Sun F. Jameson 11 Pumps 124 Barrels During 24 Hour Test

Sun No. 11 Fred Jameson at Silver has been completed on pump for a daily production of 124 barrels of oil. It topped the reef at 6,380 feet and was bottomed at 6,480 feet. It is located in the southeast corner of Section 253 and is less than one mile from Sun No. 1 Allen Jameson, discovery well in the Jameson field.

JAMESON FIELD

Sun No. 18 C. E. Mathers was drilling Wednesday at 5,800 feet in shale and sand.

Sun No. 18 Homer Jameson topped the reef at 6,232 feet and was drilling in lime at 6,275 feet.

Sun No. B-2 Tubb was in shale at 5,615 feet.

Sun J. S. Walker No. 4 was drilling at 5,863 feet in shale and sand. No shows were recovered in a drill-stem test from 5,648 to 5,740 feet in a sand section. It is a west offset to the Sun Bloodworth producer in Strawn sand.

South of the river at Silver Sun No. 10 J. B. Walker has run tubing for completion. It topped the reef at 6,292 feet and the hole was bottomed at 6,349 feet.

In the same area Sun Cent. Nat'l Bank Unit 4 topped the reef at 6,168 feet and has drilled to a total depth of 6,316 feet. Casing is being cemented.

Sun No. 3 H. L. Bloodworth was drilling Wednesday at 6,032 feet in sandy shale.

MILLICAN FIELD

In the Millican field west of Edith Sun No. 11 Davidson was drilling in lime at 6,988 feet. Slight oil shows were recovered in the Strawn reef topped at 5,957 feet and a Cad-do lime section was indicated at 6,765 feet.

Sun No. 11 Cummings topped the reef at 5,908 feet and cemented casing at 5,947 feet. Sun Cummings No. 12 was drilling at 2,375 feet in shale.

Sun No. 12 Davidson was in shale at 5,330 feet.

Sun No. 4 F. S. Price was at 5,276 feet in shale and sand.

CITY SECRETARY, MAYOR RESIGN

Resignations of Mayor Fred McDonald, Jr. and City Secretary McNeil Wylie were handed in at the Robert Lee City Commission's regular meeting Tuesday night.

Wylie's resignation was accepted and Mrs. Sam Jay appointed the new City Secretary. She is familiar with the work and has been serving as clerk in the office.

The Mayor's resignation was held up until the vacancy can be filled. Commissioners John Brown and Fern Havins are in hopes they will be able to make a satisfactory appointment within the next week or two.

Mr. McDonald said he was compelled to resign because it is impossible for him to give the office his attention. He pointed out that his father is ill and that all his time will be taken up with operation of the cotton gin and looking after his lumber business and ranching operations.

STATEMENT IS SUBMITTED BY STATE DEPT. HOSPITAL CONSULTANT

When Coke County made application to the State Health Department for Federal aid in the construction of Coke County Memorial Hospital certain agreements were made:

1. That the hospital would not discriminate against or deny admission to any patient because of race, creed, or color.
2. That the hospital would do a reasonable amount of charity work.
3. That the County would meet operating deficits of the hospital for the first two years and that the hospital would operate as a non-profit institution for 20 years.
4. That the hospital would operate according to Minimum Standards outlined by the State Health Department.

The State Health Department does not control the Coke County Memorial Hospital. Because of the legal and moral responsibility incurred when the State allocated Federal funds to Coke County for hospital construction the State Health Department does have a keen interest in assisting the County Hospital Board in maintaining high standards of patient care in the hospital. It is for this reason that at least annually a representative of the State Health Department visits the hospital to review the financial and medical records and to make recommendations for the improvement of the service to the patients.

Certain basic principles of hospital organization and management have been incorporated into Texas law regarding County hospitals:

1. That a Governing Board of representative citizens in the County

Regular monthly session of the Commissioners Court is scheduled for next Monday, Aug. 12, and it will be the duty of the Commissioners to take action at that time.

CONSULTANT HERE

R. B. Fulcher, Hospital Consultant for the State Health Department, was here Monday when he visited the hospital and conferred jointly with members of the hospital Board and the Commissioners Court.

Following that session he met with a citizens committee composed of Hawley Allen, Henry Varnadore, Wilson Bryan, Bryan Gartman and The Observer editor. Fulcher said the State Health Department has no authority but acts in an advisory capacity to assist hospitals in their problems of operation.

A statement written by Mr. Fulcher Monday night is published in this issue of The Observer. It was agreed at the afternoon conference that the statement was to be printed.

FAVORED BOARD

It was the opinion of the citizens committee that the consultant was backing up the Hospital Board in its request for Dr. J. D. McDaniel to move his office out of the hospital. In fact, he read a copy of a letter written by Dr. Dean F. Winn, Director of the Hospital Division, in which it was recommended that the doctor's office should not be in the hospital. The letter further stated that neither the doctor nor his wife should interfere with administration of the hospital.

Fulcher has been a visitor here previously and after his inspection last Feb. 21st he recommended the Coke county hospital needed a competent administrator.

He said his department was interested in seeing the hospital make a financial success, too, but would not commit himself on whether or not the present administrative overhead was excessive.

CONFERS WITH DOCTOR

Monday night Mr. Fulcher made an appointment and had a long interview with Dr. McDaniel. It was the first time the doctor had had the opportunity to explain his side of the story. When the session ended Dr. McDaniel says Fulcher told him: "I wish I had come and seen you first."

We don't know what it means, but it may have a lot to do with the confidential report which Fulcher files with his office.

