Bronte Ran Over Robert Lee 31-8

Bronte waited until the final game of the season to log its only District 6-B win, but the Longhorns accomplished this feat in convincing fashion by stampeding the Robert Lee Steers 31-8 here Friday night before a capacity Homecoming crowd.

By upsetting the heavily favored Steers, the Longhorns supplied a silver lining to a dismal season.

Bronte rode the airplanes in this rival contest, and rolled up 209 yards via the passing route. Quarterback Albert Grace and fullback Dee Arrott shared passing duties for the Longhorns and completed eight of 23 passes.

Other than the terrific passing yardage accumulated by Bronte, the game was about even statistically. First downs were even at nine each, and Robert Lee edged the Longhorns in the rushing department 143 yards to 131.

Bronte scored in every period, and the outcome of the game was never in doubt after the Longhorns pushed over the first touchdown of the game midway through the first quarter.

The score was set up by a bad snap from center on a Robert Lee fourth down punting situation. Sam Skipworth, the punter, retrieved the bad snap back but

was smothered by four Bronte linemen on his own nine yard line. After an incompleting pass on first down, the Longhorns hit paydirt on their next attempt when Arrott took a pitch-out from Grace and passed complete to Neil Black in the end zone. Danny Scott missed on his extra point kicking attempt.

Mid-way through the second period Freddie McDonald, the Steers scoring threat, fumbled and Bronte recovered on the Robert Lee 23-yard line. Alonzo Robbins ran for three, and then Arrott circled left end for 15 to advance the ball to the five yard line. An offside penalty against the Steers placed the ball on the one, and on the following play Robbins burst through a gaping hole over left tackle for the touchdown. Scott missed again and Bronte led 12-0 at halftime.

Bronte's third quarter score came early in the third quarter on a 70-yard drive. Grace sparked the drive with good passing and running. The drive was climaxed by a pass and run play from Grace to Mickey Black that covered 39 yards. Scott kicked his only point of the game and Bronte took a 19-0 lead.

On the last play of the third quarter Robert Lee broke into the scoring column when halfback Ronnie Sims swept left end on fourth down for a two yard touchdown. The score came following a 71-yard drive. Jerry Tinkler passed to Kenneth Wink for the two extra points.

Following the kickoff, Bronte went 52 yards for another score. Arrott advanced the ball to the Robert Lee 43, then Grace hit Robbins in the flat with an aerial and the fleet halfback raced down the sidelines for the touchdown. Scott missed the extra point.

The final Bronte score came in the waning moments of the game when Arrott took a pitch-out from Grace and scampered around right end for a 1-yard touchdown. Scott missed the point.

Mr. and Mrs. Jahew Jameson visited over the weekend with their friends, Mr. and Mrs. Bowman Gentry in Big Spring.

