League Season To Open Here Sunday

The Concho Basin base ball league opens Sunday, April 23, with Miles playing in Robert Lee, Forsan at Texon and Sherwin-Williams of San Angelo in Sonora. Robert Lee plays in Forsan the following week.

Six clubs are in the turbulent Concho Basin league again this year, but the alignment is considerably changed. At a league managers session in San Angelo Monday night, only four clubs put up their \$50 forfeits and squared off for action. They were Miles, Texon, Forsan and Robert Lee.

An entry from San Angelo sponsored by the Sherwin-Williams Paint Co., and composed of college boys and some older players, was also accepted providing a sixth club could be secured. Next day Sonora decided to come in, having gone in with Ozona, so it's a six-club loop.

Indications point to a great season for the league. All of the teams are spiked with good players, and it isn't likely that any of the clubs will be a pushover.

Miles vs Robert Lee here Sunday is a "natural" for the league opening and no one will want to miss this battle. Brandy Ray boasts of having the best outfit in the circuit, but fans up this way are backing the Rabbit-Twisters.

R. W. Bowman is expected to be in the lineup this Sunday, after receiving a clear signal from the Veterans Hospital where he has been getting a physical checkup.

Union Oil Company Stakes Location

Union Oil Co. of California this week staked a wildcat five miles east of Robert Lee on land owned by Mrs. Daisy McCutchen.

Location is in the center of the southwest 40 acres of the north-west quarter of Section 445 1-A H&TC. It is one mile east of Union No. 1 Jim McCutchen which was plugged after drilling to the Ellenburger in 1948.

It is thought American Republics will be associated with Union in the new exploration as they own the lease on the south half of Section 445. The Daisy McCutchen location is only 660 feet north of the American Republics north line.

Union has a block of 20,000 acres which extends from near Robert Lee at Hayrick.

3 and 4 Inches Rainfall In Coke

Following good showers last Thursday which broke a severe dry spell, most of Coke county received heavier rains Saturday night.

Total moisture for the past week ranges from 3 to 4 inches at Bronte, Hayrick, Robert Lee, Sanco, Silver and Edith. However, south of here at the Harris Ranch the rainfall was light and some of the Tennyson area did not fare too well.

Farmers are getting in the fields this week and feed crops will be planted. Some delay in planting cotton will result because of the acreage allotments which have not been definitely settled.

County Hospital Has First Patient

The new Coke County Hospital accepted its first patient this week, an emergency case. Bobby Summerville, 18 year old employee of the J. S. Marx Trucking Co., was brought to the hospital with a fractured hip.

Dr. J. D. McDaniel treated the youth and put him in one of the new rooms which is only partly furnished. The youth fell 20 feet when he was pulled off an oil tank by a telephone wire. The tank was being delivered to the oil field near Edith.

Dr. McDaniel has been occupying his office in the hospital for the past week or more. Most all equipment has been installed except the room furniture. Four beds have been borrowed from Shannon hospital and the institution will gradually be put into operation.

Laboratory and X-ray equipment is now in use and rooms have been made ready for some obstetrical cases expected very soon.

Operation of the hospital is in charge of Jim Haselden and he has been assisted by Melrose Murtishaw, chief nurse, and Mrs. J. C. Strickland, receptionist and bookkeeper.

At a meeting of the hospital board Tuesday the following additional employees were hired:

Mrs. Christine Hoglund of Edith, Mrs. Josephine Lindley, Mrs. Mayme Smith and Mrs. Jack Duncan, nurses aids, and Mrs. Ernest Varnadore, cook. They will start work when needed and one or more additional registered nurses will also be engaged soon.

Illness Fatal To Henry Escue, 52

J. H. Escus, 52, former well known Robert Lee resident, died a short time after midnight Sunday night at a San Angelo hospital. Death was caused by a heart ailment.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p. m. Tuesday from the Robert Lee Baptist church in charge of the Rev. Ernest Stewart, local pastor, and the Rev. Taylor Henley, pastor of Immanuel Baptist church in San Angelo.

Burial was in the Robert Lee cemetery under direction of the Clift Funeral home. Pallbearers included T. A. Richardson, Richmond Stroud, Paul Good, Willis Smith, Henry Varnadore and Lem Cowley.

