Large Crowd Hears Explanations About New Feed Grain Program

A capacity crowd of farmers in the Dimmitt High School Auditorium Monday night heard explanations of the new feed grain program as it affects Castro County. It was pointed out at the meeting that Castro County's acreage base for grain sorghums would be set at 200,317 acres as the two-year average. Twenty percent less than this figure — 160,000-plus acres — will be planted under the new program. It will be administered similarly to the wheat and cotton programs.


