WIDE SEARCH FOR ROBBERS OF BRONTE BANK

Search for two men who robbed the First National Bank of Bronte of \$9,000 Tuesday afternoon of last week intensified this week, since the suspects were identified and charged.

They were named by the Federal Bureau of Investigation as Byron Ralph Moore of East Alton, Ill., and Scottie Ray Mucklerath of Cayuga, Texas, both 24.

Charges against the pair were filed last Friday in Federal Court in San Angelo.

Identities of the men were traced through a .38 calibre revolver which they left in the bank. Smith & Wesson, eastern manufacturers, furnished information that the gun had been shipped to Dallas. Moore is said to have bought the revolver at a Dallas retail store Jan. 22, only five days prior to the robbery.

Sheriff Paul Good and other local officers worked with state and federal agents in uncovering evidence to identify the bandits. The men worked in Bronte and Robert Lee oil fields at times during the past six months, and were known to a number of local people. One of the men had a balance of \$1.61 in the Bronte bank.

Melba Austin, Robert Lee young woman, said the pair had been in the Nutter Cafe in Bronte on the day before the holdup. A daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Wojtek, she has been employed at Bronte by her aunt and uncle, Pete and Inez Nutter.

Officials all over the country are on the lookout for the robbers. There is some reason to believe they may be in old Mexico, as they are known to have been in that region at times during the past. One of the men has crime record. They are known to have spent the night before the robbery in a San Angelo hotel.

JAMESON FIELD EXTENDED TWO MILES NORTH

Sun Oil Company's extension of its Jameson field two miles north into Mitchell county was indicated the past week with favorable showings in its No. 1 Victor McCabe.

After reaching the Strawn sand drillstem test No. 1 was from 5,898 to 5,911 feet. With tool open 33 minutes, gas came to the surface in 7 minutes and oil in 32 minutes. It flowed oil for one hour and 17 barrels of clean oil were reversed out.

A second test at 5,911-27 feet flowed an hour and 20 minutes and 1,700 feet of clean oil was in the drill pipe. A third test 5,930-74 feet recovered 375 feet of clean oil.

Operators drilled ahead and went through a 20-foot shale streak and back into sand. A bottom of 6,029 had been reached when the drilling rig failed because of drawworks difficulties. Indications are that the test will continue to the reef.

STAKES JACOBS LOCATION

Sun Oil Co. this week staked a location on Mrs. Mattie Jacobs, but The Observer could not learn the exact location Wednesday. Property owned by Mrs. Jacobs lays more than a mile east of production in the Jameson field at Silver and joins land owned by Allen and Fred Jameson and H. L. Bloodworth.

COMPLETION ON TUBB

Sun E-2 Tubb has been finished for a 24-hour flow of 50.87 barrels of oil, no water. Gauge was through a 1/4-inch choke. Pressures were 150 pounds on the tubing and 400 pounds on the casing. Gas-oil ratio 1,252-1. Production is from the sand.

Sun D-2 Tubb, another sand well, flowed 143 barrels of oil, no water, during a 17 1/2 hour period. Gauge was through 11-64th inch choke. Tubing pressure 775 pounds, casing pressure 650 pounds. Gas-oil ratio 1,210-1.

Baker-Taylor had the contract and will move to Sun 39 Mathers after making repairs.

WEST HALF OF COUNTY FAR BEHIND BRONTE IN MARCH OF DIMES DRIVE

FOR MARCH OF DIMES

Persons attending the Alamo theatre Friday and Saturday nights of this week will have an opportunity to contribute to the March of Dimes. Manager Victor Wojtek says the theatre will run an interesting movie trailer on the polio campaign. Ladies of the Firemen's Auxiliary will solicit contributions between shows. The solicitation was postponed until this week because the Alamo was closed last Friday and Saturday nights.

The March of Dimes campaign fund was given a generous boost this week when the Robert Lee public schools turned in donations of \$213.29.

Last Saturday a benefit sponsored by the Home Demonstration Clubs netted \$36.72 for the polio drive, making around \$525 which has now been raised in Robert Lee. The Mothers' March last Friday night was nearly a bust, when very few porch lights were turned on to welcome solicitors. Not a single light was on in the north part of town.

However, Mrs. J. S. Ferrell and her committee have received additional sums from various business firms and individuals. A check reveals that a number of families have not been contacted as yet, and additional letter appeals are being mailed.

The fact is that this community is away below last year, and the committee feels that more contributions will come in. The drive is being extended until the middle of February.

While Sanco, Edith and Silver are yet to report it appears the west half of the county will be lagging far behind Bronte and the east half which already reports \$1,344.48.

Canvasses at Edith and Sanco are nearly finished and good success is reported. At Silver the campaign Sun recreation hall Saturday night is still going strong. The dance at was good for \$200 and \$54 has been pledged from individuals. Another big event coming this week is the Box Supper Friday night at Sun hall, starting at 6 o'clock, and the whole community is expected to turn out.

