## BIG INCREASE IN NORTHWEST COKE OIL PLAY

A big increase in Coke County well drilling has taken place in the past week. Norval Jackson, manager of McMillan Lumber here, advised The Observer Wednesday that 27 rotary rigs will be in operation by the end of this week in the Silver area. Five locations in other sections of the county boost the number of rotary rigs to more than 30.

Stanolind is moving in six additional rigs, giving them a total of eight. They have a large lease leased on the Spade ranch west of Silver. Ard Drilling Co. is bringing in a second and Noble also its second. Other companies to drill for Stanolind in Coke County are G. Phyr, Rowan, Simmons and Arcum. The Marcum rig has been down a month after being damaged by American Republics. Basin Drilling Co. is now on its second location for F. Kirk Johnson, while Hall & Stewart is working on a Johnson location this week.

Humble is rigging up a brand new company owned rotary in the west end of the county. Dual has a rig drilling for Hum-

C & A and Dyke drilling concerns have rotaries running Homer Snowden on the Nora lease. Six rigs are running Perkins-Prothro. Four of them are owned by Dual, while Wood and Meridith each have a rig.

Delta Gulf will drill No. 3 F. Whitt for Ashland Oil & Refining Co.

Marcum has two rigs operating for Magnolia and Miami Operating Co. has its own rotary in operation west of Silver.

Baker & Taylor is drilling a well west of Al G. Hill on the Chris Ranch, southwest of Silver and Empire moved in this week on Sun A-3 Victor McCabe, north of Silver. This is the only location mentioned above that is in Coke County.

## STAKE WILDCAT ON F. C. WOJTEK'S NORTH OF TOWN

J. B. Randle of San Angelo has announced location for a 7,000-foot wildcat, 3½ miles north of Robert Lee and five miles northwest of the McCutchen (Cisco) field. It will be the No. 1 F. C. Wojtek.

Location is 660 from the north and west lines of Section 406, Blk. 1-A H&TC Survey. The property was formerly known as the old Franks place. Land adjoining on the west is owned by Mrs. J. C. Slaughter et al and on the northwest by W. H. Wyatt.

The prospector is 2½ miles southeast of Stanolind 1 Bryan Gartman, wildcat failure abandoned March 6, 1952, at 6,806 feet. The Ellenburger was topped at 6,701 feet on elevation of 2,128 feet.

It is also 2¾ miles west of Union No. 1 Davidson, wildcat failure abandoned last August at 6,502 feet. The Ellenburger was topped at 6,471 feet.

Randle is a son-in-law of T. W. Murray, prominent San Angelo independent oil operator, who owns the Nora Gee lease block in the west end of Coke County where several rigs are now drilling.

The Wojtek Section 406 is under lease to Union, and the lease is due to expire in May, 1956.

## Discuss Plans For Building New Court House

Coke County Commissioners Court held a special session last Thursday when matters were discussed concerning the new court house. Meeting with the commissioners were members of the citizens advisory committee and the architects.

At a special election Oct. 30 the county voted by a majority of 10 to 1 to issue \$300,000 bonds for construction of the new county building.

Results of last week's conference included the following:

It was decided that the new court house will be built in front of the old building and will face north. It will set back 45 feet from the street and have on 18-foot clearance between the old structure.

Length of the new building was reduced to 148 feet and the width was set at 56½ feet. Few changes were made in interior plans, except that the jury dormitory will be partitioned to provide room for women jurors.

Architects will proceed at once drawing up specifications and submit a final draft to county officials within a few weeks.

After completion of the new court house the old structure will be torn down and the ground leveled off. A driveway is proposed to extend from east to west through the block and permit parking in the rear as well as in the street in front.

## Jack Brock And Family Escape Serious Injury

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Brock and their year-old daughter, Jackie Nell, escaped with bad bruises and cuts in a head-on collision with another car Saturday.

The accident occurred between Snyder and Post when the Robert Lee family was enroute to visit Mr. Brock's parents at Floydada. They were hit by an oncoming auto which had turned out to pass another vehicle. The Brock 1954 Ford sedan was badly damaged.

Jack's father was called to the scene of the accident and after receiving first aid treatment the family returned to their home here.

Jack was able to take up his teaching duties at Robert Lee High School Monday, but he will have a substitute bus driver for a few days.

