

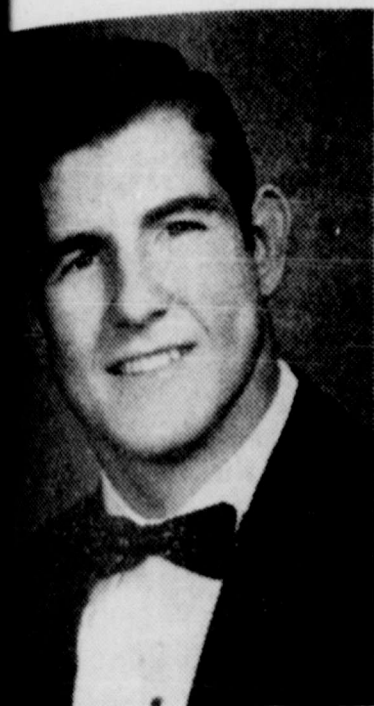

LITTLE LEAGUE BALL GAMES

Robert Lee's Little League ball teams have been busy the past week as their season's activities are nearing the end. Lakeview pushed across eight runs in the final inning to best the Robert Lee Pee-Wee nine 16-15 last Sunday afternoon in Lakeview. The previous Sunday saw the miniature Rabbit Twisters flood the Lakeviewers 12-7 on home grounds. The Pee-Wee's suffered another setback last Saturday in our neighbor city. Bronte 5-Pee Wee's 2. On the same date, the Little League team won 17-7 over Bronte.

All three teams will play their final games Saturday evening against Bronte leaguers at the County Park diamond. J. P. (Snipe) Conley has coached and directed the Robert Lee teams.

County Park and Pool Scene of Saturday's Events

The new County Park and swimming pool will attract both oldtimers and the younger set Saturday as they come to participate and watch competitive events in swimming, diving, life-saving, tennis, and baseball.

Registration for the swimming races and diving contests is still open. The races will measure 50 yards each. Entries still may be made in the free style, breast stroke, side stroke, and the back stroke. Age groups in these events will be children under 10, 11-14, 15-17, and 18-up. The races will begin at six o'clock and continue intermittently until finished. Provided registration is large enough, girls and boys will have separate events.

A life-saving exhibition will be held at 7 o'clock by students of the life-saving classes. Approximately 70 students, including both adults and children, have qualified for the Red Cross Beginning Swimmer certificates. Eleven have qualified for the Intermediate certificates.

The diving contest will include a number of required dives and a "fancy" dive of the contestant's own choosing. Jack Dentman will do the announcing for the swimming events.

Final matches in the tennis tournament will be played at 8 p.m. Players in the tournament have supplied funds for the purchase of a trophy to be presented to the winner. Approximately 20 contestants are taking part in the tournament.

Baseball games with Bronte Little League teams will start at 4:30 in the afternoon. The Pee-Wees are scheduled to play first, followed by the Little and Pony leaguers.

A large crowd is expected to be on hand for the events.

Allen Bloodworth and Family Return To Thailand For Two More Years

After a summer's stay in the States Allen Bloodworth and family left this week on their return to Thailand where he will continue as a representative of the U. S. Government's International Cooperation Administration.

It is the third trip to the far east for Mr. Bloodworth. His first assignment was for a two-year period in Burma and he and his family returned early this summer from 2½ years in Thailand. He is going back for two more years.

Allen is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Bloodworth of Silver and grew up in Coke County. He is a graduate of Texas A & M College and was a vocational ag teacher at Mason when he accepted the government position.

The family has spent some time with Silver and Robert Lee relatives, and also visited Mrs. Blood-

worth's mother, who resides at Bryan. Allen recently completed a three weeks refresher course in agriculture and education at A & M.

The family left Silver early Monday for Los Angeles. They are driving a used car which they purchased when they arrived in California three months ago. The auto will be sold before they start their long plane trip Saturday. Three days are to be spent in Manila and two days in Hongkong before arriving at Bangkok Aug. 17.

