## Commissioners Hold Monthly Session

Coke County Commissioners Court held its regular session Monday, and the day was largely devoted to the transaction of routine matters and allowing bills.

The Court voted to sign an oil lease on 177 acres in Cochran county which was formerly Coke county school land. The land was sold some time ago but Coke county retained the right to make one more lease on the property and secure the bonus which has been agreed at \$25 per acre. The money will go into the County's Permanent School fund.

Frank C. Dickey met with the board and was given permission to proceed with constructing park and playground facilities on the court house square. Mr. Dickey is chairman of a BCD committee which is fostering the project.

Later on the chairman and his county committee will meet and determine the cost of the primary election—and he cost to each candidate for having his name printed on the ballot. That's the legal end of it, and May 5th is the day for you to remember.

Your announcement in The Robert Lee Observer is in the nature of a political advertisement and has no significance as far as the county chairman is concerned.

A last minute candidate could—if so desired—file with the chairman on Monday, May 5th, and carry his announcement in the local paper after that date.

Everything seems to be going along satisfactorily in the affairs of the City of Robert Lee. The terms of Mayor John D. Harvey and Commissioners John H. Brown and Fern Havins expire this year. They have been nominated by petition for reelection and theirs will be the only names printed on the ballot.

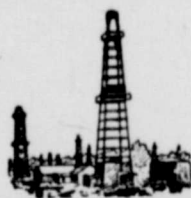
The City election will be held on Tuesday, April 1.

## Notes From The Oil Field

Union No. 4 Elizabeth McCutchen, northeast outpost to the McCutchen Cisco sand field east of Robert Lee, was swabbing Wednesday. There was some oil but results are not encouraging. Perforations were made in a 5-foot pay section from 3,992 to 3,997 feet.

Lone Star Producing Co. No. 1 Wendland cemented surface casing at 526 feet. The wildcard is 7 miles southeast of Robert Lee and 300 feet south of the Colorado River.

E. D. Anderson, production engineer for Lone Star, is in charge of the operation. J. B. McGill is handling tools for Century Corp., the contractor.

E. L. Doheny No. 1 Mozelle Taylor, wildcard 1½ miles south of Tennyson, has been plugged and abandoned. It recovered 350 feet of mud and 570 feet of salt water, no shows of oil or gas, on a 45-minute drillstem test between 5,491 and 5,566 feet in the Ellenburger.

### UNDER PEACE BOND

Marcus Tubbs of Norton has been put under bonds in Coke County Court for disturbing the peace. He created quite a disturbance the other night at Bronte when he visited the home of his estranged wife. His hearing will come up at a later date.

### JEWELRY STORE ROBBED

The Manley Jewelry Store in Robert Lee was robbed of \$90 worth of merchandise Tuesday night of last week. The crime was not discovered until Thursday, as the store is closed on Wednesdays. Entrance to the building was gained by prying open a rear window. Officers are investigating the local break-in. Local talent is suspected.

## MARCH TERM OF DISTRICT COURT OVER IN HURRY

The March term of District Court for Coke County wound up in a hurry Monday. When it was seen there would be no jury trials Judge John Sutton excused the panel for the term.

Pleading guilty to criminal charges were T. W. Anderson and Ira Walter Patton, both of whom were brought here from the penitentiary where they are serving time for peccious crimes.

Anderson had been indicted by the Coke county grand jury last week on three counts of forgery and passing checks. He was given a 2-year sentence on each count, the terms to run concurrently with the time he is now serving.

Patton, indicted for stealing property from the Highway Department shed at Bronte, also received a 2-year sentence.

The men were brought here on a bench warrant by Sheriff Paul Good and Deputy Frank Keese. Tuesday Anderson was turned over to Runnels county authorities, while Patton was returned to Huntsville Wednesday by Keese and Deputy Chilly Tinkler.

The court affirmed a judgement in favor of Mrs. Mary Slaughter et al in the matter of quieting title to a section of land north of Robert Lee which has been sold to Frank Wojtek, Sr.

### TWO DIVORCES

Wanda Jean Word was granted a divorce from David Richard Word and the plaintiff was given custody of a minor child. She was formerly Wanda Jean Tidwell.

Janie B. Sheppard was given a decree from Delmir Morris Sheppard after a hearing in which the plaintiff was the only witness. She was given custody of two minor children for 9 months of each year, and the defendant is to have them during the three summer months.

