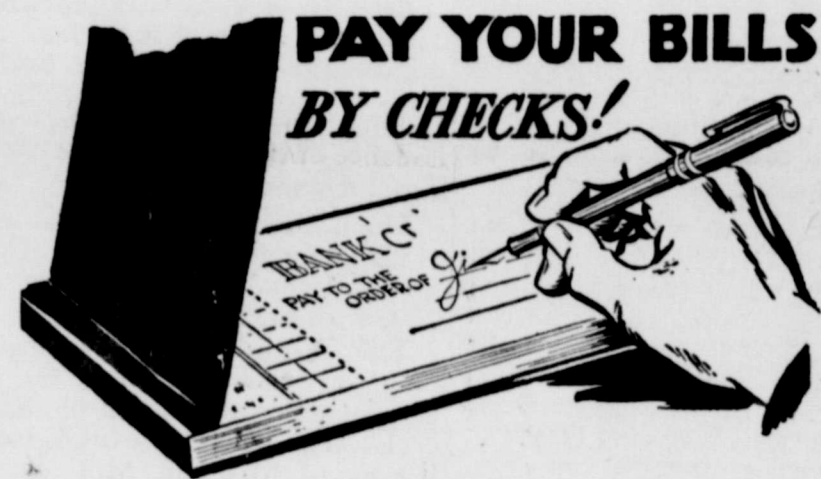

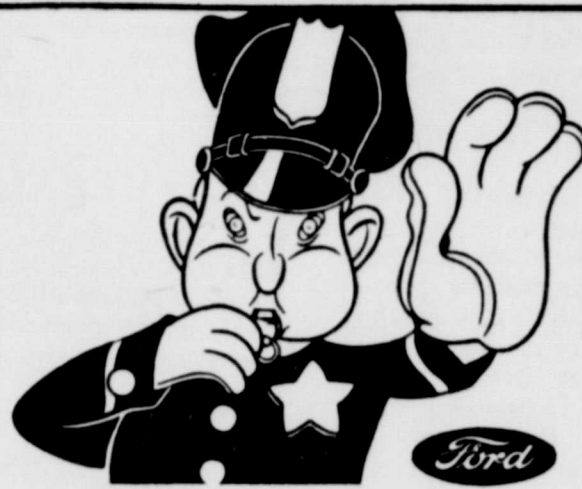

She really gave meaning to the word "hospitality;" and, it is a nice thing to remember about anyone—that is, how very generous and hospitable they are—but the thing that should be said about Mrs. Stewart, and which can be truly said, is: She would find something good in everyone. She saw the best in people and always looked for the best. She never harmed anyone by word or deed.

Granny Stewart loved children and befriended them and she was loyal to them. The neighborhood boys used to gather at the old Stewart home; and, with her permission, ride her calves. However, she did require them to ride the heifers because she did not want any weight knocked off of the steers. Young people loved her and confided in her without reserve. She was a friend to them all, ever ready to counsel, always sympathetic and kind. Her humble and highly respectable home was always open to the young folks and her chief delight was doing something for others.

Notwithstanding the fact that neither she nor her children were rich, they contributed as much, if not more, of their means to the general welfare as any family in the community, regardless of wealth.

Mrs. Stewart was, and is a quiet, unassuming, refined and pure mother, with the wisest and most wholesome counsel for any boy or girl whom she knew, or knows; people have always loved her and respected her and partook of her hospitality throughout the years. She has devoted her life to her family and her community; any person who knows her; or has ever known her, will testify to the high quality of her influence.

The people of Coke County owe her a debt of gratitude, May God, in whom she has an abiding faith, bless her with happiness throughout her life.

## Soil Conservation District News

"Range management has made me money" is the statement made by C. E. Arrott, district cooperater and a member of the Tennyson Conservation Group. I deferred my range during the growing season of 1948 and have held the number of livestock down this year, Arrott said. My stock has done good all year and my rangeland is beginning to produce a good litter on the ground. The old grass litter on the ground aids in water intake, controls soil temperatures, and retards runoff during rainfall, Arrott went on. Calves that I marketed this year weighed 100 to 125 pounds more than I have ever sold off of this ranch, Arrott explained.

