Ranch Deal Here Involves \$90,000

One of the most important real estate deals made here recently is announced by A. B. Sheppard, who has sold his holdings across the river a few miles southwest of Robert Lee.

Purchasers of the 1,948 acres of ranch and farm land were Fred L. Roe, Jr., his mother, Mrs. Effie Roe, and his sisters, Mrs. Louise Hatch and Mrs. Pauline Holland. Consideration is reported in the neighborhood of \$90,000.

Involved in the transaction is the former J. I. Murtishaw place of 1,294 acres, which Sheppard bought four years ago. Also the 654 acre tract which was purchased a year ago from Claude Dean.

Mrs. Roe and her children own considerable property to the north and west of their new purchase. They will obtain possession immediately and plan to operate the additional land themselves.

Mr. and Mrs. Sheppard will move to Robert Lee as soon as their new home now under construction is finished. Mr. Sheppard has made a big investment in apartment buildings here and contemplates further expansion along that line if the housing demand continues.

Long Illness Fatal To Hubert Fields

J. Hubert Fields, 63, well known rancher and horseman, passed away last Friday at 4 a. m. at his home a mile west of Edith. He had been in failing health the past two years and his decline was rapid the past few weeks.

Graveside services were held at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon at Paint Creek cemetery. The Rev. J. H. Halford of Levelland, former pastor of the Pecan Baptist church, officiated. Clift Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Fields was born in Brown county Oct. 28, 1886, and moved with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Newt Fields, to Coke county in 1892. They were among the early settlers of the Edith community. He married Miss Kelly Brown of Edith Jan. 3, 1906.

Hubert was well known as an expert horseman, having raised and trained some highly valuable polo ponies and roping horses. He was a top roper in his younger days. He was a good citizen and had a wide circle of friends throughout this territory.

He is survived by his wife and five sons: Alfred, Bob and Carlton Fields of Robert Lee, Dick Fields of Mertzon, and Hawley Fields of Edith; one daughter, Mrs. Louella Davidson of Edith; and seven grandchildren.

Four sisters, Mrs. J. M. Sparks of Kermit, Mrs. R. H. Price of Fort Stockton, Mrs. M. B. Sheppard of Abilene, and Mrs. A. G. Cook of Blythe, Calif., also survive. Pallbearers were J. T. Thetford, Ralph Garvin, Ed Hickman, Chris Millican, Delmir Sheppard and Tom Schooler.

State Begins Work On New Highway To Edith

Work started last week on the new highway from Robert Lee to Edith. State owned equipment is being used on the project, while bridges will be let by contract.

In charge of the work as resident engineer is Felix Itz of Ballinger. He said a road camp has been established in the Russell pasture west of town and that the west half of the highway will be graded first.

Almost all of the road will be relocated and there will be no corners on the 8 mile stretch.

Mr. Itz says work will continue right through the winter. While it may be necessary to stop work a few days because of severe weather, he feels they accomplish more during the winter than in hot weather.

Russell Wildcat Coring at 6,360

C. H. Murphy & Co. No. 1 R. C. Russell, wildcat five miles northwest of Robert Lee, was coring at 6,360 feet Thursday morning in a formation believed to be Mississippian lime.

Bill Hoy, district geologist for Murphy, advised The Observer he was reasonably sure they were in the Mississippian and if this is true, they are getting close to the Ellenburger. Hoy said they will continue to core into the Ellenburger. Coring started at 6,338 feet.

Early this week a drillstem test was taken from 6,144-67 feet with the tool open one hour. There was a fair blow for 30 minutes. Fifty feet of mud was recovered but there were no oil shows.

Later a core was taken from 6,220-40 feet which consisted of hard black shale made up largely of fossils.

Sun Making Hole On 3 Coke County Tests

In the Jameson field southwest of Silver, Sun No. 4 Bloodworth was drilling in shale Thursday at 6,040 feet. A previous drillstem test in sand from 5,878 to 5,913 feet recovered 25 feet of slightly gas cut mud and no show of oil.

Sun No. 4 Robert W. Walker, in the same locality, was drilling at 4,912 feet in shale and hard sand.

Sun No. 7 Annie L. Cummings, in the Millican field west of Edith, was drilling in shale at 5,395 feet.

R. H. Goodwin is Sun's new switcher in the Millican field. He moved his family to Edith from Forsan and they are now occupying the new pumper's residence on the Millican lease.

Home Demonstration Department

Distict Meeting In Abilene

The Coke county home demonstration agent, Vernemma Freeman, attended a three day training meeting held in Abilene November 14-16.