## Sun Gets Sand Producer On Mathers Lease

The Jameson (Strawn sand) field at Silver Saturday gained its second completion when Sun Oil Co. No. 8-A C. E. Mathers was finished for a daily flowing potential of 172.63 barrels of 47 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,138-1.

Production was through a ¼ inch tubing choke and open hole between 5,906 feet, where seven-inch casing was cemented, and 6,098 feet, the total depth, with top of pay picked at 5,906 feet on elevation of 1,950 feet. Completion was natural. Tubing pressure was 310 pounds, with packer on casing.

Completion of this well extended pay one location east. The Strawn sand pay was opened by Chester Hunter of Dallas No. 1 E. E. Stagner.

## You May Enlist In Marine Corps

Men who have taken their pre-induction physical examinations have until midnight, March 31, to volunteer for the U. S. Marine Corps.

T-Sgt. Jack Harmon, of the San Angelo recruiting office, made this announcement Wednesday on his visit here.

Men with dependents can be enlisted to serve anywhere from 17-24 months on active duty in the Reserve and be returned at the end of that time to their home on inactive status.

Single men can choose the Reserve enlistment, or the 3 or 4-year Regular enlistment. Men 17 years old must be able to obtain their parents' or guardians' consent to enlist.

However, the sergeant pointed out that the 17-year old men who are permitted to enlist, enjoy the advantage of a 1½ years training period before they become eligible to be sent anywhere near a combat area.

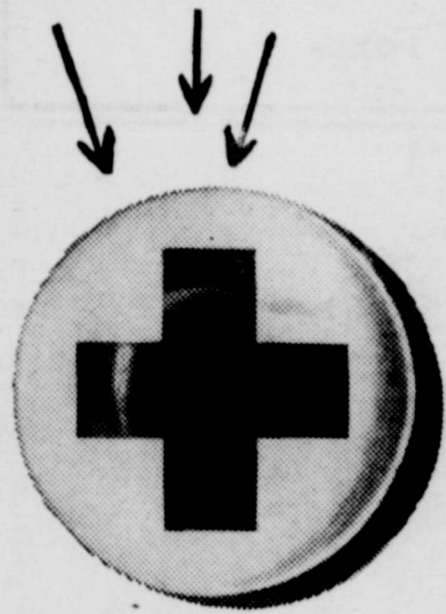
First practice session for Robert Lee players has been called for next Sunday at 2 p.m. if weather is favorable.

## MANY TEXANS IN 47TH INF. DIVISION NOW MOVING IN FOR MANEUVERS

Camp Rucker, Ala.—Four hundred and four Texas soldiers from 206 communities will return to their home state in March as part of the 47th "Viking" Infantry Division stationed here to participate in Exercise Long Horn at Fort Hood.

The 47th's Texas contingent is composed of draftees and rotated Korean veterans.

Included in the ranks is Sgt. Vaughan S. Davis, of Robert Lee.

Fort Worth is represented by 44 men in the division. Dallas has 22; El Paso, 22; San Angelo, ten; Tyler and Houston, each six.

The draftees poured into the 47th in the middle of February, 1951, after processing at Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

The 47th Division—Army home of so many Texans—is one of the youngest infantry divisions in active service. First organized as a Minnesota-North Dakota National Guard unit in 1946, the 47th was federalized in January, 1951. Since then, it has been training at Camp Rucker, sending thousands of personnel to Korea. In replacement, hundreds of Korean veterans have been assigned to the Division.

Although the Division, as a unit has no combat record, the individual regiments and battalions have fought under other divisions' colors. The 175th Field Artillery Battalion fired a million and 300 thousand rounds in Africa and Italy in World War II, and gave Hitler his first taste of American artillery at Medjez El Bab, North Africa, on November 19, 1942.

The 164th Infantry Regiment hit the Solomons, Leyte and Guadalcanal. The 135th Infantry Regiment was the first to land American troops in Europe. The 136th Infantry Regiment fought in New Guinea, Morotai, and Luzon. The 188th Field Artillery Battalion saw action at Utah Beachhead, St. Lo, and The Battle of the Bulge. The 194th Tank Battalion was caught in the fall of Bataan. Seventy-five per cent of the survivors died either in the infamous "Death March" or in prison camps.

For Exercise Long Horn, the 47th will have to transplant itself lock, stock, and barrel. That entails moving a "city" of some 15,000 men—with equipment—900 miles across four states.

Exercise Long Horn will include 150,000 men for eight Army and numerous Air Force units. The problem is designed to give realistic training in large-scale offensive and defensive operations.

