## Grand Jury to Investigate Murder Charge

A murder charge against Vernon Glenn of Bronte will be investigated by a Coke County grand jury when it is called into session Monday at 10 a. m.

Glenn, 27 years old, is out under a \$5,000 bond for the fatal shooting of Hollis Stevens, 31, of Bronte last Wednesday morning.

When the jury commission met two weeks ago there were no criminal matters in sight and District Judge Joe L. Mays did not order a grand jury for the new court term which opens Aug. 6.

However, after the Bronte affair Judge Mays summoned grand jurors to appear at 10 a. m. Monday.

The jury list includes E. L. Caperton, E. F. Glenn, J. M. Parker, Robert I. Brown, Charles Sims, Bob Edwards, Leonard Fletcher, Bill Allen.

Also Curtis Walker, Eddie Good, Ernest Ivey, J. D. Gilbert, Billy Sid Evans, James A. Wells, Garland Spencer and Crowley Harmon.

Since E. F. Glenn, second name on the list, is a brother of the defendant, he will not serve.

The Bronte shooting took place at 9:30 a. m. near the Bronte post-office. Stevens was shot through the forehead with a .25 revolver and died at 7 that evening without regaining consciousness.

Glenn had been a clerk in the post office where Mrs. Stevens was acting postmaster. It was understood that Glenn was an applicant for the permanent appointment as postmaster.

Mrs. Stevens was out of the office a day or two prior to the shooting, and was treated for a nervous breakdown. She was back in the office Tuesday and was being assisted by John Coalson, a substitute rural mail carrier.

The state men advised Mr. Ivey they would help remove fish from the receding lake some time next week. The rescued fish will likely be put in deep holes in the Colorado River, since the new city lake seems to be overstocked since water there has also receded considerably.

## Havins Beats J. W. Service In Precinct 1

J. W. Service was unsuccessful in his bid for re-election as Commissioner of Precinct 1, being defeated by Fern Havins by a majority of 138 votes.

Mr. Service is completing his eighth year in the office, having succeeded H. C. Varnadore in 1949.

Mr. Havins ran a good race two years ago, but failed by 27 votes. Nobody predicted his majority would be so great this time.

Havins carried Robert Lee and Silver where voting records were made, while Service maintained his edge in the small Sanco box and had a majority of four in the absentee votes.

Mr. Havins will take office next January for a 4-year term. County commissioners draw a salary of \$3,000 plus \$600 expense allowance.

## O'DANIEL HIGH IN COKE COUNTY PRIMARY VOTE

More than 1,200 Coke County voters turned out to cast their ballots in Saturday's Democratic primary election.

Heaviest votes were cast at Robert Lee where 466 ballots were counted, and at Silver with 153. A hot race for commissioner in Precinct 1 accounted for the increased interest.

At Bronte, where no local or county contests were at stake, the vote was much smaller than usual.

Only change in the county setup will result as the defeat of Commissioner J. W. Service in Precinct 1 by Fern Havins. Ed Hickman was re-elected in Precinct 3 over Fred Ashworth. Returns of these races will be found elsewhere in this newspaper.

W. Lee (Pappy) O'Daniel ran well ahead in the governor's race with a county total of 495 votes. Price Daniel was second with 303 and Ralph Yarborough got 197 votes for third place.

Coke gave A. J. Bishop a lead in his race for re-election as State Representative, but he will face E. J. Grindstaff in a runoff. Charles Mason Henner, the Santa Anna doctor, failed to pick up support he had expected over the district.

Justin Kever ousted Aubrey Stokes for district attorney and was given a boost from Coke County 619 votes to 432. Kever ran ahead all over the 51st district.

Election boards worked late in voting boxes where the balloting was heavy. Robert Lee returns were not completed until 1 a. m. and the Silver board worked until nearly midnight.

Reports from each of the 14 boxes were received Saturday night in the county clerk's office, except from Tennyson. Their report did not come in until Monday.

The second primary will be held Aug. 25. Daniel and Yarborough will fight for the governor nomination. Other candidates to be voted on in the runoff will be Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General and Representative.

Duane Conger and family have gone from Lubbock to Corpus Christi for a few weeks, but will move to May in September when Duane will begin teaching there in the public school. His wife is the former Edith Walker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Walker of Robert Lee.