Miss Thelma Casey, district agent, discussed making monthly reports with the agents on Monday afternoon.

Tuesday was spent with Mrs. Eloise T. Johnson, family life education specialist, in charge. Mrs. Johnson discussed the importance of preserving and encouraging family and also discussed ways of coordinating family life education with the program for 1950 in each of the counties of District 7.

Wednesday was spent with Miss Bonnie Cox, organization specialist, in discussing the women's home demonstration councils and what could be done to make them more effective. Miss Cox also discussed the planning of council work for a year and assisted the agents in making council plans to fit into the county situations.

Floor Sanding Demonstration

A floor sanding demonstration was held in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Rives, Jr. of the Friend-

ship community on Friday, November 18. A representative of Clarke Sanding Machine Company, Mr. Shelby H. Presley, gave the demonstration.

Mr. Presley informed the group that kerosene should be applied to the floor and allowed to stay on about 30 minutes before the sanding is started if the floor has previously been waxed, varnished or painted. If the floor has a heavy coat of old finish on it the kerosene should be left on the floor overnight in order to keep the old finish from sticking to the paper on the sander. Mr. Presley stressed the fact that no open fire should be in the house and that the house must be open while this process is going on.

Mr. Presley began sanding by using a very coarse sand paper. He informed the group that if the floor was very rough the first sanding should be done crosswise of the boards and the second sanding should be done going the same direction the boards run.

The third or last sanding was done with a fine sand paper which left the floor ready to be finished. Any good wood filler was recommended. The application of this filler should be followed by an application of a good floor seal which should be sanded by using steel wool then a second application made and treated the same way. A coat of varnish may follow then, but this is not necessary. A good wax is all that is needed on top of the floor seal. A good floor seal topped by a wax makes the use of varnish unnecessary and leaves a very nice floor finish which is easy to keep.

Soil Conservation District News

L. E. Wink, a district cooperater reports that the weeping and sand love-grasses that were seeded last spring on his farm are well established and made an excellent growth this year. Wink seeded the grass in regular width rows on a good prepared seed bed. "The grass came up to a good stand and made a fair seed crop the first year," Wink said. "I believe the success to grass seeding is a good prepared seed bed," Wink went on.

"The protection of our crop stubble is the way to reduce inter terrace erosion" is the statement made by R. H. Sims, a cooperater with the Coke County Soil Conservation District. "I protected my wheat stubble and prepared my land with a Graham-Hoeme to leave most of the stubble on the surface of the soil," Sims explained. "I believe broad base terraces are necessary in a complete coordinated soil and water conservation program, however we can see signs of inter terrace erosion every day," Sims went on.

Two miles of terraces were completed last week on the J. B. Walker, Jr. farm located six miles west of Silver. The terraces are apart of Walker's complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan. Other practices that Walker is applying include contour farming, seeding of cover crops and seeding range grasses.

J. P. Arrott reports the weeping and sand lovegrasses he hand seeded last spring is well established and has made a good growth this year. "I hand seeded the grasses in the holes and under the brush where I had eradicated cedar." I believe if land owners are planning to eradicate cedar they should hand seed various grasses to provide a seed source for improving our ranges, Arrott said.

Steers Victims Of Longhorn Hoofs In Gridiron Finale

Robert Lee Steers and the Bronte Longhorns wound up the football season on the Bronte field last Thursday afternoon, with Bronte winning 7 to 0. The traditional Turkey Day game was a dogfight all the way, with the Longhorns having enough edge in offensive play to put over a lone touchdown.

The score came in the second period when Hester connected with a 25-yard pass to Vaughn. Donnie Duncan, Robert Lee freshman halfback, was in on the play all right, but he was just too small to knock down the ball. Jerald Sandusky's educated toe kept the Steers back against their own goal line most of the first half, and on one occasion he punted out of bounds on the one-yard line.

Robert Lee ball carriers running from the T formation were stopped cold. They got into Bronte territory once in the third quarter and worked the ball down to the 31 yard line. Along in the fourth period the Longhorns had a drive under way when Sam Plumlee intercepted a pass on the Robert Lee 21. Bronte made six first downs during the game. Robert Lee made but one.

The following detailed account of the game will be of interest to fans. Bronte was assessed one 15-yard penalty and four 5-yard penalties for off-sides. One 5-yard penalty went against Robert Lee.

First Quarter

Sandusky kicked off for Bronte, Hood returning the ball 10 yards to his 18. Duncan gained 2, Hamilton went off tackle for a couple. Duncan made another short gain but there was a 5 yd. penalty on Bronte. On fourth down with less than a yard to go McGallian punted to Sandusky, who returned 25 yards to the Robert Lee 37.