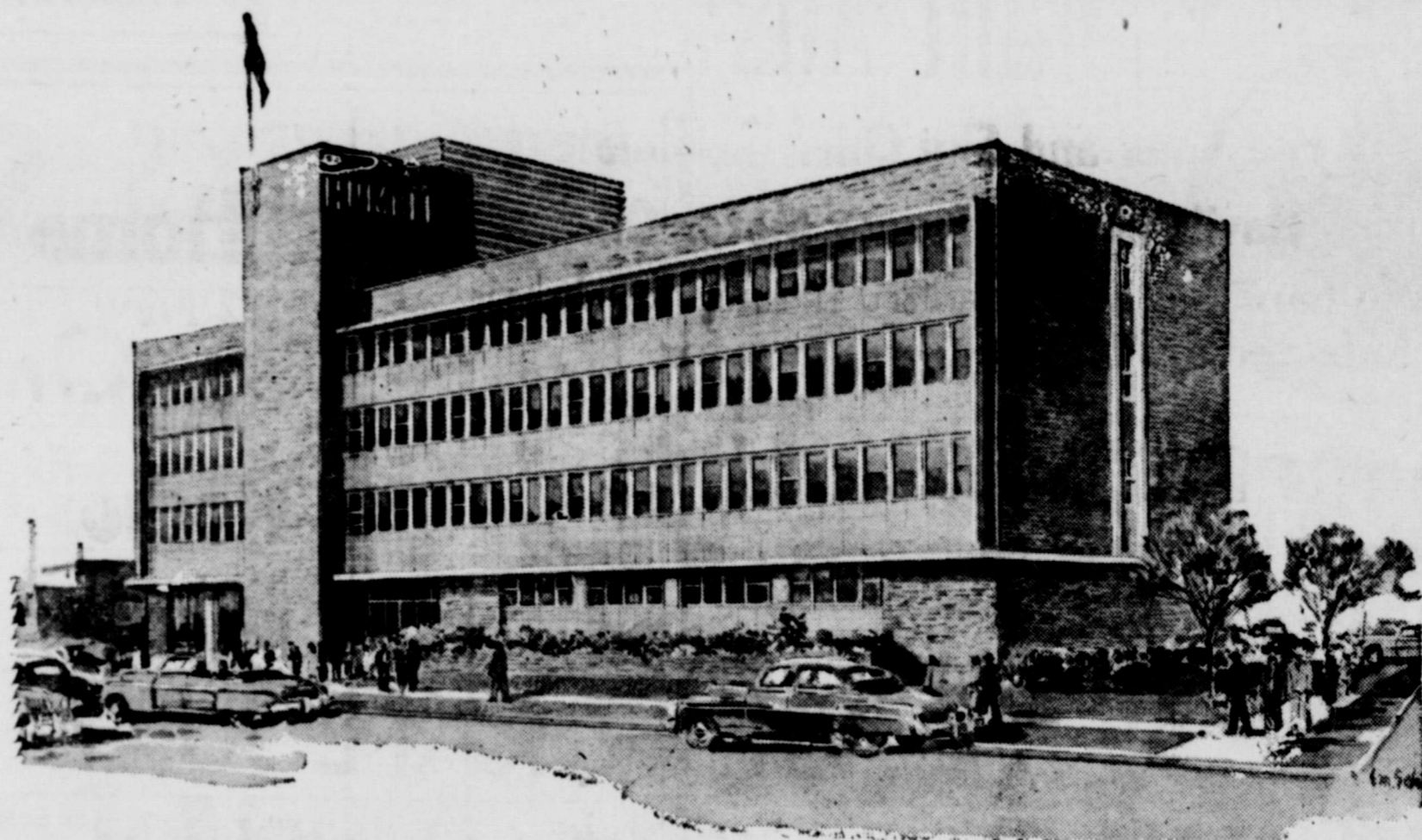

## Funds Available To Help Farmers In Drouth Areas

All Texas counties are now under designation as disaster areas by proclamation of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The action qualifies farmers who have suffered crop losses and who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere for loans from the Farmers Home Administration to put in 1952 crops. Announcement of the designation was made at Dallas, headquarters of the Farmers Home Administration by L. J. Cappleman, State Director.

Bad weather conditions in 1951 reduced crop yields materially and tightened up credit conditions, to the extent that many farmers were unable to finance crop plantings. Disaster loans are now available in each county. Farmers who have sustained production losses on crops and livestock may apply for funds to pay for seed, fertilizer and materials for insect control where needed, gas and oil for tractors, feed for livestock, essential farm and home operating expenses, machinery repairs and other expenses incident to the production of a crop.