Henry was born on a farm between Robert Lee and Bronte on Oct. 18, 1897, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Elijah Escue. He was reared in this community and was engaged in the trucking business until six years ago when his health failed.

At that time the family moved to San Angelo and purchased a home at 2025 N. Magdalen and Henry entered the real estate business. It was thought he had recovered from his old ailment until he became ill last Thursday night.

Mr. Escue was a member of the Baptist Church and the Woodmen of the World. He married the former Miss Iber Modgling at Robert Lee in 1919.

Survivors include the widow; three daughters, Mrs. Floyd Higgins and Mrs. Jack Cowley of Robert Lee and Anna Escue of San Angelo; and two sons, J. H. Jr., and Irven Escue of San Angelo.

Two brothers, Wyley Escue of California and Charlie Escue of Kilgore, and a sister, Mrs. Lucy Service, and four grandchildren also survive.

Officials Ponder New Bridge Here

A new bridge over the Colorado River at the south edge of Robert Lee is being discussed by the Highway Department.

Engineers are pondering the advisability of spending more than \$28,000 already allotted for repairing the bridge. They have found that it could be strengthened satisfactorily, but it cannot be widened.

Narrow bridges cause a bottleneck on important highways that are being eliminated as rapidly as possible. They are dangerous, too.

Black topping of the new stretch of highway between Robert Lee and Edith is scheduled to start next week. Bridge contractors are also due to begin work on crossings over the Colorado river west of town, also Mess Box Creek and Paint Creek.

UCRA To Get \$350 Month For Water

A contract to furnish water to the city of Robert Lee from the new Mountain Creek reservoir provides for a monthly cash payment of \$350 per month to the Upper Colorado River Authority.

The contract agreement was reached at a meeting of UCRA directors here Tuesday. The payments will continue over a 20-year period and should be sufficient to cover cost of the dam and reservoir, estimated at \$84,000. There will be no interest charged and there is no limit on the amount of water the city may take from the lake.

The agreement also provides that maintenance costs not exceeding \$1,000 per year shall be taken care of by the city.

Construction of the Mountain-Creek dam and reservoir at the northwest edge of Robert Lee is well along. With the UCRA agreement settled it is thought sale of the \$65,000 revenue bonds for water treatment plant and new water lines can be completed. Contracts for the work will be let as soon as funds are realized from the bond sale.

Competing in literary events will be Johnnie Beth Snead and Tommy Kirkpatrick in girls and boys extemporaneous speaking, Lurlyne Pettit in typing and Garland Davis in junior high school declamation.

Winners in the regional will be privileged to enter the state contest at Austin.

Davidson 4 Flows After Acidizing

Three miles west and one mile north of Edith, Sun No. 4 G. W. Davidson flowed 151 barrels of oil in 17 hours after being acidized with 5,000 gallons. No. 4 Davidson topped the lime reef at 5,952 feet and was bottomed at 6,051 feet.

Paul F. Rutledge had the drilling contract and rig was being skidded Thursday to No. 5 Davidson. New location is 1,980 feet from south line of Angie Good Survey 158, and 1,200 feet east of Davidson No. 3, a producer.

Also west of Edith Sun No. 3 C. C. Millican was drilling in shale at 5,975 feet.

In the Jameson field at Silver, Sun No. 5 Willie I. Tubb topped the reef at 6 318 feet and cemented 5 1-2 inch casing at 6,325 feet. It was drilling ahead in lime Thursday at 6,358 feet.

Sun Central Bank Unit No. 1, southwest of Silver, was drilling at 4,588 feet in shale.

Sun No. 4 Allen Jameson at Silver pumped 13 1-2 barrels of oil on Tuesday and 10 barrels the following day. Production is from tight lime between 6,393 and 6,582 feet which was shot and then acidized with 20,000 gallons.

Greenland at 5,469 Ft.

Southern Minerals-Seaboard No. 1 Mary Greenland, 15 miles southwest of Robert Lee, was drilling Thursday at 5,469 feet in lower Capps lime. A drillstem test in the Palo Pinto 4,784 to 5,064 feet showed no oil.