Bangkok is the capital of Thailand and a city of more than a million people. It is headquarters for Mr. Bloodworth and his family resides there while he travels through the country assisting the Minister of Education in establishing vocational ag schools.

He finds the people very cooperative, honest and reliable, and his work has turned out to be pleasant and highly interesting. He plans to continue studying the Thai language, which originated in China and is considered quite difficult.

Thailand is a tropical country and the climate is good. It is cool and pleasant from October to February, then hot and humid until May, with the rainy season extending from May until October.

Mr. and Mrs. Bloodworth have three children, Bill, 17, Barbara, 15, and Mary, 3½ years. They attend an international school in Bangkok. About 20 nations are represented in the enrollment of 300 students. Classes run from primary through high school.

Farm Bureau Queen Contest Set For Aug. 26

A queen for the Coke County Farm Bureau will be selected Aug. 26 at Robert Lee. Winner of the contest will compete in district competition at Big Spring Aug. 29.

Only the senior group will be eligible to compete for district queen, but two younger age groups will participate in the county show. The youngest age group will be those girls from 4 to 9 years old; the middle group will include girls from 10 to 15; and the senior group will include girls from 16 to 22.

In order for a girl to compete she must be the daughter or sister of a member of the Farm Bureau. Senior contestants must have been at least 16 and not more than 22 years of age Sept. 1. All contestants must be unmarried.

Girls will be judged on appearance, poise and personality. Each entry will be asked a few questions about the Farm Bureau and will be required to talk for one minute on "Why I Am Glad My Family Belongs to Farm Bureau."

All contestants will wear formal dresses in the competition.

The winner of each age group will be awarded as prize, as well as the senior winner being permitted to enter the district contest.

Mrs. C. E. Arrott, secretary of the Coke County Farm Bureau, said Wednesday that any girl who wishes to enter the contest should see her or a member of the queen's race committee. This committee is composed of Mrs. James L. Coffman and Mrs. Fay C. Roe, both of Robert Lee, and Mrs. J. B. Mackey of Bronte. Mrs. Arrott said that membership in Farm Bureau are still being accepted from relatives of girls who wish to enter the contest, and who are not eligible because their father or brother is not a member.

The public is invited to attend the contest.

Local 4-Hers Invited To Menard for WTU Electrical Demonstration

About 150 4-H Club boys and girls, adult leaders, county and home demonstration agents from 22 West Texas counties are expected in Menard Aug. 13, for an Electrical Demonstration Day to be held at the Menard High School. The school is being sponsored by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service and West Texas Utilities Co. R. E. Ruble of Ballinger, WTU District Manager, and R. L. Conner, WTU Menard Local Manager, will serve as hosts for the utilities company.

J. L. (Curly) Hays, WTU Farm and Ranch advisor, will open the program at 9:30 with introductions and group assignments following the registration of delegates. The boys and girls will be divided into two groups. At 10:15 the two groups of boys will see electrical demonstrations by Price Hobgood, Agriculture Engineer, Extension Service of Texas A & M College and Bob Jaska, Research Associate of the Agriculture Department of Texas A & M. At 11:05 the speakers will change groups.

The two groups of girls will attend demonstrations on home lighting given by Jake Traylor of Ballinger, WTU Lighting Advisor, and G. C. Osborne of Abilene, Lighting Supervisor. Mrs. Ruth Clampitt, WTU Home Economist, will give a demonstration on cooking with small appliances.

At noon the group will be the guests of West Texas Utilities Co. for lunch served at WTU Park in Menard.

Following the lunch, Dan Castles, WTU Public Service Department, will present a program on adequate wiring in homes.

The afternoon session will be held in the auditorium where four electrical demonstrations will be presented by 4-H Club teams.

Assisting with the day's program will be R. E. Kennedy, Manager of WTU's Public Service Department.

Attending the school from each county will be two representative boys and two representative girls, the county and home demonstration agents, who have been invited to attend by V. G. Young, District Extension Agent, and Miss Thelma Casey, District Home Demonstration Agent, both of San Angelo.

