BCD Interested In Blue Cross Service

Importance of Blue Cross Hospital Service in relation to the successful operation of a public hospital, was explained here Monday by Kenneth O. Anderson at a luncheon meeting of the Board of Community Development.

Mr. Anderson is regional director of Blue Cross and was invited to come here and outline the service which might be made available in Coke county.

Since Blue Cross Service is available only in groups of five or more, many individuals ordinarily cannot be accepted. However, Anderson said it might be possible to open up the entire county for membership for a 2-week period if the community made an urgent request.

Anderson stated Blue Cross now has 39 million members over the nation. The new hospital plan will take care of 95 per cent of hospital costs, compared with 78 per cent in former years. The BCD will discuss the matter at its next meeting, and no doubt an effort will be made to make Blue Cross memberships available to all Coke county people at some period in the near future.

Honored at the luncheon were Carl V. Maddoux, vocational ag teacher, and his boys who won third place in a recent greenhand quiz contest for Texas FFA members. The team includes Roy Clawson, Don Joel Schooler and Allen Sparks.

Other guests were John Auten, Slim Johnson, Paul Isbell, Jim Sexton and Victor McCabe. Piano music was played by Mrs. Morris Varnadore.

The next BCD meeting is scheduled for Monday, April 10.

City Election Tuesday

Robert Lee voters go to the polls next Tuesday, April 4, to elect a mayor and two city commissioners to serve for the next two years. Only names on the ballot are Mayor McNeil Wylie and Commissioners Fern Havins and John H. Brown. Census Takers Named; Enumeration Starts April 1

The 1950 Census will get under way in Coke County, Saturday, April 1, with plans for completion in a period of three to five weeks. Three persons from Robert Lee, Mrs. Mattie Bell Campbell, Mrs. Emma Perciful, and the Rev. Ross T. Welch, are taking the training this week in San Angelo to be census enumerators for the western half of the county.

Those who receive questionnaires in advance should study them carefully and be prepared to give the answers when the enumerator calls.

Schools in District Meet

Robert Lee high school, junior high and grades will participate in district competition this weekend in San Angelo. Literary events are set for Friday, with track and field contests Saturday. Winners of the district will then go to the regional meet in the state-wide elimination in a volleyball tourney at Mertzon last week Robert Lee grade school team won the championship of its division. The high school boys were defeated in the finals by Bronte.

Ronnie Baker was under clinical examination this week for a back injury sustained a short time ago in basket ball practice. X-ray pictures revealed the injury was not too serious. Ronnie is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Genie Baker.

The Sunshine 4-H club girls met in the high school English room March 28. Mrs. Barron, county agent, was present and plans were discussed for the coming dress revue.

School Elections Set For Saturday

Interest appears to be increasing over annual school trustee elections scheduled for Saturday of this week.

In the Robert Lee district three candidates for re-election are Frank McCabe, Mrs. Marvin Simpson and Floyd Harmon. Also filed as candidates are E. C. Davis and Fern Havins. C. S. Brown, whose name had been filed, withdrew.

At Bronte, where a complete new board of seven members must be chosen because of a district consolidation, voters will select a school board from 19 candidates. All the seven old members are candidates, and there are 12 new names.

Four candidates will be on the Silver ballot where two places are to be filled, and two trustees will also be named at Edith.

Candidates for re-election as members of the county board of education are W. F. Filkes from Precinct 1 and D. O. King from Precinct 3. Although there is a vacancy as member at large since S. E. Adams moved to San Angelo, an election to fill the position has not been called.

Robert Lee Plans Crack Ball Club

Robert Lee fans are looking forward to another interesting base ball season with one of the top notch entries in the Concho Basin League. Some changes are certain in the team's personnel, but it appears the starting lineup will be even stronger than last year when Robert Lee showed its class by winning the league playoff.

Everyone interested in making the team is advised to be on hand for a long practice session Sunday starting at 2 p. m. Another workout will be held the following Thursday evening to condition players for the game here Sunday, April 9, with the fast Goodfellow Field Skyhawks.

Concho Basin League play will start Sunday, April 16. J. W. Denman and A. J. Kirkpatrick represented Robert Lee at the first league meeting in San Angelo Monday night. Forsan and Big Lake were voted in and it is hoped there will be a circuit of eight good clubs when final league details are ironed out at a meeting next Monday night.

