## Steers Ride High In Eldorado Win

Robert Lee Steers have shifted into high gear this week following their 18-14 upset victory over the Eldorado Eagles last Friday night. It was a 6-B conference game.

This week Robert Lee journeys to Menard for a non-conference scrap with a tough eleven that was nosed out 22-21 last week by Boerne. Menard will be trying to avenge the 19-0 licking they suffered here last year.

The experts who guess the winners for the Bronte, Abilene and San Angelo newspapers will no doubt place Robert Lee as the underdogs as they did last week against Eldorado.

But the defeat of Eldorado's Eagles wasn't a fluke. It was pretty one-sided for the Eagles during the first half, but the Steers had a wide margin during the last two periods.

Recovering a fumble on the Steer 40 yard line in the first quarter, Eldorado moved for a touchdown and converted 2 points. The second period was scoreless and Eldorado was ahead 8-0 at half time.

In the third quarter Sam Ed Skipworth punted out on the Eagle 1-yard line. They immediately kicked out and Robert Lee had possession on the Eldorado 27. The Steers marched goalward and John Walker went over from the 2 for a touchdown. They failed to convert on a line play.

Early in the last period Eldorado punted to the Steer 5-yard line. On a line plunge Freddy McDonald fumbled, but Jerry Quisenberry recovered and ran 60 yards to the Eagle 35 before he was hauled down from behind. McDonald then went around end for 27 yards to the 8 and Jerry Tinkler tossed a pass to his brother,

After receiving the kickoff the Eagles were forced to punt and Robert Lee had the ball on their 34. McDonald cut through right tackle, picked up four nice blocks and ran 66 yards for a touchdown. The Steers again couldn't carry over to convert the extra points.

A short time later the Eagles scored their second touchdown on a pass play which was good for 58 yards. They failed to convert. McDonald intercepted an Eagle pass as the game ended with the score standing: Robert Lee 18, Eldorado 14.

Statistics showed 13 first downs for Eldorado and 12 for Robert Lee.

Yards gained: Robert Lee, 304 rushing, 8 passing, 312 total. Eldorado, 219 rushing, 82 passing, 301 total yardage. Eldorado was held to a net gain of 27 yards on the ground during the entire second half.

The Steer line showed a lot of improvement, with honors going to young Jerry Quisenberry at center. This permitted Skipworth to occupy a guard slot on offense and drop back as a linebacker on defense. All the other linemen were outstanding.

Robert Lee is now tied with Lorraine for the top spot in district 6-B, each having one victory and no defeats in loop play.

Bronte won an easy 22-0 victory over Colorado City B last Thursday night. Lorraine took a surprise 14-6 victory over Trent and Hermleigh downed Roby 28-14.

Eldorado plays at Trent this week, Lorraine meets Stanton and Bronte will face an acid test against the Cardinals at Hermleigh. The Longhorns have a couple of disabled linemen. Stover Taylor, 185-pounder, has a fractured foot and may not play again this season. Bobby Wrinkle, 206 pounds, has not worked out this week because of a light concussion.

Thursday night of next week, Oct. 16, Silver plays at Hermleigh.