Cotton Farmers Still Face Ruin

The court room in Robert Lee was crowded Monday afternoon with farmers who had been called in to hear latest reports on the new cotton acreage allotment.

R. B. Allen of Silver presided over the session and various provisions of the new law were discussed by members of the county PMA committee.

It appears that Coke county may receive 1,200 additional acres because of the amended law, although Congressman Fisher advised persons here that we should get 3,795 acres more.

Because of the drouth Coke county's cotton acreage was cut very low during the years of 1946-47-48 and these figures furnish the basis of the new allotment program.

Farmers were advised to file an appeal if their allotment is not as large as they think it should be. After April 28 a board of review will pass on their claims.

The Observer learns that the state committee is having plenty of trouble administering the new law. The amendment was aimed to help counties which had been cut too drastically. Now we learn that all counties, some with bigger allotments than they can use, are being increased.

Lawrence Higgins got the first Robert Lee hit in the third inning and scored a short time later when Porter dropped John Conley's fly to left. Higgins hit safely again to lead off the fifth but was out when Eckert Tinkler hit into a double play.

After McKinney struck out in the sixth, Frank Tincup cracked a hit into center. Joe Phillips drove a two-bagger into deep center to score Tincup. Phillips scored when Miller failed to hold Chilly Tinkler's fly into short right.

Moisture penetration tests made in the vicinity of Robert Lee after a total of three inches of rainfall showed the benefit received from a good cover of grass on the rangeland. A test made on bare ground showed only four inches of moisture penetration, with a fair cover of grass moisture penetrated twelve inches and on ground with a good cover or grass moisture penetrated 26 inches.

The soil under a good cover of grass was observed to be loose and there was enough litter on the ground to break the impact of the raindrops and prevented the top inch of the soil from sealing over.

Complete Rawlings No. 4
Flowing naturally 189.88 barrels of 46 gravity pipeline oil in 24 hours, Hickok & Reynolds, Inc. No. 4 E.C. Rawlings in the Bronte (Palo Pinto) field has been finaled.

Gas-oil ratio was 350-1. Flowing tubing pressure was 80 pounds, there was a packer on the casing. Production was through a quarter-inch tubing choke and 90 perforations from 4,372 to 4,387 feet, with total depth 4,398 feet.

With elevation 1,822 feet, the producer is 440 feet from north and east lines of the lease in section 453-1A-H&TC.

