Rites Thursday For J. S. Ross, Robert Lee Man

John S. Ross, 85, long time and highly respected Robert Lee resident, died at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday in Coke County Memorial Hospital. He suffered a stroke a week previously and had been in the hospital since.

Mr. Ross had been in failing health for two years after receiving serious burns in a gas stove explosion.

Funeral services were scheduled for Thursday at 10 a. m. in the Robert Lee Baptist Church in charge of the pastor, the Rev. Bennie Smith. Burial was to be in Robert Lee cemetery under direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Mr. Ross was born Sept. 4, 1873 in Benton County, Ark., and later moved to Henderson County, Texas. He married Miss Gertrude Bulger on Dec. 15, 1897.

They moved to Coke County in 1906. He was engaged in farming and was an early day mail carrier between Robert Lee and San Angelo, and also was an experienced gardener and nurseryman. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

His wife died in November, 1947. In recent years he made his home here with his son, Roy P. Ross, and family and also made extensive visits in the homes of his other children.

Mr. Ross was a good friend and neighbor and a good citizen who was loved and admired by everyone.

Surviving are three sons and three daughters. They are Roy P. Ross of Robert Lee, Mrs. Lydia Ayers of Mansville, Okla., Mrs. Treatie Cole of Midland, Jeff E. Ross, Mrs. Ruth Humble and Warren G. Ross, all of Pueblo, Colo.

He is also survived by a brother, A. L. Ross of Conroe and a sister, Mrs. Addie Tillison of Lawton, Okla.

There are 28 grandchildren and 62 great grandchildren.

Humble Gets Oil on Harris Long Stepout

Biggest oil news of the week is the indicated production in Humble's No. 4-B Harris Estate. It is a wide stepout from production in the new I. A. B. (Menielle Penn) field northwest of Robert Lee and is only 1½ miles southeast of the East Lygay straw pool south of Silver.

A 71-hour test of the Pennsylvania through perforations at 5,472 to 5,572 feet returned 886 feet of fluid, including 189 barrels of new oil and the remainder load oil.

Flow was through one quarter inch and 3-16 inch chokes, respectively. Gravity of oil was 43.2. Operator was flowing early this week to clean out and test.

Dual's rotary rig was stacked near the location.

Humble is completing its No. 10 Harris and the company owned Rig No. 48 moved to Harris 11 where it was drilling below 2,000 feet early this week

Roy Guffey of Abilene has been given a contract to drill Sun B-1 Foster Sims Price, wildcat 4 miles southeast of Silver.

The rotary rig will be moved from the Victor McCabe ranch, north of Silver, where Petroleum Ventures got a dry hole.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. staked two locations in the IAB Menielle (Penn) Field 14 miles northwest of Robert Lee. Both are slated for 5,900 feet with rotary.

No. 12 R. H. Harris Estate is 6,925 feet from the southwest and 450 feet from the northwest lines of Conrad Kleb Survey 504.

Site for the No. 4 R. C. Russell is 1,050 feet from the south and 1,620 feet from the west lines of Section 471, Block 1-A, H&TC Survey.

