TENNYSON 4-H BOY SHOWS CHAMPION GILT

William Carper of Tennyson showed the champion Coke County gilt in the Sears Gilt show held in San Angelo Oct. 1. William placed 3rd in competition with the champion gilts from Tom Green, Runnels, and Menard Counties. Other placings in the Coke County Show were David Lindsey of Silver 2nd, Morgan Ashworth of Edith 3rd, Jerry Jameson of Silver 4th, Danny Ray Scott of Bronte 5th, Bobby Allen of Bronte 6th, Michael Teague of Tennyson 7th and Russell Brown of Tennyson 8th.

I seldom spend any time bragging on the work of members of the Coke County 4-H club, but this group of boys did the best job of developing a bunch of breeding gilts that I have ever seen in my six years of experience with 4-H club work. There wasn't a gilt in our county show that you could say would have placed higher with a little better care. They all did a top job and I am eager for everyone to see this group of gilts at the county show in January.

Coke County 4-H club members will be leaving Thursday for the State Fair in Dallas with six entries in the Junior market Turkey Show. The following boys and girls have turkeys entered: Jeanna Kay Denman, Lanny Denman of Bronte and Jackie, Brenda, Peggy and Benny Corley of Tennyson.

STEERS MEET ELDORADO 11 HERE TONIGHT

Robert Lee's Steers are going up against some stiff competition tonight when they take on the tough Eldorado Eagles, a member of District 6-A. This will be the Steers first time this season to take on a Class A team. After last week's showing against the Abilene Sophs, fans are expecting the Steers to show up in fine style tonight.

The following report on last week's game as reported in the Standard Times is as follows:

The Abilene High School Sophomores struck hard and fast to register 21 points in the second quarter, and then fought off the Robert Lee Steers who had it in high gear playing catch-up to eke out a 21-19 victory in Robert Lee.

Early in the second quarter Abilene lit up the scoreboard first. John McMahan ricocheted off a Steer defender at the line of scrimmage and spinning beautifully raced 31 yards for the touchdown. Travis Watson added the conversion on an end-around play and Abilene owned a 7-0 advantage.

Robert Lee was quick to counter as Freddie Ashworth took a pitch-out, ran out of running room on one sideline, reversed his field and was off on a spectacular 60-yard sprint to paydirt.

With the score standing 7-6, the visitors caught fire and added two more touchdowns to boost their halftime margin to 21-6. Both of the Abilene tallies came via the air route. McMahan threw to Butch Newman for a 15-yard scoring sortie and seconds before the half ended, it was McMahan on the receiving end this time on a pass from Roger Evans. The play covered 23 yards.

Rifle armed sophomore quarterback Tom Sawyer of the Steers kept the Abilene defense loosened up all night as he completed seven passes for 137 yards.

Sawyer pulled the trigger on a 25 aerial shot to Jerrell Harmon who gathered it in on the Soph 30' and outran the defense to move the score up to 21-12 midway in the third period.

Harmon played stellar defensive ball for the Steers all night as on several occasions he knifed thru the Abilene line to throw Eaglet ball carriers for losses at crucial times in the second half.

Freddie McDonald added to a game already filled with spectacular running and passing as he chalked up the final Robert Lee touchdown in the final period on a 68-yard gainer off Abilene left side and all over the football field. Robbie Don Godwin plunged for the extra point, but the clock ran out and the final score read Sophomores 21, Robert Lee 19.

Abilene netted 12 first downs and 21 yards total offense. Robert Lee mustered 9 first downs and 287 yards total offense.

In other games last week Bronte stomped a ME H9oogho etaoin beat Melvin 32 to 0; Rochester beat Hermleigh 34-0; and Eldorado beat Loraine 39 to 12.

Conference play in 6-B begins this week between Loraine and Trent. Oother 6-B teams are taking the weekend off before entering conference play.

