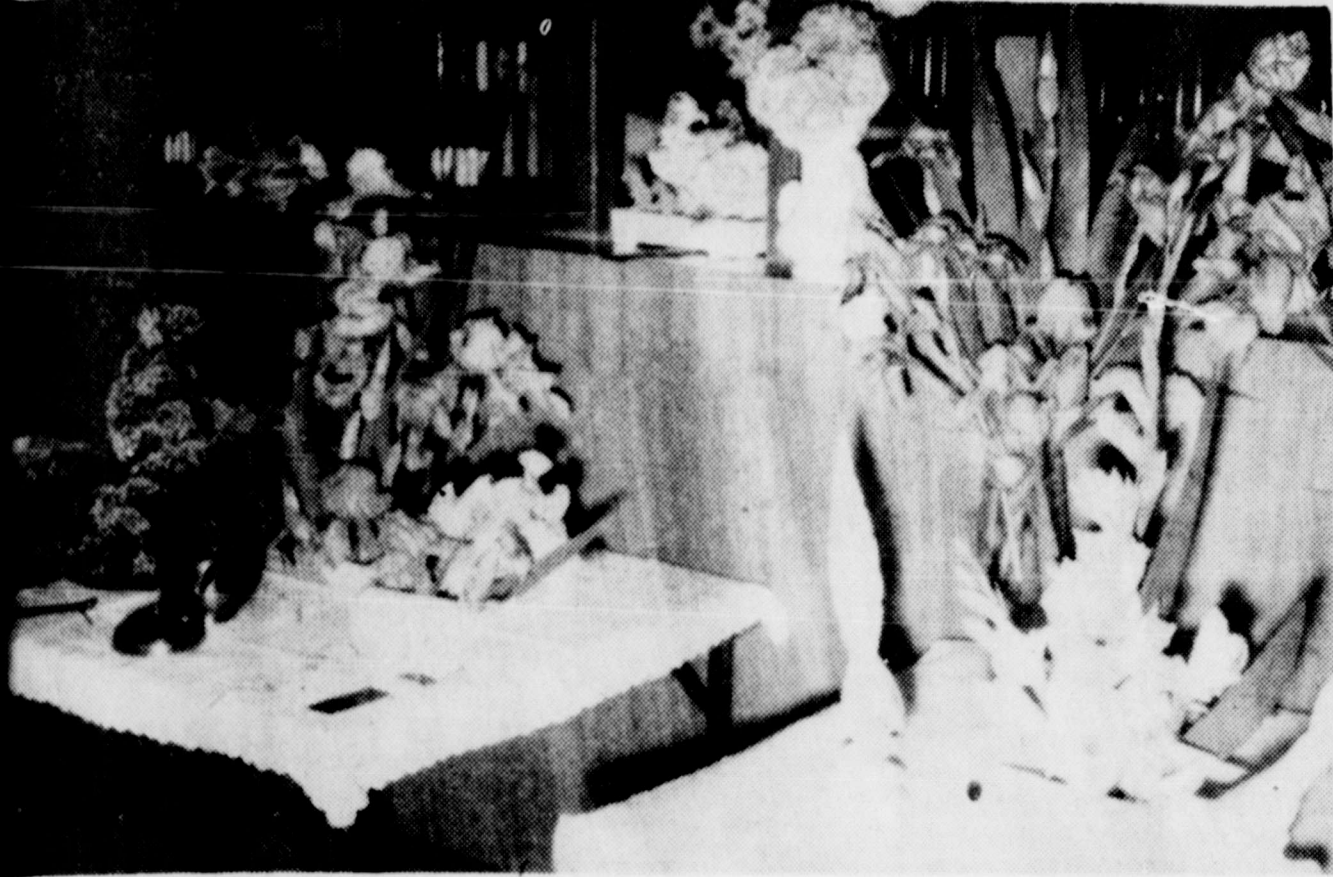

## MORE RAINS IN COUNTY REACH 2 TO 5 INCHES

Coke County received more highly beneficial moisture during the past week, but rainfall here was light in comparison with many other sections of the state.

Robert Lee gauged something over 2 inches during the past ten days, and this amount was reported from much of the west half of the county. However, Bronte's rainfall was near 5 inches, and some points around three inches was reported.

Very little runoff occurred here and some stock tanks are not filled. Mountain Creek reservoir overflowed with Saturday night's rain which was estimated from .75 to an inch in this locality.

Scattering showers, some of them heavy, occurred in the county this week. A tornado funnel was sighted Monday afternoon northwest of Bronte, but it didn't touch the ground.

Farmers will plant their crops as soon as they can get in the fields. Moisture all over the county is sufficient to bring up crops.

General chairman of the show was Mrs. B. A. Austin, with Mrs. F. C. Clark, co-chairman. Mrs. Frank McCabe, club president, and other officers welcomed visitors as they arrived. Judging the entries were Mrs. Lillian Newman and Mrs. A. B. Darsey of San Angelo.