Boxes will be divided into classes for grade school girls, high school girls and adults. There will be prizes for the prettiest and most original boxes in each division, and the man or boy who pays the highest price for a box will receive a special prize from the committee. Entertainment later in the evening will include games of progressive 42, canasta and dominoes. There will be six tables of each, with a charge of 10c per person. High and low prizes will be awarded.

Silver turned in about \$500 for the March of Dimes a year ago, and Chairman Pres Pew says they will do as well or better this year. They plan to wind up their campaign next week.

SCHOOL MAKES RECORD

Robert Lee school children made a new record this year in contributing to the polio fund. Teachers helped with the contests between the 12 grades and also contributed to their groups. First prize among the higher six grades went to the 8th graders where 36 pupils turned in \$47.40 for an average of \$1.31 per capita. Among the six lower grades, 4th graders made the best showing. A sum of \$24.20 was donated by 35 pupils for an average of 69 cents each. Sixth grade pupils gave an average of 64 cents. In the higher group, the 7th grade was second, its 25 pupils donating an average of \$1.09.

SUN WILL SELL JAMESON GAS TO LONE STAR

Sun Oil Company has signed a contract to furnish Lone Star Gas Company 10 million cubic feet of gas daily from the Jameson oil field at Silver.

Lone Star will start immediate construction of an 8-inch pipeline to extend from Silver to the company's main 10-inch transmission line at Colorado City.

Sun plans to add a refrigeration unit to its Jameson gasoline plant to process the gas before it goes into the Lone Star pipeline. Butane and propane and all heavy parts of the wet gas will be extracted.

H. P. Pew, superintendent of the Jameson plant, says the contract with Lone Star will vary at times, but the average will be approximately 10 million cubic feet daily.

Sun will use gas from the new sand wells to apply on the Lone Star contract. There will be no change in the company's present system of returning dry gas from reef wells to the formation.

New installations necessary for the project will be included in Sun's present expansion program at the Jameson field plant. Tentative date when the hookup with Lone Star will start operation is April 1.

MRS. FRANK WOJTEK, SR., LONG TIME RESIDENT, DIES AT AGE OF 81 YEARS

Mrs. Frank C. Wojtek, Sr., 81, died in Coke County Memorial Hospital at 10 o'clock Friday morning, January 30, after an extended illness. Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Saturday in the Robert Lee Methodist Church, with the Rev. Ray Lee, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery, with Clift Funeral Home in charge. Pallbearers were grandsons of the deceased.

Mrs. Wojtek is survived by her husband, five sons, Vladimir V., Otto, Victor, Gene, and Frank, Jr., all of Robert Lee; two daughters, Mrs. Tom Wington of Robert Lee and Mrs. Earl Nutter of Bronte; two sisters, Mrs. Joe Krizan of Lark, Texas and Emily Rezmicek of Temple; one brother, Louis Hruska of Lark; 22 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Wojtek was born Anna Hruska, in Jablunka, Moravia (Czechoslovakia), March 2, 1871. She was the daughter of Steve and Anna Frances (Martinez) Hruska. She came to America with her family before she was one year old.

The Hruskas were agricultural people who came to America in search of land because their native land was overpopulated and there was not enough land for all.

Leaving Jablunka early in September, 1871, the Hruska family landed at Galveston just before Christmas, 1871. The Atlantic crossing was made in a sailing vessel which was blown off its course when it encountered a storm. Three weeks passed before the boat was able to regain its course.

Traveling from Galveston in a "prairie schooner," the Hruskas settled in Fayette County, where they lived seven years. Their next home was in Williamson County, where they lived for four years before moving to Bell County.

Anna Hruska attended school in Williamson and Bell Counties. In speaking of her schooling, she once said, "Most of my teachers were men. They didn't spare the rod. Many were whipped, but I ever got a whipping. I felt that if I should get a spanking in school I would die of shame." Continuing her account of her schooling she said, "I had a hard time getting started. I couldn't speak English. I couldn't understand the teacher, and the teacher couldn't understand me. One of my teachers had a tre-

mendous voice, and when he bel- lowed at me, I forgot all I knew; however I liked school, and history was my favorite subject."

Anna Hruska was married to Frank C. Wojtek, June 5, 1892, in Belton, Texas. They lived on a farm near Seaton, Bell County, for six years before moving to Temple, where they lived for six months.

Mr. and Mrs. Wojtek moved to Tom Green County in 1899. They lived on a farm in the Twin Mountain community for three years and in San Angelo one year. They moved to Coke County on January 1, 1904, and had lived here continuously since that time.

Mrs. Wojtek's health broke in 1939, when she spent many weeks in a San Angelo hospital. Making a partial recovery, she was able to look after her household until about two years ago. Her condition became critical about ten days before her death.

Mrs. Wojtek was a faithful wife, a kind, patient, and loving mother and a wonderful friend. She was loved and respected by all who knew her. She was a member of the Methodist Church.

Jeff Dean Explains County Road Project At BCD Luncheon

County Judge Jeff Dean spoke at the Board of Community Development luncheon Jan. 26 on Farm to Market roads. He stated a federal aid allotment would make \$85,000 available for Farm to Market Road construction in Coke county during the coming two years.