Before leaving town the consultant also called on Dr. J. K. Griffith and obtained his views on the local hospital situation.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2
Proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board is increased to One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds and certain conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows: *

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now prescribed by Senate Bill No. 29, Chapter 318 of the Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature (provided, that when the limitation of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) is used in said Senate Bill No. 29, the same shall hereafter be construed as One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000), or as said Act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws that the Legislature may hereafter enact; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preference right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period ending December 31, 1959; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary during the period ending December 31, 1959, to pay principal of and interest on the bonds heretofore issued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 31, 1959, all moneys received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute obligations of the State under the Constitution of Texas. Of the total One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) of bonds herein authorized, the sum of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) has heretofore been issued, said bonds are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945.

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945.

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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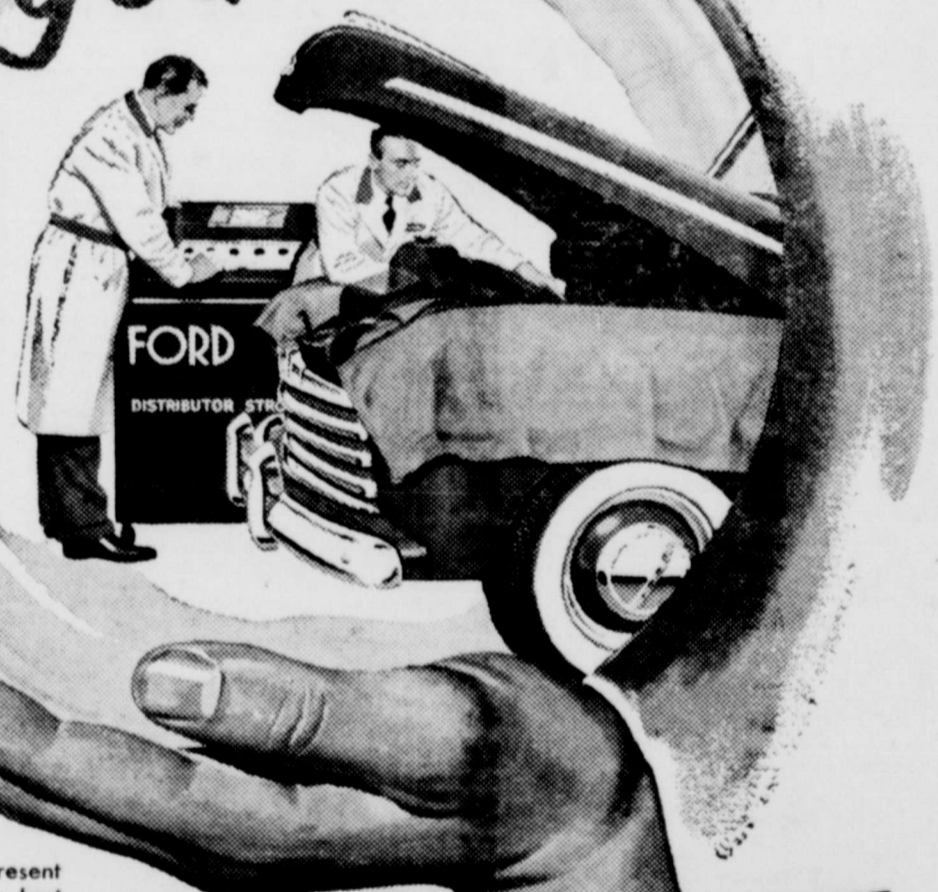

Lilly will make his headquarters at Zephyrs in Brown county.

Marvin Carter, director of organization for Texas Farm Bureau Federation, in assigning Lilly to this area, stated that the organization was adding four additional fieldmen to its staff this month. The state will be divided into seven areas. Lilly's territory has 25 organized counties, with a membership last year of 9,944.

Gov't To Support Cotton Market

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 7.—Many farmers may consider placing their 1951-52 cotton crop in government loan if the market price drops below the government-support price, Dr. A. B. Cox, University of Texas cotton marketing professor, said.

In recent weeks, the market price has declined, approaching the government-support level, because a large crop is anticipated in the coming season, he explained.

Under a loan, which is made at 90 percent of parity, a farmer may redeem his cotton should market prices rise above the government support level.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts as to provide that the Legislature may authorize an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section after Section 11 thereof to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for the necessary proclamation and publication, and calling of an election therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in such other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper investment for said fund; provided, however, that not more than fifty per cent (50%) of the said fund shall be invested at any given time in stocks, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of the said fund be invested in securities issued by any one (1) corporation nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any (1) corporation be owned; and provided further that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. This amendment shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such Amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

Watch Out for Signs Of Polio Next 3 Mos.

Clip this out and keep it within reach until the end of October. This tells you what to look for, and what to do, for the peak of the polio season, which is the next three months.

The first sign is an under-the-weather feeling, in yourself or any child of yours. Of course this is the sign of scores of other things, but in this season you never know until you stop, look and listen.

Watch for headaches, upset stomachs, sore throats, stiff muscles in back and neck, dizziness, fever, tired eyes. If there is trouble about breathing or swallowing, call a doctor.

At any of these signs, put a child to bed to rest, or take other measures to keep him quiet. Rest yourself if you are the one. Fever does not need to be high. A slight fever is a sign that needs careful watching.

If you can't call a doctor, get in touch with your local chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Keep children out of crowds where possible. Don't stop them from playing with their usual friends. Don't stop a normal life. Swimming is OK. Chilling is bad. So is fatigue. A chilled or a tired person is more susceptible to a bad polio case.
