Coke Gets More Rain; Escapes Storm Damage

Coke County escaped storm damage but received some beneficial moisture Wednesday when turbulent clouds and tornado warnings originated in West Texas and sped southeast to the Gulf. Robert Lee gauged a half inch from a heavy shower about 1:30 p.m. There was very little wind here, indicating we were on the edge of the storm. Valley View farmers southeast of town got an inch of moisture, while to the southwest the measurement was a half inch. Less rainfall was received north of town, but Bronte's heavy downpour amounted to .9 of an inch. Silver reported good rains.

The moisture will prove highly beneficial to thousands of acres of oats and other small grain which has furnished excellent grazing for several weeks, but was beginning to need rain.

While the San Angelo radio stations kept anxious listeners informed of the weather warnings, no damage was reported in West Texas although several tornadoes were seen.

She had been in failing health for two years, but her son and his family were shocked to find her dead in her room at 6 a. m. Saturday. She had gotten out of bed and was sitting in a rocking chair.