Season Here For Canning Vegetables

The vegetable canning season is in full swing now. Here are a few pointers given by Mrs. Fay C. Roe, C. H. D. A., that will help in having better quality canned products.

Follow up-to-date canning instructions. Recommended methods have changed a great deal through the years. Come by the office or write for up-to-date information. Mrs. Roe can also furnish instructions for the new one-step method of canning for certain vegetables such as snap peas, peas, squash, etc.

Use the pressure canner method for all non-acid vegetables. Can fruits and tomatoes in the water bath.

Use only standard make jars (with the manufacturer's name imprinted on the jar) when canning in a pressure cooker. The tops

of the jars must be free from nicks to insure a seal.

Most people today seem to be using the 2-piece self-seal lid. This has a metal disc and metal ring. It is self sealing as the jar cools after processing. Screw lids down before placing in pressure canner or water bath. Do not tighten upon removal from canner.

Keep pressure canners in good condition. Check gauge for accuracy once each year. Keep the pet cock of the canner clean. Clean after each use. Keep the opening of the gauge and pet cock clean—a toothpick will do the job.

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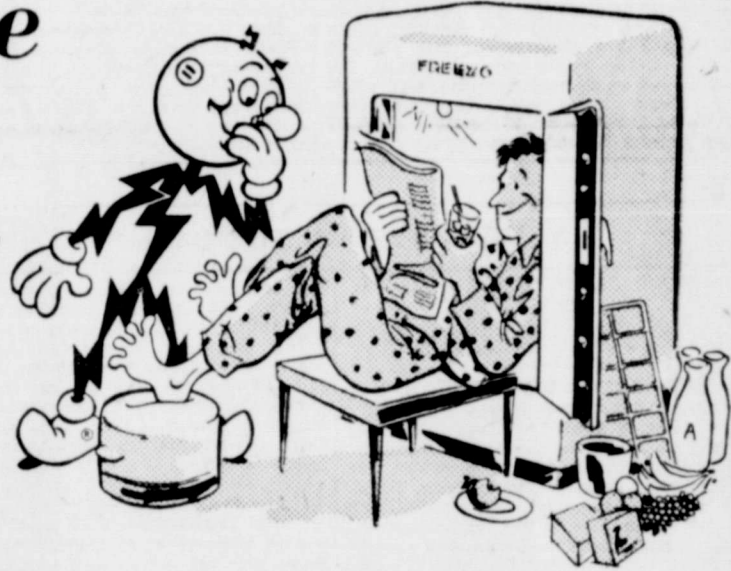
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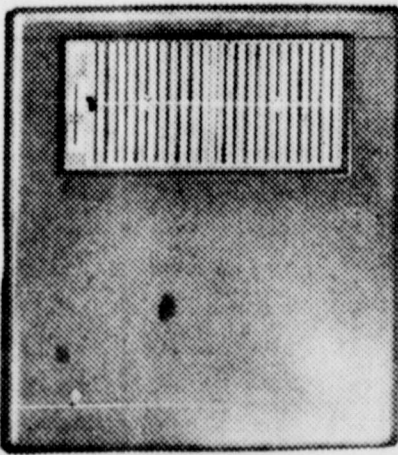

Now is a good time to freeze some eggs for Thanksgiving and Christmas. As you know eggs are plentiful and cheap at this time of the year so you save money as well as assure yourself of plenty of eggs for holiday cooking. Here are the easy to follow directions. Break fresh eggs in cup or bowl to be sure "alls well." They may be separated or frozen as a whole egg. Stir with a fork to mix well, strain through a sieve. To one cup whole eggs or 1 cup yolks (about 5 medium) add one of the following: 1/2 tablespoon sugar, 1/2 tablespoon corn syrup, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Nothing is added to the whites if frozen separately.

Eggs can be frozen in any amount you choose — one whole, two or three or more together. Muffin tins, small bowls, cups or ice cube trays can be used for freezing. When solidly frozen remove from container and place in plastic bag. Label with quantity, date, etc. To use remove needed eggs from freezer, thaw overnight in refrigerator or in container in cold running water.