The Garden Club officers and members were pleased with the fine attendance and are grateful to the bank officials for permitting use of their building.

## Swimming Pools In New Parks To Open May 11

Swimming pools in the new County Parks at Robert Lee and Bronte will open for the first time on Saturday, May 11.

This announcement was made at the BCD luncheon at Varnadore Cafe Wednesday noon by Mayor Cumbie Ivey, Jr., who had taken part in a joint meeting of the park boards and commissioners court Monday night.

Formal dedication of the Robert Lee Park will be held at a later date. Beginning May 11 the pool will be open week days from 4 to 8 p.m. if weather permits.

After the school term ends May 24 regular swimming hours will be from 1:30 until 8 p.m.

Prices for swimming were set at 15c for students and 35c for adults. An adult season ticket may be purchased for \$5.00. Forenoons will be reserved for instruction and special groups.

Other rules and regulations concerning operation of the new parks and pools were discussed Monday night, Mr. Ivey said, and a published announcement is expected to be made next week.

BCD members head a report from Fred McDonald, Jr., who is general chairman of the Pancake Supper set for May 17. He asked for everybody's cooperation in an effort to make the event a success, and tickets were distributed to all members so that an advance sale can be made.

Mayor Ivey said the matter of hiring a recreation director had been discussed, and it appeared that this might be possible for the month of July. County, city and school district funds would be used. The BCD passed a resolution favoring the plan.

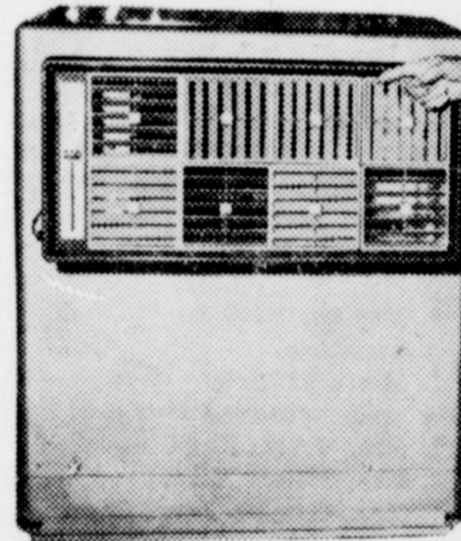

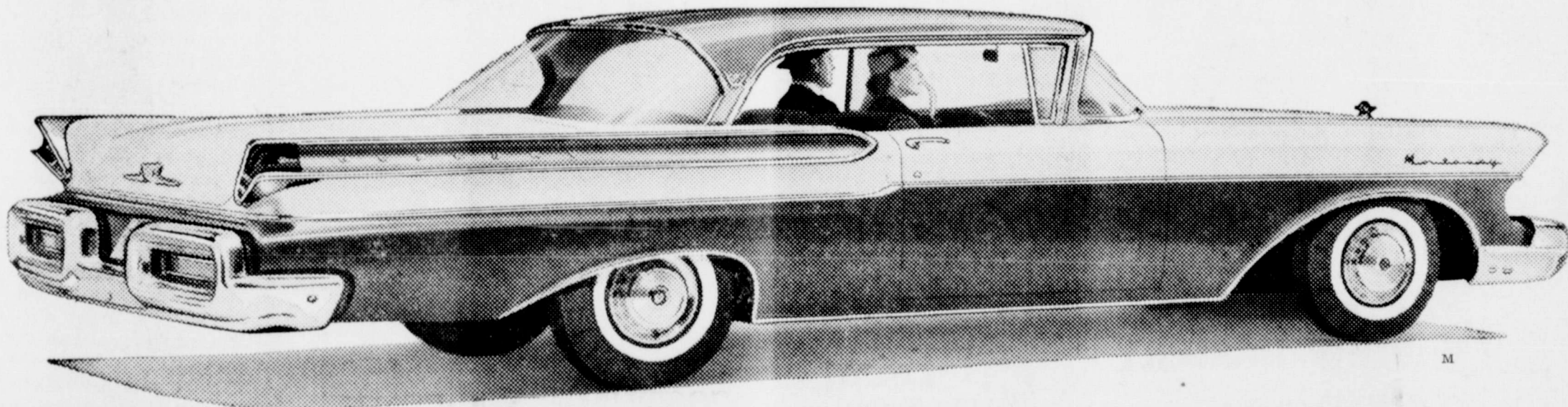

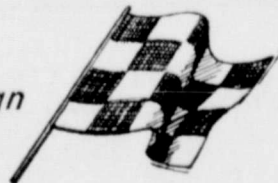

## Coke Wildcat Logs Shows On 3rd Test

Humble Oil & Refining Co. 1 I. A. Bird, et ux, in 474-1A-HAR Coke County 7,100-foot rotary wildcat located 12 miles northwest of Robert Lee, logged shows of oil and gas on a drillstem test in Pennsylvania.