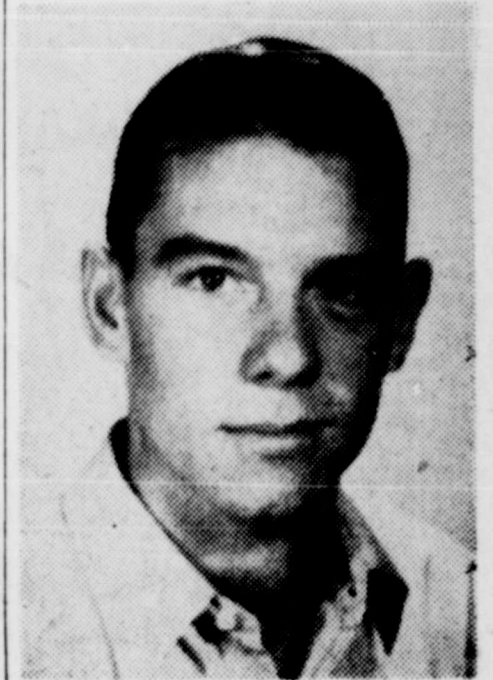
TWO ROBERT LEE FFA MEMBERS TO RECEIVE HIGHEST AWARD

Billy Glenn Carwile and Milburn Wink will be awarded the American Farmer Degree at the National Future Farmers of America Convention in Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 10-13.

Milburn, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Wink of Robert Lee, is a junior student at Texas Tech. Billy Glenn, son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Carwile, is employed in a sporting goods store in San Angelo.

Milburn has been an active FFA member for the past six years participating in many FFA activities. The American Farmer Degree is the highest merit award that can be earned in the Future Farmers of America Organization. Only boys of this outstanding ability ever succeed in being awarded the Gold Emblem Key symbol of this achievement.

Of the 38,000 FFA members in Texas only 38 Texans will receive this highest award. Of those 38 only 3 are from West Texas. Milburn Wink and Bill Carwile are the only two Robert Lee FFA members in the Chapter's 17 year history to receive this high award.

Attending the National FFA convention will be approximately 7,000 FFA members from every state of the Union and Hawaii and Puerto Rico. Two to three hundred Texans will board a Kansas City Special Train at Fort Worth Oct. 9 to make the journey. The train is to be courtesy of the Santa Fe Railway Co.

Individual merit is the basis of the award. Some of the outstanding achievements and advancements made by Milburn during his 6 years as an FFA member include: Chapter President, District President, Area Treasurer, Member of poultry judging team at State, member of Livestock Judging team that placed 2nd in State. Candidates for State FFA officer, and he has exhibited livestock at many livestock shows in Texas.

To be eligible as a candidate a member must have earned at least \$1,000 from his project program and this Milburn has easily reached. Also a candidate must show outstanding leadership ability and this is evidenced by the various offices he has held in the organization, especially above the local level. In 1952, he was the Area Treasurer, and the following 2 yrs. he represented the Lone Wolf District as their State Officer Candidate. Milburn has attended five State FFA conventions being delegate twice.

Milburn set his sights on becoming an American Farmer in 1949 when he enrolled in vocational agriculture under the supervision of Carl V. Maddox. In 1950 he was awarded the highest award given by the local Chapter, Chapter

The American Farmer Degree is the highest merit achievement award given by the Future Farmers of America Organization. Only one member out of 1,000 active members is eligible for the degree and Texas with slightly less than 39,000 active members are to receive 38 American Farmers. The Gold Emblem Key is the award given and will be presented by the National F. F. A. President, Bill Gunter of Liveoak, Florida.

Of the 3,700 active members from 84 schools over West Texas making up Area II only 3 boys were elected to the degree. Two from Robert Lee and one from Lamesa.

The American Farmer Degree is based on individual merit and outstanding achievements attained by each individual. Bill entered the Robert Lee FFA Chapter in 1949 and was elected Greenhand vice president. Other activities that first year included being on the Greenhand Chapter Conducting Team, alternate on the poultry judging at state and delegate to rear officer training school. He raised and entered in local shows six lambs. From these activities as a freshman in high school he progressed to the most coveted award.

