HOPE TO SPEED UP ROAD WORK IN PRECINCT 1

Bids on constructing a new paved highway around the Silver Loop will be opened by Coke County Commissioners Court Saturday, Dec. 11. The project also includes eight blocks of paving in Robert Lee leading to the county hospital and school house.

Contractors have shown considerable interest in the job and a number of bids are expected to be received.

Some delay has been experienced in getting right of way for the road and bridge projects in precinct 1, where a bond issue of \$45,000 was voted several months ago.

Condemnation proceedings against C. E. Mathers resulted in being awarded \$700 by the board of appraisers which included C. Allen, H. L. Bloodworth and Robert Walker. A new location for the road near the Colorado River required 3.74 acres of Mathers land and cut off a field of about 15 acres.

Judge Jeff Dean advised the Observer this week that core tests and footings of the river bridge could be made very soon, so that bids for the bridge could be advertised.

Judge Dean also stated that engineering work on the new road south of the river leading toward Smith was nearly finished, and right of way easements would be sought in the near future.

These road and bridge projects seem to be extremely necessary because of the increase in oil play in the northwest part of the county and construction of a new gas plant on the W. C. Blanks Ranch.

Oil Strike Indicated At Wojtek Wildcat

An oil strike three miles north of Robert Lee was indicated Wednesday when the J. B. Randle wildcat on F. C. Wojtek recovered 100 feet of oil on a drillstem test.

The test was made in a sand section 4902 to 4910 feet with the formation undetermined. During a two-hour test gas surfaced in one hour and 30 minutes and 100 feet of clean oil was recovered. It had a gravity test of 43. Bottom hole pressure was reported at 1,875 pounds. There was no water.

Operators planned to core deeper.

Location is 660 from the north and west lines of Section 406, blk 1-A, H&TC Survey.

