## TRIMBLE GETS NEW TRIAL IN DAMAGE SUIT

A new trial was granted Wednesday in the \$438,000 damage suit of Jack Trimble. Judge Joe L. Mays made the ruling in a District Court hearing after attorneys for the plaintiff claimed misconduct during last month's trial.

The jury had denied Trimble damages in his suit against E. P. Dannelly. All of the 12 jurors, who decided the outcome of the trial a few weeks ago, were examined at the hearing Wednesday.

Marvin Hanz of San Angelo, one of Trimble's attorneys, alleged that:

1. The issues submitted precluded the jury from considering evidence as to the speed of Dannelly's vehicle except at the instance of impact.

### MUCH OF CASE

Hanz said the plaintiff had based much of his case on the speed of the car before the brakes were applied.

2. Two jurors who went to the scene of the accident to reconstruct speed and stops discussed their findings during deliberations and during a jury recess.

3. The jury considered evidence they were not instructed to consider.

The San Angelo attorney contended that the jurors took into account testimony of a highway patrolman that Trimble was in violation of the law when he crossed the highway.

"A number of jurors said the decision would have been different had they considered the speed before the accident and not considered testimony of the highway patrolman," Hanz said.

4. When a dispute over the word "immediately" arose, one of the jurors went home and referred to Webster's dictionary for a definition, as well as asking a librarian what she considered the definition.

### NEW EVIDENCE

5. There is newly-discovered evidence as to the speed of Dannelly's vehicle.

Judge Mays said the new trial will be subject to call after civil jury week begins here early in August.

Trimble, 40, a Robert Lee oilfield worker, was hospitalized for 75 days with injuries suffered in the accident, which happened 3.1 miles south of Robert Lee on Highway 280. Trimble was driving a pickup truck and Dannelly was operating an automobile when the collision occurred.

The first trial, which lasted six days, was a hard-fought legal battle from the very first between Hanz and Jerome Pope of Odessa, attorneys for the plaintiff, and Don Case and Herby Strasburger of Dallas and B. W. Smith of San Angelo, representing Dannelly.

Answering 38 special issues, the jury ruled that Trimble had suffered \$50,000 damages, but that he was negligent in the collision. Thus, Trimble was prevented from receiving any payment for his injuries. The group also ruled that Dannelly was in no way negligent in the mishap.

## CHEAP FEED IS COMING IN FOR DROUTH AREAS

The government program to provide cheap livestock feed in drought stricken areas of the southwest began rolling this week. The first carload of corn for Coke County was being unloaded on the Santa Fe tracks in Bronte.

Shipments of cotton seed cake and oats are expected to arrive in the near future.

J. E. Quisenberry, county PMA secretary, stated the Drouth Disaster Committee held its first meeting here Tuesday and approved all applications on file.

G. C. Allen of Robert Lee and L. T. Youngblood of Bronte were named on the committee to represent the banks, while Wilson Bryan was chosen as the farmer member. O. E. Kresta, county PMA chairman, is also chairman of the Drouth Disaster committee, and County Agent T. B. Hicks is a member of the group. The other member of the committee is the district PMA director, Paul Shillenberger of Sweetwater.

The PMA has been a busy place since blanks for signing up feed applications became available. Up to Wednesday noon 700 tons cake had been ordered, 100 tons of cotton seed meal, 250 tons of corn and 80 tons of oats.

Prices for the feed, about one-half the present market figures, are: cotton seed cake and meal, \$35 ton; corn, \$1.00 per bushel and oats 50 cents a bushel. The big car which arrived in Bronte Tuesday night contained 108,000 pounds of shelled corn from Nebraska.

Feed will be sold only to carry through basic livestock operations and is not available for commercial feeding purposes. Efforts will be made to get some hay allocated along with the grain.

Drouth conditions become more serious by the week. Congress is taking up a proposal to make more credit available to livestock men plagued by the drouth. Action was expected Thursday.

Livestock men of five southwestern states were to hold a meeting in Dalhart Thursday to organize a new association. Launched by a Dalhart banker a few days ago, it was brought out at a preliminary gathering that present officials of the livestock association were wealthy men with other interests, and were not representing their groups by refusing to ask for government price supports.