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article XVI of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as provided by Section 43 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be void by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and this Amendment shall be published and the election held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, blind, and needy children and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person; and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection. "Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning December 1, 1957 and ending August 31, 1959: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Old Age Assistance, One Hundred, Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000) for Aid to the Blind, and Five Hundred, Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and other wise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations, and appropriations for these purposes."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall be printed on such ballot the following clauses.

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions of bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said Fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c, as follows:

"Section 49-c. There is hereby created an agency of the State of Texas to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called "Texas Water Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law. "Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59 or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storing and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for all useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board, income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year prior to December 31, 1958, moneys are received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water De-

velopment Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and upon the same terms and conditions prescribed for the proceeds derived from the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1982, and all moneys thereafter received as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the State bonds, except that such amount as may be required to meet the administrative expenses of the Board may be annually set aside; and provided, that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys so received shall be deposited to the General Revenue Fund.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1957, same being the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1957, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

TEXAS WOMAN'S UNIVERSITY LISTS FEATURES FOR FALL

DENTON, Texas — Texas Woman's University (formerly TSCW) will enroll students from nearly every county in the state this fall. The school always has had a nationwide appeal, according to Francis W. Emerson, dean of admissions-registrar. The session opens Sept. 17-18.

The Texas Legislature's action changing the name to Texas Woman's University officially goes into effect Aug. 19.

With reference to this change, President John A. Guinn explained that "the institution which has been known for more than 50 years as CIA and later as TSCW enters a new era in which it will enjoy the advantages of a designation appropriate to its true character."

More Honors For J. B. Cole Paintings

Mrs. J. B. Cole of Wimberley sends in a reprint from the San Marcos Record concerning some of her husband's recent paintings which attracted wide interest. The Coles are former well known Coke County residents, having moved to Wimberley a few years ago.

Following is the reprinted news story:

J. B. Cole of Wimberley tied for two second place awards at the Fredericksburg Art Clubs annual Outdoor Art Exhibition July 6 and 7.

Mr. Cole, a retired rancher, began painting at the age of 60 in order to utilize his spare time. His style and subjects have attracted wide-spread attention.

The exhibit contained 200 paintings — oil, watercolor, pen and ink drawings, pencil sketches and a display of rocks and semi-precious stones and items of jewelry and cutlery using stone inlay, a display of sculptures in marble obtained from many parts of the world, wood carving, a fine collection of wood inlay art work, some textile painting, and a grouping of miniature costumed dolls.

Cleo Havins was released Friday from Big Spring Veterans Hospital and is now convalescing at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Pat Havins, south of Robert Lee. Cleo underwent a spinal fusion operation in Dallas in May and two weeks later was transferred to the Big Spring hospital. He is making a good recovery. Cleo is a civil service employee at Goodfellow AFB fire department.

TSCW is the only college or university in the entire South which offers the doctorate in all major subject matter areas of home economics. To date, 19 Ph.D.'s have been conferred, mainly in the fields of nutrition and textile technology.

Its research programs, which include research services available to state hospitals and special schools as well as other state institutions and establishments, are supported by industrial, governmental and private grants which in the past five years have totaled more than a half-million dollars.

TSCW's occupational therapy school has the only such degree program for undergraduates in the Southwest. Its enrollment of freshmen occupational therapy majors is expected to be the largest in the nation.

The School of Library Science was the first in Texas to be accredited by the American Library Association and has been so designated ever since.

TSCW's College of Nursing, which utilizes the clinical facilities of Parkland Memorial Hospital in nearby Dallas, has grown to where this fall it will have more than 250 students in the four collegiate levels.

The Department of Journalism is the only one in a woman's college ever accredited by the American Council on Education for Journalism. This accreditation began in 1948 and was renewed in June of this year.

Four new buildings of modern functional design were opened on the campus during the past year and several other important specialized buildings will be started in 1958.