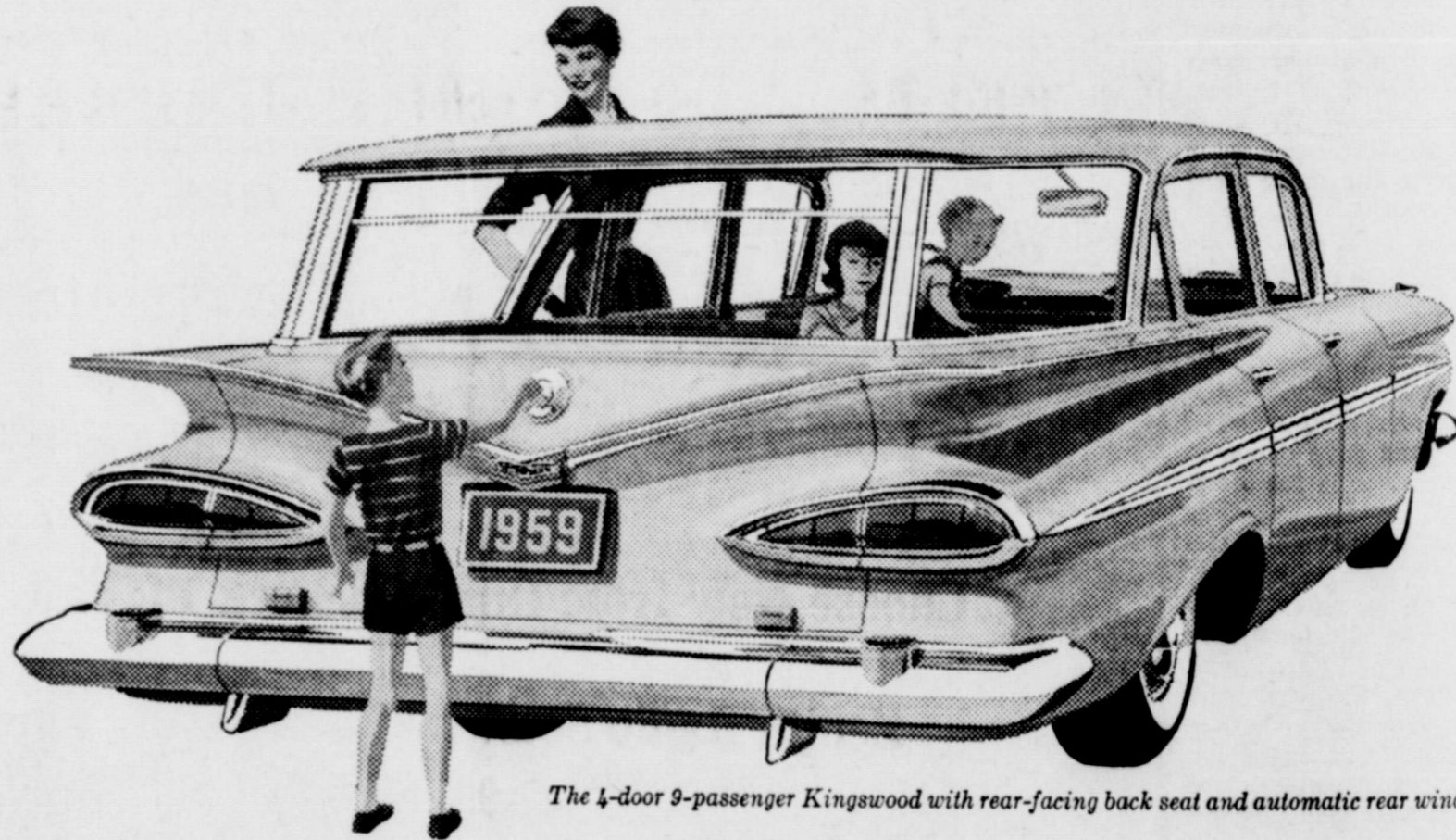

H D Agent's News Dept.

By CAROLE L. HOOPER

When I first began working in June I was told that August would be a busy month—believe me, my informants forgot to add November!

We had a good attendance at the 4-H Achievement Supper Saturday night. You can read elsewhere in the paper about the program.

Thanksgiving is fast approaching and I've heard of a number of hunters coming home with turkey so I'll pass along a few ideas I've received in the last few days on the care of turkey.

Uncooked turkey should be wrapped loosely in aluminum foil or waxed paper and stored in the refrigerator at 36-38 degrees F. Whole birds may be kept this way for three days; cut-up turkey for two days.

Freezing of uncooked stuffed birds is not recommended.

It is best to thaw a frozen bird before roasting it. To do so, loosen the wrapping, but leave it on, and place the turkey in the refrigerator to thaw. This may take two days or more depending on size of the turkey.

Proper care of left-over stuffed turkey is especially important. Remove all stuffing from the bird. Wrap meat and stuffing separately in waxed paper and store at 36-38 degrees. Use gravy or stuffing within one or two days and heat thoroughly before serving.

Instead of having to plan for left over turkey, maybe you would like to buy a half or quarter turkey this year. They are being cut this way and you can choose the breast section if you prefer white meat or the leg section if you prefer dark meat.

Here are directions for roasting half or quarter turkey.

Rub cut side with salt. Skewer skin to meat along cut edges to hold the skin and meat together during roasting. Tie the leg to the tail piece and tie a cord around the breast to hold the wing flat.

Place the bird, skin side up, on a rack in a shallow pan. Grease with cooking fat and cover with a fat-moistened cheesecloth. Baste during roasting. Set oven for 325 degrees.

Here is a guide for roasting times:

3½ to 5 pounds — 3-3½ hours.
5-8 lbs. — 3½-4 hours
8 - 12 lbs. — 4-4½ hours.

Perpare favorite stuffing and bake in a greased pan or casserole during the last one and one and one-half hours of roasting time. To perk up the stuffing baste with pan drippings or giblet broth.
