James Clayton Caraway was born in the Hayrick community Nov. 28, 1883, the son of the late W. T. Caraway. He married Miss Lillian Williams at the Hayrick church on Feb. 26, 1926. For the past 14 years, they had resided east of Blackwell near Hylton.

Surviving are his widow; two sons, Jimmy at home and Wilfred, stationed in the armed services at Camp Chaffee, Ark.; two daughters, Misses Zaida and Glovina of Robert Lee.

He also leaves five sisters, Mrs. Anna Brooks, Mineral Wells, Mrs. Alice Burnett, Abilene, Mrs. Hawley C. Allen, Robert Lee, Mrs. T. J. Percifull, Christoval, and Mrs. Frank Burges of Dallas.

Admission prices for each session will be 20 cents and 35 cents.

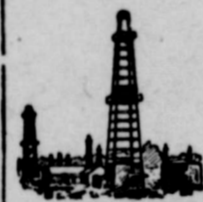
### TO OPEN CAFE AT SILVER

## Notes From The Oil Field

Stanolind No. 1 Bryan Gartman, wildcat 7 miles northwest of Robert Lee, was plugged and abandoned this week. The hole was drilled to a total depth of 6,806 feet after penetrating 97 feet into the Ellenburger. A drillstem test yielded 2,000 feet of sulphur water. Kadene Drilling Co. is moving rotary to Eldorado where it will drill for Stanolind.

Union No. 3 Elizabeth McCutchen, five miles east of Robert Lee, was drilling Tuesday at 2,874 feet in shale. It is an east offset to Union No. 2 Elizabeth McCutchen in the northeast quarter of Section 445. Morgan Drilling Co. has the contract. Rotary equipment was moved back to the McCutchen field after drilling a dry hole for Union on Maurene Stewart, west of Blackwell.

W. M. and A. P. Fuller No. 1 Mrs. J. A. Waldrop, wildcat near Hayrick, was testing a lime section Wednesday bottomed at 6,550 feet. Chester Hunter No. 1 E. E. Stagner, 5 miles southwest of Silver, was cleaning out oyster shell and testing in the reef bottomed at 6,400 feet. Extensive acid treatment has been used and some oil has been swabbed.

It was reported Wednesday that The Chicago Corp. No. 1 Dr. R. J. Warren was making preparation to plug and abandon after reaching the contract depth of 6,400 feet with no shows. Lester Rice had the contract and is moving his rig to Glasscock County, west of Garden City.

## Auto Crashes Into Service Station

An auto carrying three members of the armed services, two Air Force officers and a Wac, failed to negotiate the curve coming into Robert Lee from the east at 4 a. m. Sunday, crashed into the Conoco service station operated by Howard Varnadore.

The crash knocked down both pumps and did other damage. The car, a 1951 Pontiac, will require repairs costing \$500.

Lieut. Childress C. Clift of Knoxville, Tenn., owner of the vehicle, said his buddy, George Simpson, was driving at the time. Simpson's sister, also a passenger, suffered a minor head wound.

The driver said he failed to realize the road made a sharp curve, as he had not seen any highway markers. The group was returning to their base at Chandler, Ariz., after a holiday visit with relatives in Tennessee. They had come through Waco and were taking a short cut to get back on Highway 80.

The car was left here for repairs and the trio went to San Angelo where they hoped to get air transportation at Goodfellow Field.

## BCD To Support Highway Safety, Clean-Up Drive

Community projects involving highway safety and a citywide cleanup were discussed at Monday's luncheon meeting of the Board of Community Development.

Druggist T. W. Farris pointed out that the State Health Department had recently issued a warning that every city and town in Texas would be compelled to clean up and help stop the spread of polio and other diseases.

The matter of signal lights for the three-cornered intersection at the northeast edge of Robert Lee and also at the crossing of Austin Avenue and the Colorado City highway, was also discussed.

City officials were requested to investigate both problems. Mayor John Harvey said he would immediately contact the State Health Department and Highway Safety officials.

A committee to nominate new BCD officers will report at the next meeting. Members of the committee are Wilton Scott, B. C. Goodwin and Sid Ferrell.