## WORK DELAYED

Engineering on the proposed new paved road around the loop at Silver has been completed, as well as the several blocks of paving in the school and hospital areas of Robert Lee. However, some landowners in the Silver area have not signed easements for the new right of way and this is holding up letting a contract.

## Applications Coming In For Drouth Feed

Eighty-two applications for grain and hay under the Government Drouth Relief Program were approved at the first meeting of the FHA committee here Tuesday.

The applications involved 1,361,800 pounds of grain and 430 tons of hay.

Members of the committee are Delmir Sheppard, George Thomas and W. W. Ivey.

Coke County was recently added to the Drouth Disaster Area, making it possible for farmers and stockmen to obtain help in buying feed for their foundation herds and flocks.

The government allows \$1.00 per 100 pounds on corn, oats, barley, grain sorghums and grain cubes containing 60 percent and 75 percent grain. The relief program also pays one-half rail freight up to \$10, or trucking hauling at the rate of \$1.00 per ton per 100 miles.

Applications for obtaining grain and hay under the program must be made at the ASC office in Robert Lee, which is in charge of J. E. Quisenberry.

Feed is to be purchased from retail dealers. Key Feed Store in Robert Lee is set up to handle orders promptly.

The FHA Committee will meet again next Monday afternoon to consider additional applications.

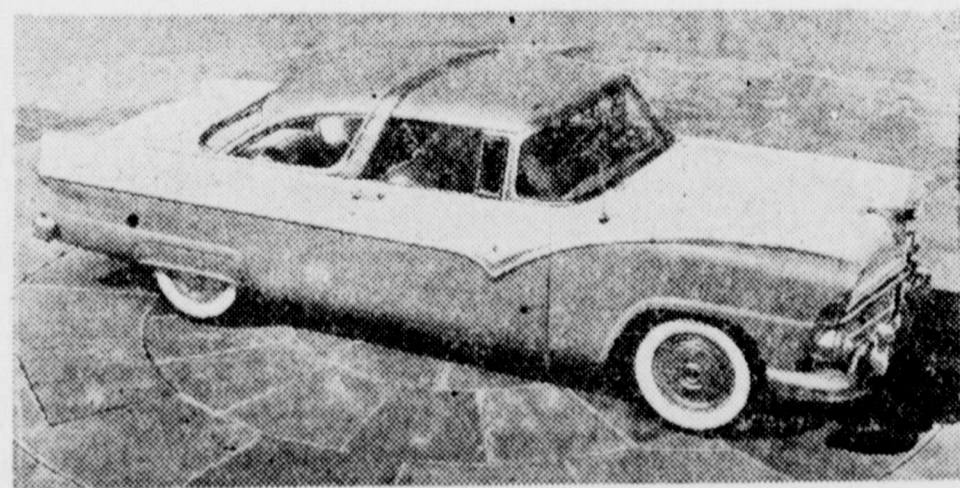
Bronte plays a non-conference game in Rankin this week.

# History of Coke County

## INSTALLMENT 37

A. W. Puett, who became publisher in 1925 was one of the most independent in spirit. He called a spade a spade and spared nobody. Once when a group petitioned the Robert Lee City Commissioners to call an election to vote off the incorporation, Puett published a list of the petitioners giving the amount of city taxes that each had paid, showing that some of the petitioners had paid no tax. He fairly "roasted" the people who went away from the home town to trade with "chain stores" in near by cities.

A. J. Kirkpatrick, present editor and publisher is, from the standpoint of journalism, perhaps the best qualified of all the long list of editors. Mr. Kirkpatrick was connected with publishing companies in Iowa for a number of years. He was in service in Alaska during the Second World War. Mr. Kirkpatrick is very ably assisted by his son, Tommy Kirkpatrick, who will be a Junior student in journalism next fall. Tommy edited The Ram Page, San Angelo College newspaper during the 1952-53 term.

A list of editors and publishers who at one time or another were connected with the Robert Lee Observer includes: J. S. Brady, Sam Wilkins, Gray Reed, Tom Durham, Irvin and Pritchard, Merchant and Reed, Hubert Pearce, J. C. Newton, G. A. Beeman, M. H. Davis, J. T. Rankin, George Cowan, J. G. Berryman, Berryman and Lamb, A. W. Puett, F. W. Puett, Bob Hall, S. R. Young, Mr. Hunter and A. J. Kirkpatrick.