Credit is advanced under authority of Public Law 38 and is available to farmers who have sustained losses, and who cannot obtain from local sources the funds needed to plant a crop this year. Before a loan is made a County Committee of three farmers must certify that the applicant suffered a substantial production loss. Farmers may apply for loans at the office of the County Supervisor, Paul C. Shillingburg, located in the Agricultural Building, at Robert Lee. The office is open each Thursday.

Funds will be available to ranchmen whose herds have been depleted by the drouth. They can borrow to restock their pastures.

Farmers who qualify under the disaster loan regulations may discuss their needs with the County Supervisor.

Better farming practices are emphasized in the FHA program. These will be discussed and agreed upon by the county supervisor and the applicant when the loan application is prepared. A program of diversification is the safest course.

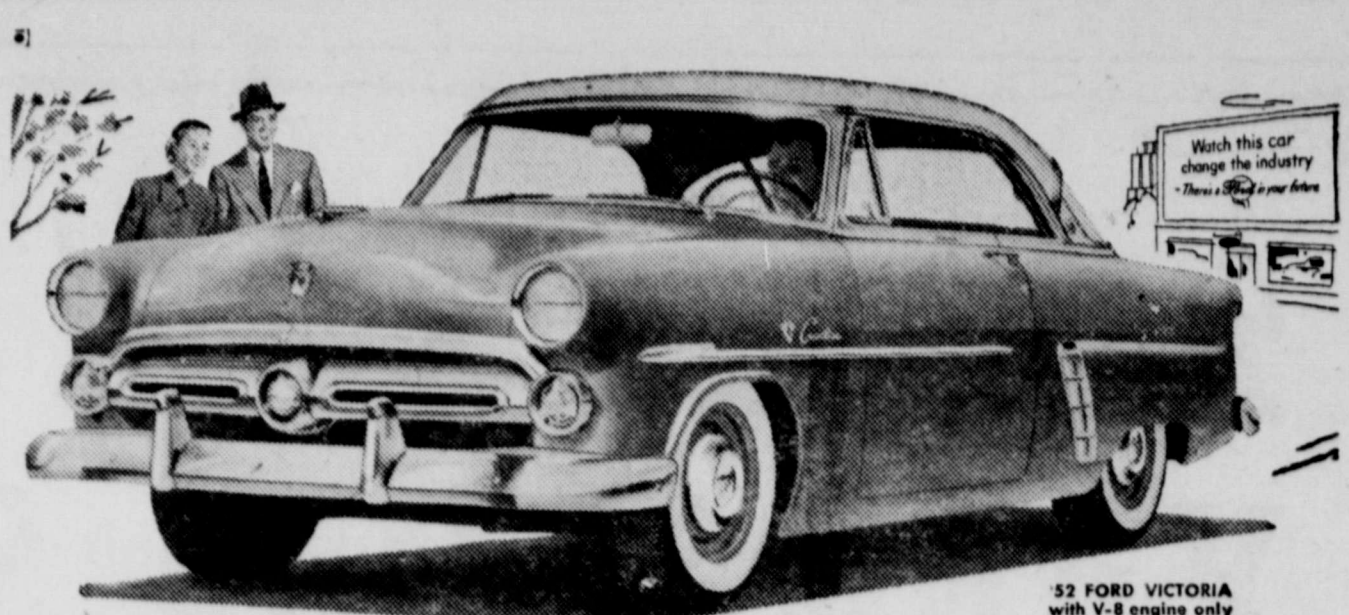

AUSTIN, Texas, Mar. 6.—Boys who reach the age of 18, required to register with the nearest draft board, can register in Robert Lee with Hugh Lewis, Jr. and in Bronte with J. A. Stephenson.

Services of these registrars enable Coke county boys to register in their own county without having to go to the expense and trouble of travel to San Angelo.

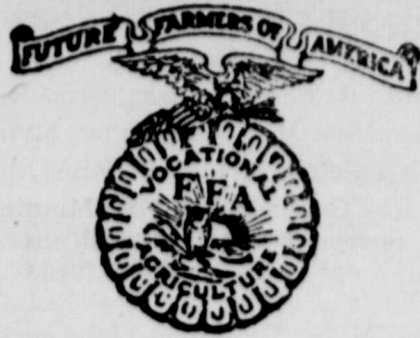
A local board is maintained for the three-county area because one board can take care of it under present circumstances and thus help keep down the cost of government.
