Hermleigh Winner Of District 5-B; Steers Take 2nd

Hermleigh Cardinals won the District 5-B championship last Friday with a 12-7 victory over Trent. The Gorillas were leading 7 to 6 up until the last two minutes when Hermleigh passed for its second touchdown. The Cardinals had six wins and only one loss in conference play.

Robert Lee Steers wound up in second place with 5 victories and 2 defeats. Tied for third were Trent, Coahoma and Hobbs, each with four wins and three losses. Bronte had three victories and four defeats in loop competition.

STEER NOTES

Norman Roberts, who was knocked out of the Bronte game early in the second period, remained in the hospital a couple of days but returned to school Monday. He suffered a badly bruised and twisted knee, but there was no fracture and the injury is expected to mend rapidly.

Loss of Roberts was a severe blow to the Steers. Only a sophomore, he plays fullback on offense, and is shifted to end on defense. Norman would have spoiled some of the Longhorns passing, and he might have picked up another touchdown or two himself.

Roberts wasn't the only Steer player to get roughed up. Donnie Duncan had to be taken out for a while and was pretty well used up. Lynn Davidson went in as a halfback and somebody popped him on the nose the first play.

BANQUET COMING UP

The annual Football Banquet may be held before Christmas if the jackets arrive in time. It will be a community-wide affair and tickets will be sold by the BCD.

The Steers have fine prospects for 1952. J. A. Brown and Royce Wallace are the only seniors on the squad. Bronte will be strong again next year, too, although they lose five first stringers.

Notes From The Oil Field

Another producer in the McCutchen field, 5 miles east of Robert Lee, was assured this week. Union's No. 2 Elizabeth McCutchen flowed 10 barrels of oil per hour on a drillstem test from 3,987 to 4,003 feet.

It then cored 20 feet deeper and casing was seated at 4,021 feet. Plugs were drilled out Tuesday and operators expected to complete the well Wednesday.

Chester Hunter No. 1 E. E. Stagner, 5 miles southwest of Silver, was drilling at 3,000 feet. Tucker Drilling Co. had a fishing job over the weekend but drilling was resumed Tuesday.

J. Kenneth Blackmar No. 1 R. L. Page, wildcat 5 miles west of Robert Lee, was drilling Tuesday morning at 5,940 feet in Strawn lime. No shows have been reported. The test is scheduled to explore the Ellenburger.

A wildcat 6 miles north of Bronte has been staked by R. A. Josey, Inc., of Houston. The firm's No. 1 E. C. Rawlings is in the northwest quarter of Section 365, and is 1 1/2 miles southeast of Lion No. 1 Rawlings, a 6,233 foot failure drilled in April.