## New Bank Titles For Allen, Richardson

Stockholders of the Robert Lee State Bank held their annual meeting Tuesday, when officials reported the best year in the bank's history. Deposits at the end of the year reached an all-time high of nearly one and a quarter million dollars. A 5 percent semi-annual dividend was declared.

Directors were re-elected as were the officers. However, G. C. Allen was promoted to Executive Vice President, and T. A. Richardson was named Vice President and Cashier. R. C. Russell continues in his position as bank President.

These officers along with Victor Wojtek and Henry Briscoe make up the Board of Directors. Mr. Briscoe was elected to the board last year following the death of Willis Smith.

The Robert Lee Bank now has a capital and surplus fund of nearly \$75,000.

Smith is a Coke county native son. He was born in the Lometa community 33 years ago and much of his life has been spent in the vicinity of Edith. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Lake Smith. Finnell and his family now reside on the farm and ranch he purchased two years ago from Hub Walker.

He graduated from Robert Lee high school in 1937. He was one of the first Coke county young men to be called for service in World War II. After entering the service in the fall of 1941 he trained with Company D of the 90th Infantry Regiment at Camp Roberts, Calif.

Finnell was transferred to the 41st Division at Fort Lewis, Wash., and was shipped to Australia late in 1942. He suffered a serious knee injury while on maneuvers and was hospitalized 5½ months. Later he was transferred to New Guinea where he served at Third Camp

Lodge.

His wife, whom he married in 1945, is the former Rhonda Muston, whose parents previously resided at Bronte and in the Valley View community. They have a daughter, Charlotte, six years old.

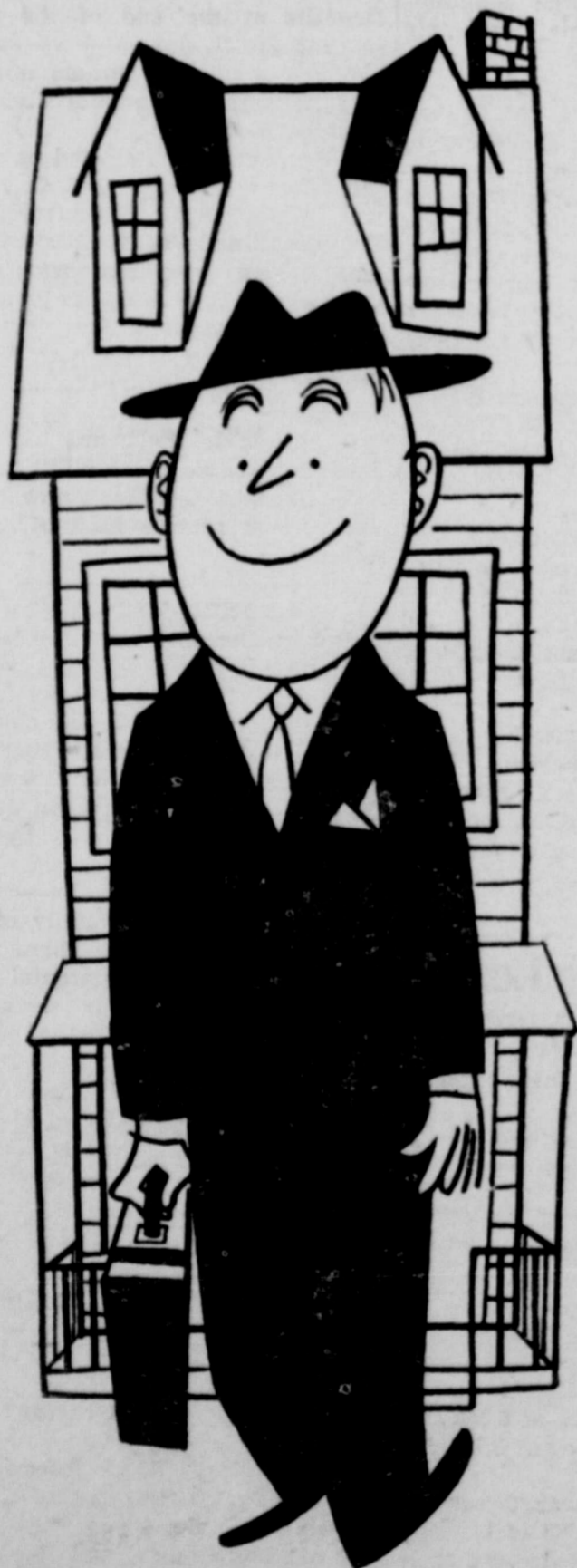

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## School Men Attend State Conference

The Texas Education Agency, directed by Dr. J. W. Edgar and brought into existence by the Gilmer-Aiken Law, held its regular School Administrators' Advisory Conference on Education in Austin January 3rd, 4th, and 5th.