Bronte has shown some signs of wanting to drop out. What a pity! How are they going to have any fun this summer. Although Bronte defeated Robert Lee twice last year in league games, everyone over this way still wants to see them come on in this season.

Notes From The Oil Field

Amerada No. 2 March Ranch, 12 miles southwest of Robert Lee, was plugged and abandoned the last of the week with a total depth of 7,315 feet. The final drillstem test recovered 365 feet of sulphur water.

No. 2 March topped the Ellenburger at 6,992 feet, 135 higher than No. 1. No. 1 March was a failure at 7,434 feet.

Noble Drilling company's rotary equipment, which drilled the two tests on the March Ranch, has been stacked. Slim Johnson, pusher, has taken charge of a rig in Scurry county.

Seaboard and Southern Minerals No. 1 Mary Greenland, wildcat 15 miles southwest of Robert Lee, was drilling Thursday morning in lime and shale at 3,050 feet.

Humble this week completed No. 2 O. L. Johnson in the south part of the Bronte (Palo Pinto) field in Coke County for a 24-hour flow of 186.22 barrels of 46.3 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 495-1.

Production was through a quarter inch choke from open hole between 4,340-60 feet, which had been treated with 500 gallons of acid. The oil was cut only two-tenths of one per cent by basic sediment. Flowing tubing pressure was 100 pounds on the tubing, 380 pounds on the casing.

No. 2 Johnson is 660 feet from the east line and 590 feet from the most southerly north line of J. L. Good survey 6, and 1,453 feet south and slightly west of No. 1 Johnson, a producer.

Red Cross Drive Lags

Indications are that Coke county is \$200 short of its goal of \$924 in the 1950 drive. It is also revealed that the west side of the county is at fault. Mrs. Billie Lewis was in charge of the canvass here, but sickness retarded progress of the drive. During Friday and Saturday of this week the Red Cross list will be at The Observer office, and it is hoped that a number of individuals who have not been seen will drop by and lend a hand. The house was a good 5-room structure and was formerly known as the Lee Roberts place. Mr. Trimble plans to rebuild.

Submit Bids On Filtering Plant, New Water Mains

R. B. Thornton & Son of Brady submitted a low bid of \$54,088 for Robert Lee waterworks improvements at a letting here Thursday afternoon.

Six bids were opened, the highest figure being \$68,407.

The contract includes construction of a new water treatment plant at the Mountain Creek Dam, also the laying of 4,350 feet of 8-inch water mains and 4,330 feet of 6-inch water pipe. There are to be 13 new fire hydrants and contractor will provide material and labor for all the work.

Plans and specifications for the projects were provided by the engineering firm of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper of Lubbock.

Brannan 11 Tops Lime Reef Low

Another producer in the Jameson field at Silver was indicated this week when the lime reef was topped at 6,168 feet in Sun No. 11 Jewell Brannan. The reef was 100 feet low. Casing was cemented to a depth of 6,180 feet and drilling will be continued to completion.

Sun No. 5 Willie I. Tubb, southwest of Silver, was drilling Thursday at 4,746 feet in shale.

A workover rig was dismissed on Sun No. 4 Allen Jameson and swabbing will begin Friday. A Strawn section 6,415-6,530 feet which was tight and almost barren, was previously shot with 288 quarts of nitro glycerine.

In the Millican field west of Edith 10 3/4ths inch surface pipe was set in Sun No. 3 C. C. Millican. Morris & Hamilton has the contract.

West and north of Edith Sun No. 4 G. W. Davidson was drilling in shale at 4,510 feet.

H. D. Smith, area superintendent for Sun at Silver, said this week that No. 2 Jewell Brannan was being killed and would be worked over as a gas injection well. No. 2 Brannan has a potential 24-hour production of 156 barrels. Its allowable will be distributed to other Brannan wells in that area.

Construction started this week on two new dwelling houses for Sun employees at Silver. The Jameson Camp, for production and pipeline workers, and Tubb Camp, for gas department employees, will each get one of the new homes.

Contract was let to the Owens Construction Co. of eastern Louisiana and material is being furnished by the McDonald Lumber Co. of Robert Lee.

