Varnadore Askins **Farms Sold Here**

An important land deal was completed here last week, involving sale of the Henry Varnadore and F. A. Askins farms near Robert Lee.

New owner of these properties is Mrs. J. E. Roane of Robert Lee who traded in her 308 acre wheat and cotton farm near Silverton.

Emory E. Mills of Tulia bought the Varnadore and Askins farms here and in turn traded them to Mrs. Roane for her Briscoe county land. The Roane family has owned the Silverton farm for a number of vears.

Both the Varnadore and Askins deals were for cash. The Varnadore place of 293 acres in Friendship community sold at \$60 per acre. Askins received \$75 per acre for his place which adjoins the highway two miles northwest of Robert Lee.

Mrs. Roane advised The Observer that her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. O. B. Jacobs, will move onto the Askins place, while Lowell Roane will operae the Varnadore farm.

Neither Varnadore nor Askins have announced their future plans, but they both indicated they may be interested in purchasing land where there is a little more rainfall.

Coke Has Its Sixth Highway Fatality

William C. Davis, 21, of Colorado City, was killed instantly at 3:30 p. m. Christmas Day when the car he was driving crashed on the new highway near Edith.

Mrs. Eula Mae Barber, 31, of Colorado City, a passenger in the same car, suffered critical injuries. Highway patrol officers investigating the wreck said Davis probably fell asleep at the wheel of the 1951 Chrysler. The vehicle left the highway, struck a fence on the left side of the road, crossed the highway again, plowed through a fence and stopped in a pasture 30 yards from the road.



Sun's Biggest Well **Finaled This Week On Mathers Lease**

Sun Oil Company this week completed one of the biggest producers ever known in the Jameson Field near Silver where oil was discovered five years ago. The company's No. 21 Mathers flowed 507.59 barrels of oil and no water during its official 24-hour test.

Guage was through a 1/4-inch tubing choke. Tubing pressure was 1,100 pounds and casing pressure 1,240 pounds. Gas-oil ratio 1,262-1. Five thousand gallons of acid were used in treating the pay section from 6,381 to 6,456 feet, the total depth.

Sun Ends Gas Waste **In Millican Field**

Sun's new gas plant in the Millican field west of Edith was scheduled to be put into operation Thursday.

Consructed strictly as a conservation measure, he plant will be used to inject escaping gas back into the ground and no petroleum liquid products will be exracted.

The plant has two Ingersoll-Rand compressors of 300 h. p. each, but they will not have the capacity to handle all the 8 million cubic feet of gas which is now estimated to being flared daily in the Millican field.

P. E. Pew, superintendent of Sun's Gas Department in Coke county, says the company will continue to study the situation and additional construction is in prospect for both the Silver and Edith plants.