The Bronte Enterprise was first published at Bronte in 1907, by C. H. Bentley, who came to Bronte from Tennessee. Bentley owned The Bronte Enterprise from 1907 to 1910, when he sold to T. R. Butler in 1912.

The plant which Mr. Bentley installed was fairly modern. Mr. West used the same plant, but he brought in an experienced newspaper man, C. W. Goff, to edit the paper. The Enterprise had done well under Mr. Goff, and he was retained by Mr. Butler and the next owner, A. J. Nelson.

The Bronte Enterprise suspended publication in 1915, and resumed publication in 1918, with J. D. Scott as editor and publisher. Mr. Scott sold to W. C. Redmond, who re-sold to D. M. West.

Mr. West published the paper until November, 1944. He was succeeded by J. H. Mullane, Exton Talley and Ed Nunnally, Jr.

Ben Oglesby, Jr., bought the Bronte Enterprise on July 1, 1948, and has edited and published the paper since that time.

For three years in succession, The Bronte Enterprise was named the leading newspaper in West Texas towns under two thousand population. The rating was by

the West Texas Press Association.

The Bronte Enterprise has contributed in many ways to the upbuilding of the Bronte community and of Coke County.

## Former Edith Resident Died In San Angelo

Miss Josephine Millican, 70, former Coke County resident, died at her home at 215 E. 41st St., in San Angelo at 5:20 p. m. Friday. She had been in failing health two years.

The daughter of early day Coke County residents, Miss Millican was born April 20, 1884, in San Saba County. She moved to Coke County in 1895 and joined the Pecan Baptist Church at the age of 15. She was a member of the Lake View Baptist Church in San Angelo.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. in the Lake View Baptist Church with the Rev. Ted Cotten, pastor, officiating.

Burial was at 5 p. m. Sunday in the Paint Creek Cemetery at Edith community, west of Robert Lee.

Burial was by the grave of her father who died in 1936.

Survivors include her mother Mrs. Mary E. Millican of San Angelo; three sisters, Mrs. Henry Burk and Mrs. R. A. Linney,