Leaders denounced would include Ray Willoughby of San Angelo, and Jack Roach and Jay Taylor, both of Amarillo.

Governors of the same five states will meet in Amarillo Friday to discuss the drouth situation.

The second monthly meeting of the Robert Lee Board of Community Development is scheduled for Thursday night, July 16, at the school cafeteria. President Bob Vaughan says an interesting program of local interest is being arranged. Members of the Lions Club and all other interested citizens are invited to attend. ## Here's Pointers On THE DRAFT LAW

### ARTICLE IX

The rights of men registered with a draft board are guarded by appeal regulations. Appeals from local board decisions are heard by four state appeal boards.

Both the national and state directors of Selective Service may appeal from the determination of a local board at any time.

A man registered with a board, any person who claims to be his dependent, his employer under certain circumstances, and others may appeal to the appeal board from any classification except a determination of physical or mental condition.

The registered man and others named in the above paragraph, in most cases, are allowed only 10 days from date a notice of classification is mailed to file the appeal. Regulations allow a longer period, from 30 to 60 days, when the man is in certain U. S. territories, foreign countries, or on the high seas.

The local board may allow appeals beyond these time limits if it is satisfied that the failure of the person to appeal within the period was due to lack of understanding or to some cause beyond control of the person.

The person who desires to appeal must file written notice with the board. The notice need not be in any particular form but must state the registrant's name, and identity of person appealing. If a registrant is registered with a Texas board and is working or living in California, for example, he may appeal to a California appeal board if he wishes.

If the registrant is placed in a class available for military service (1-A) by the appeal board, and there is a dissenting vote, he may appeal to the President of the United States.

### FACTS ABOUT BEEF

Beef is plentiful. That is good news to millions of American housewives. It means they can afford to include beef on their menus more often nowadays. Record numbers of cattle coming to market have brought beef prices in recent weeks to the lowest point they have been in many years.

Beef is popular with the whole family and contains nutrients needed by all ages. It provides good quality protein, important for body building and repair. Lean beef also is a valuable source of B vitamins and of phosphorus and iron. Even the least expensive cuts contain all of these food values. Liver also is excellent as a blood builder because of its iron and copper content.

Proper storage of beef in the home is important. Fresh beef should be stored, loosely covered, in the very coldest part of the refrigerator and should be used within a few days. Variety meats such as liver are especially perishable and should be used within two days. Ground beef should be held only one day unless frozen.

## Home Demonstration Department

### TWO FRUITS A DAY

Did you know there are more than 40 different fruits that you can prepare for family meals? You can serve these fruits in 150 different ways, too.

Jonell Black, home demonstration agent for the Texas Agricultural Service, says that's an average of three ways to prepare each kind of fruit, so it should be an easy matter to get the TWO FRUITS A DAY that the Texas Food Standard suggests for safe eating.

Eating two fruits a day is pretty good insurance for the Vitamin C which the body needs fresh every day. Vitamin C is the factor which has become identified as a nutrient essential to the healthy growth and maintenance of teeth, bones, tissues and blood. Vitamin C cannot be stored in the body from day to day and is usually destroyed in cooking.

Lack of vitamin C in the daily diet may show in any place in your body—in skin surfaces, teeth, the bones, muscles, blood. It is helpful in the healing of wounds.

Two fruits a day will supply the amount most of us need. All the familiar citrus fruits are bountiful sources of Vitamin C—half a glass or four ounces of orange or grapefruit juice, canned or fresh, goes far toward meeting a day's needs. The same is true of half a grapefruit, a whole orange, or a couple of tangerines.

There are many suggestions for getting fresh fruits in the diet—ice cream, sherbet, or drinks made with the fruit juices are excellent and appetizing.

The drouth continues to increase the danger from fires. All citizens are urged to be careful with trash fires and motorists are especially urged not to throw lighted matches, cigarettes or cigars onto highway right-of-ways.

