DEATH CLAIMS MRS. M. H. HAVINS PIONEER WOMAN

Death came Tuesday to Mrs. M. H. Havins, 86, one of Robert Lee's oldest and most respected citizens. Her passing occurred at 10:45 a. m. at the Coke County Memorial Hospital.

She was hospitalized following a fall at her home three weeks ago when she sustained a fractured arm just below the shoulder. Complications set in, resulting in her death.

Funeral services were held from the Primitive Baptist Church here Wednesday afternoon, in charge of the Rev. Ray Lee, Jake Richardson and L. L. Bodine. Grandsons serving as pallbearers were Charlie Vowell, Otto Havins, R. D. Winans, Murphy Havins, Gene Roberts and Cleo Havins. Burial was in Robert Lee cemetery beside the remains of her late husband.

Clara Wyatt was born Feb. 26, 1867, in Cook County, Texas. She married Milton H. Havins in Coleman County on Jan. 5, 1882. They came to Coke County in January, community, southeast of Robert Lee.

The Havins family was active in community affairs and Mr. Havins served two terms as County Commissioner. His death occurred Nov. 12, 1941.

Mrs. Havins continued to reside in her own home here in Robert Lee. She joined the Methodist Church at the age of 12 years and later united with the Primitive Baptist Church.

Mrs. Havins is survived by four daughters and five sons. They are: Mrs. Eva Vowell, Abilene, Mrs. Mae Winans, San Antonio, Mrs. Ed S. (Bernice) Roberts, Schulenburg, and Mrs. Bessie Caudle, Corona, Calif., Pat and Fern Havins of Robert Lee, Fred of Midland, Mike of San Angelo and R. L. Havins of California.

She also leaves a brother, Henry Wyatt, of Robert Lee. There are 37 grandchildren and 58 great grandchildren.

JAMES MANCILL NAMED COACH AT ROBERT LEE

As previously mentioned in The Observer James T. Mancill has been employed as the new athletic coach of Robert Lee High School. He will take over his duties Sept. 1 but plans to move his family to Robert Lee early in the summer.

The new coach has been connected with the Colorado City school system the past two years, serving as junior high coach in 1951-52 and as B-team mentor last season and this spring. He coached football, basketball and track the first year and the same the second. The Colorado City B team captured four football games and lost two but had to forfeit two others because of the outbreak of polio in the city.

Mancill came to Colorado City from Lovington, N. M., where he was an assistant football and track coach. He graduated from Sul Ross in Alpine in January, 1950.

Born in 1929 in Big Spring, Mancill's family moved to Menard in 1945. The new Robert Lee coach graduated from Menard High School in 1947 and entered Sul Ross the same year.

While attending the Alpine school, Mancill participated in football in 1948 and 1949, lettering one year at guard. The Lobos captured the conference title both years that Mancill played and traveled to the Tangerine Bowl at Orlando, Fla., in 1948.

Mrs. Mancill is the former Miss Peggy Miller of Menard and the couple has one son, three years of age.

Parents of the new coach are Mr. and Mrs. M. M. Mancill, Menard ranchers.

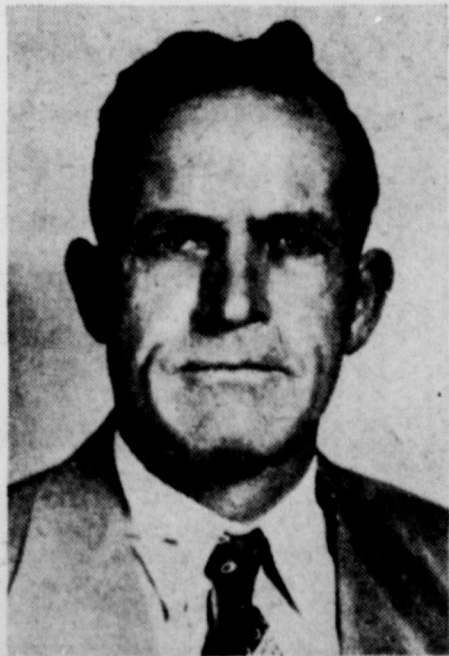
Buddy Havins lifted a long fly over the left fielder in the seventh for a home run.

Saturday the Robert Lee High School Band took part in the Regional Interscholastic League Competition-Festival at San Angelo.

The Band rated second division in both concert playing and sight reading. In solo, entered from here was one first division and three second divisions. Ensemble entries rated two seconds and one third division.

Bands, solos and ensembles are rated against a standard of excellence, not against one another. Division I is the best conceivable performance, 95-100.

Division II is an unusual performance but with minor defects, 87-95.

Division III is a good performance, but not outstanding, 80-87.

Division IV is an average performance but lacking major qualities, 75-80.