Sandusky hit the line for a yard and Hester lost 2 trying an end run. Sandusky cracked thru for 8 yards. An offside penalty against Bronte was retused and the Steers took the ball on their 31. Hamilton fumbled on the next play and McCutchen recovered for Bronte on the Robert Lee 30.

Sandusky gained 3 yards in two trusts and Hester picked up 4 around end. Sandusky was stopped on the 23 where Robert Lee again took over. Hood was dropped for a 6 yard loss and Hamilton made 2. Bronte took a punt on the Steer 46.

Winn picked up 3 yards and Sandusky added 4 more. Sandusky then went over for a 1st down on the 36. Two pass attempts failed, and Hester gained 2 off tackle. Sandusky punted out of bounds on the Robert Lee 7. Duncan and Hood picked up some yardage. On the next play Bronte recovered another fumble on the Robert Lee 11.

Second Quarter

Sandusky gained a yard in two plunges and two aerials failed, after which Robert Lee took the ball on their 10. Duncan gained a yard and tossed a short pass which failed to connect. Bronte took a punt out of bounds on the Steer 35.

Hester gained 8 yards around end. Sandusky was stopped but a 5 yard penalty went against Bronte. Winn went off tackle for 3 yards. Hester connected with a pass to Vaughn, who ran 8 yards for a touchdown. Rusk crashed over to convert the extra point. Score: Bronte 7, Robert Lee 0.

Hood took the kickoff back 20 yards to his 29. Hamilton went off tackle for 3 yards and Hood circled end for 3 more. A fumble was recovered by Duncan back on the 22 yard line. Sandusky took a punt in midfield. The play was called back and a 5 yard penalty went against Bronte. Another punt was taken by Sandusky on the Steer 36. Hester and Winn each gained a yard and a pass to Gentry was too long. Sandusky punted out on the Robert Lee 1 yard line.

McGallian punted to his 30. The play came back with a 5 yard offside penalty called on Bronte. Hood failed to gain and McGallian punted to the Steer 33. Hester

gained 5 yards off tackle and three pass attempts were incomplete. Robert Lee took the ball on their 28. Hamilton cracked center for 2 yards. Hester intercepted a pass thrown by Hood and was downed on the Steer 27.

Third Quarter

Sandusky brought the kickoff back 20 yards to his 39. Winn gained 6 thru center then lost 5 trying to circle end. Sandusky was stopped with one yard gain. Hood carried the punt back 15 yards to his 40. The Steers netted a yard in three plays and Hester took a punt on the Longhorn 40.

Two passes failed and Duncan brought a punt back to his 40. Mauldin crashed off right tackle for 9 yards. The Steers were penalized 5 yards on the next play. Hamilton made 2 yards thru the middle and Mauldin added 3 with a yard to go McGallian punted to the Bronte 19.

Sandusky was stopped at the line of scrimmage then Rusk charged thru for a 1st down on his 29. Rusk moved for 3 yards in two plays. Sandusky added 5. Hester failed to make the down and Robert Lee took over on the Bronte 40. It was the first time the Steers had been in possession of the ball in Longhorn territory.

A pass to Varnadore on the 15 was incomplete. Bronte was penalized 5 yards on the next play. Hood connected with a pass to McGallian to the 31. Hood was thrown for a 6 yard loss trying to

go around end. Hamilton cracked thru for 2 yards and McGallian punted to the Bronte 15.

Fourth Quarter

Sandusky punted to Duncan on the Steer 43. Hester intercepted a pass on the Longhorn 34. Sandusky went off tackle for 9 yards and then made it first down on the 46. Sandusky hit the left side of the line for a yard, then took a pass from Hester for a first down on the Steer 21.

Plumlee intercepted a pass on his 21. Duncan circled end for 8 yards and Hamilton smashed thru to the 34 for Robert Lee's only first down of the game. Duncan and Hamilton each gained a yard and Mauldin was run out of bounds on the 43. McGallian punted to the Longhorn 44.

On the second play Hester completed a pass to Sandusky for a 1st down on the Steer 41. Hester went thru center for 2 and then picked up 6 around end. Rusk failed to gain. Sandusky plunged for a 1st down on the 29. The Longhorns failed to gain and were set back on a 15 yard penalty. It was 4th down and 23 yards to go. Hood returned a punt 20 yards to the Robert Lee 32. Hood completed a pass to Varnadore for 7 yards as the game ended. Score: Bronte 7, Robert Lee 0.