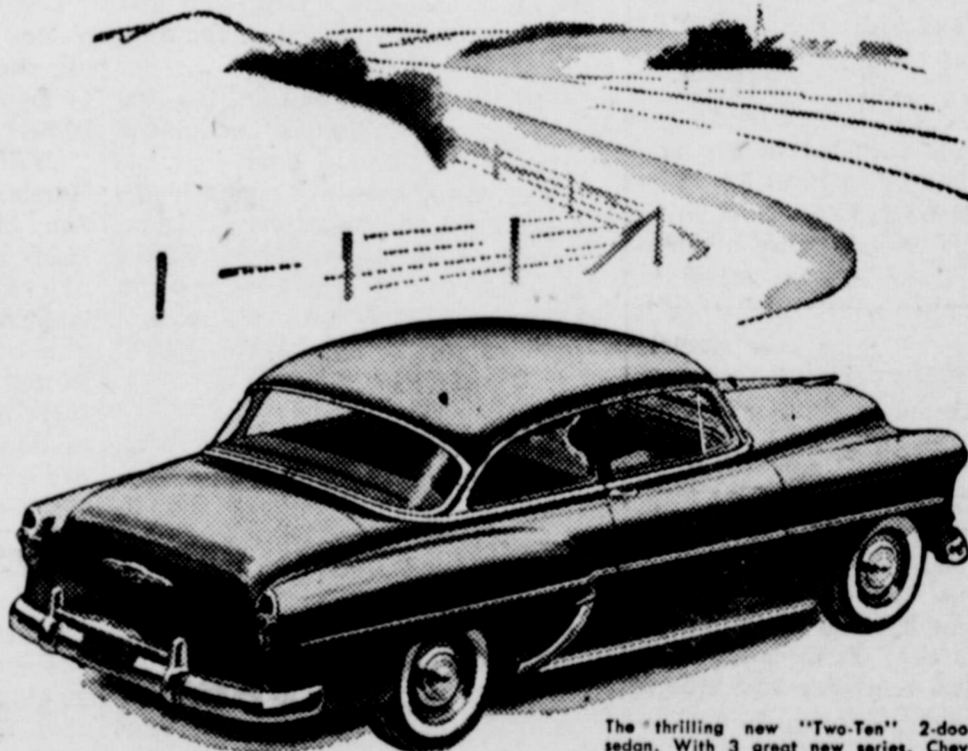

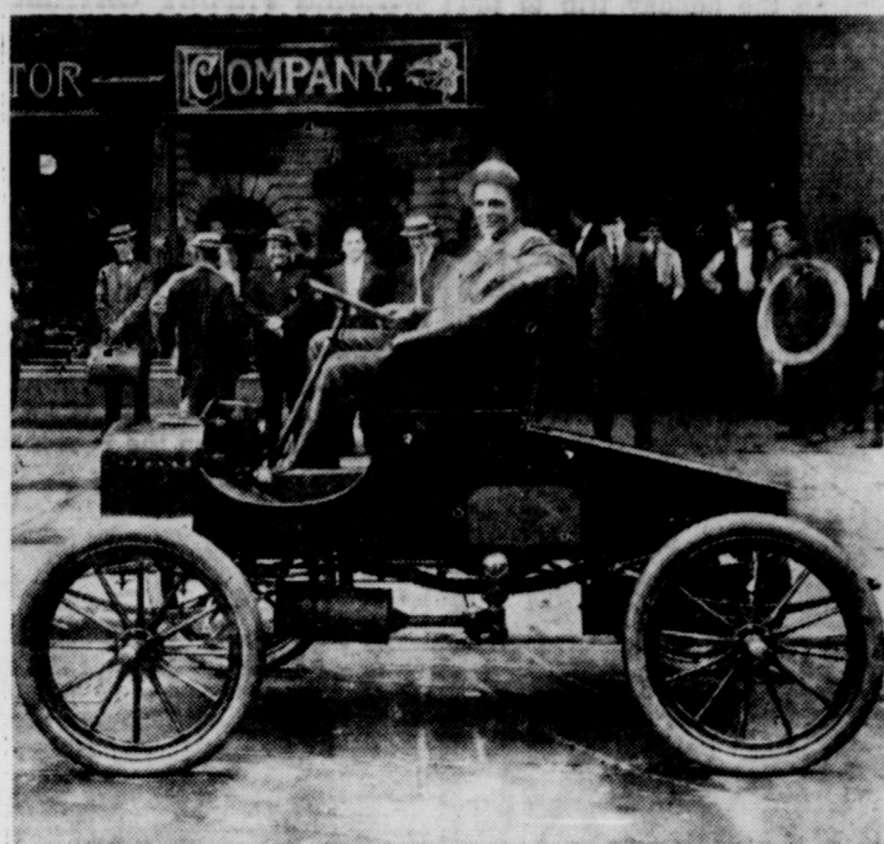
## HAYRICK HD CLUB

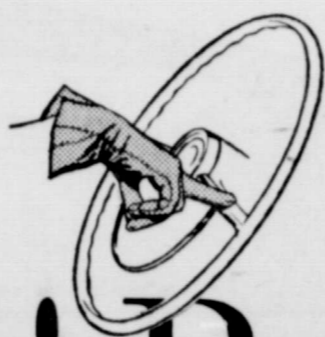

## HEALTH TALKS

Prepared By The

If you complain of "kidney trouble," your doctor probably won't know exactly what you mean until he questions you further, since the term covers a lot of territory. However, four of the commonest diseases lumped under this catch-all are (1) kidney stones, (2) prostrate trouble, (3) acute inflammation of the urinary bladder (cystitis), and (4) blood in the urine (hematuria).

Although kidney stones most frequently form in the kidney, they are found at times in other parts of the urinary tract. They may be of varying size, shape, and hardness. Only one of a number of stones may be present. Luckily, most stones pass on to the outside and perhaps are not accompanied by pain. However, if they stick somewhere in the urinary passage, they may cause severe colicky pain or stop the flow of urine, making an operation to remove them necessary.

Men who have the most trouble with prostate disease are those of middle age and older. They may notice it becomes increasingly harder to pass urine and may have to empty the bladder several times each night. The prostate becomes enlarged, but the exact reason is unknown. No medicine will reduce its size, although in mild cases of enlargement heat and massage may be helpful. If the stream of urine is lessened sufficiently or cut off altogether, a doctor must perform an operation to remove the gland.

The symptoms of acute cystitis usually are relatively severe and its course (even without treatment) as a rule is fairly short lived. Patients with this condition feel the urge to pass urine more frequently. They may have pain with urination and the urine perhaps appears cloudy or contains pus or blood. Fever may be present.