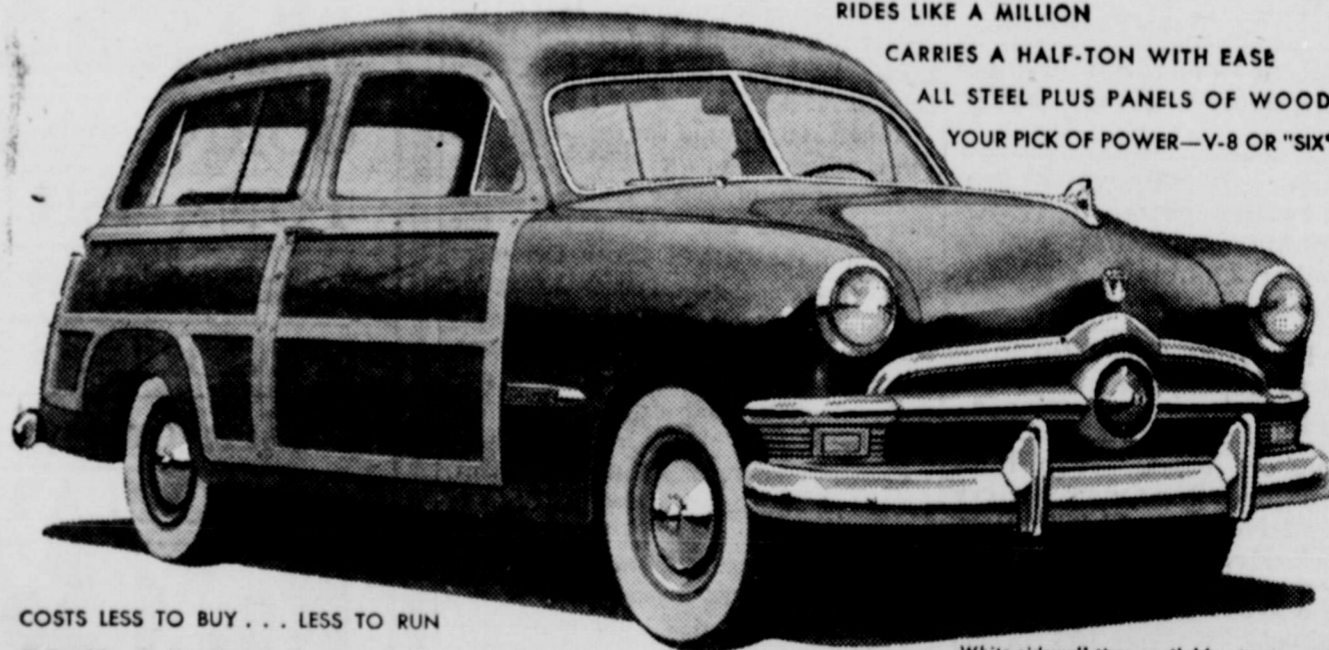

State Fair Offers \$50,000 For Authentic Flying Disc

The State Fair of Texas has posted a reward of \$50,000 for the first authentic "flying disc" of interplanetary origin to be discovered and delivered to State Fair Park in Dallas in time to be placed on exhibit at the fair's gigantic 1950 Mid-Century Exposition Oct. 7-22.

"This offer does not mean that we either believe or disbelieve in the interplanetary flying disc reports," said R. L. Thornton, president, in announcing the reward, "but if there is such a thing, it is only fitting that it be exhibited at the biggest state fair in the nation since the State Fair of Texas has always tried to bring to its vast audience the first information of any new and important scientific development."

Rules of the offer will be drawn up in legal form and filed with the Dallas County clerk. In general, they are as follows:

1. The State Fair of Texas will pay \$50,000 to the first person or group of persons who delivers to State Fair Park in Dallas an authentic flying disc of interplanetary origin in its original physical form.

2. The reward will be paid only if and when the authenticity of the flying disc in question as a vehicle or space-ship of interplanetary origin has been determined and vouched for by a committee of scientists selected by the state fair from leading universities of the state of Texas.

3. There shall be no appeal from the decision of this committee of scientists.

4. The offer shall expire Oct. 1, 1950.

Reports of flying discs have increased greatly during the past few months. Thousands of people have claimed to have seen the "discs" or "saucers." However, no one has yet produced an authentic flying disc or saucer.

The U. S. Air Force, after investigating most of the reports, has announced that the majority are the result of hallucination or mirage, over-vivid imagination or such things as weather balloons, jet planes or the planet Venus. However, among the sightings have been some the Air Force has not been able to explain at all.

Gov't Trapper Has Bagged 3 Bobcats

C. B. Burrows, government trapper who started work in Coke county the last of February, already has his program well organized and is showing good results.

A few days ago the trapper brought in a bobcat he had captured on the Lake Smith ranch, southeast of Robert Lee, and he previously had caught two on land operated by Delmir Sheppard, west of here.

Bobcat tracks are quite numerous in the rough sections of Coke county. The animals weigh from 35 to 40 pounds and cause untold damage. The bobcat seems to prefer young goats to anything else and they have been known to put a goat raiser out of business. They also prey upon lambs and it is almost impossible to raise deer where there are bobcats.

The bobcats are light tan with black spots, and stand about 20 inches high.

Burrows said he was handicapped in trapping operations by the dry windy weather of the past several weeks, but his work will be more successful since the recent heavy rains. He arranges with ranchers so that none of their livestock will be molested.

The trapping service is sponsored in Coke county by the Wildlife Association which has for one of its most important objects the eradication of predatory animals. Ranchers have been asked to contribute to the cost of the campaign, and a portion of the trapper's wages are paid by state and federal funds. County Agent Hicks says many of the ranch owners have agreed to support the program.

Burrows is a former Sweetwater resident and has been engaged in the trapping business for a number of years. He worked in Sterling county last year. He has a wife and little son, Charles Billy, Jr. The family is occupying the Henry Childress place, five miles southwest of Robert Lee.