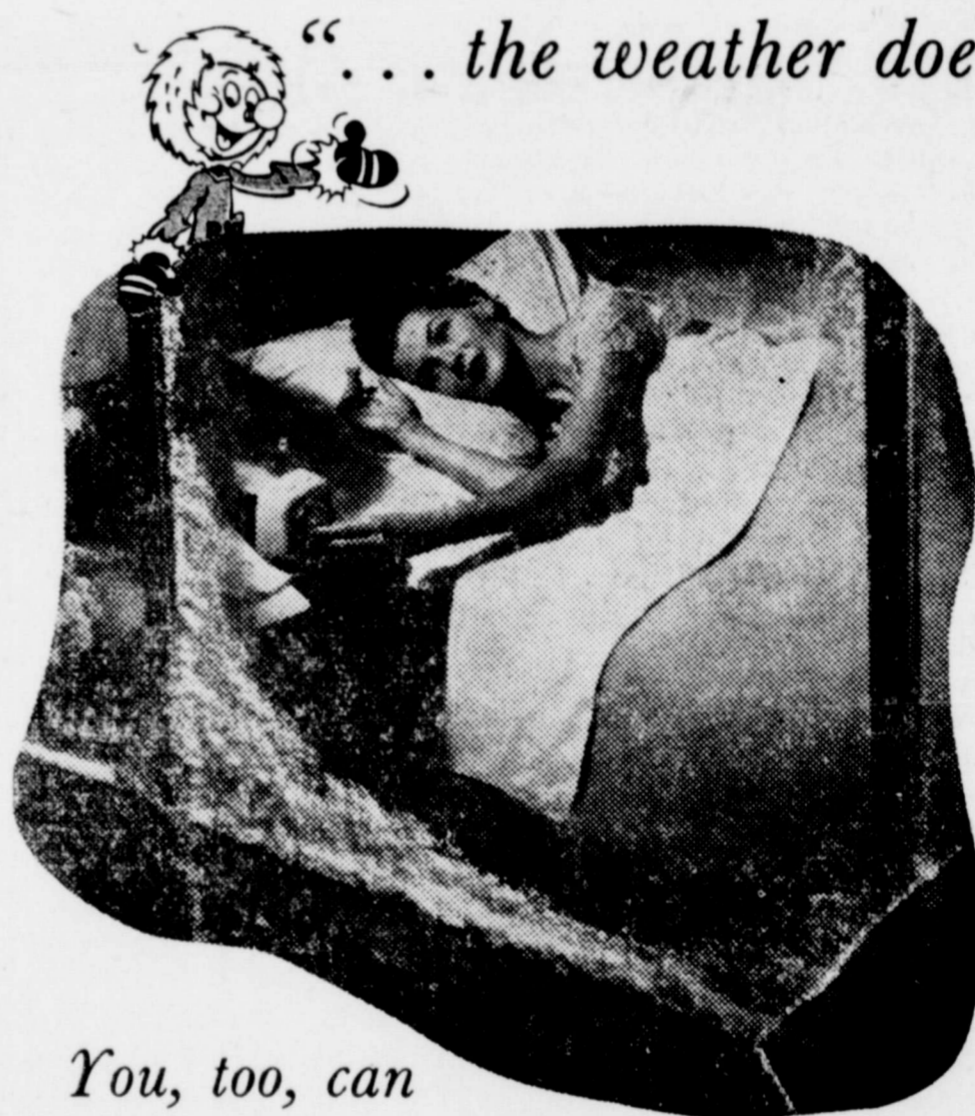

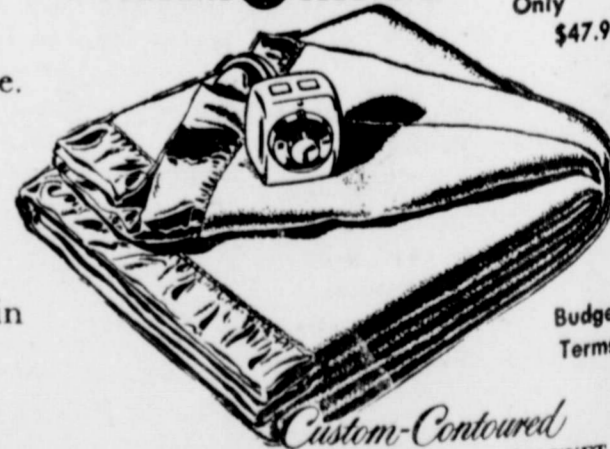

Farm Bureau to Recommend More Equitable Acreage

A national farm program designed to eliminate surpluses and discriminatory acreage controls will be recommended to the American Farm Bureau Federation, according to James Arrott of Tenneyson, president of the Coke County Farm Bureau.

Under the Texas plan, acreage control would be set up on the basis of a farm's total tillable acreage. The present law places control on the individual commodities. According to the plan, the percentage of acres to be retired from production would be determined by the over-all over-production of all agricultural commodities in this country.

The percentage of acres responsible for surpluses would be taken out of commercial production. According to President Arrott, it has been found to average 5 to 15 percent of the nation's cultivated acreage. If the percentage amounted to 10 per cent, then each farmer would be required to divert 10 percent of his tillable acreage from production, he explained.

A farmer would have to comply with this provision in order to be eligible for price supports. Good soil conservation practices would also be required for the idle acres.

This would be encouraged by soil conservation payments.

Under the plan, a system of price supports would be instituted to encourage the shifting of production from crops in surplus supply to crops in short supply.

The Texas Farm Bureau believes that its plan, if administered fairly, would enable farmers to earn full parity for their crops with a maximum of freedom in their operations. Since the government would be concerned with policing only a small percentage of acres on each farm, the cost to the tax payers would be much less than for the present farm program.

Farm Bureau Discusses Medical Care for Farmers

Plans for protecting farm and ranch families against financial hardship in case of illness, including cancer, will be discussed at a meeting Tuesday, Nov. 30, at 10 a. m. at the Cactus Hotel in San Angelo, according to James Arrott, president of the Coke County Farm Bureau.

Farm Bureau leaders from Coke and three other counties in this area will meet with Blue Cross-Blue Shield and Texas Farm Bureau staff members to plan increased participation of Farm Bureau families in the group hospitalization and surgical benefits program.

The state farm organization and Blue Cross-Blue Shield, a non-profit organization, will conduct a concerted campaign over the state in December and January to enroll Farm Families in the Blue Cross-Blue Shield program. The Texas Farm Bureau, with over 14,000 farm families enrolled in the group hospitalization program, is the largest Blue Cross group in Texas.

The drive has been set up in conjunction with the offering of the Blue Cross-Blue Shield C. I. E. (catastrophic illness endorsement) to Farm Bureau members. The endorsement, which includes coverage for 11 dreaded diseases, including cancer, has not been available to Farm groups in the past.

It will be offered only during the months of December and January, Arrott said.
