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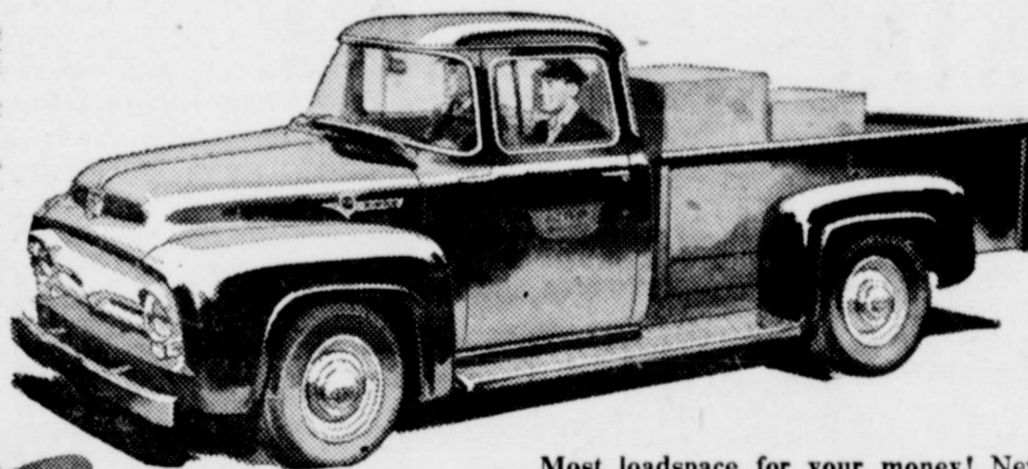
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Annice Gartman Wins Gold Star Award With Home and Livestock Projects

"4-H Foods, Clothing, gardening, food preservation and livestock demonstrations have kept me pretty busy, but I still have time for playing in the school band and for church and community activities," said Annice Gartman following the winning of the Coke County Gold Star Award. The award was presented at the Annual 4-H Achievement supper held last week in Robert Lee.

Annice is in her 8th year as a member of the Robert Lee 4-H Clubs and is a sophomore in high school. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Gartman of the Sanco Community.

A turkey project took most of her time in 1950. She raised 25 and showed them in Abilene and won a 1st and 3rd and in Dallas she won 2nd and 3rd. She realized a nice profit from this project.

Clothing work began in 1951 when Annice made a simple gathered skirt. She has made a dress each year since to wear in the Dress Revue. She has won a second and a third place in County Contests.

Gardening and Food Preservation has always been important to Annice as she helps her mother with the garden, canning and freezing so that the family can be well fed. Her yield has not been very good due to drought conditions, but the amount grown has been of benefit to the family and Annice has learned many things about gardening and food preservation. She was awarded the Frozen Foods Award in 1955 for her record in the work.

Food preparation is of special interest to Annice. She began early in her club work by making breads, muffins, and cookies. Now Annice can do a "woman size" meal any day. She has taken part in the County Food Contests two years. She and Leslie Nell Wink won 1st in the County Vegetable preparation in 1955, but the mumps prevented Annice taking part in the District Contest. In 1956 Annice and Mary Beth Schooler won County Dairy Foods and 2nd in District.

Annice has received a year pin each year since 1951. She attended District Camp in 1955 and was a Recreation leader in the County Camp. Annice has held a number of club offices including Reporter, secretary, Council Delegate, Recreation leader.

During the current year Annice has carried a livestock demonstration under the supervision of Jack Walde, Co. Agri. Agent. She has fed a Hereford steer, bred by Douglas Gartman, and exhibited the steer at several shows. First the steer was exhibited at the Coke County Stock Show where it won reserve champion. Then the steer was shown at the San Antonio Livestock Exposition where it took first place in the light weight open class. Going on down the show circuit, Annice's steer took ninth place at Abilene, eleventh place at Houston, first place at San Angelo, and twelfth place at the Heart 'O' Texas Fair in Waco. Finally the steer was exhibited at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas where it took fourth place. Annice sold her eleven hundred pound steer named "Pumkin" at Dallas for 36 cents a pound.

She likes sports of all kinds and plays the Saxophone in the High School band. She is also active in the Sanco Community Organization and church affairs.

Other 4-H girls who have won the Gold Star award in recent years are: Mary Frances Wylie, Mary Beth Schooler, Leslie Nell Wink, Bennie Wyatt, Joyce King Walker.





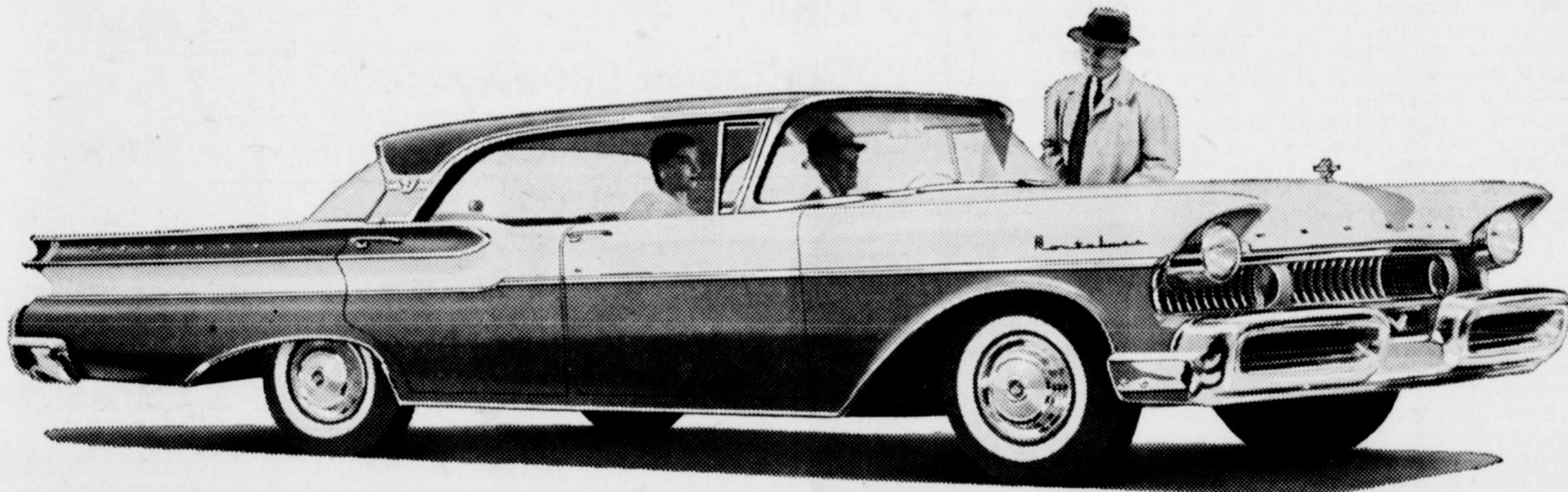