Silver voters cast 153 ballots in Saturday's Democratic primary election. Eleven absentee ballots were also counted from this voting box, making a record turnout over any previous election. The primary was conducted by H. L. Bloodworth. Vote counting was not completed until nearly midnight.

Silver gave its biggest vote to Price Daniel in the governor's race. He had 67 votes, O'Daniel 51, Yarborough 18, Senterfitt 12, Haley 4 and Holmes none.

In the county commissioner's race the Silver vote was 105 for Fern Havins and 47 for J. W. Service.

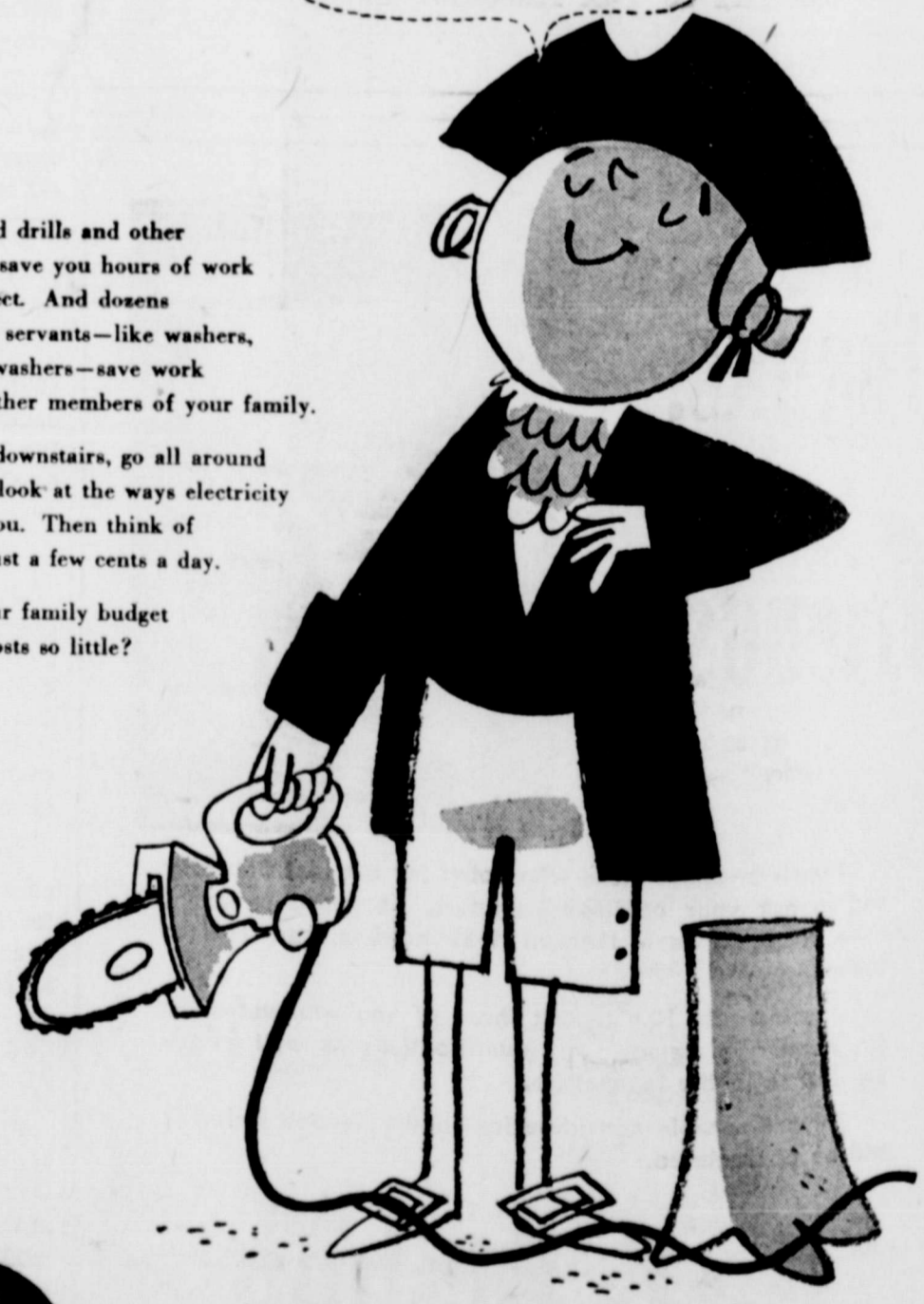
