DATA ON NEW SCHOOL BUILDING WILL BE AIRED TUESDAY NIGHT

Considerable preliminary work in connection with submitting a proposal for a new school building in Robert Lee has been done. Now the public is invited to attend an open meeting next Tuesday night, when various phases of the project will be aired.

A. V. Sheppard, school board president, says a big turnout is hoped for. Everyone is or should be interested in good schools whether or not they have children of school age. The school trustees says it is up to the people to make it known whether or not they favor the project.

The meeting is set for 6:30 Tuesday night, Nov. 24, and everyone will have an opportunity to ask questions and make suggestions. Definite information on cost and a preliminary sketch of the proposed building and other pertinent information will be brought before the group.

At a session of the school trustees Tuesday night of last week the firm of Wilson & Patterson of Ft. Worth was retained as architects. They were selected from four applicants.

Tuesday night of this week the board interviewed bond purchasers and the contract went to Gordon Charlton and Ted Alexander, representing Columbian Securities Corp. of Texas, and R. A. Underwood & Co. They submitted the lowest bid of an average rate of 3.185 per cent interest.

C. M. Smith, representing the First Southwest Company, paired with T. A. Richardson of the Robert Lee State Bank in submitting a bid of 3.29 per cent. The estimated bond issue for a new school building is \$250,000 with the bonds to be retired in 21 years.

Present plans are for the construction of a new building to include auditorium and class rooms, while the present gymnasium and grade rooms would be retained. The original old high school building would be abandoned under the new proposal.

300 Bales Cotton Have Been Ginned

Cotton pullers remain scarce in this locality and as a result the gin is only turning out from 5 to 12 bales dally.

Cotton is being brought to the local gin from Bronte, Blackwell and out on the Divide toward Sterling City.

Four Projects Slated in Coke County Fields

Applications have been filed to drill two outposts and two step-outs to production in Coke County fields.

Stanolind Oil and Gas. Co. will drill its 4 J. E. Chappell 1/2-mile southwest of production on the northwest side of the Jameson (Strawn) field, 20 miles northeast of Sterling City.

Rotary drilling to 6,400 feet will begin when permit is received.

Location, on a 7,865.85-acre tract, is 768 feet from the southeast and 2,024 feet from the southwest lines of 1-15-SPRR.

WENDKIRK TESTS

Kewanee Oil Co. will drill two 5,000-foot rotary tests in the Wendkirk (Cisco) field, six miles southwest of Bronte.

Kewanee 4-B Wend, 1/2-mile south and slightly east, is 800 feet from the northwest and 2,490 feet from the middle northeast line of 1-Thos. Hennessy survey. Estimated elevation is 1,807 feet.

Kewanee 1-C Wend, 3/8-mile southwest, is 330 feet from the southeast and 4,200 feet from the southwest lines of 456-Erdmann Girke survey. Drilling, on the 218.15-acre tract, will begin when permit is approved.

A. G. Hill of Abilene has filed application to drill his 10 Ralph Harris Estate 3/8-mile northeast of production in the one-well Lygay, South (Caddo) field of Coke County, 25 miles northwest of Robert Lee.

The project will be drilled with rotary to 7,000 feet. Operations are to begin Nov. 15.

Location, on a 4,275-acre tract, is 467 feet from the south and 2,100 feet from the west lines of 11-Winfield Scott survey.

A. G. Hill 8 Ralph Harris estate, the discovery well, was finished June 19, 1951, for a daily potential of 104 barrels of 41 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 954-1. The Caddo was topped at 6,740 feet on elevation of 2,069 feet. Production was from between 6,771-75 feet.

FIELD DEPLETED

Allen Guiberson 1 Lassiter, lone producer in the San Benito field of Coke County, has been abandoned as a depleted well.

Located in 308-1A-H&TC, 14 miles northeast of Robert Lee, the well was completed June 30, 1948 for a daily potential of 222 barrels of 47 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 2238-1. Production was from between 6,495-528 feet in the Marble Falls lime. Total depth is 6,528 feet. The Marble Falls was topped at 6,133 feet on elevation of 2,120 feet.

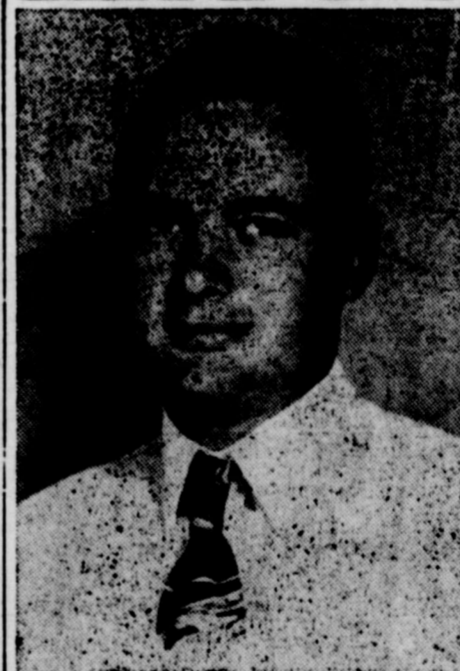
SUN 48 MATHERS FLOWS 253 BBLs.