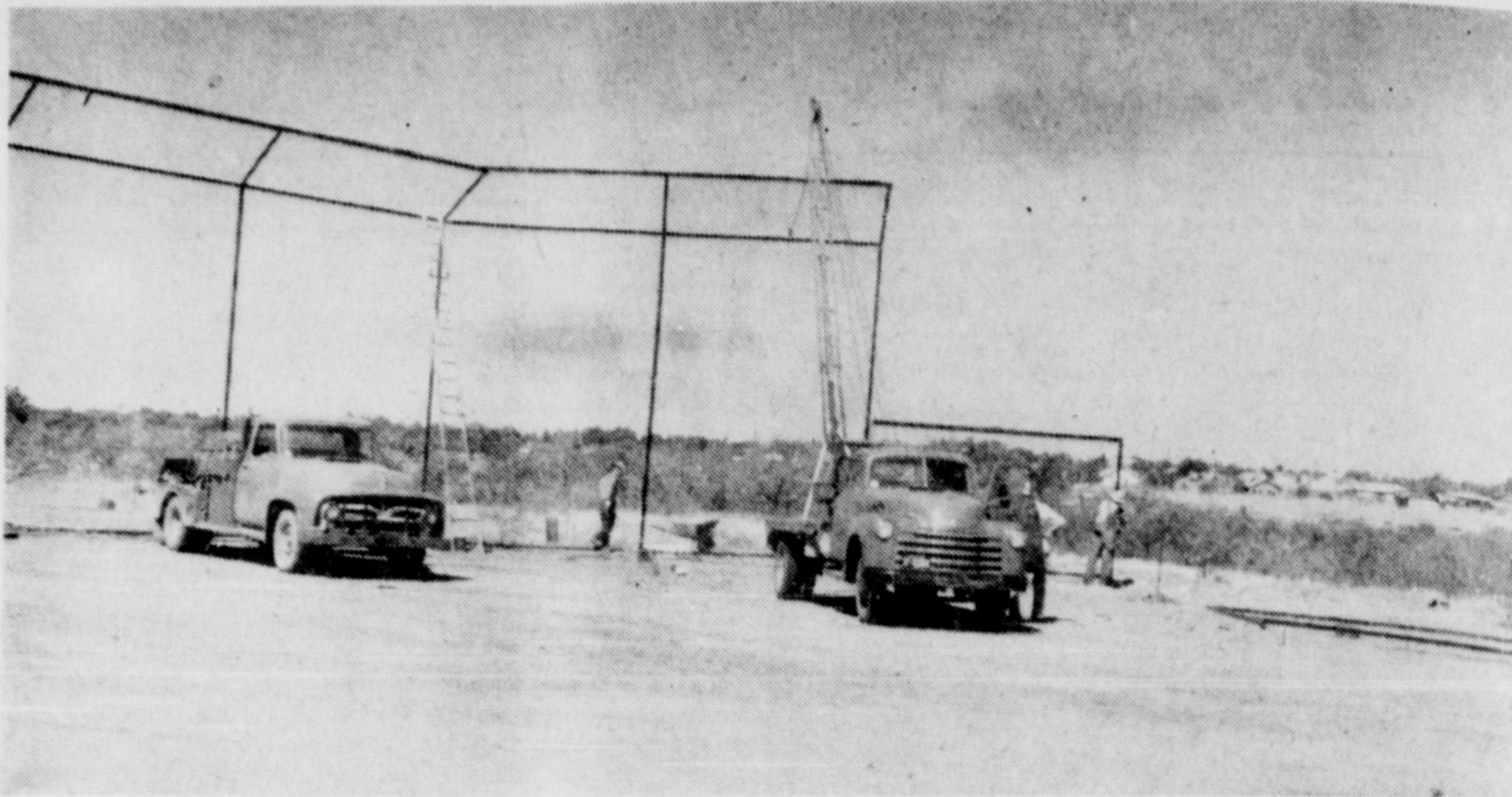

receiving dental attention.

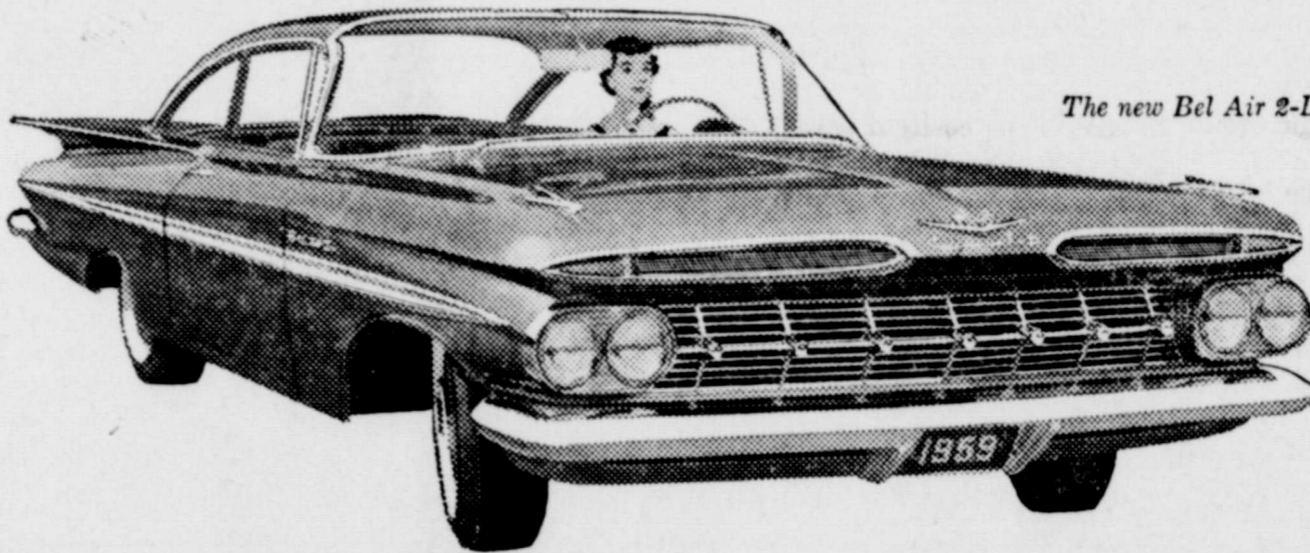
Don Albright, Sun production field clerk, is a flu patient. He was on a vacation trip last week and both he and his wife became ill over the weekend.