Some of his outstanding achievements include: Chapter Vice-President, District Reporter, Member of Livestock Judging team that placed 2nd in State, Area vice-President, Master of Ceremonies at Area Banquet, Delegate to State FFA Convention and also exhibited livestock at various major livestock shows.

The qualifications for the American Farmer Degree as set forth in the Official Manual are: Must have been an outstanding local chapter member, must have participated in FFA Activities above the local level, must have held an office above the local level, have been out of high school for at least 1 year, and have earned from his project program at least \$1,000.

Bill received his Chapter Farmer Degree Award in 1950 under the direction of Carl V. Maddox. His senior year in high school he received the highest honor given by the State Association the Lone Star Farmer Degree Award under the supervision of Carter

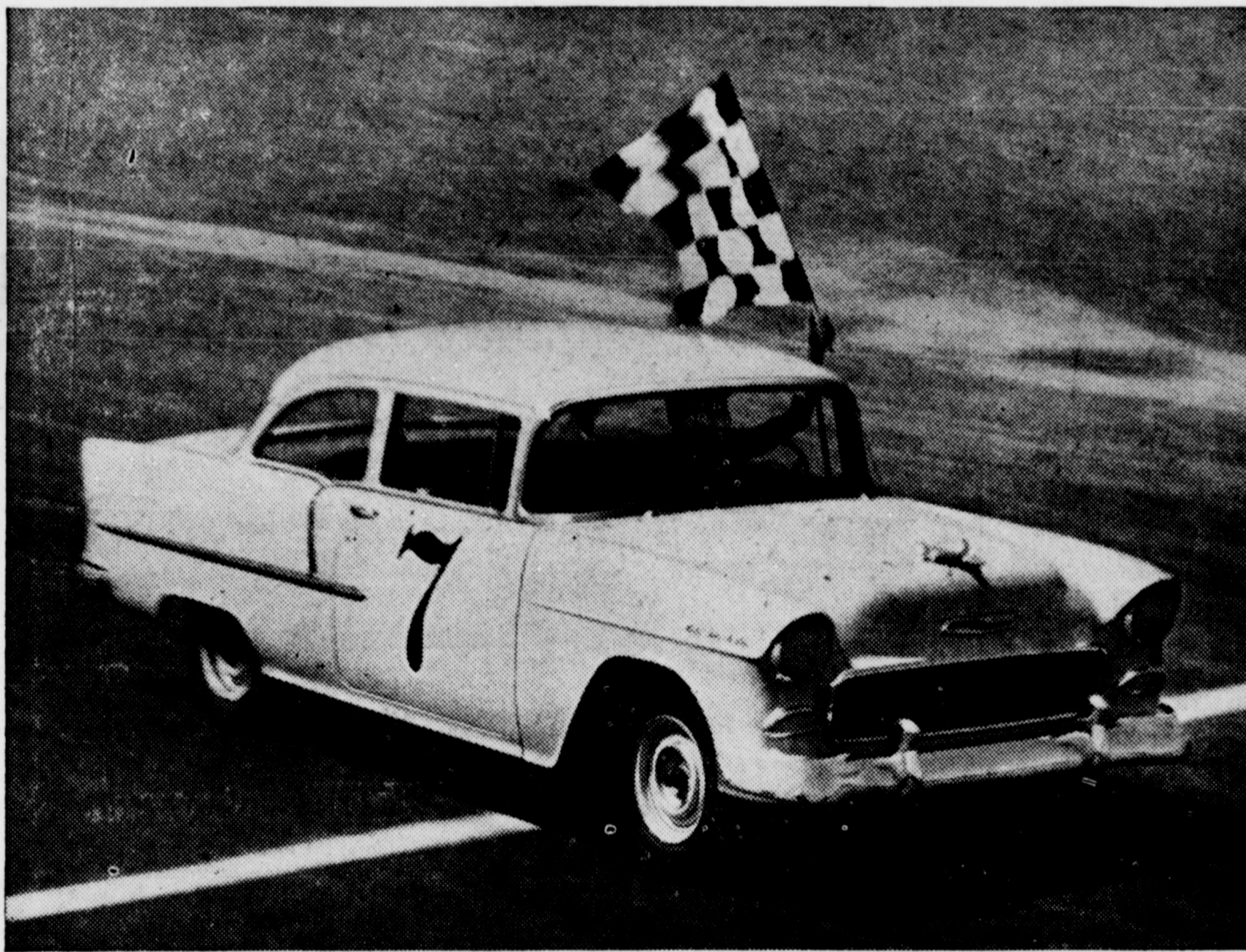

Part of Highway 70 Is Completed

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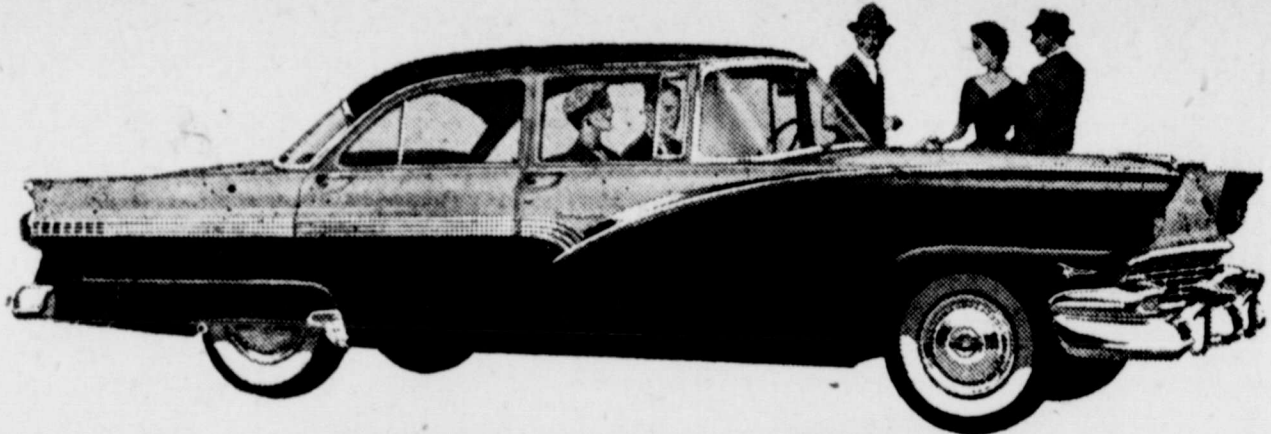

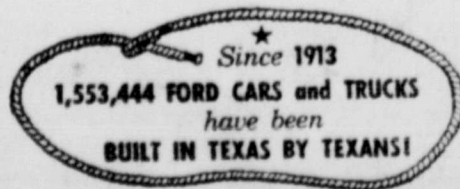

In the United States, a total of 2,005,539 new teachers will be needed by the end of 1965, ten year hence. 1,047,410 of that num-

