Gas Lift Aids Two Sun Producers In Silver Oil Field

Sun Oil Company announces potential tests have been filed on two recent Coke county producers in the Silver area.

Sun B-2 Willie I. Tubb flowed 106 barrels of oil and no water during its official 24-hour test. Guaged through a 3-4th inch tubing choke the pressures were from 10 to 100 pounds on tubing, and 505 to 545 pounds on the casing. A gas lift line was installed.

Also flowing with the aid of a gas lift is Sun Central Nat'l Bank Unit No. 4. The official 24-hour test guaged 36 barrels of oil and 3 barrels of acid water through a 2 inch opening. Pressures were from 10 to 120 pounds on the tubing and from 576 to 600 pounds on the casing.

JAMESON FIELD

Sun No. 20 Homer Jameson was drilling ahead Wednesday at 6,395 feet in lime, after cementing 5 1/2 inch casing at 6,304 feet.

Sun No. 13 Fred Jameson was drilling at 4,011 feet in sandy shale and lime.

Sun No. A-4 C. E. Mathers was in sand at 4,420 feet.

Sun No. 17 Jewell Brannan was drilling at 5,858 feet in sand and shale.

Sun No. 17 C. E. Mathers was in shale at 5,485 feet.

South of the river at Silver Sun Blanks-Perkins No. 1 was at 5,240 feet in shale.

MILLICAN FIELD

In the Millican field west of Edith Sun No. 13 Annie L. Cummings recovered 20 feet of drilling mud on a drillstem test from 6,169-94 feet. There were no shows of gas or water. No. 13 Cummings topped the reef low at 6,173 feet.

Sun No. 12 Cummings flowed 24 barrels of oil and no water during a 4-hour test ending Tuesday night. Guage was through a quarter inch choke. There was no water. The flow then died and it was swabbing Wednesday. No. 12 Cummings topped the reef at 5,893 feet and was bottomed at 6,028 feet.

Sun No. A-5 F. S. Price topped the reef at 5,950 feet and was completed at a depth of 6,068 feet. It was swabbing Wednesday.

Mrs. Dickey Home From Visit Among Friends in Mexico

Mrs. Frank Dickey returned early this month from a motor trip to Mexico City, where she enjoyed two weeks of sight seeing and visiting old friends. She made the trip in company with Miss Alice Smith, nurse at the Ballinger hospital.

Mrs. Dickey was only two years old when her parents moved to Mexico City. Her father was a building contractor and industrialist. When she was nine years old her mother died, and the next year she lost her father. She then went to live with Dr. Benj. Lara and family and remained with them 10 years. She learned to speak Spanish and English, too.

Because of the approach of the war in 1914 she was forced to return to the United States and lived with relatives in St. Louis, Shreveport and Dallas before her marriage.

Twelve years ago the Dickey and Lara families exchanged visits. Young Jimmy Dickey spent six months with the Laras in Mexico City and young Ben Lara, Jr. resided with the Dickey at Ballinger for over a year.

The Robert Lee woman found many changes when she returned to the Mexican capital city and metropolis on this visit. The city is in the midst of a boom. Its population has increased to more than 3 million and new buildings are going up everywhere. Much credit for Mexico's present period of prosperity is due to its president, Miguel Aleman. Mrs. Dickey and her companion were royally entertained during their two weeks' visit in the Lara home and with other friends. Weather was nice and cool, with rain descending every day at 5 p. m. The city has an elevation of 5,700 feet.

The distance from Robert Lee to Mexico City is 1,200 miles and good pavement was enjoyed over the entire route. Americans find the rate of exchange very advantageous at this time. One dollar can be exchanged for 8.60 pesos. Back a number of years ago one peso was worth 50 cents in American money.

Services at Bronte For Bob Keyes, 67

R. L. (Bob) Keyes, well known Bronte resident, died at 4:30 a. m. Tuesday of a heart attack. He passed away in his sleep at the home of his former wife, Mrs. Mattie Bell Campbell, in Robert Lee.