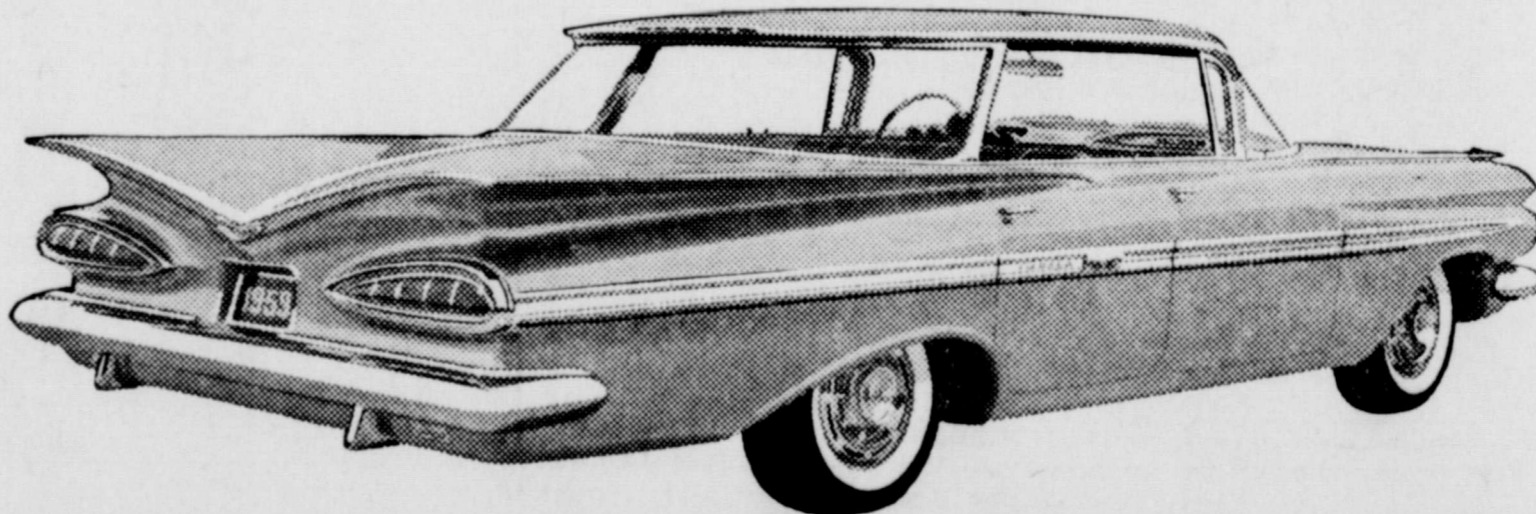

An Open Letter

Dear Virginia Jay:

I read your letter to the Observer very carefully and it seems a bit vague to me. I would like to ask a few questions. Who is trying to strangle the little towns, especially Robert Lee? Who is pulling the ropes around her neck? It couldn't be the town itself, could it? Who is knocking on the hospital and wanting it closed? I have heard no one knocking on it or wanting it closed.

Personally, I am a friend of the doctor and of all the nurses. If the board finds it impossible to get funds to keep it going, who is to blame?

Sixty years ago, as a bride, I came to Coke County, and since that time, my husband and I have spent thousands of dollars in Robert Lee. I have been a friend to the town, having lived there and worked there for a time, myself. I have many friends in this little town and I value them highly. Furthermore I pay my hospital bills and seldom go elsewhere for anything that can be bought in Robert Lee. What is true of me is also true of many of the country people.