Treatment requires that the germ responsible and the exact part of the urinary tract which is "feeding" the infection to the bladder (which normally is very resistant to disease) be located. Usually acute cystitis responds promptly to measures such as bed rest, hot baths or applying heat over the bladder, lots of fluids by mouth, and medicine given for the specific germ causing the infection. Pain may be relieved by medicine also.

If treatment is not successful within a reasonable length of time, a complete investigation including repeated analysis of the urine, a cystoscopic examination and x-ray tests should be done. A cystoscope is an instrument passed through the urethra (the tube that conducts urine from the bladder to the outside) which allows the examiner to see the inside of the bladder.

Blood in the urine may have a number of causes, the most common ones being kidney stones, acute cystitis, and cancer. In women inflammation or stones in the urinary tract most often are the causes, but in men older than 50 years of age bleeding has a 50-50 chance of being due to an abnormal growth such as cancer. Early diagnosis and removal of cancer leads to a greater chance for cure.

Anyone who has blood in the urine should have a urologic examination, even if no pain is present. Bleeding from cancer usually is only occasional, and only rarely is pain an early symptom of the disease. The urologic investigation may be made even before bleeding stops; it most likely will include the passage of tiny tubes about the size of piano wires into the tubes leading from the kidneys to the bladder, a cystoscopic examination, and x-rays made with dyes or opaque substances injected to make the urinary organs show up well on x-ray films.