On the 1½-hour test between 5,762-812 feet, recovery was 322 feet of dry gas in the drillpipe and 55 feet of oil and gas-cut mud. Flowing pressure was zero; 30-minute shut-in pressure, 1,515 pounds.

The project was bottomed at 5,812 feet, preparing to core.

Earlier on a core between 5,778-784 feet recovered 22 feet of fractured lime with shows of oil and gas and a core from 5,784-812 feet recovered 28 feet of shale and lime bleeding oil and water.

A previous test between 5,678-690 feet returned gas and 120 feet of oil and gas-cut mud, while a test earlier test between 5,584-90 feet returned 45 feet of slightly oil and gas-cut mud, 5 per cent oil.

### WHO IS ACTUALLY PAYING?

Dear Editor:

The idea that somebody is paying, our taxes has bobbed up again and again.

But had you noticed how gasoline went up from 25 to 26, 27, 28, 29 and 30 cents? Who actually is paying the taxes that towns, school districts and counties all over the oil producing areas add from time to time? Well, its you, brother. In the main, it's you — everytime you drive up to my gasoline pump or anybody else's gasoline pump.

If the companies did pay their taxes without raising the price of their products, those increased taxes would be money that would NOT go toward raising the pay of the people who work for the companies.

So in one way or another, regardless of who wants to kid us or kid themselves, we pay these debts and the interest on them. Public improvements wisely financed, soundly built, and of a kind that really adds to the soundness of the country and the productivity of its soil and its people are good.

But we can't go out and do everything any and everybody wants done. We must select carefully and finance wisely, and I am ready to say that just about all the improvements we need or can afford from now on could and should be built on a pay as you go basis. This can be done in carefully planned units and money that would be out for interest on a bond issue or pavement and labor.

We have abandoned the idea of an REA telephone system because it calls for a bigger debt than many of the people are able and willing to assume. We could not find a way to get all this expensive equipment without too much debt, making rates too high. A steadier, sounder way of developing and improving rural telephone service would have been better for town and country. But "progress" in a HURRY has made that impossible.

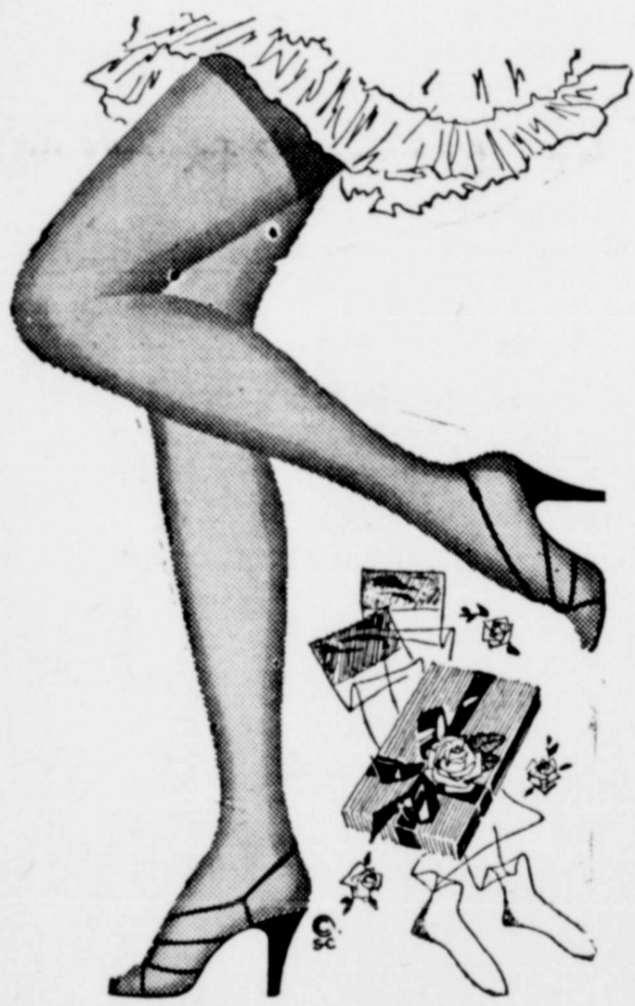

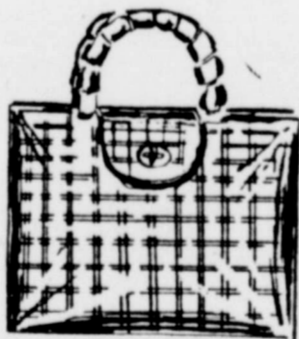

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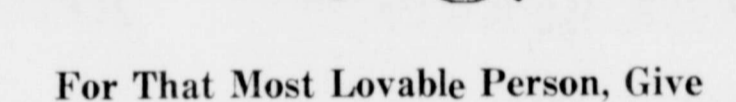