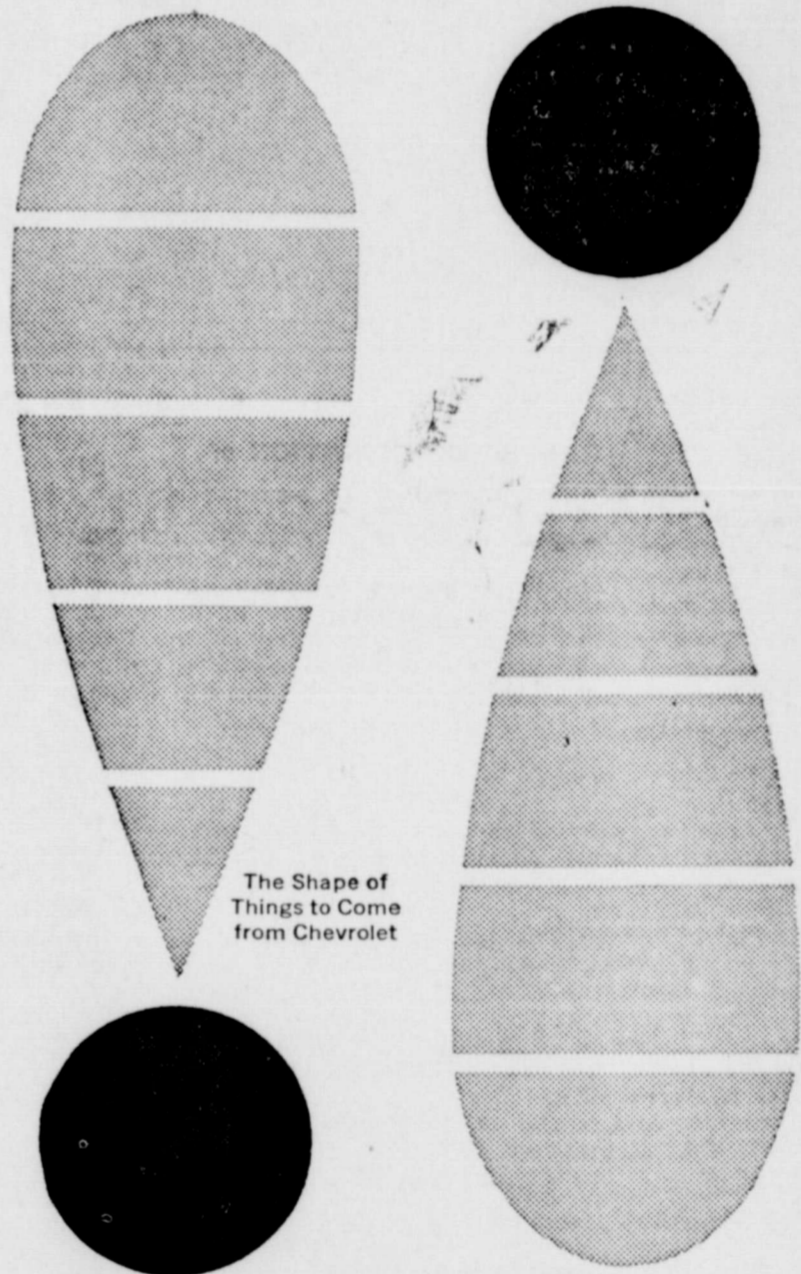

Extension home management specialists suggest starting at the top of the closet with hats. A square hat box uses the shelf space to better advantage than a round one. Find a box as large as the shelf will take, so more than one hat can be tucked into it.

Liberal use of tissue paper keeps the hats in good condition. If shelf space is limited, perhaps a second shelf can be added. This higher shelf will be good storage space for seasonal items or anything that is seldom used.

Lower down, the rod for hangars might be changed from a single one, the full width of the closet, to two shorter ones installed from back to front. This arrangement adds space and convenience especially in shallow and wide closets.

On your rod or rods, hang garments by sections according to lengths, blouses to the back or end, then suits and skirts and lastly, dresses. Under the short pieces you will have storage room for out of season garments.

If your closet is still too stuffed, take a good look at your wardrobe. A garment you haven't worn in months probably isn't so valu-

able to you as the closet room. Store out-of-season clothing carefully to make room for seasonal garments.

Good closet accessories will help keep your wardrobe in good condition. You can make your own shoe bags, hat boxes, glove boxes and dress covers. Directions are given in a new extension bulletin, "Facts about Clothing Care." Come by my office or phone for a copy of this bulletin.

## County Agents News Column

The Coke County 4-H Clubs have terminated their drive to control the mice and rats infesting the area. It is hoped that the program has met with success. In many cases the eventual results are yet to be tabulated. The influx of cool weather and/or lack of food outside has not been completed.

Should a sudden change occur in the future in the numbers present, particularly around storage areas, the 4-H Clubs will renew the campaign.

In the meantime, taking precautions to prevent them from getting a foothold in the farmstead area would be advisable. Cleaning up the premises and plugging holes will help. Also, we will attempt to keep abreast of the situation in order to be prepared for another campaign if one becomes necessary.

With the recent rains, the temporary and permanent pastures have changed almost over night. Nearly everyone it seems would like to have a few more head of sheep, cattle, steers or something if they could find the right buy. All the sales of stocker animals we have heard of or read about have been for so called high prices. The markets have been very active.

The question has arisen and must arise in each operators mind as he is buying — what will the market be next year or when I go to market with these animals? No one knows, but the economists have plotted the trends.

At the present, indications are that neither will change a great deal, up or down, except for local changes such as we are having now brought on by the surplus of grass.

The outlook, following present trends, is different for swine. The number of slaughtered hogs is expected to increase this fall, then increase still more in the spring and next fall.

We mention the hog market because some operators and also economists are wondering what effect cheaper pork and cheaper poultry may have on the beef cattle and sheep markets. They possibly should be taken into consideration, particularly in the long range outlook.

This is National Fire Prevention week. The best defense against fire is fire prevention. The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council reports that by not giving fire a place to start, the Nation's annual fire losses of about 150 million could be cut in half.