The road from Robert Lee to Water Valley has been agreed upon as Coke county's Farm to Market road project, and the matter will be taken up with Highway Department officials for final approval. Farm to Market highways are now costing about \$12,000 per mile, Judge Dean said.

Pavement of the Silver loop road will have to wait until oil field development is completed in that area, the county judge added. Highway officials feel that road improvements are not practical in a locality where oil field work is booming.

Judge Dean mentioned that the county is getting \$30,000 or more each year from the 30 cent ad valorem tax and this is being used as a fund to buy right of way and provide fencing for new Farm to Market roads. The UCRA gets the first \$13,000 from the 30 cent ad valorem tax.

BCD President Bob Vaughan referred the matter of raising funds to pay volunteer firemen's insurance to the Fire Prevention Committee. The problem of screening solicitors was discussed and will come up for later action. It was pointed out that often fake schemes are devised to get money from local business firms.

A report from the membership committee showed that the campaign is less than half completed. Thirteen sustaining memberships at \$5 each had been turned in, and an equal number of members at \$1 per month.

The BCD holds two luncheon meetings each month.

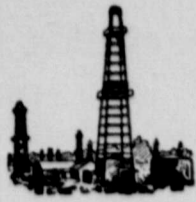

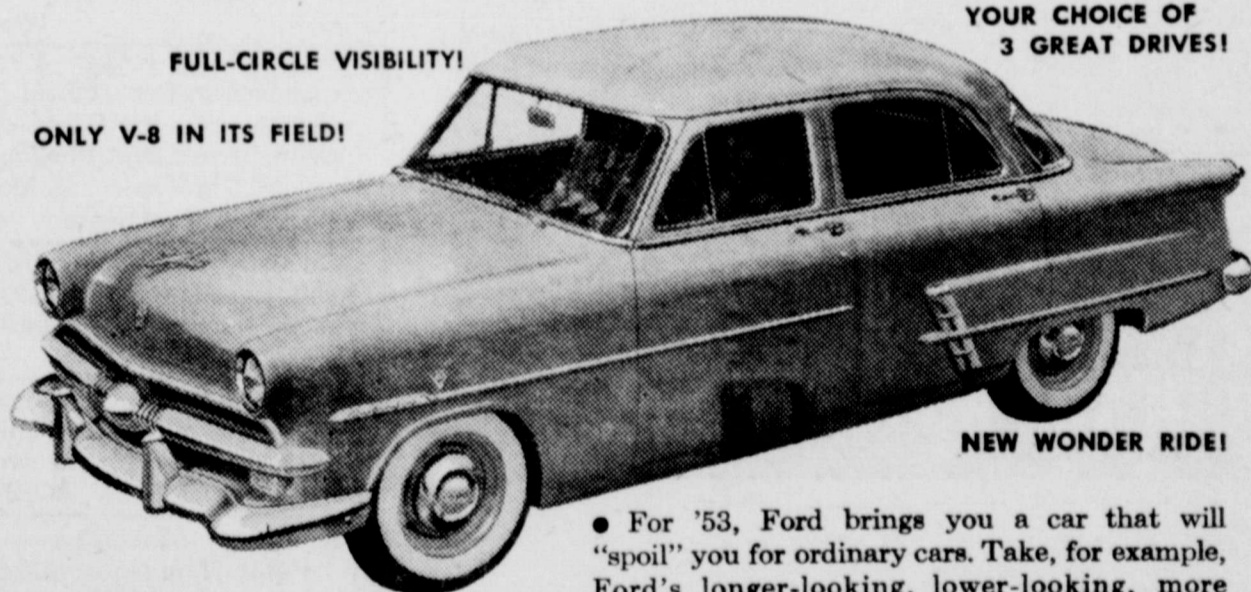

TEACHER SAYS FREE SCHOOLS FACING CRISIS

Facing of a possible crisis in public education is largely a financial matter, in the opinion of E. L. Galyean of the research department of the Texas Teachers Association.

He was the main speaker at a dinner meeting of the Coke County Teachers Association held at the Robert Lee school cafeteria last Wednesday night.

The legislature is being urged to improve teachers salaries in order to attract 11,000 additional teachers that will be needed in Texas public schools during the next eight years. Teachers with degrees now receive a minimum salary of \$2,403 annually. A minimum of \$3,000 is being sought.

Only 4,000 college graduates were certified to teach in Texas last year, and approximately half of those were lured away from the profession, primarily by higher salaries offered by industry, Galyean reported.

Cost per pupil is \$1.25 per day for all school expenses, the speaker pointed out, and Texas is down to 26th place among the states on the amount spent per child in free public schools.

Mr. Galyean made a stimulating speech to the teachers and his remarks were well taken by school board members and P. T. A. representatives who were invited guests.

Hollis Lloyd, Robert Lee high school principal, was master of ceremonies. A short program was presented following the excellent chicken dinner served by Mrs. Tom Rives and her assistants. Nettie Bob Bell sang a vocal solo with Mrs. Jeff Dean as accompanist.