Could it be possible that the country people are to be burdened with this deficit by higher taxes on the farms and ranches? People who have gone through a recent drouth of at least seven years and who have stayed here by a great struggle against odds? It is a very small percent of the people who have oil wells on their property and those who do are not getting rich fast. It is not like it used to be in the oil business. And let us all remember that prices are high for us too.

I am a widow and I cannot get out and supplement my income with wages as so many younger ranchers have to do. I have a small ranch and am trying to get a living out of it. I have no social security nor old age pension. I don't cost the government anything. My income is barely enough to meet my bare necessities. If it had not been for a few oil leases, I do not know how I would have made the grade. These come only every ten years or so. My pasturage lease and a few hundred dollars oil rentals have enabled me to get by so far and I do not think an added burden of taxes should be expected of me. What I say of myself would apply to many others. There are three or four other widows in this vicinity who have little ranches and get little or no income from them. Land is not selling at these fictitious prices you hear about. It just isn't selling.

There are many things we would all like to have that we cannot afford. If we are to stay solvent, we must live within our income. No one would regret the closing of the hospital more than I would. You are so right when you say that if we go to another hospital we have to pay the money, so why not pay it here at home? Of course there are a few people so destitute that they cannot pay, but I daresay there is not a big percentage of the delinquent bills in this class.

If the country people are to be "strangled" and become unable to pay their bills, who then will come forth to fill this emergency? Let us look this thing squarely in the face and then maybe it will become apparent who is strangling

whom. Now Virginia, I know you are honest and fair, so I appeal to your integrity. Let's be fair about this thing.

County Agents News Column

During recent months, a livestock and human disease, that has been with us for years, has received more than its share of publicity. You probably have heard and seen it discussed on television. You possibly have discussed it with a friend or neighbor. The disease is brucellosis, or if you prefer, bangs disease or contagious abortion — a disease of cattle, sheep, horses, swine and goats that can cause undulant fever in humans.

And as a Texan, you will hear more about brucellosis in the future, not because of the severity of the disease, but because Texas is fast endangering their position as a producer and supplier of feeder and stocker cattle by not employing some brucellosis control measures.

In only two years, at the present rate of action, only three per cent of the counties in the United States will have unrestricted markets for Texas cattle. Texas' entire economy will be affected, not just the farmers and ranchers, if present trends continue.

It is our aim, through this and other means, to help publicize the situation. And with assistance of local cattlemen, veterinarians, the Farm Bureau and our County Building Committee, attempt to set up a program of action.

Texas does not have a high rate of infection, not as high as some other states, but the lack of action to control the costly disease is placing the State in a very unfavorable position. We will attempt to inform you of that position and the national situation.

On a national scale, brucellosis control is moving rapidly. During 1958 four more states were added to the list of those already modified Brucellosis free. Fifteen states currently recognized are: New Jersey, Michigan, New Mexico, Utah, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Minnesota, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Vermont, Washington and Wisconsin. In addition 537 counties in other states have received certification. At last count, fifty-three percent of the Counties in the United States are either certified, or on area control programs.

According to Secretary of Agriculture Benson, ninety per cent of all U. S. Counties will be certified by 1960. Texas' 254 counties represent approximately seven percent of the U. S. total. Unless we act with speed, only three percent of the counties in the United States will be unrestricted markets for our cattle within two years.

With livestock representing forty-eight percent of the agricultural income of Texas, such a situation must not be allowed to develop. No one is in better position to help the livestock industry meet the critical challenge of brucellosis than you. Time is short and the need is critical.

We plan another article on the subject next week further explain-

ing the situation and mentioning some action that has been proposed.

PHONE MAN MOVES HERE

E. G. Lindsey and his family recently moved from Bronte to Robert Lee and are occupying General Telephone Company's residence. Mr. Lindsey is maintenance man for the Blackwell, Bronte, Robert Lee and Sterling City exchanges. He and his wife have taken over operation of the local switchboard, succeeding Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Goode, who have returned to San Angelo. The telephone company is now changing the Robert Lee rural lines over to dial, and when this work is completed the switchboard will be discontinued.

