3-Year Old Rescued From Hole at Silver

A thrilling rescue of a 3-year-old Robert Lee boy, Mitt Rogers, occurred at Silver recently when he fell into a 30-foot hole.

The youngster, son of Mr. and Mrs. Benny Rogers, was visiting Silver with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ross Gann, operators of Odom Cafe.

While playing in the rear of the restaurant he fell into the deep hole which had been drilled when a septic tank was constructed. The hole, only 16 inches wide, was barely covered.

When Mitt's plight was discovered by his mother and grandparents, help was called and a rescue was completed without mishap by Odom and Johnny Walker, Pipeline employee.

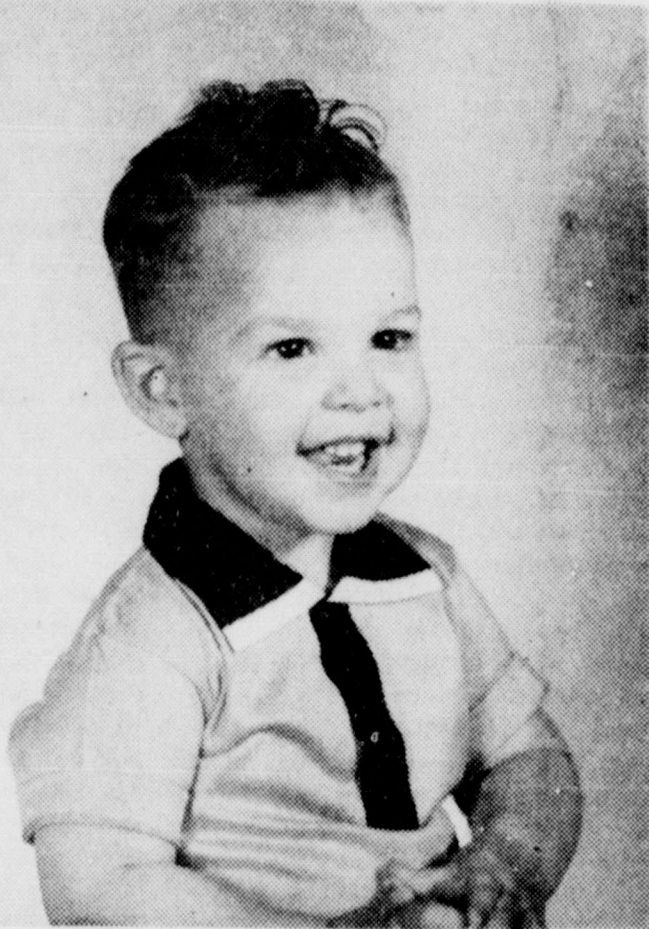
They dropped the end of a long rope to the little fellow and raised him how to tie it around himself under the arms. After he had fastened the rope, he was drawn to safety.

The men were amazed at the composure of Mitt, who didn't cry or even become hysterical. He was dirty and muddy from head to toe but was unhurt from the experience. There was only a little mud and water in the bottom of the hole.

Spillway Repairs To Cost \$64,946

Steers Win District 20B Championship

With victories over Bronte and Miles the past week, Robert Lee Steers won the base ball championship of District 20B. They were undefeated in the round robin circuit, getting two wins over Norton, Bronte and Miles.

Jerry Tinkler hurled the Thursday game at Bronte, which resulted in a score of 5-2. He gave up four hits and struck out 16. Bennie Corley was on the mound for Bronte. Richard Sims, Steer backstop, got three hits out of four trips, including a triple and a double.

Robert Lee shut out Miles 4-0 here Friday, with Paul Tinkler allowing only two hits and whiffing 13. Robert Lee garnered six hits.

A playoff next week will see Robert Lee pitted against either Wall or Talpa, who are now tied for first place in District 21B.

MRS. GOOD HONORED

Mrs. Eddie Good was honored with a Pink and Blue coffee Thursday from 9:30 until 11:00 a. m. in the home of Mrs. Frank McCabe. Other hostesses included Mmes. Vaughan Davis, Kenneth Lackey, J. F. McCabe Jr., Bill Allen, Richard Day and Mac Mathis. Refreshments were served and Mrs. Good received many beautiful gifts.

F. A. Seidel & Sons of Ballinger submitted a low bid of \$64,946.85 for spillway repairs of the Mountain Creek Dam at a public letting before Upper Colorado River Authority directors here Tuesday afternoon.

Officials of the UCRA were voted authority to sign a contract with Seidel & Sons, who will be required to post a performance bond. Work on the project is to start within ten days after the contract is signed.