Division V is a poor performance with much room for improvement.

Since this marks the first entry of the band into the League, the rating is one that the band students and director are proud of.

Mr. H. C. Gilligan, Music Supervisor, Kermit Schools: "This is a capable band and one that can really come through as it grows, nice performance. Need more lower instruments."

Mr. Oakley Pittman, Southern Methodist University: "This is a nice group, very pleasant to listen to. Congratulations."

Mr. Maurice McAdoo, North Texas State Teachers College: "This is an immature group with some musical problems to iron out. A good performance for this size band."

Mr. Robert Maddox, Odessa Public Schools: "A courteous and well disciplined group. One that is a pleasure to work with."

Important Notice to Persons Holding Notary Public Commissions

Secretary of State Howard Carney has announced that he will reappoint all persons who now hold Notary Public Commissions and that all such persons must qualify by filing an oath and bond with the County Clerk of their residence between June 1, 1953 and June 10, 1953. The law specifically requires County Clerks to approve Notary bonds and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State. All Notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the County Clerk acts thereon.

Any person who has not heretofore been a Notary Public should apply to his County Clerk between May 1, 1953 and May 23, 1953, if he desires to have this application given prompt attention in the State Department, as the rush of reappointing all old Notaries may slow up the ordinary process of making new appointments and issuing commissions.

Secretary of State Carney said, "Each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the County for which he is appointed; exact names and permanent addresses should be given to the County Clerk in applying for a commission, as location of the Notary may be necessary long after he has notarized a particular instrument."

Johnny William Meek was born in Mississippi on Nov. 14, 1872.

On December 25, 1895 he was united in marriage to Charlotte Lamb of Coke County, Texas. To this union were born five children, Millard, Dewey, Albert, Theo and Mattie Bell.

They lived in Coke County, Texas until 1917 when they moved to Edgewood, New Mexico where he was engaged in farming. On November 29, 1937 Charlotte passed away and Johnny made his home with his daughter, Mattie Bell. Since 1947 he lived in Albuquerque, New Mexico and was a member of The Edith Street Baptist Church.

Johnny Mack passed away April 27, 1953 at the age of 80 years, 5 months and 13 days.

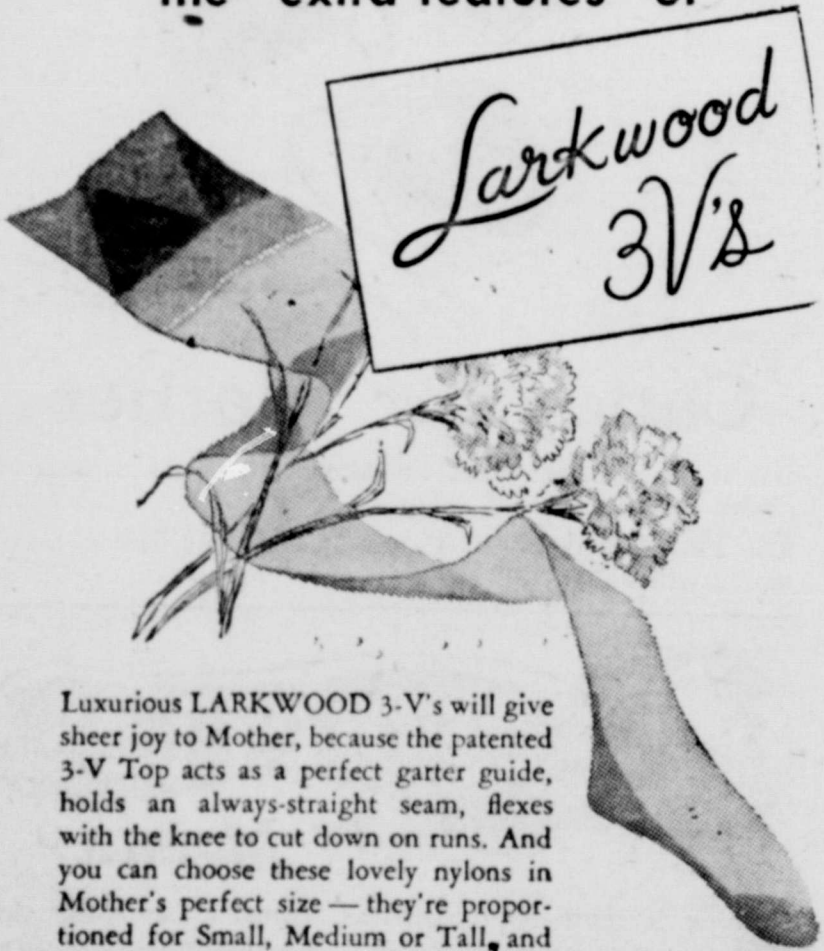
