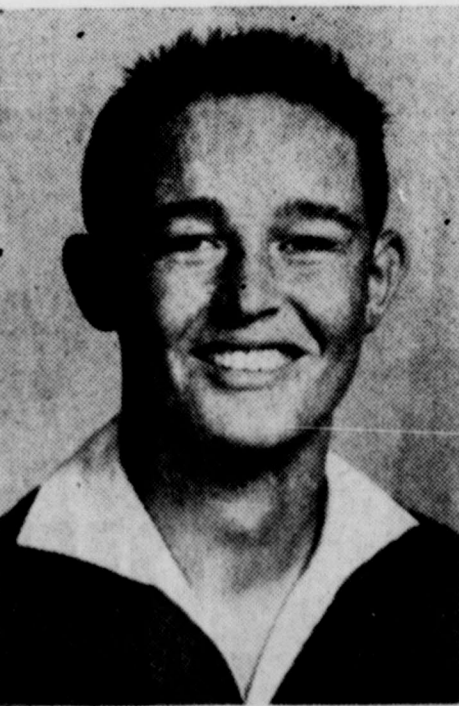

Traffic is heavy at this point since it leads down town and also goes north to the new County Park. It will be a red signal, requiring all traffic to stop before proceeding through the intersection.

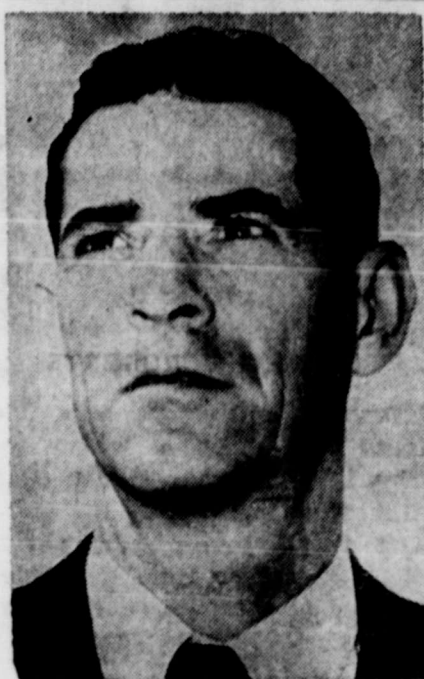

Travis McNair Returns To Local Church

Best Oats Crop In Years Being Harvested Now

A wonderful grain harvest is underway in Coke County. It's by far the best crop in many years, and may be the best this area has ever produced.

Oats is the principal crop, although there are some fields of wheat and barley.

Some of this year's oats came up volunteer and were grazed longer than usual. But weather conditions have been ideal for small grain. The spring was cool and there was plenty of moisture.

And now the harvest is progressing with equally favorable conditions. Grain has matured properly and heads are well filled. Dry weather has come on and the grain is ripe.

Oat yields are running from 50 bushels up to 60, 70 and more. Much of the crop is being stored for feed. Some is being sold locally at 50c per bushel delivered. The government is supporting a price of 59 cents a bushel for sealed oats. Quality is good, running 2 or 3 pounds over the 32-pound per bushel weight.

Sanco's Homecoming Sunday was the biggest and best since the event was started four years ago. Former residents came from many states to renew acquaintances and recount happenings of bygone days.

The Sanco Methodist church where the morning program was held overflowed with homecomers and home folks. Nolan Pentecost, president of the Sanco Community Ass'n, welcomed the guests and turned the meeting over to Ulmer S. Bird, who served as master of ceremonies. Scripture reading and songs by the choir featured the program.

The big Tabernacle was packed with people around long tables in the old country style "dinner on the grounds."

After the noon meal and during a visiting period, some of the former residents launched among themselves a project of restoring the roof of the community tabernacle, scene of many Sanco Camp Meetings and barbecue dinners in the past.

O. E. (Orville) Smith of Baytown was informally named chairman of a committee of "exes" for the re-roofing undertaking. It was estimated an expenditure of \$1,000 would be required.

Sanco, named for one Comanche Chief (Sanco) and situated on Yellow Wolf Creek, which was named for another chief, took a look backward 100 years to 1858 when the Overland Mail, or Butterfield Trail, was opened through the area.

Former postmasters were mentioned since the Sanco post office was established 170 years ago. The longest service in the office for any one person was H. J. Gartman, 80, now of Austin who was unable to be present. He served 27 years before reaching the compulsory retirement age ten years ago.

Since then his daughter-in-law, Mrs. T. A. Gartman, served three years, Ulmer Bird three years, and the present postmaster, Mrs. Ulmer Bird, is in her fourth year.

The first postmaster was Mrs. J. L. Durham and others included O. L. Tubb, L. C. Clevenger, W. H. Campbell. Mrs. John Allen was acting postmaster for several months a few years ago.

Coming farthest was Mrs. D. D. McElroy, 82, of 417 N. Oxford Ave., Los Angeles, Calif. She was accompanied by her son, W. R. McElroy, and his daughter, Mrs. Faye McElroy Cheever, also of Los Angeles.

Mrs. McElroy was formerly Ethel Poore and lived in the 1880's with an uncle, John Barron, at his Yellow Wolf Ranch headquarters. A few months ago she came back to Coke County for the first time in 60 years, and hearing of the Sanco Homecoming she returned for it, coming a distance of 1,250 miles.

More information concerning Homecoming visitors will be printed next week.

Texans May Cut Traffic Deaths If They Keep On

Texans have a good chance to reduce their annual traffic death toll to the lowest figure since 1949, but only IF they continue to improve their driving as they have thus far this year.