W. C. Shamblin and H. C. Grafa harvested King Ranch Bluestem grass seed last week. The grass seed were produced from seeding made on their farms. They harvested the seed by cutting the hay and will run it through a hammer mill. The grass seed will be used to seed larger acreages next year. I believe this is the best way for land owners to harvest grass seed for their own use, Shamblin said.

A diversion terrace 400 feet long was completed last week on R. H. Sims farm located five miles north of Bronte. The diversion terrace is a part of Sims complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan.

E. F. Glenn, a member of the Kickapoo Conservation Group, finished a complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan on his farm located five miles north of Bronte. The plan included construction of level broad base terraces, seeding and farming on contour, protection of crop stubble, trial seeding of rye and vetch, trial seeding of hubam sweet clover, and protecting of range vegetation

## Lists Trees and Shrubs Best Suited to Coke

F. E. Keating of the Big Spring Field Station has been testing trees and shrubs for use in this section of the state for many years. A report of his findings was released August 30 through the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

In his report Keating lists the following trees and shrubs that do well in this area:

Evergreenshrubs, Abelia, Agarita, Ceniza or Texas Silverleaf, evergreen Evonymus, Firethorn, Pfitzer Juniper and the Privets.

Deciduous shrubs, Amur Honey suckle, Beautybush, Bird-of-paradise, Chastetree, Chinese Lilac, Desert Willow, Redbud, Vanhoutte Spirea and many others are listed in this class.

Vines, English Ivy, Everblooming Honeysuckle, Queen's blooming honeysuckle, Silvine, Fleeceflower and Virginia Creeper.

Shade trees, American Elm, Green Ash, Velvet Ash, Thornless Honey locust and Native Hackberry.

Evergreen trees, Arizona Cypress, Rocky Mountain Juniper and Red Cedar.

Keating advises that transplanting is best done in early spring before growth starts. Irrigation during the first season will help the newly set plants to become well established.

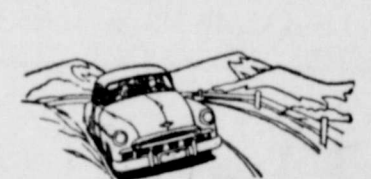

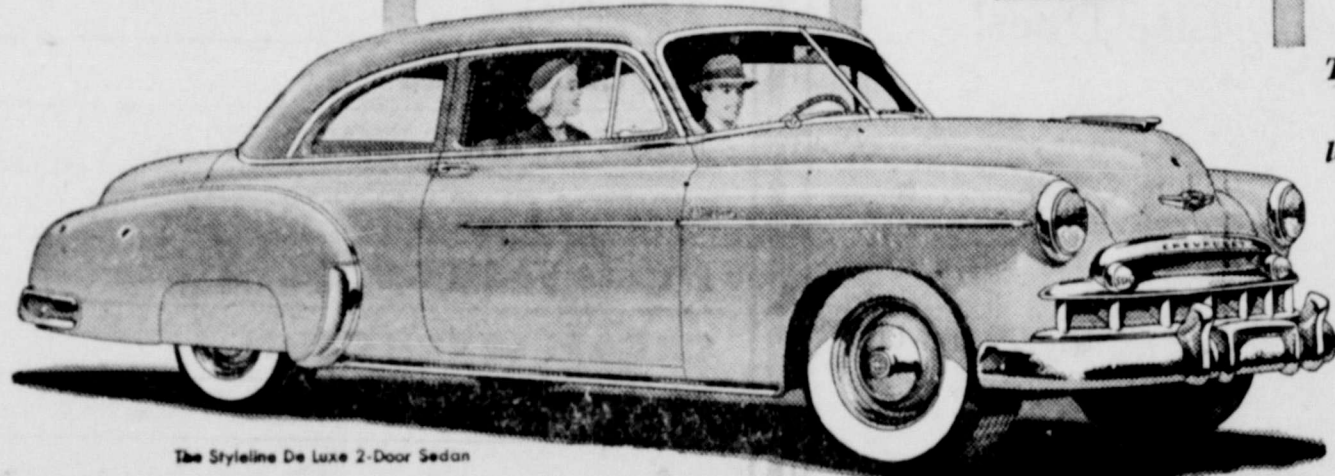