Sun No. 48 C. E. Mathers in the Jameson field at Silver has been completed for a daily potential flow of 253 barrels of oil, no water. Gauge was through an 11-64 inch choke. Production is from Strawn sand, the pay section having been treated with 6,000 gallons of sand oil. Tubing pressure was 1,075 pounds, with packer on the casing. Gas-oil ratio 1,510-1.

Empire Drilling Co. had the contract and moved to Sun 10 Victor McCabe in Mitchell County, 5 miles north of Silver. It is a 1 1/2 mile northwest extension to Sun's North Jameson field on McCabe and R. S. Anderson property. L. F. (Tiny) Pettit is the Empire tool pusher.

Sun 10 McCabe cemented surface casing at 514 feet, and was drilling Wednesday morning at 807 feet.

Sun 8 Central National Bank (Blanks Estate) drilled to total depth of 6,110 feet and was running 7-inch casing to bottom.

Mancill is serving his first year as a coach in Robert Lee. He was faced with a small and inexperienced squad when he took over Sept. 1, and several freshmen are being used in the starting lineup.

STEERS BATTLE LONGHORNS AT BRONTE TONITE

The 1953 football season comes to an end Friday night when Robert Lee High School Steers tangle with their friendly traditional rivals, the Bronte Longhorns. The contest will be played at Bronte, with kickoff time at 7:30.

This game is of great importance to Bronte, as a victory will give the Longhorns the 7-B District championship. They previously defeated Trent, the only other member of the 3-school circuit. On the other hand, Robert Lee would relish a win over the Longhorns to close out in a blaze of glory a season that has been far from successful.

Bronte licked Robert Lee at the start of the season by a score of 23 to 6, although that game didn't count in the conference standing. But the Steers were green and looked much better in winning from Ira and the Abilene Sophomores.

Bronte failed to win consistently although they knocked off a favored Trent club and then defeated Hobbs. Comparative records give the Longhorns a considerable edge over the Steers. Each of the Coke County teams suffered close defeats from Loraine, while Robert Lee made two touchdowns against Coahoma and the Longhorns were unable to score on the great Bulldog eleven.

Four seniors on the Robert Lee team are Hollis Lloyd, Bobby Walker, Bill Casey and James Robertson. Victor Collett, is a junior but will not be eligible another year. Bobby Walker received a neck injury after playing three games, and his loss was a severe blow.

Things were pretty blue in the Steer corral this week. Lynn Davidson, flashy halfback, was nursing an ankle sprain received Monday. Other players seemed to be in shape.

A big crowd will be on hand for the game Friday night and the Robert Lee band will participate in activities during the intermission. After the game the Steer squad will be served a turkey dinner at Y-Courts Cafe.

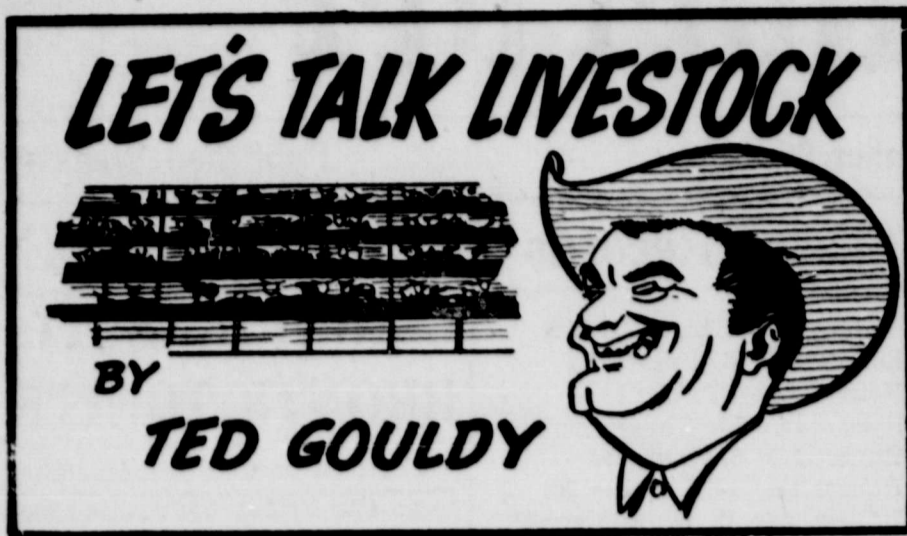

Fort Worth—The cattle business ran into trouble again this week. For better than two years just about everything seems to have hit the cow business that could hurt. In the wake of the year's biggest run of cattle to market just a couple of weeks ago, it was felt that certainly the excessive runs were now behind. But look at what happened!

Twelve major markets reported over 160,000 cattle and over 32,000 calves last Monday, the second biggest run of the year.

Following the frost that nipped a lot of Johnson grass and other pasture a week earlier, Fort Worth had its largest run of the year on Monday.

The reports from all markets were the same. Weak to 50 cents lower, some spots 50 cents to \$1 lower.

Cattle and calf prices were saved a worse break by the fact that demand for stocker and feeders was broad on the better kinds. Some 997 pound feeder steers at Fort Worth cashed at \$17. Numerous sales of high grade yearlings and calves were reported in the \$15 to \$17.50 bracket to stocker and feeder

outlets. There was a steady demand for replacement cows. Heifers and heifer calves have a hard time finding a home, except in a packing house.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings drew \$17 to \$23. Some shelly kinds sold from \$7 to \$9.

Fat cows cleared at \$9 to \$11.50, and a load of heiferettes topped at \$13 and averaged 887 pounds from G. R. Davis, Taylor County. Cannors and cutters drew \$6 to \$9, with some shelly low yielding cannors below \$6. Bulls cashed at \$7 to \$12.

Good and choice slaughter calves bulked at \$12.50 to \$16 and common and medium sorts sold from \$9 to \$12, with culls from \$7 to \$9.

Good and choice stocker and feeder calves and yearlings drew \$13 to \$17.50.

Hogs were steady to 50 higher, topping at \$20.75 to \$21.25. Sows were steady to 50 higher at \$19.50 down.

Most sheep and lambs were fully steady, some toppy feeders sold 50 cents higher. Feeder lambs drew \$14 to \$17.50, the lat-

ter a new high for the past few months. Woolled fat lambs drew \$16 to \$19, and shorn fat lambs from \$17.50 down. Lower grade lambs drew \$8 to \$14. Old ewes drew \$6 to \$6.50, with stocker ewes \$7 to \$10. Old wethers sold from \$7 to \$10. Slaughter yearlings sold from \$10 to \$15.

An unusual feature of the trade was some top sheep and lambs that came from Louisiana. Many people believe that East Texas and Louisiana are not a desirable ground for sheep raising, but in recent years a number of breeders are getting fine results.

One of these is A. H. Kelley, Benton, Louisiana, who on Monday at Fort Worth topped the market in several classes. His woolled lambs at 88 pounds top-

ped at \$19. Some aged wethers drew \$10. Yearlings sold a \$14. Kelley's sheep and lambs usually top their division when they come to Fort Worth.

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Texas Relatives May Claim \$7,000 German Estate

San Francisco, Nov. 19—A will-o-the-wisp search is under way in Texas today for two German immigrant brothers and their sister who would be quite aged if living and, therefore, more likely for their children or grandchildren who are wanted to claim a \$7,000 estate of which they obviously never heard.

The brothers, if still living, are Friedrich Wilhelm Jaeger, 92 years old; Gustav Ferdinand Jaeger, 89, and the sister, Mrs. Anna Elizabeth Maria Jaeger Koenig, 97. If they are dead, then their children would succeed to claim, with grandchildren next in line.

James W. Smith, probate genealogist, 1299 California St., San Francisco, who specializes in tracing missing relatives to settle estates, is directing the hunt, but without clues as to in what part of Texas members of the Jaeger family may now be living.

"Friedrich Wilhelm Jaeger and Gustav Ferdinand Jaeger, and Mrs. Koenig were born in Germany," Mr. Smith said, "and emigrated to this country while in their 20's or 30's. They are reported to have settled somewhere in Texas, but information as to just where is lacking. Mrs. Koenig was presumably accompanied by her husband. There are also indications that their descendants afterward scattered over the state. Since the translation of Koenig is "King" there is a possibility that the Koenigs or their children may have changed their name to King to Americanize it.

"The estate in question was left by a relative who died without descendants and under the circumstances it reverts to the elder Jaegers or, if they are dead, to their descendants."

Healthy Child Requires Well Balanced Diet

AUSTIN, TEXAS — In speaking about the food requirements of a child enjoying maximum health, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, emphasized the importance of a well rounded diet and stated that a healthy and well nourished child enjoys life because he is physically fit.

Stressing the importance to health of an adequate and well balanced diet, Dr. Cox stated further that when a child is in good health, his appetite is good, elimination regular and sleep is sound and untroubled.

"A child's appearance can usually help parents to judge the state of his nutrition. A well nourished child has good skin color and there is a moderate padding of fat over the bones and muscles of the arms, legs and body. Muscles are well developed and strong. Teeth are good and the gums firm and pink," Dr. Cox said.