Governor Price Daniel, Chairman of the Texas Traffic Safety Council and leader of the State's all-out safety crusade, has been advised by the Dept. of Public Safety that Texas motorcycles for the first 21 weeks of the year show a decrease of 117 over the same period of 1957. This represents a drop of 14 per cent.

A total of 836 traffic deaths were recorded through the 21st week of 1957, while only 719 are estimated for the same period of the present year.

And the DPS told the Governor: "IF — and this is a big IF — Texans will continue to improve their driving as much as they have thus far this year, there is a possibility that motorcycles may even fall below the 1949 total of 1,957 persons."

The 1949 total was the lowest traffic toll of any year since 1945. Should the 1958 death list drop that much, the reduction would be 582 in the number of deaths, or about 23 per cent, under the 1957 figure. The Governor's traffic safety campaign has set a minimum goal of 254 fewer victims than last year, or about 10 per cent.

Some 35 farmers, ranchers and contractors of the Sterling City and Robert Lee area attended a root plowing and reseeding demonstration last Thursday. The demonstration was held on the Rufus Foster ranch about 12 miles west of Robert Lee on the Sterling City highway.

The field day was sponsored jointly by the Coke and North Concho River Soil Conservation Districts and Treanor Equipment Company of Abilene. The root plowing followed a short film on results obtained from root plowing. The root plowed plot was seeded to sideoats grama, blue grama, plains bristle grain, buffalo grass, sorghum alum, blue panic, and perennial sweet sudan.

Mr. Foster plans to defer the root plowed area until well established in grass.

This plot will warrant watching. A sign will be erected to mark the plot on the highway.

Of the 330 applications received under the F-4 flood disaster program all but a few have been serviced. Those few individuals who have not been contacted on their approvals should contact the Soil Conservation Service in the Court House as soon as possible. June 30 is the deadline for completing practices under this program.

Several Soil Bank participants are spraying their land for weed control to prevent competition with young grass seedlings. The kill has varied somewhat with the different weeds, temperature, and wind.

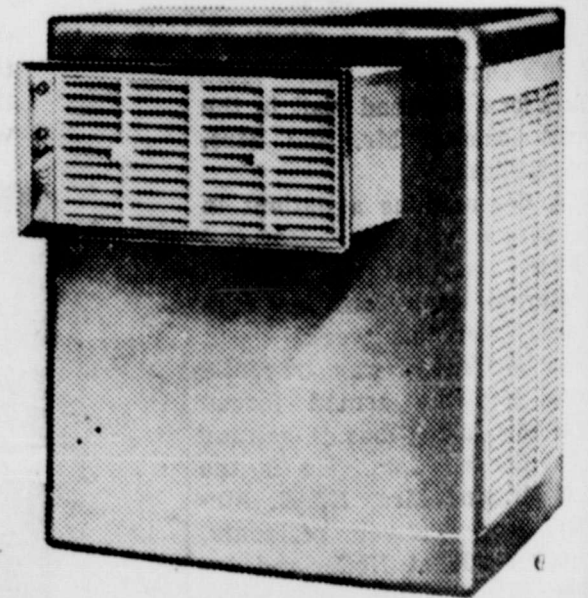

SMALL TALK

Coke County Commissioners Court has been discussing the matter of hiring outside lawyers to clean up delinquent taxes. While about 95% of the county taxes are usually collected, there is a remaining 5% that stays on the books and nothing is done about them. According to my law book the county tax collector should do something about it, but he don't.

So they engage a special collector at a certain fee, probably 10% of what he collects. He writes letters, threatens suit, gets all he can and then quits. After he's gone there are still a lot of delinquent taxes on the books.

Some of the delinquencies involve small pieces of property on which taxes have not been paid for years, and in quite a number of cases the ownership is not known and it is assessed as "owner unknown."

The thing is that this property, (it might be just a lot or two in a locality that was not too desirable) cannot be bought or sold unless the taxes are paid up.

So it seems to me that all these little parcels should belong to somebody. The only way to get a clear title to them is to file a tax suit, foreclose and sell them for taxes. All tracts may not bring as much as the tax bill and costs amount to, but the property would have a new owner who would pay taxes in the future. The matter is of interest to the school district as well as the county, and is of particular importance to the City of Robert Lee. We are scattered out too much now. Paving, water lines and a possible sewer system are too expensive to be extended along vacant property.

Most people will agree that delinquent taxes and property titles should be cleared up. If it is started again it should be with a bonded agreement that it will go all the way, and not scrape the surface. Also that the city, school and county taxing districts unite in the program.

I don't mean to devote this entire column to gripes, but it seems some constructive criticism is often valuable. If and when I criticize, I at the same time will submit what I consider a suggestion which might improve the problem being discussed.

Right now Robert Lee has a future that looks good. We have many fine improvements that will attract more people if we could provide adequate housing. A dozen or more comfortable rent houses are need at this time, but we are not getting them.

The matter was brought up a second time at the BCD this week. Maybe there is a way to finance some houses through the FHA or other agencies. Before the discussion was finished, someone moved to adjourn.

We sent out several subscription due notices lately. Looks like most of them may have already gone in the waste basket.

Tommy Gibson says he was turned down for enlistment in the army the other day because he was too big. He's 5 feet 10½ inches tall and weighed 214 pounds. So he came home and is doing something about it. Took off 6 pounds in a few days, and is going back next week and enlist in the Marines.

An editorial in the Standard-Times was critical of San Angelo business firms not staying open on Memorial Day. Indicated they must not need the business and anyhow Decoration Day was not a legal holiday in Texas. Well, May 30 is a national legal holiday and is the one day in the year set aside to honor especially those who gave up their lives in war, as well as all persons who have passed to the Great Beyond.