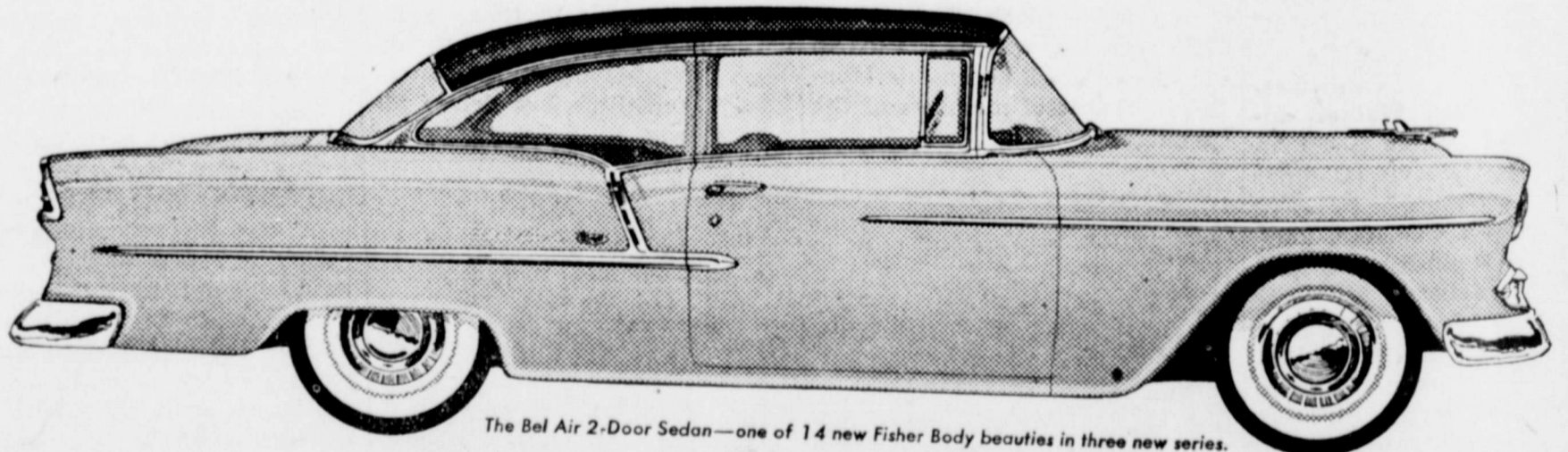

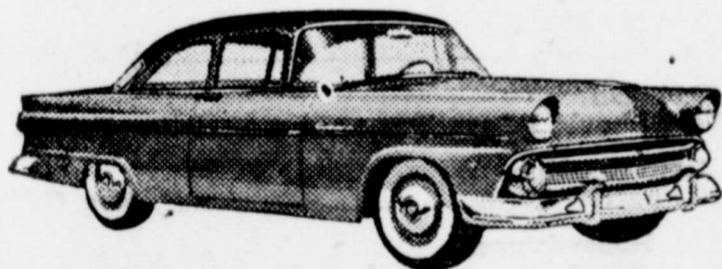

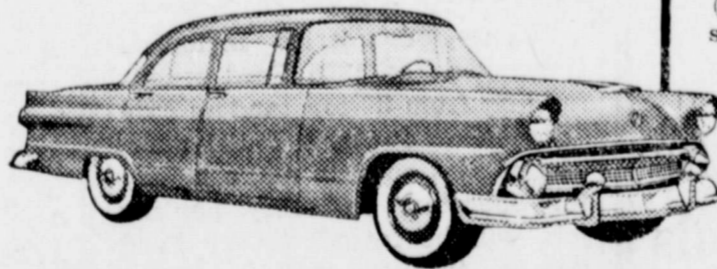

## Eight Officials to Start Four-Year Terms January 1

Those who will serve four years are County Judge Jeff Dean, County and District Clerk Weldon Fikes, County Treasurer Mrs. Gertrude Gray and Commissioners Howard Brock of Precinct 2 and Claude Ditmore of Precinct 4. Justices of the peace C. E. Bruton of Precinct 2 and Emory Davis of Precinct 1 and District Judge Joe Mays also

have 4 year terms.

Those who will serve regular two-year terms are Sheriff and Tax-Assessor Paul Good, County Attorney Frank Dickey, Jr., Commissioners J. W. Service of Precinct 1 and Ed Hickman of Precinct 3, District Attorney Aubrey D. Stokes and Constables T. F. Sims, Sr., and V. H. Simpson.

Coke Countians voted against the amendment, by a vote of 266 to 118, but it carried over the state and becomes a part of the constitution

Production was from open hole between 5,307.74 feet, where 5½ inch casing was set and 5,328 feet, the total depth. Top of pay was picked at 5,317 feet on derrick floor elevation of 1,818 feet. Pay section was acidized with 300 gallons.