The session was a far cry from the old meetings under the State Department of Education. Nine major problems were discussed for three days by seven hundred superintendents and various leaders of the Agency. Some of the more important questions discussed were Certification and Teacher Education, State Plan for Vocational Education, Field Audits of School Records, and Transportation Problems.

Practically every superintendent in this part of the state was present. The greatest benefits received from the meeting is knowing what changes will be required of the various schools and knowing what changes will be made next year.

Under the plan used by Dr. Edgar, the responsibility of improving the schools of the state will rest largely on the shoulders of all the administrators. The plan illustrates Democracy in Action.

Local school men attending the conference were J. L. Carroll of Bronte, Supt. B. C. Goodwin of Robert Lee and Judge Jeff Dean.

## UCRA Will Finance Bronte Water Line

At a special election Saturday Bronte citizens told its city officials to go ahead and complete proceedings with the Upper Colorado River Authority to insure an adequate water supply for the city. The vote was 67 to 0.

The project involves laying a water line 12 miles from Bronte to the new Oak Creek reservoir south of Blackwell. One-tenth the water impounded above the Oak Creek dam was reserved by the UCRA when they agreed to the City of Sweetwater's permit. This will be available for the use of Bronte people, the quantity being about 600,000 gallons daily. Present water consumption at Bronte will not exceed 150,000 gallons per day, thus an adequate source of water is assured.

The UCRA will pay for the entire project, estimated to cost \$185,000. This includes a settling tank and filtering plant at Ft. Chadbourne. G. C. Allen of Robert Lee, UCRA secretary-treasurer, says sufficient funds are on hand to pay for the project without issuing bonds.

The City of Bronte will repay the UCRA for the cost of the project but there will be no interest charges. The monthly payment will be \$700 per month.

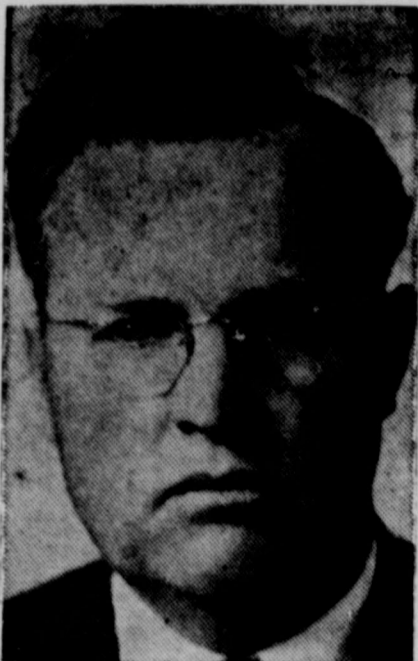

### 'SOIL AND WATER' NEW MAGAZINE FOR LANDOWNER

Landowners of Coke County are getting their first copies this week of the landowners' magazine of Texas, a sort of grass-roots proposition undertaken by men and women who own and operate the millions of acres of land in the state.

The Magazine, called "Soil and Water," contains 40 pages of information on conservation in all major sections of Texas, plus a cover printed in color.

Established by the District Supervisors of the 164 Soil Conservation Districts representing over 142 million acres of Texas land, the magazine, to be issued monthly, points out in its first issue that "conservation isn't something you achieve and then sit back and admire, like a twelve-point buck over the mantle, its a continuing job and will never be finished as long as man makes a living off the soil."

Achieving conservation through Soil Conservation Districts, it adds, is "the very essence of democracy. The nation's Soil Conservation Districts, operated by the landowners themselves, constitute a new nationwide declaration of faith in democracy at a time when the faint-hearted fear the breakdown of our type of government."