Next lowest bid was \$75,614 submitted by Broughton & Erierson of Dallas. Other bids were \$82,427 made by Norman Courage of San Angelo and \$90,638 submitted by Harry Newton of Graham.

Forrest and Cotton, consulting engineers of Dallas, prepared the plans and specifications for rebuilding the spillway which washed out in October 1957 following an 8-inch rain in the Mountain Creek water shed. There has been no runoff since then and no further spillway damage.

Cost of the repairs will be added to the amount which Robert Lee must repay to the UCRA over coming years. Mountain Creek reservoir furnishes a domestic water supply for Robert Lee, and the city pays \$350 per month or \$4,200 per year on the debt. There is no interest charge.

Attending the meeting at Robert Lee State Bank Tuesday were the following UCRA directors: L. T. Youngblood, president; G. C. Allen, secretary-treasurer; Cumbie Ivey Sr., Dale Leddy, Henry Teplicek, Rufus Foster and Dick Salmon. The latter is a newly appointed director as is K. V. Northington of Ballinger, who was unable to be present.

Carl Runge, UCRA attorney, was also present and will draw up the contract for Seidel & Sons. Several contractors were present when the bids were opened and two representatives were on hand from the engineering firm.

Messrs. Youngbloods and Allen advised The Observer that the UCRA has sufficient funds on hand to pay for the spillway repairs without issuing new bonds.

SUFFERS BROKEN HIP

Mrs. Jennie Bilbo, 81 year old Robert Lee woman, sustained a fractured right hip in a fall at her home early Monday. Her nephew, Arthur Tubb, stopped by soon after the accident occurred and helped get her to the hospital. Examination showed a fracture and she was taken to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo where she underwent surgery Tuesday morning. A pin was inserted to resolve the fracture and reports indicate she is doing as well as can be expected. It is hoped she can be removed to the hospital in Robert Lee within a few days. Mrs. Bilbo is the mother of Sherman and Hal Anderson of Silver and Shelton Anderson of McCamey. She is step-mother of A. J. Bilbo and Mrs. C. W. Bessent.

County Agents News Column

The pastures and fields over the County look considerably different, are more moist than they were a month ago, but the moisture situation is far from ideal. Some operators are planting, others are re-planting and waiting for more moisture.

We have checked the soil temperature. At planting depth, the temperature is well above 70 degrees. The soil is plenty warm for seed germination, but the moisture is not ample to plant on in many cases.

Four Coke County 4-H club members will journey to College Station on June 9 to participate in the State Judging Contests. Dee Arrott, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Arrott, Tennyson; Eddie Glenn, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. K. Glenn, Bronte; Donald Spiller, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. O. Spiller, Bronte; and Kenneth Wink, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Wink, Sanco, are members of the first place soil judging team in the District.

Some ninety 4-H club members, leaders and parents met at Wojtek's skating rink on Tuesday

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night of last week for an evening of fun. The spills were numerous, but apparently they were enjoyed.

The United States Department of Agriculture has been for the past few years conducting field studies on controlling screw worms in the Southeastern States. Now they are expanding the study to include several Southwestern States and Mexico. You may have been contacted on the issue or may have heard about it.

Outstanding results have been obtained in the Southeastern States where the blow fly is rather isolated. Sterile male flies were released over the infested areas. Their mating with the native female flies resulted in a majority of the eggs that were produced being infertile. If the process of the blow fly in the Southwest can be controlled, the program will be worth millions of dollars to Southwestern stock men.

It's still not too late to fertilize your lawn. And fertilizer will pay for itself on a lawn with the water saved during the coming months. Two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1000 square feet of lawn is a suitable application rate.

The pecan nut case bearer will

be making its debut in the future, and may have in a few cases already. All indications point to the period from May 15 to June 1 as being the most favorable during which to spray to control the casebearer. However, each yard or each bottom must be checked to find the exact time to spray. Get your sprayer in working order then check daily for the case bearer eggs on the bottom end of the nuts. If you find several eggs in a tree and a few larvae hatched out, spray the tree. Spraying your tree too early or after the larvae is near maturity will be of little or no value.