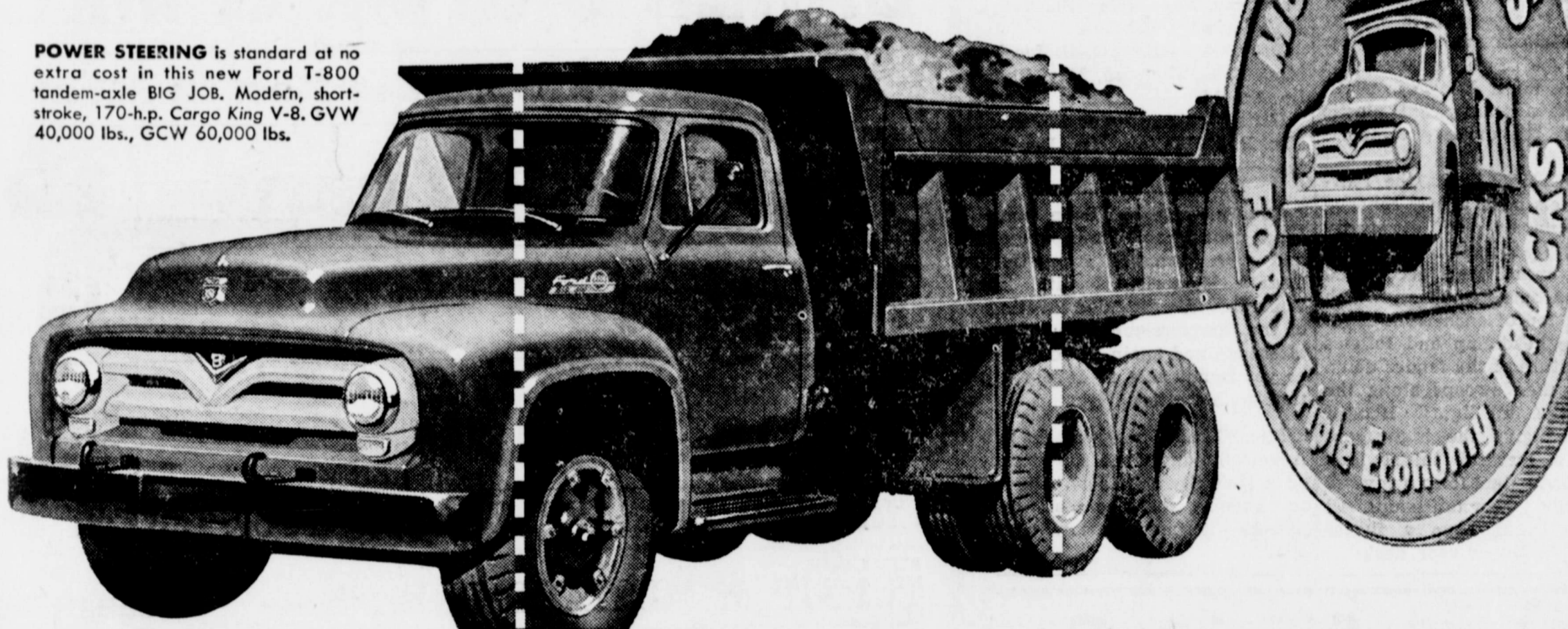

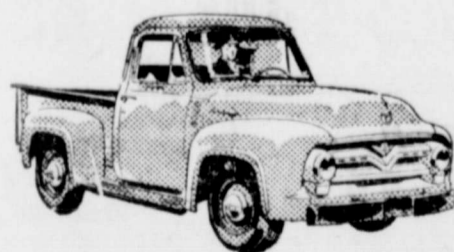

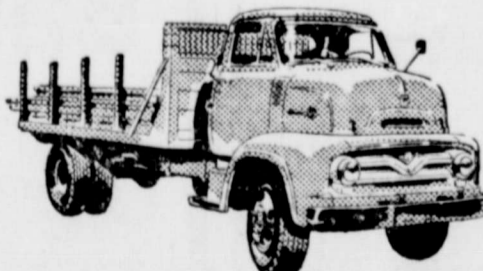

## IVEY MOTOR TO SHOW '55 FORDS HERE FRIDAY

Ford will introduce an entirely new line — the high-styled Fairlane series — as the leader of its four lines of 1955 passenger cars to be shown in 6400 dealers' showrooms across the nation on Friday, Nov. 12. Ivey Motor Co. will have several of the new Fords on display Friday and the public is invited to come by and inspect them.

Modern styling inspired by Ford's new Thunderbird personal car distinguishes the new Fords. Retaining definite characteristics which have won Ford style leadership, the 1955 Fords also have a wrap-around windshield and a new, lower silhouette. The Crown Victoria — a new model, is the first Ford sedan under five feet in over-all height.

Ford, which offered the first V-8 engine in the low price field in 1932 and has built 14 million V-8s since, introduces for the first time three new engines:

A high compression Y-block V-8 engine of 272 cubic inch displacement and an 8.5 to 1 compression ratio.

An improved 6 cylinder I-block engine of 223 cubic inch displacement and a 7.5 to 1 compression ratio.

Dual exhausts, which provide extra power, are standard on all Fairlane V-8 and station wagon models.

The new Ford Fairlane series, named after the home of the late Henry Ford, includes a completely new styling idea — the Crown Victoria model. This car has an arch of chrome over the top like a tiara. It also is available with a transparent plastic roof over the driver's compartment.

Like all 1955 Fords, the Fairlane models have a new concave grill composed of a sturdy chrome-plated grid. Fairlane cars are immediately recognized by a chrome trimline which starts on top of each front fender at the headlamp and follows the curvature of the fender down ward — then sweeps along the side to the tail lights. Hooded headlamps give the high front fenders a forward thrust look while rear fenders form a reverse angle above larger tail lamps. All the new Fords have a flatter hood and a longer rear deck.
