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## TWISTERS PLAY SKYHAWKS IN LEAGUE FINALS

Finals of the Shaughnessy playoff in the Concho Basin League get under way here next Sunday when the Rabbit Twisters meet the Skyhawks of Goodfellow AFB.

It will be a two out of three series, with the winners taking 60% of the \$300 jackpot. The purse was made up by each of the six league members paying in a \$50 entry fee.

Goodfellow went into the finals by trimming Texon in two straight games. The score of last Sunday's game on the Goodfellow diamond was 14-11. Robert Lee downed Bryan Electric in the semifinals.

## TO MAKE WATER WORKS REPAIRS

Repairs on Robert Lee's water system, damaged by flood waters last week, are expected to get under way in the near future.

Temporary lines, which were connected up when the big 8-inch main broke are furnishing the city with sufficient water at present. A contract to repair the big pipe has been let by city officials to W. E. Kimrey & Son of San Angelo. It will be necessary to purchase two lengths of 8-inch. The job will be handled on a cost-plus basis.

Directors of the Upper Colorado River Authority were to meet in Robert Lee Thursday of this week to take action on making repairs to the Mountain Creek Dam spillway. Engineers have checked the project and will meet with UCRA and city officials.

The spillway washed out on the backside, while the portion nearest the lake shore remains intact. Contrary to some reports, the dam itself was not in danger of going out.

Cost of the spillway repairs, which may reach \$6,000 or more, will be paid by the UCRA. The amount will be added to the principal sum of \$82,000, overall cost of the dam and filtering plant, which is being paid off by the city at the rate of \$350 per month.

## CEMETERY NOTICE

## Coke Farmers Get 72 Carloads Of Government Feed

Coke County farmers and ranchmen have received 72 carloads of feed under the government drought relief program. It was divided as follows: 48 cars of cake, 6 meal, 7 oats, 2 wheat and 9 corn.

Practically all orders for corn and cake have been filled, according to County PMA Secretary J. E. Quisenberry.

Mr. Quisenberry also adds that a considerable number of feed orders have been cancelled, owing to the fact that recent rains have improved the crop outlook in Coke County. Grazing should be much better in another week or two and a big acreage of late feed will be planted.

No stockman is going to order government feed if he doesn't need it even if it can be obtained at half, Quisenberry predicted.

## PETTIT JURY TO REPORT MONDAY

Judge Joe L. Mays will resume District Court for Coke County next Monday when a panel of 48 petit jurors have been notified to report at 10 a. m.

State cases will be taken up first to be followed by civil suits. Six indictments were returned by the recent grand jury, but three of those cited have not been apprehended and their names have not been made public.

A. A. Griggs of Odessa, charged with receiving and concealing stolen property, was taken into custody last week and is free under \$1,500 bond. Other indictments are against Everett Jimerson, who is alleged to have stolen oil field property at Silver and disposed of same to Griggs. Albert Edward Poe, 21, is charged with rape.

### TRIMBLE CASE POSTPONED

The \$435,000 personal damage suit of Jack Trimble will not come up for a second trial at this time because the defendant, E. P. Dannelly, is seriously ill in a hospital at Temple. Dist. Clerk Weldon Fikes aid a doctor's certificate has been filed in regard to the man's illness and attorneys for Trimble agreed to postponement of the trial.

Two or three compensation cases are on the docket for trial next week.

Judge Mays points out that a recent legislative act provides that District Court for Coke County shall be in continuous session. A term opening the first week in August will run until a new term starts the first week in February.

## SUN REPORTS 4 NEW PRODUCERS IN SILVER AREA

Sun Oil Company reports four new producers in the Jameson Field at Silver, three of them in Coke County and the other in southeastern Mitchell County on the Victor McCabe lease. Production on all is from the Strawn sand.

Sun 47 C. E. Mathers flowed 143 barrels of oil, no water, during its official 24-hour test. Gauge was through 11/64 in choke. Tubing pressure was 840 pounds, with packer set on the casing. Gas-oil ratio 1,995-1.

