Pecan Spraying Indicated For Period May 26-30

Several people have inquired about spraying pecan trees to control the nut casebearer. I checked several pecan trees in the area and found only one. The proper time for spraying is still a few days away. Just when to spray can be told only by checking the nut clusters for eggs. I believe spraying during the period from May 26 to 30 will give the best control. I will check more nut clusters later in the week and should be able to give a positive answer at that time. To be sure of timing, you could check the nut clusters closely and especially for the appearance of casebearer eggs. The eggs are usually deposited singly on the tip of the blossom end of the small nuts; they are pearly white with a bluish tinge and about a third the size of the nut head. They hatch in four to five days. After hatching, the worm moves down below the pecan cluster and feeds on the buds in the leaf axil. The buds are covered and the tell-tale webbing of black frass around the bud can be seen. After four or five days of bud feeding, the worm now grows larger, moves back to the stem and bores a hole at the base of the pecan and enters to feed.

Because of the short period of time the worm is exposed, timing of control measures is of utmost importance. Long residual sprays such as DDT can be applied when a number of eggs are found in the bud. If fairly short residual sprays such as malathion are used, it is best to wait until some of the eggs have hatched and worms are found feeding in the buds.

Proper application of the insecticide must include a thorough wetting of the nut clusters and the stems immediately below. To do this on a large tree it is best to have a sprayer that will develop 300 to 600 pounds pressure. Small hand sprayers will do the job, but are slow and tedious and without pressure the leaves will not be parted enough to wet the cluster of nuts and the immediate area where the casebearer does his feeding.

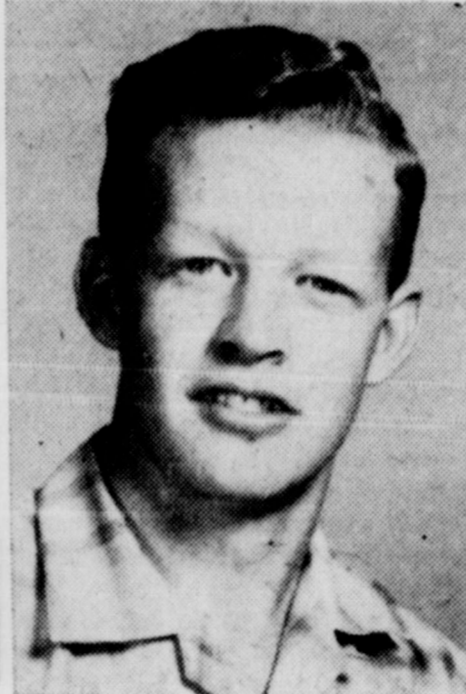

P. W. Millican west of Edith and W. M. Millican gauged around 3 1/2 inches during a two-hour rain early Saturday afternoon. The Edith locality and the area east to the Colorado River west of Robert Lee had about 2 inches.

Rainfall here now amounts to 11.78 inches since the first of the year.

Farmers welcome the fair weather this week and hope to get along with planting and field work. No additional moisture will be needed for the grain crop which is maturing rapidly.

Expect Profit Of \$300 From Big Barbecue

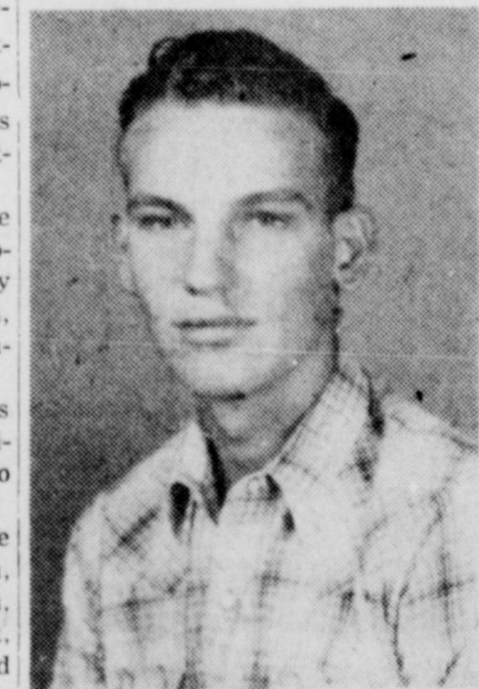
A net profit of \$300 is anticipated from the barbecue held at the County Park in Robert Lee last Friday evening.

The affair was sponsored jointly by the Silver Lions Club and the Robert Lee Board of Community Development. All proceeds will be devoted to the summer recreation program.

In addition they loan pick-ups to 4H and FFA groups to familiarize students with one type of equipment used in agriculture. He said that many schools offer classroom theory only, due to the shortage of qualified "behind the wheel" instructors.