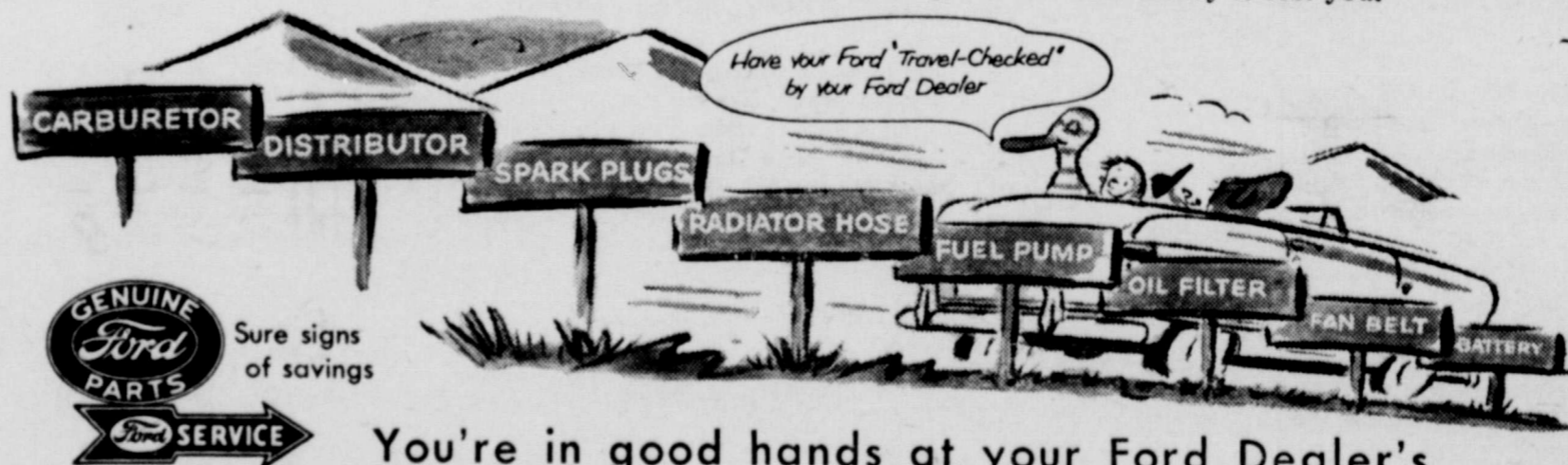

## 7,571 Employees Of Sun Oil Company Made Stockholders

Philadelphia, Pa., July 6—More than \$9,250,000 worth of Sun Oil Company common stock is being distributed to 7,571 company employees.

They participated in a plan for buying stock, with the company contributing one dollar for every two dollars they invested. Now the plan has matured, and certificates for 130,455 shares are being distributed to them.

In total shares distributed and in the number of Sun men and women who benefitted, this plan—the 23rd in a series which matures annually—broke all records.

The plan liquidated June 30 started in 1948, when for a 12-month period Sun employees subscribed up to 10 per cent of their wages to buy Sun Oil stock. All employees with one or more years of service are eligible, on a voluntary basis to participate.

All stock that was bought was held by trustees until June 30.

Sun Oil Company began the annual stock plans in 1925 and since that time more than 840,000 shares have been acquired by employees in this manner. Now employees comprise almost half of Sun's 15,277 stockholders.

A new Stock Plan—the 28th—began July 1. Approximately 12,000 employees are participating.

Trustees of the plan broke down the total of 130,455 shares in the current liquidation as follows:

Shares purchased by employee's investments, 53,112; shares purchased by contributions of the Company, 26,556; and shares in the surplus fund which were also distributed to employees on a proportion-

ate basis, 50,787. Thus for every share bought with his or her own money, every employee got slightly less than one and one-half additional shares.

The Surplus Fund of each plan accumulates stock from sources such as stock dividends, stock and cash dividends on stock dividends and the Company's contributions for purchase of stock in employee accounts which, because of voluntary withdrawals by employees, are closed out before the plan's liquidation.

## Congress Urged To Continue Federal Aid For Highways

Austin, July 7—The 83rd session of Congress should not go into history without taking favorable action on a bill to provide approximately \$200 million of Federal funds for highway construction, J. H. Kultgen of Waco, President of the Texas Good Roads Association, has advised Texas members.

In a letter addressed to Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, Senator Price Daniel and Representative Sam Rayburn, Kultgen urged every effort to bring about passage of road assistance under either the Dempsey or the Dondero bill.

Gen. Ike Ashburn, Executive Vice President of the Texas Good Roads Association, last week appeared before the House Subcommittee of the Public Works Committee in Washington. He told the committee members Texas economy is dependent upon more money for highways.

Under the present formula, based on highway mileage and motor fuel tax payments, Texas would get from \$16 to \$25 million additional Federal funds for interstate highways.