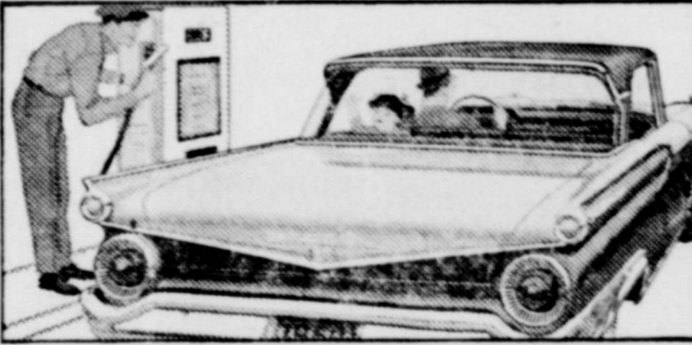

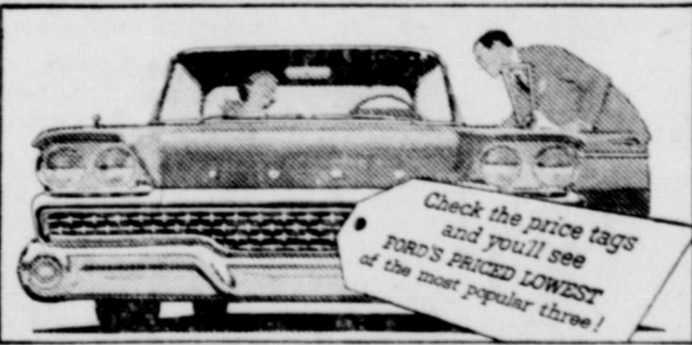

Topping the list of 93 awards were the Gold Star awards presented to Marjorie Gladys Rives and Dee Arrott. Miss Rives is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Rives, Jr. of Robert Lee and Dee is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Arrott of Tennyson.

Marjorie Gladys, Robert Lee high school sophomore, has been a 4-H member for six years. She had a well rounded program with

clothing, foods, gardening, recreation and has served on a number of planning committees.

The past year she won County Dress Revue and was one of the top three in the District Revue, entitling her to model in the State Revue. Other awards she has won include: Dress Revue, Food Preparation, County Achievement Awards; year pins for five years; first place, county Dairy Foods, 1955-56; first place, county team vegetable demonstration, 1957; second place dairy demonstration 1958; first place, share the fun, 1958.

Dr. Bestor is a past president of the Council for Basic Education and is the author of "Educational Wastelands" which has created a stir in educational circles.

Dr. Bestor feels that learning is a full-time job and that classroom hours add up to less than a normal work week.

The additional time, he says, must be made up by study outside the classroom. Such study not only helps the student digest what he has learned but will help both him and his teacher to spot the particular points or areas where he lacks full understanding.

The amount of homework assigned, therefore, is one measure of a good school. — San Angelo Standard Times.

Sun Oil Co. has staked a wildcat, No. B-1 Foster Sims Price, 16 miles northwest of Robert Lee. It is located 660 feet from the east and south lines of Section 323 H-&TC Survey. Lease on the property runs out Jan. 27, 1959.

The location is a mile north and three-fourths mile west of the Cynthia Malone wildcat drilled two years ago on top of Meadow Mountain. Sun, Humble and Magnolia were interested in the test which reported a good showing in the Strawn but was not completed as a producer.

A contract for the Price wildcat is expected to be let immediately.

IMPORTANT TEST

Humble set 7-inch casing at its No. 4-B Harris Estate at 5,558 feet, after plugging back from a total depth of 6,400 feet.

The wildcat located in T. G. Goss Survey 1 is about 13 miles northwest of Robert Lee and is a long stepout from production in the new I. A. B. (Menielle Penn) field.

Casing will be perforated opposite a lime section. This is an important test and if a producer is made a wide extension of the field will be assured.

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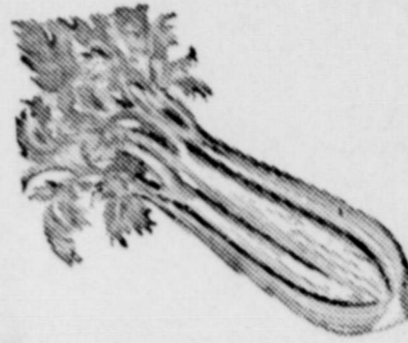