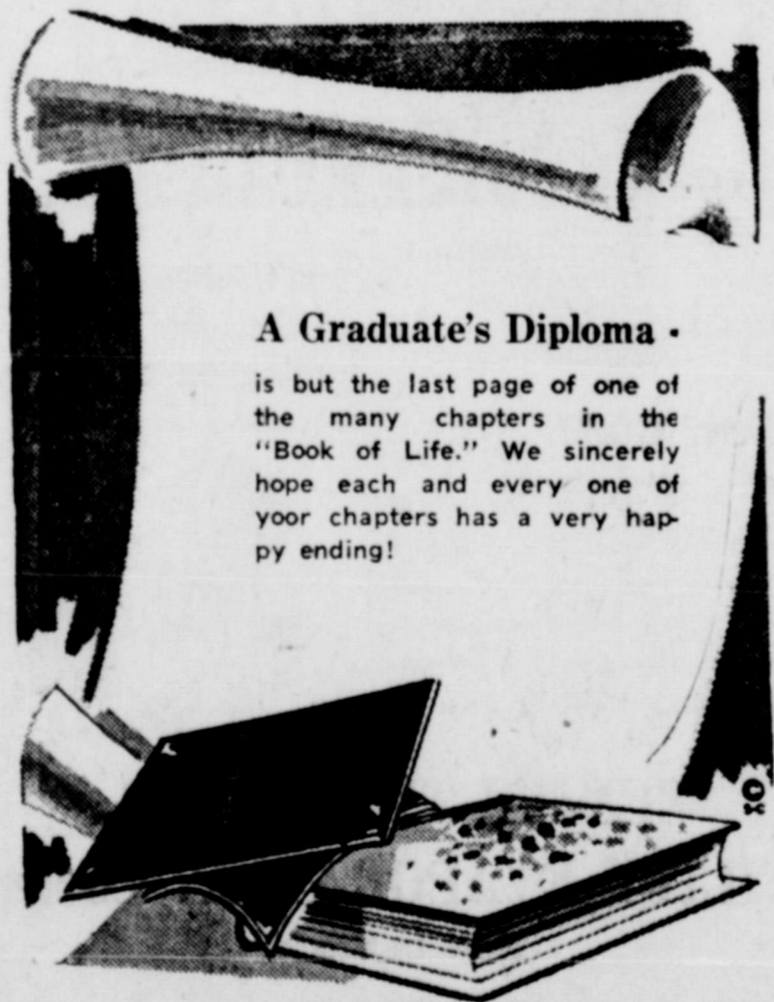

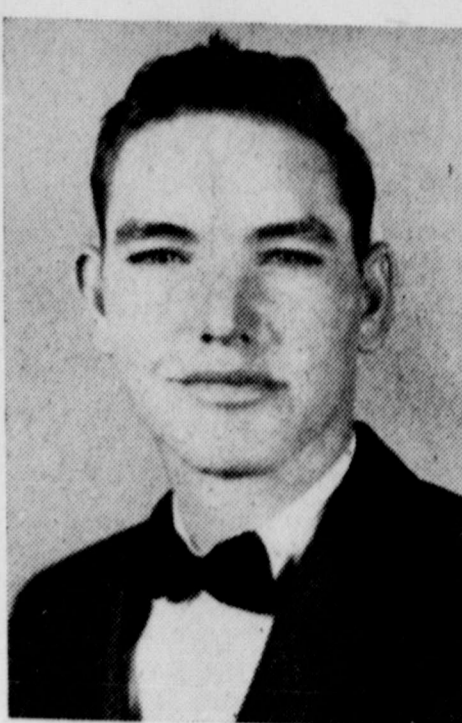

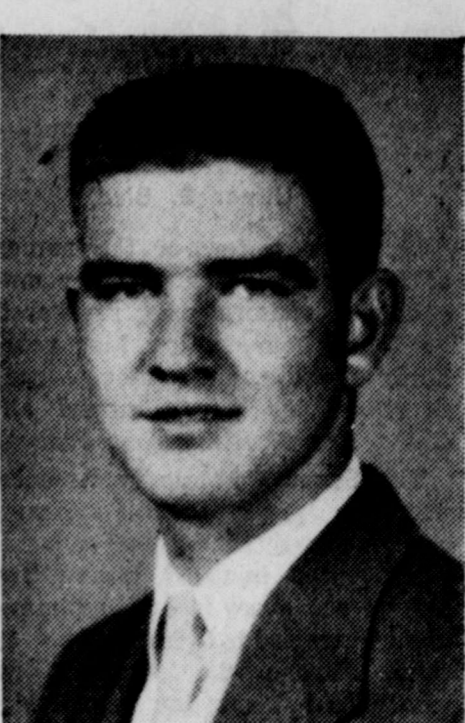