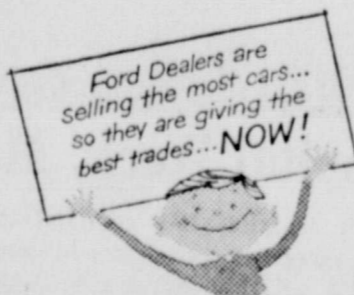

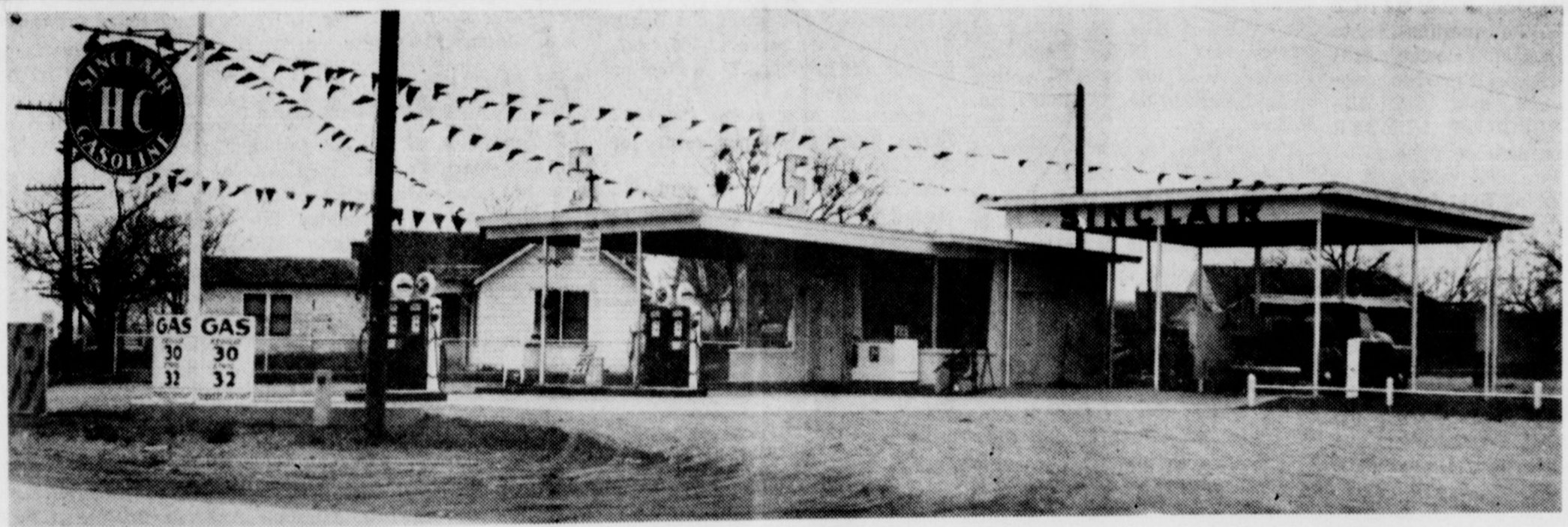

NOTICE OF ELECTION ON PETITION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS BY COMMISSIONERS' PRECINCT NUMBER 1 OF COKE COUNTY, TEXAS

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF COKE ss
TO THE RESIDENT PROPERTY TAXPAYING VOTERS OF COMMISSIONERS' PRECINCT NUMBER 1 OF COKE COUNTY, TEXAS, AND TO ALL OTHER PERSONS CONCERNED:

TAKE NOTICE that a petition signed by Sterling Lindsey and more than Fifty (50) other persons, as resident property taxpaying voters of COMMISSIONERS' PRECINCT NUMBER 1, a political entity, TEXAS, has heretofore been submitted to the Commissioners' Court of said County, wherein such petitioners assert that they desire the Court to order an election to be held in said COMMISSIONERS' PRECINCT NUMBER 1, for the purpose of submitting the following proposition to the qualified resident property taxpaying voters of said Precinct, for their action thereupon:

"WHETHER OR NOT the bonds of COMMISSIONERS' PRECINCT NUMBER 1, a political subdivision of COKE COUNTY, TEXAS, shall be issued in the total principal sum of ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$150,000) for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, and which bonds are to bear interest at a rate not exceeding FOUR AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (4½%) per annum, and are to be payable at such times as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court, but not to exceed TWENTY (20) years from the date thereof; and that at such election there shall also be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of the said COMMISSIONERS' PRECINCT NUMBER 1, the question as to whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property within the said COMMISSIONERS' PRECINCT NUMBER 1, for the purpose of paying the interest on the said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption or payment thereof at maturity."

