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

However, Loraine will not get a defeat, but Eldorado Eagles get to represent the district in the playoff due to an earlier 7-6 defeat over Loraine.

The Steers drew first blood in the opening quarter, with Loraine getting a touchdown in the second period. The score was 6-6 at the

The Bulldogs got their second touchdown in the third period and a 2-point conversion and added another 6 points in the final quar-

Loraine received the opening kickoff and drove 55 yards to the Steer 5-yard line when they were held for downs. Freddy McDonald and John Walker in three plays moved to the 20 and a 1st down. Then Ronnie Sims went wide around his left end for more than forty yards and a 1st down on the Bulldog 36.

Three carries by McDonald failed to make a 1st down by inches. On the next play he went off right tackle then cut to the left and ran for a touchdown. A pass at-

Near the end of the quarter Rolast week to Governor-Elect John bert Lee recovered a Loraine fumble near midfield. Sims got 4 yards and McDonald 3.