Sun 33 Mathers was gauged for a daily flow of 180 barrels of oil, no water, through 11/64 inch choke. Tubing pressure 900 pounds, with packer on the casing. Gas-oil ratio 1,490-1.

Sun 6 Victor McCabe flowed 157 barrels of oil, no water, during its potential 24 hour test. Gauge was through an 11/64 inch tubing choke. Pressure was 250 pounds on the tubing, with packer on the casing. Gas-oil ratio 965-1.

Sun B-2 J. B. Walker flowed 99 barrels of oil, no water, during a 15-hour test ending at 7 a.m. Tuesday. Gauge was through an 11/64 choke. Pressures were 800 pounds on the tubing and 275 pounds on the casing. Gas-oil ratio 1,501-1.

Sun continues to have six rotary rigs drilling in the Silver area, according to Supt. Jake Higginbotham.

Empire Drilling Co. is on Sun Tubb B-3 and was in shale at 2,608 feet Tuesday morning.

Sun Mathers A-15 drilled to a total depth of 6,010 feet and was waiting on cement to harden on oil string. Morris-Hamilton is the drilling contractor.

Sun A-6 Anderson, north of Silver in Mitchell County, was also waiting on cement after drill to a total depth of 6,050 feet. Ray-Harris is the contractor.

Baker & Taylor is drilling on Sun B-3 Central National Bank, south of the river at Silver, and Tuesday was in shale and lime at 1,480 feet.

Another B & T rig is on Sun 23 Homer Jameson. It was drilling ahead Tuesday at 2,000 feet in shale and lime.

Sun 7 Victor McCabe, north of Silver in Mitchell County, was drilling Tuesday at 4,196 feet in shale. Carl Short is the contractor.

## HEALTH TALKS

The duties and responsibilities of two medical specialists, the anesthesiologist and the pathologist, may not be well understood by the average person.

The anesthesiologist, who with the surgeon shares the responsibility for the patient's safety during surgery, has the following specific functions to perform:

1. To review the patient's records and confer with the attending physician to find out the patient's general condition before surgery in preparation for giving the anesthetic.

2. To decide, in conference with the surgeon, the anesthetic and method of anesthesia, also the drugs (if they are to be used) to be given beforehand to relieve fear and tension and make the anesthetic easier and more comfortable for the patient.

3. To keep a constant watch on the patient's condition during surgery by counting the pulse and respiration, measuring the blood pressure, watching the patient's color and general appearance, and other similar measures.

4. To report at intervals on the patient's progress to the surgeon, who, although perhaps he has to concentrate chiefly on the details of the surgical technique, nevertheless is deeply interested in this vital information.

5. To see that the patient's condition remains good throughout surgery by giving blood transfusions, injections of fluids by vein, and other drugs as needed.

6. To keep an accurate written record of all important data about the operation.

7. To return the patient to his bed, to see that a nurse or attendant stays with him as long as needed, and in consultation with the surgeon to leave instructions for the patient's care after surgery.

The usual domain of the anesthesiologist is the operating room; that of the pathologist is the hospital's laboratory. The pathologist is a physician who limits his practice to laboratory medicine, which is basically concerned with the nature and causes of disease. His tools are the microscope, incubator, centrifuge, and other equipment commonly found in the medical laboratory.

The field of duties of the pathologist is vast; his examination usually contributes greatly toward diagnosis. As examples, he performs and interprets special tests, examines tissue removed at operation or autopsy, studies bacteria—helpful and harmful, and studies blood and problems of blood transfusion.

By his diagnosis the pathologist also influences directly or indirectly the course of treatment. A pathological report on tissue examined during operation may determine whether surgery is to be conservative or radical; the establishment of the diagnosis of diabetes through specific tests may determine whether or not insulin therapy is to be used.