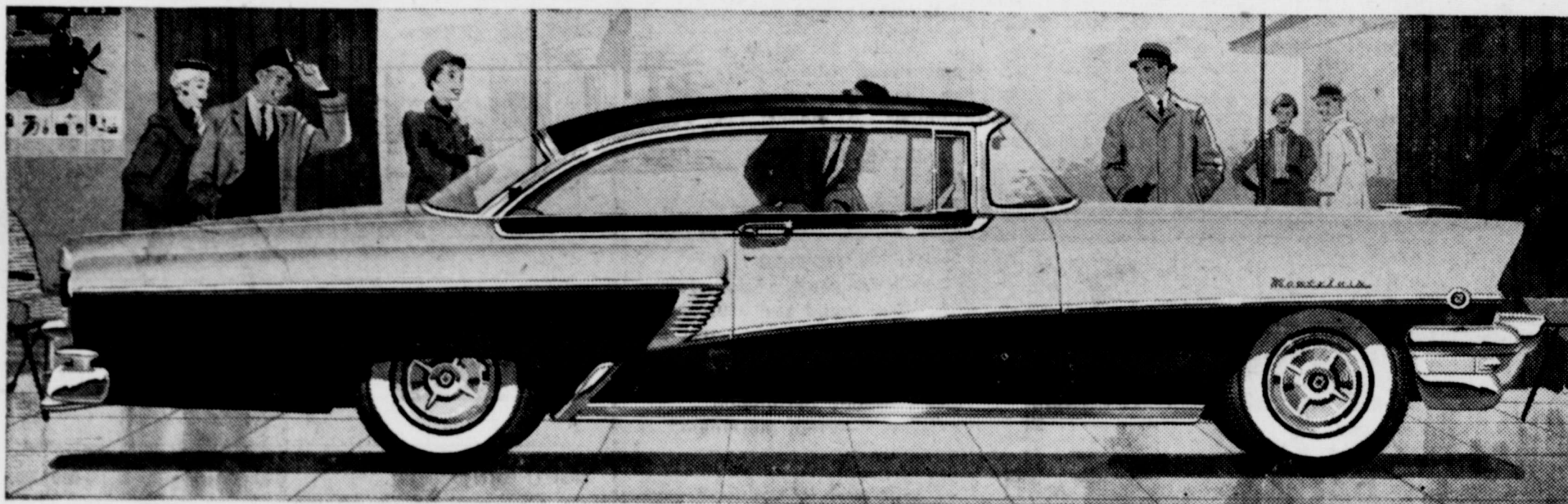

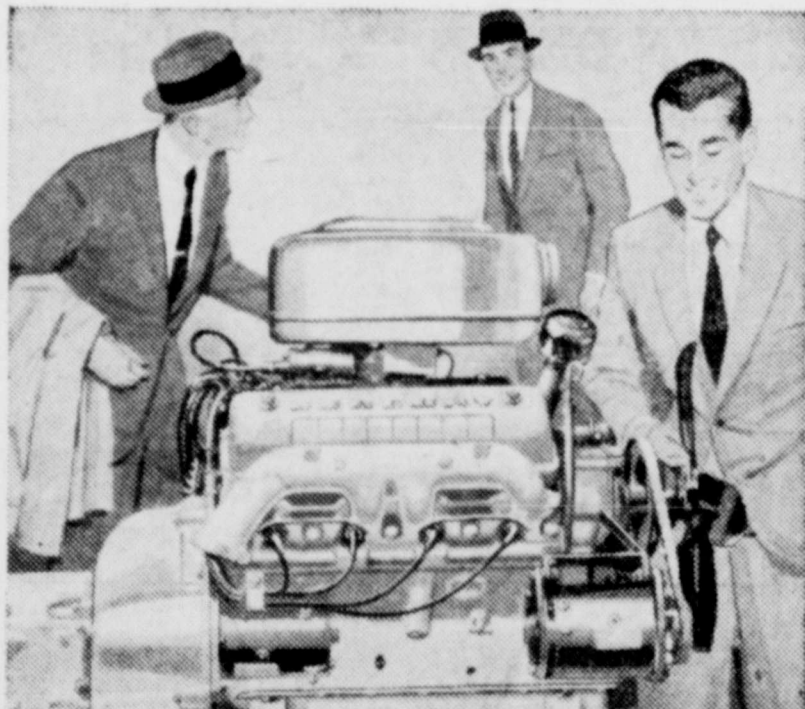

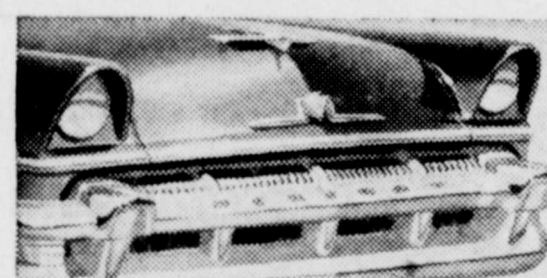