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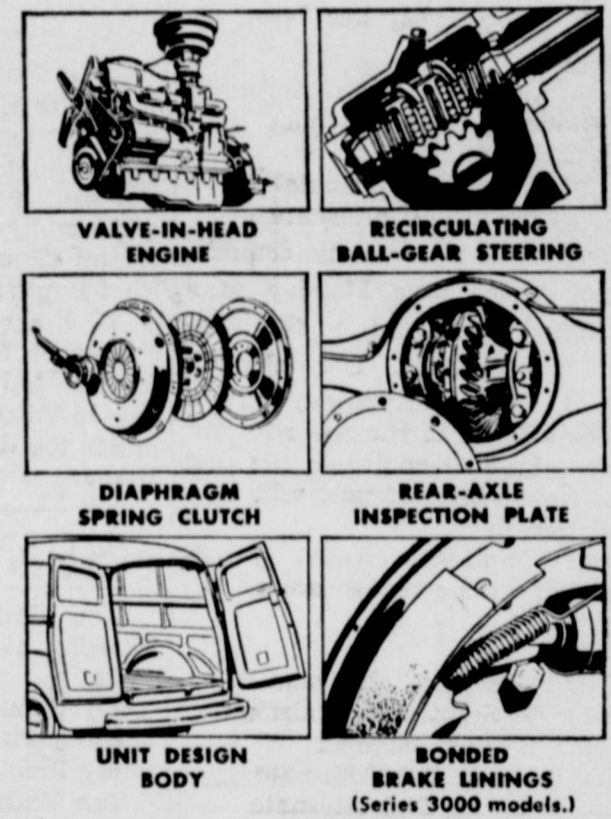
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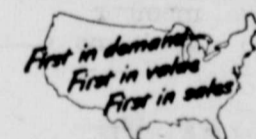
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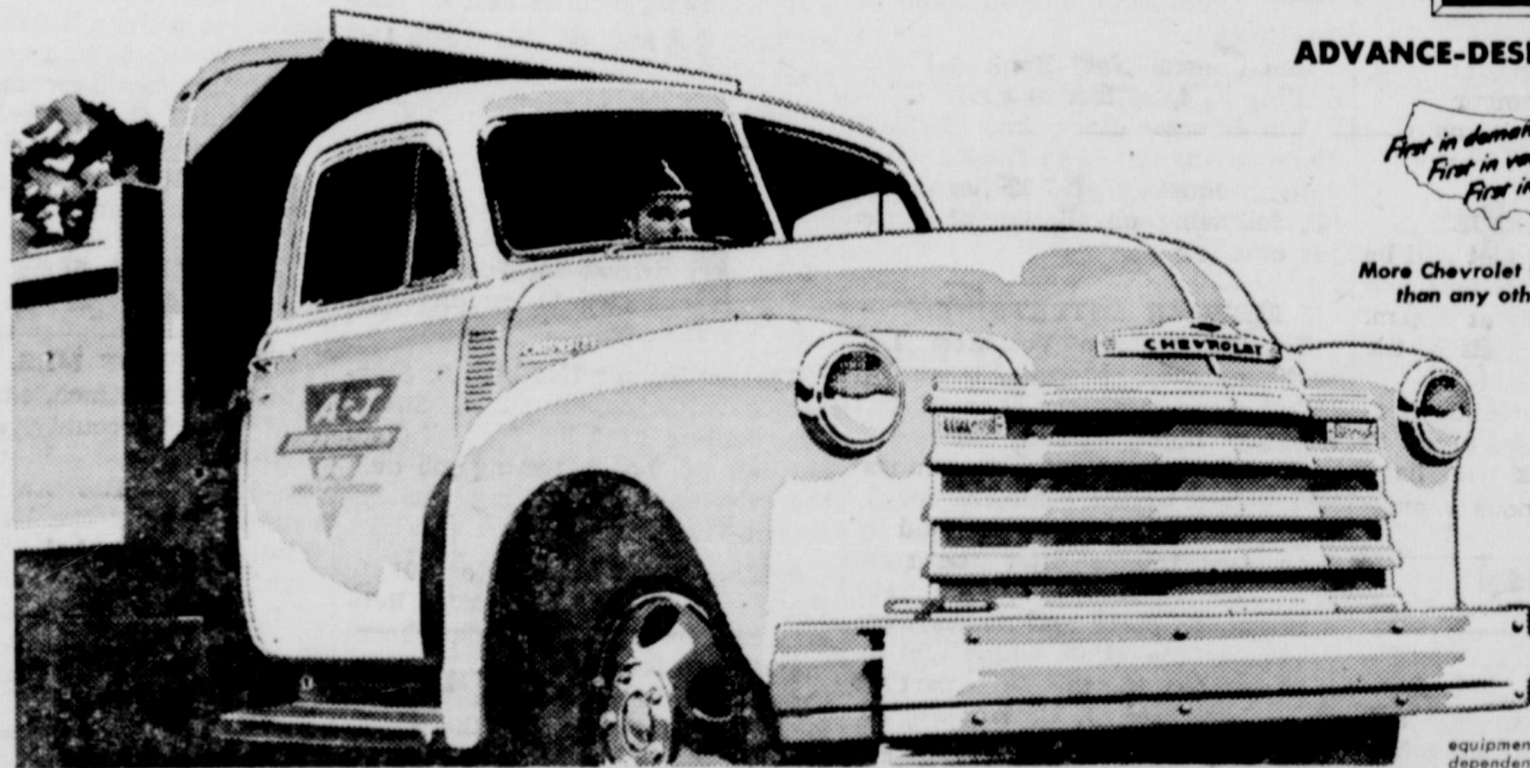

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Robert Lee Takes Bronte Game 25-19 In Season Finale

Robert Lee Steers wound up the football season last Friday night with a 25-19 victory over the Longhorns at Bronte. Trailing 19-0 at the half, the Longhorns steamed up during the latter stages of the game when their aerial attack began clicking.

Fumbles were numerous at the start of the game. Bronte recovered a fumble on the Steer 17-yard line, but two plays later Milburn Wink recovered for Robert Lee. After taking a punt on his 42 yard line a Bronte player fumbled and Norman Roberts recovered for the Steers.

SCORE EARLY

Donnie Duncan skirted end for a first down on the 29. J. W. Caudle Bronte end, intercepted a pass on his 23. The Longhorns failed to advance and punted to Bill Havins on the Bronte 38. Roberts went off right tackle, dodged several Bronte tacklers and ran for a touchdown. A line play failed to convert. Score: Robert Lee 6, Bronte 0.

The first period ended with the Steers taking a punt on their 47. Duncan picked up 9 yards around end and tossed two incomplete passes. He then got around his right end for a 1st down on the Longhorn 26. Duncan completed a pass to Havins to the 6 yard line, and on the next play went around end to score. Duncan converted with a placekick. Score: Robert Lee 13, Bronte 0.

ROBERTS INJURED

The Longhorns began passing. Marlon McCutchen completed a throw to Lyndon Waldrop for a 1st down on the Bronte 45. The same combination then took the ball to the Steer 22. After a 5-yard penalty had been called on Robert Lee, McCutchen crashed right tackle for a 1st down on the 10 yard line. Norman Roberts suffered a knee injury and was carried off the field. Bronte failed to connect with its passes and a 15-yard penalty set them back to the Steer 24 where the ball went over to Robert Lee.

The Steers were unable to advance. Duncan's punt was nearly blocked, J. O. Bagwell downing the ball on the Steer 28. Caudle caught a pass for a 1st down on the 13.