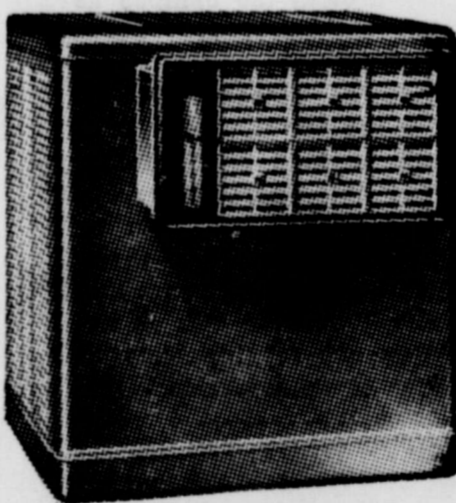

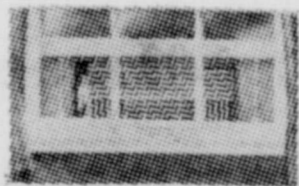
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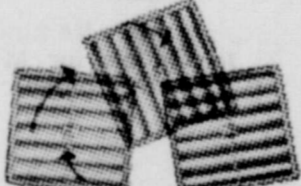

ranch owner in Llano County received more than \$23,000 from deer and turkey hunting permits last year, Mr. Jacobs reported.

The speaker urged hunters to understand gun safety and help prevent accidental shooting of other hunters. He also urged more care in fishing, stating that 20% of all accidental deaths in Texas are caused by drowning, including traffic accidents.

None of the drowned persons taken out of the lakes have been equipped with life preservers. It is smart to have one, he added.

Wild films were shown and proved highly interesting.

John T. Stewart, club president, presided at the meeting. He urged members to attend the district Lions convention in Colorado City.

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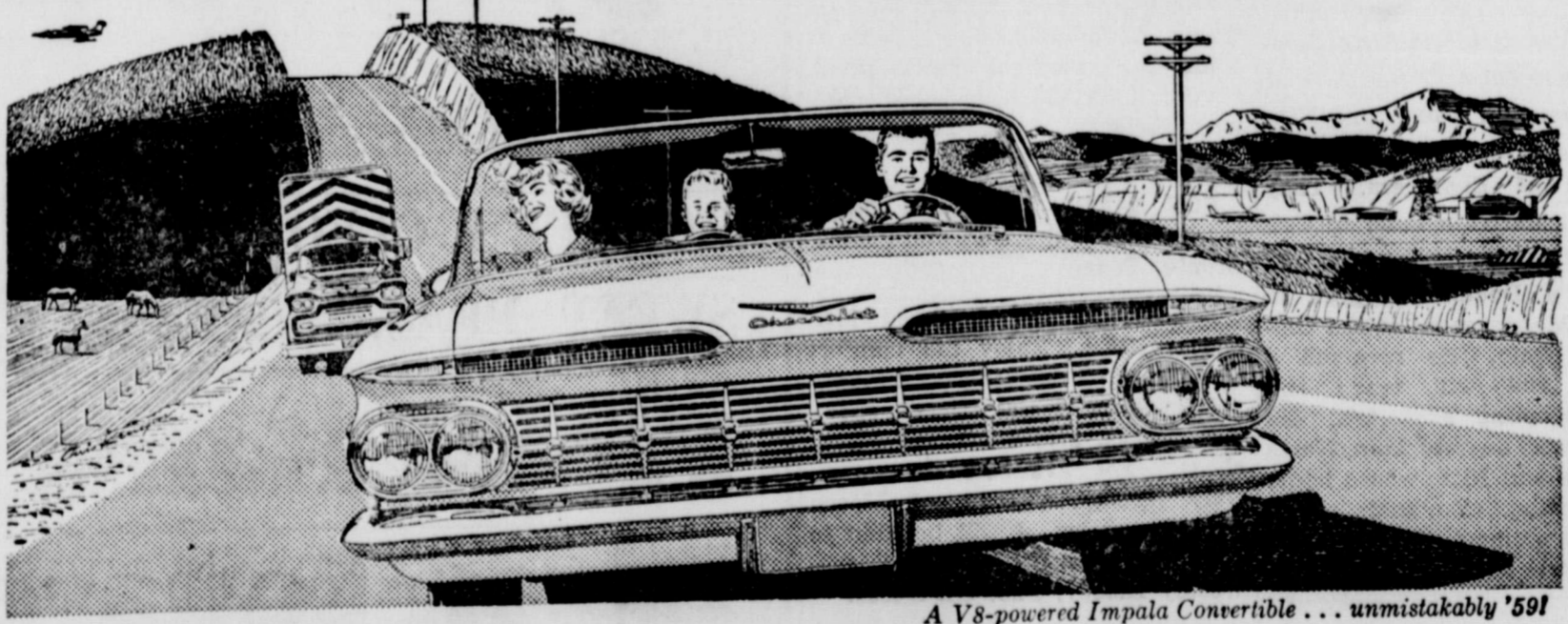

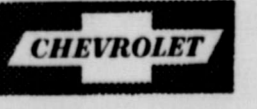