The pathologist counsels interns and residents in the skillful use of laboratory procedures and teaches them how to select tests that will cover the requirements of a given bedside problem at the least cost of money and time. He confers with the attending physician as a consultant to work out any laboratory problems that arise and joins other doctors in staff meetings and dis-

cussions for the purpose of improving the quality of medical care given patients in the hospital. Finally, he trains medical technicians who work with him, supervises their work, and interprets the results of tests they perform, as well as those he does.

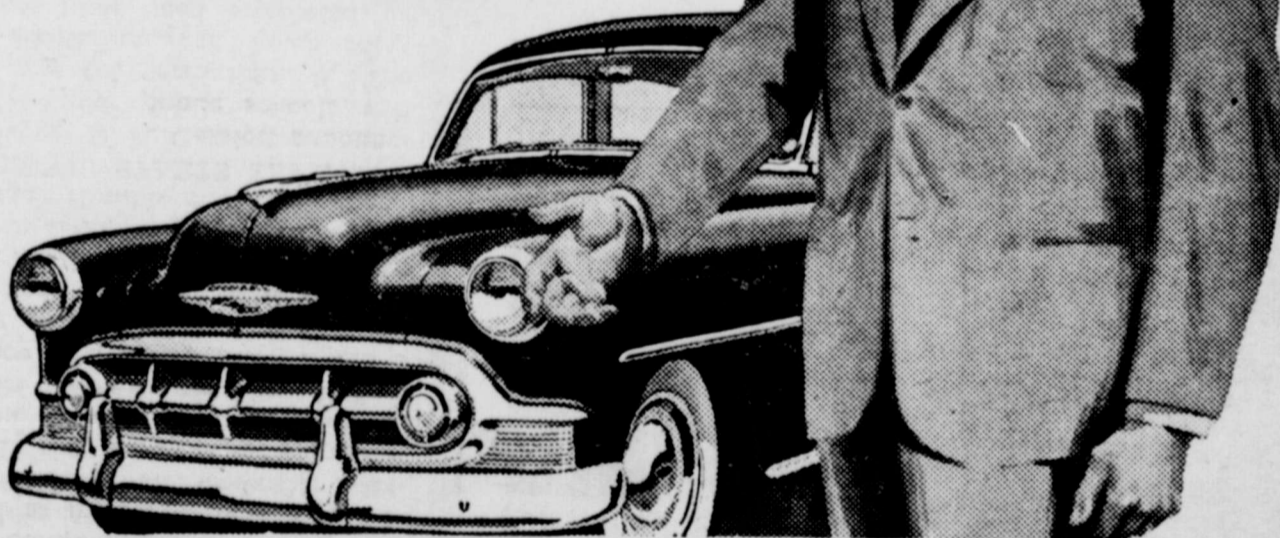

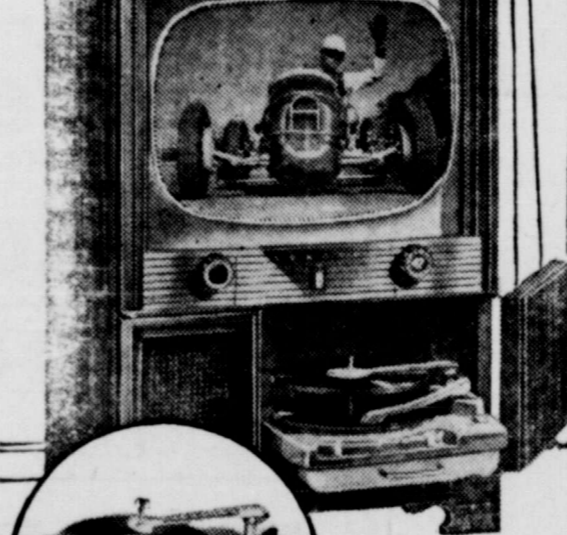

Today the couple is celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary with an open house at the Park Homes Community Center.

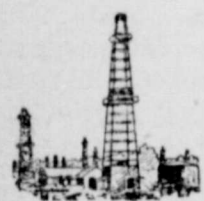
They were married in Robert Lee Thursday, Aug. 9, 1903. A portion of the account in the Observer follows:
