## COUNTY IS ORGANIZED FOR 5th WAR LOAN, DRIVE BEGINS MONDAY

Organization for the 5th War Loan drive in Castro County has been perfected by the county chairman, Mr. H. W. Golden. The drive, which begins Monday, June 12, will continue through July 8. Castro County has been assigned the largest quota it has ever been called on to raise—\$130,000.00. Mr. Golden declared that regardless of the hugeness of the task citizens of the county would oversubscribe the quota as a result of the great need for mountains of supplies for our invading forces and other armies that fight in every sphere of action. 200 DOZEN PINEAPPLE RECEIVED HERE WEDNESDAY

On Wednesday morning the long-awaited-for pineapples arrived—over 200 dozen of them. The pineapples were ordered cooperatively through the Marketing Committee of the Home Demonstration Council and was handled through the M-System store in Dimmitt. The pineapples came from Laredo where they were imported from Mexico. Mr. D. Neumeyer, accompanied by Mr. Lee Welch, made the trip to Laredo and brought the pineapples to Dimmitt by truck, arriving in Dimmitt about 11:00 o'clock Wednesday morning. Most of the pineapples were unloaded directly from the truck into pickups, cars, etc., with most of them being unloaded by 4:00 o'clock. Marketing chairmen in the different clubs simplified the unloading by taking their club's quota at one time.

The pineapple was of the sugar loaf variety and are of excellent quality. They average 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 pounds or more in weight, and sold for \$3.85 a dozen. Recipes for preserving the pineapples were furnished by the Home Demonstration Agent.

Cooperative buying of pineapple is one of the ways in which the Marketing Committee of the Home Demonstration Council has helped the people of the county. Approximately 215 families have benefitted during this venture.

The Marketing Committee of the Home Demonstration Council is composed of Mrs. Sid Sheffy, Flagg, Chairman; Mrs. A. F. Bakemore of Rance, and Mrs. Dave Shepard of Northedge, who wish to thank Mr. Neumeyer for taking his truck for the pineapple, for Mr. Carpenter of the M-System for taking orders, and Mrs. Bill Simon and Miss Thelma Belknap for their assistance in keeping the records and unloading.

One hundred and sixty dozen pineapples were brought by Mr. Neumeyer for the Amherst Marketing Committee. They were unloaded at Amherst early Wednesday morning.