Bob had been in failing health for some time. He had been a patient at a San Angelo hospital for a long period and recently had been in the Percifull sanitarium at Christoval. His illness dated back three years and for the past three months his condition was considered critical.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday from the Baptist Church in Bronte, in charge of Rev. C. R. Blake of Sylvester and the Rev. J. R. Medlock of Christoval. Burial was in the Fairview cemetery under direction of Cliff Funeral home. Pallbearers were Floyd Modging, Irvin Cumbie, Fred L. Roe, Wade Rees, Frank Grimes and Jim McCutchen.

Robert Lee Keyes was born at Crossville, Tenn., Oct. 3, 1883. He came to Bronte in 1904 and had been a continuous resident of Coke county since that time. He was a rancher and dealer in livestock and was known over this section as one of the best horse men in the business.

Surviving are the son, Benjamin L. Keyes of Christoval, one granddaughter, Koleta Keyes, and a niece, Mrs. B. A. Sumner of Pampa, Texas.

Another Coke county boy to enter San Angelo Junior College this week was Stanley Austin, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. I. M. Austin. Stanley attended school in Tulia the past two years where he made excellent grades and received his diploma from Tulia high school last May.

Notes From The Oil Field

Union has staked its No. A-2 Daisy McCutchen, 1,660 feet from east and 990 feet from north line of Section 436. The location is 3-4ths of a mile north of Union B-2 Daisy McCutchen which was plugged and abandoned last week at 4,020 feet. The latter test was a north offset to Union No. 3 McCutchen, a producer. Operators report the Cisco sand pay section around 4,000 feet had drifted largely to shale.

Aurora Gasoline Co. of Detroit, Mich., is rigging up rotary on its No. 2 Daisy McCutchen, one location west of its No. 1, a recently completed producer. Continental Drilling Co. has the contract.

The McCutchen field is four miles east of Robert Lee.

Barron Kidd No. 1 A. N. Counts was drilling ahead Tuesday at 4,940 feet in shale, sand and lime. A drillstem test last week around 4,200 feet failed to recover any oil shows. The wildcat is 12 miles southwest of Robert Lee.

Ralph Lea of Midland No. 1 Lem Cowley was making hole Wednesday at 700 feet. The shallow wildcat is 5 miles southeast of Robert Lee.

Bass and Richardson No. 1 Frank McCabe, 4 miles north of Silver, recovered only mud in a drillstem test from 6,758 to 6,843 feet.

Hooray for football, it's here again! And best of all, the curtain raiser for Robert Lee will be the Bronte Longhorns vs. the Steers here Friday night.

It's hardly necessary to build up a Bronte-Robert Lee grid game, because they are always hard fought and rivalry between the two clubs is intense. Everyone in Coke county wants to see the battle even though it might result in a one-sided score.

But this year Bronte and Robert Lee appear to be about the same calibre. The Longhorns lost last year's great backfield star, Gerald Sandusky, but the remainder of the squad is intact. Eight seniors graduated from the 1950 fine Steer eleven, and a lot of new material has had to be developed.

Bronte has played two games this season, losing to Wylie and the crack Junction Class A outfit. The score down at Junction last week was 19 to 6, and Bronte's showing was highly creditable.

The Steers were under fire for the first time last week, when they journeyed to Iraan and were scalped by the Class A Chiefs by a 38-7 score. Coach Charles Dennis didn't get too great a headache, and he thinks his boys will improve from that experience.

It may not have been as bad as the score indicates. The first quarter was scoreless, but Iraan ran four touchdowns in the second period. The Steers lone counter came near the half when Donnie Duncan completed a short pass to Norman Roberts over the goal line.

Iraan of course has too much class for Robert Lee this year. All members of the Steer squad saw action and everyone came through without injury. The game was matched last spring because it was worth \$250 to the Robert Lee high school athletic fund.

Houston Jolley, former Robert Lee resident and 1942 graduate of the local high school, is Bronte's new coach. He has a degree from Howard Payne. Jolley resigned as assistant coach at Lake View to take the Bronte job. Jack Price is assistant coach. Houston was a pretty good footballer in high school days. Friday night's game will be the first time he ever wanted Bronte to beat Robert Lee.

Coach Charles Dennis is getting some excellent help this year from J. Hollis Lloyd, new high school principal. Ronnie Baker is student manager for the Steers.

Friday night's game will start at 8 o'clock and a record crowd is expected. The football field is well covered with grass this fall, and plenty of seats are available.
