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ROBERT LEE NOSED OUT BRONTE 8-7 IN SEASON'S FINAL FOOTBALL GAME

Robert Lee Steers came from behind to defeat Bronte's Longhorns 8 to 7 to wind up the football season here last Friday night. It was a thrilling game witnessed by a large homecoming crowd.

Bronte scored its touchdown in the first quarter on a sustained 80-yard drive and the extra point was converted to give them 7 points. The Steers' lone touchdown occurred late in the second period when Duncan completed a 10-yard pass to Norman Roberts. Conversion failed and Bronte was leading 7 to 0.

Things were happening fast in the last quarter. Bronte was on the Steer 36 yard line when Halfback Bill Havins intercepted a pass and ran the ball back 60 yards. He got thru a horde of tacklers and it looked as though he was long gone for a touchdown, but fleet Bronte tacklers stopped him on their 9-yard line.

Prospects were bright for Robert Lee, but on the next play Duncan fumbled and Bronte recovered on its 3 yard line. The Steer defense tightened up and Don Kiser was back on the goal line to punt. It was fourth down and five yards to go. But Wilton Robertson and Bill Carwile crashed through to block the kick and the ball rolled into the end zone. It was a safety and gave the Steers two points and the ball game. Robert Lee was down on the Longhorn 4 yard line when the game ended.

Statistics show Bronte made 17 first downs and Robert Lee 12. Bronte recovered five Steer fumbles while Robert Lee recovered two Longhorn fumbles. Pass interceptions were even, each club getting two. Bronte had two punts blocked, Robert Lee none.

Two months ago Robert Lee and Bronte played to a 7-7 tie on the latter's field. At that time the Steers rolled up 17 first downs, while Bronte made none. Everyone who witnessed the two games were amazed at the great improvement the Longhorns had made.

1st QUARTER

J. O. Bagwell kicked off for Bronte with the wind to Lynn Davidson on the Robert Lee 21. Bill Havins gained 5 thru center and Davidson added 3. Donny Duncan circled right end for a 1st down on the 31. Davidson hit the line for 66 yards in two tries and Duncan went off left tackle for a 1st on the 45. The Steer offensive bogged down and Davidson punted to the Bronte 14.

Arbie Phillips circled his left end for 28 yards and a 1st down on his 41. Dean Stephenson gained 4 thru center and Phillips carried to the Steer 47 and a 1st down. Phillips went thru center for 6 and Stephenson added 2 more. Phillips got loose around end for a 1st on the Robert Lee 34. Lyndon Waldrop pitched out to Billy Gentry who made it a 1st down on the 19. On the fourth down with 4 yards to go, Waldrop completed a pass to Phillips on the Steer 2 yard line. Phillips went thru center for a touchdown. Bagwell's placekick converted. Score: Bronte 7, Robert Lee 0.

Duncan returned the kickoff to his 38. On the second play Bagwell recovered a fumble on the Steer 45. The Longhorns were stopped and punted to the Robert Lee 15. The Steers picked up 5 yards in two plays.

2nd QUARTER

GENERAL RAINS BREAK WORST DROUTH PERIOD

Rainfall measuring from 1½ to more than two inches was received in Coke County Sunday and Monday, bringing hope that the most serious drouth in history may be broken.

The rain fell slowly and very little runoff water resulted. Fields were wet down as much as ten inches or more. It was the first general rain in many months. In Robert Lee the rain gauge showed 1.6 inches while all other sections of the county received at least that amount and some places 2 inches were reported.

The moisture will be of untold value to pastures and crops. It will bring on the small grain planted earlier in the fall, and many farmers and ranchers will do more planting as soon as they can get in the fields. This week's rain should insure some winter grazing a little later.

FIRST KILLING FREEZE

The rain was accompanied by cooler weather and the first killing freeze of the season occurred during the night Tuesday when the mercury dropped to 28 degrees.

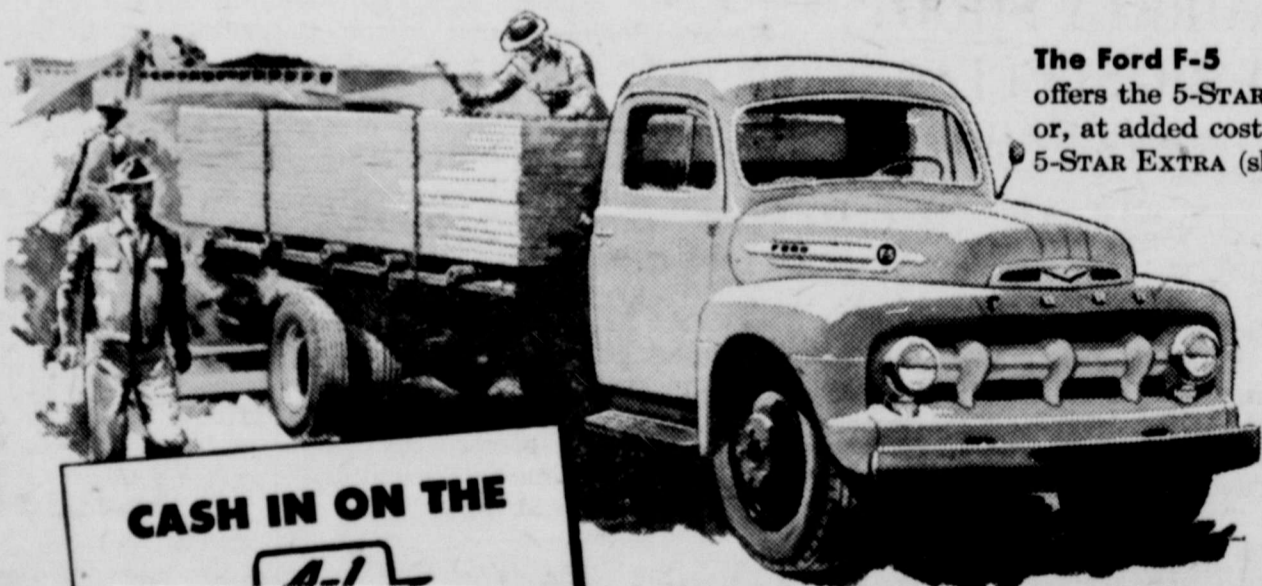
