According to data included in According to data included in
the new edition of he Smithsonian the new edition of the Smithsonian
meteorological tables, just published by that institution, this
means that approximately
227 tons, or 54,308 gallons, of water
has fallen on each acre of the has fallen on each acre of the
area designated. area designated
Similarly a inch rainfall means 1 ton, or 272 gallons, of water per acre. A halfinch fall represents 57 tons, or 13,577 gallons per acre. For a one-
inch fall the figures rise to 113 tons, or 27,154 gallons. The destiny of water is calculated at 62.4 pounds per cubic
foot.