That finicky appetite or a tired feeling after a little exertion indicates a possible malnutrition and the child should see the family physician. Poor appetite can also mean the beginning of an illness and possibly that the child does not require as much food as he is being urged to eat.

Required as a diet for the preschool child and those of school age, Dr. Cox included milk, vegetables, eggs, meat, fish or cheese, cereal and bread and added that cod liver oil and other vitamin preparations are important in

winter and early spring but should be prescribed by the family physician.

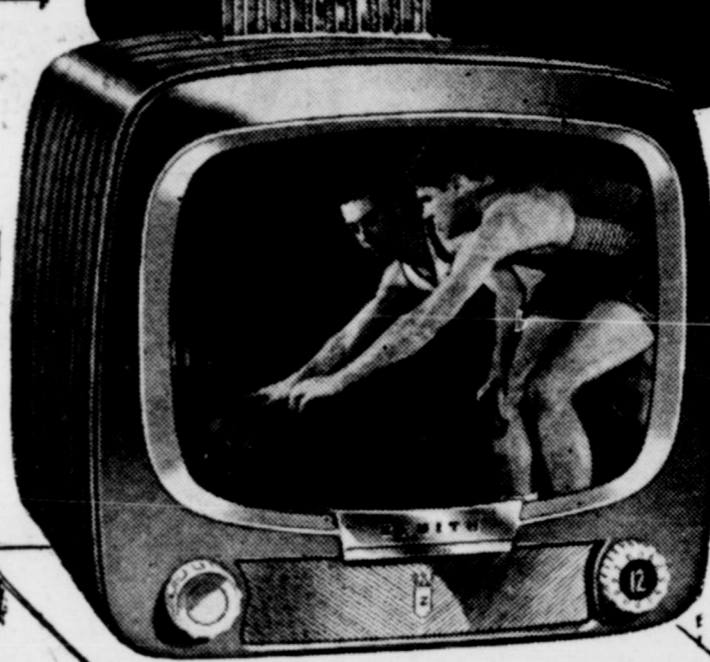

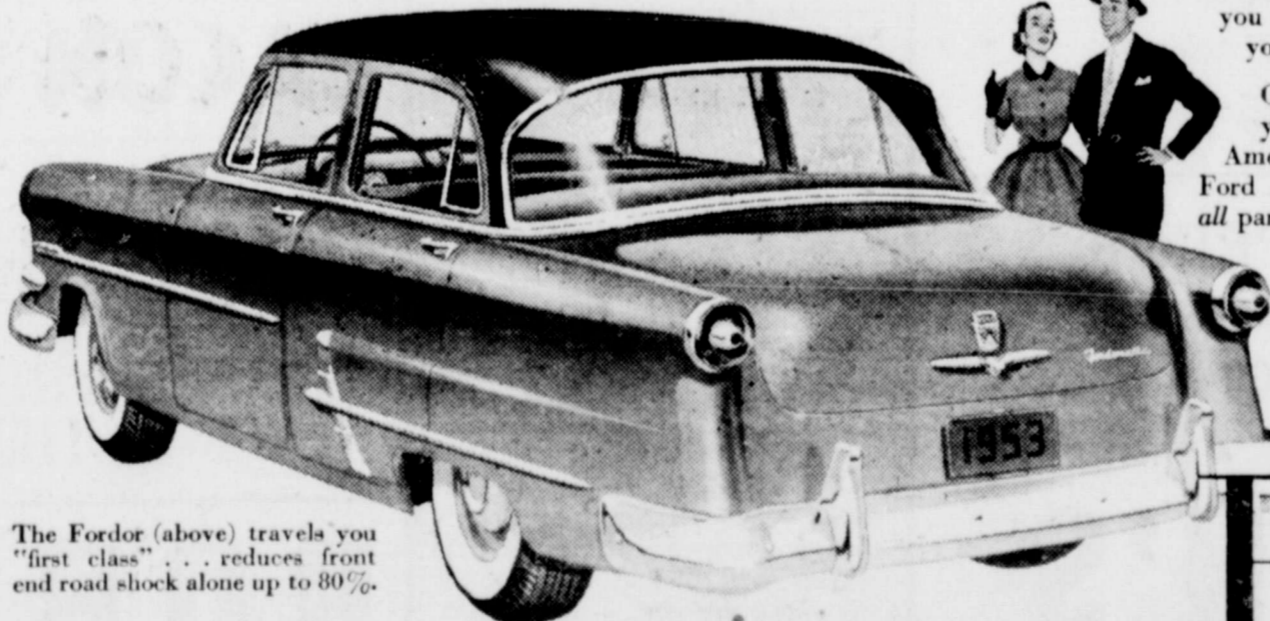