Soil Conservation District News

The board of supervisors of the Coke County Soil Conservation District spent Tuesday morning, March 14, observing the growing of cover crops and seeding of adapted range grasses in the Bronte and North Bronte Conservation Group. C. N. Webb, chairman of the board of supervisors, has announced Bryan Yarbrough, vice chairman; W. C. Shamblin, secretary; and W. E. Burns and Guy Denman, members, attended. A member of the South Sanco Conservation Group and James W. Allen, member of the North Bronte Conservation group, also observed some of the conservation work that is being applied as part of the district cooperators complete soil and water conservation plan.

E. J. Hughes, district conservationist, Big Spring; H. M. Bell, zone conservationist, Fort Worth, and A. V. Sheppard, work unit conservationist, Robert Lee, with the Soil Conservation Service attended the tour, Webb pointed out.

The group observed rye and vetch and Dixie wonder winter peas growing on James W. Allen's farm. The rye and vetch and peas were seeded the last of November. Allen told the group that he grazed sixty to one hundred head of sheep, two horses, and two milk cows on twenty-two acres during the month of February.

The group observed a diversion terrace on John N. Coalson's farm that had been seeded to western wheat and weeping lovegrass. The diversion terrace was seeded to grass control erosion and aid in getting land plowed up back into production.

The next stop was to observe a year old seeding of madrid sweet clover on Mrs. C. H. Wilkin's farm. The clover was seeded with a drill in 1949 and was harvested as hay. The clover produced about one and one half tons of hay per acre. Mrs. Wilkins plans to harvest seed this year.

On D. K. Glenn's farm located one mile South of Bronte the group observed cows and calves grazing rye and vetch. They also observed

good grain sorghum stubble management. Glenn seeded the rye and vetch on land that was seeded to grain sorghum last year. The grain sorghum stubble was all on the surface of the soil.

The last stop was to observe re-seeding of adapted range grasses on Ed Cumbie's ranch located three miles east of Bronte. The re-seeding was on rangeland that had been pitted with an off set disc that would dig out a shallow pit.

At each stop the advantages of the cover crops in a complete coordinated soil and water conservation program were discussed. The development of nodules on the roots and the amount and penetration of the root system was pointed out and discussed. The legumes are deep rooted plants that will penetrate the plow pan and bring up soil nutrients to be used by the future crops that are to be grown on the land, Webb, went on.

Traffic Death To Increase In 1950

AUSTIN, March 29 (Spl)—One hundred and two less persons died in Traffic accidents in Texas during 1949 than in 1948. The Traffic Death Book for last year officially closed on March 15th, according to a statement released today by Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, and the final toll stands at 1,957 fatalities. This figure is 9 more than the prediction made a year ago by N. W. Woerner, Chief of the Safety Department's Statistical Division, Garrison said.

In forecasting the fatalities for 1949, Chief Woerner went against many existing indications of certain increases in the death rate and said that the figure would drop. It did by the 102 margin.

Woerner released for the first time today his prediction for 1950. He says that this year will be the most costly and tragic in the history of the State. He predicts an all-time high of 2,068 traffic fatalities. Basing his gloomy forecast on increasing individual apathy toward the traffic problem, he solemnly declares that he hopes he is wrong.

Olin Culberson In Governor Race

Austin, March 15.—Olin Culberson, a member of the Railroad Commission, has announced his candidacy for Governor of Texas in the following statement:

"Firmly believing that a change in attitude is necessary toward the wasteful operation and run-away cost of our state government, I am formally announcing my candidacy for Governor of Texas. My filing fee has been mailed to John C. Calhoun, chairman of the State State Democratic Executive Committee.

"A great deal has been said about the soaring cost of the federal government in the fifteen year period between 1935 and 1950, and exclusive of the cost of wars and affairs incidental to them, the annual cost of the federal government has increased 280%.

"But little has been said about the fact that during the same period 1935 to 1950, the cost of our own state government has increased almost 500%—from \$111,000,000 in 1935 to approximately \$550,000,000 in 1950.

"The policy seems to be to spend for most any purpose when money is available, and then levy a new tax when some emergency arises. We have seen just such a situation within the last few weeks when an \$80,000,000 sales tax was placed upon the people of Texas.

"Much is always said about the emergency, but never a word about the wasteful and extravagant policies that emptied the treasury and created the emergency. The talk is always about some necessity for spending more, but never about the need for spending it more wisely.

"I propose to talk about such things in my campaign which will be opened later and carried to every section of Texas."
