#### **Emergency Hay Program Saved Ranchers \$60.000**

Coke County farmers and ranchers received 237 carloads of hay under the Emergency Hay Program, a total of 2,964 tons, according to a report released this week by J. E. Quisenberry, local PMA secretary.

Total cost of the hav to the consumer was \$95,204.60, or an average of \$32.12 per ton. It is estimated locally.





#### Notes From The Oil Field

#### WENDLAND WILDCAT

F. Kirk Johnson of Ft. Worth will drill his No. 1 Wendland, a 4,000foot wildcat in J. D. O'Daniel Survey 8, a mile south of the Colorado River, nine miles southeast of Robert Lee. The prospector is four miles south and east of the McCutchen field which produces from the Cisco at an average depth of 3,975

AUSTIN-Early spring is the best time for a community to start a fly control program, declared Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. That is before the fly population has a chance to multiply. It is estimated that one pair of flies, under favorable conditions, could have countless descendants before winter.

Every time you kill a fly early in the season, and destroy breeding places, you stop whole colonies of flies before they can start. The most effective way of preventing swarms of flies is to destroy or make inaccessible to flies the organic material which attracts flies by their odors, and which are essential to them as food and breeding places.

Individual householders should make it their responsibility to clean up their own back yards. Garbage cans should have a tight fitting lid and they should be leak-proof. Inadequate facilities for storage of garbarge and refuse usually result in widespread fly breeding. Uncovered or partially covered garbage containers produce odors that attract a large number of flies. Good window screens will do a lot to keep flies out of buildings, thereby protecting food from contamination by flyborne disease organ-

There is no substitute for good sanitation in fly control. Every spot in town must be cleaned of garbage and trash. If a few dirty places are left, swarms of flies will breed. A neglected stable on the edge of town will furnish a plague of flies for the entire neighborhood. After garbage and trash have been removed, insecticides will help to reduce the fly population in local spots. It is a temporary protection, however, and should be regarded only as a supplemental or emergency means of control. Insecticide spraying will be effective only if sanitary conditions are maintained throughout the summer.

#### Here's Pointers On THE DRAFT LAW

ARTICLE III

Young men of draft age who ask for and get deferments under certain conditions automatically extend the time during which they can be drafted by nine years. be drafted by nine years.

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director names the following type of deferred men, among others, who have their liability for service extended until age 35:

1. Members of the ROTC and other officer training programs.

2. Students deferred to go to high school or college under requirements of law; college students deferred under authority of the local board.

3. Men left at home for civilian employment.

4. Men deferred to farm.

5. Married men deferred because of their children or because of extreme hardship and privation to aegendents.

6. Men classified as mentally, physically, or morally deficient or defective.

"The regulations spell this out," General Wakefield says. "So when a man gets the privilege of a deferment he is taking on a corresponling responsibility. The man who never receives a deferment like these cannot be drafted after he reaches his 26th birthday."

The state draft director says that under this provision of law, it is possible for a deferred man to lose nis qualification for deferment at age 34, for example. Under such circumstances, he would again be eligible for draft.
